Questions began to arise since the Schleicher County officers' vehicles are tinted very dark and numerous vehicles passed on the highway were noted with "dark" windows. How could one vehicle get singled out and others not even stopped or questioned? It makes no sense. All that aside, when a call was placed to determine what steps were necessary to resolve the matter, the Justice of the Peace explained that "With those dark windows, the car looked as if it came from Mexico because a lot of cars coming from there have windows that almost look black." To me this seems to be discrimination based on where you are from or what type of vehicle you drive. Having had a similar incident in California, I assumed that, like there, a fine would be paid after the windows were shown/proven as corrected. That was not possible. Payment of the ticket is the only way to resolve the problem. I understand that Eldorado has

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## 2002 Agricultural Census surveys arriving



After sixty years, we've learned a little patience and that what's good for city folk doesn't necessarily apply out here.
