Soil And Water Stewardship Week April 29 - May 6

The Eldorado-Divide Soil and Water Conservation District has announced they will join in the national observance of Soil and Water Stewardship Week, taking place April 29-May 6, according to an announcement by Tom Enochs, chairman of the district.

The theme of this year's observance is "Citizens of all Creation". "This focus is especially appropriate as our need for stewardship is vital if we are to maintain the productive capabilities of our basic natural resources of soil and water. Together we must work for the good of all to utilize, conserve and properly manage those resources in our care," said Enochs.

The Eldorado-Divide SWCD was organized in 1941 for the purpose of offering farmers, ranchers, and the local community a voluntary conservation technical assistance program through which individuals could seek and request conservation assistance to meet their individual land's capabilities and needs.

"Basically it is the district's responsibility to provide technical assistance when requested, relative to proper soil use and treatment, erosion control practices, solve drainage problems and assist farmers and ranchers with crop, range and pastureland management," concluded Enochs.

The National Association of Conservation Districts has sponsored Soil and Water Stewardship Week in the U.S. since 1955, in cooperation with the nation's nearly 3,000 soil and water conservation districts.

being unsure...well, you can see where this is leading.

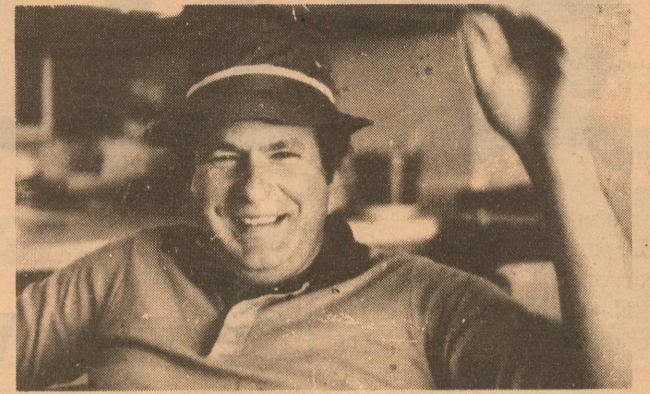
I also have never had the courage to flip the sealed bag over to see if all the stuff stays inside. Somehow I think that only works for the lady in the TV commercial, but I am not sure.

Voting Deadline Nears For May 5 Election

Secretary of State George Bayoud reminded Texans that Tuesday, May 1 is the last day of extended absentee voting for the May 5 municipal, school board and the hundreds of other local elections across the state.

Registered voters have until

ballots for the Saturday, May 5 elections, Bayoud said.

"Many important decisions on issues and representation will be decided in these elections," Bayoud said. "I hope that those Texans who have decided who they are going to vote for will

Tuesday to appear in person at polling places to cast absentee consider taking advantage of the extended voting period."

Under a 1987 law, registered voters in Texas can cast absentee ballots by personal appearance during the extended voting period. Extended voting for the May 5 elections began on Monday, April 16. Those who vote during the extended absen-

tee period need no excuse to do so.

A separate period still exists for those who cast absentee ballots by mail. But those who vote absentee by mail must give a reason for doing so.

An Apple A Day

Cigarette smoking, beer drinking and eating high-fat foods all may contribute to esophageal cancer. This study of 178 cases of esophageal cancer in western New York found cigarette and alcohol use strongly associated with the disease. Interestingly, beer drinkers had a

much greater risk than wine or hard liquor drinkers.

Foods that are high in retinol (Vitamin A), such as dairy products and organ meats, also were associated with an increased risk, above and beyond the risk of eating high-calorie, high-fat diets.

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Drive Aware -- Motorcycles Are Out There

Last year, 243 motorcyclists were killed and 6,812 were injured in traffic accidents in Texas. More than half of these accidents involved another vehicle. According to national statistics, two-thirds are caused, not by the motorcyclist, but by the driver.

"The biggest cause of motorcycle accidents is motorists who don't see the motorcycle," said Henry Palma, Manager of the Department of Public Safety Motorcycle Safety Bureau.

National statistics show that more than half of the accidents are caused by a driver who did not see the motorcyclist.

"We want drivers to become more aware of motorcycles on the road," Palma said. "By driving aware, motorists are helping

make the streets and highways safer for everyone."

Why doesn't the average driver see an approaching motorcyclist? Motorists tend to look for other cars, not for motorcycles, Palma said. And because of its small profile, a motorcycle is harder to see.

A motorcyclist's riding pattern also differs from that of a car and is harder to predict. Traffic, weather, and road conditions often require motorcyclists to respond differently than drivers do.

Drivers can drive aware if they know what to expect from motorcyclists and the situations where accidents are likely to occur. These high-risk situations are when motorists make a left turn in front of motorcycles;

when a motorcycle is in a car's blind spot; during hazardous road conditions; in strong winds; and when large vehicles block a motorcycle from a driver's view.

Palma offered some tips on driving aware. First, anticipate a motorcyclist's maneuvers; they may change lanes according to traffic conditions. Signal your intentions, and look carefully in all directions. Respect a motorcycle as a full-sized vehicle with equal rights to the road and to a full lane. Allow plenty of space when following a motorcycle. And most importantly, look out for motorcyclists, especially at intersections.

To reduce the number of motorcycle accidents and fatalities caused by the drivers of other vehicles, the DPS Motor-

cycle Safety Bureau has undertaken a state-wide public information and education campaign on Driver Awareness. The theme of the program is "Drive Aware - Motorcyclists Are Out There."

The Motorcycle Safety Bureau of the Department of Public Safety was created in 1983 by the legislature to improve rider skills and reduce the number of severity of motorcycle accidents in the state. The program sets up and monitors motorcycle training classes throughout the state and promotes motorcycle safety and awareness.

Foxworth Moves Up To L.A.T. Presidency

On April 21, Walter L. Foxworth was formally installed as President of the Lumbermen's Association of Texas, the largest single state affiliate of the National Lumber and Building Materials Dealers Association.

Foxworth, a 31 year veteran of the lumber business, moves into the presidency from that of first vice president. He stated that he is glad to be taking over the reins of the Association during a period of rising optimism in the Texas construction industry.

"Most indicators are pointing up, and a modest but definite increase in building permits of all kinds supports our hope for better times ahead in construction related businesses," Foxworth said.

The Association, which is headquartered in Austin, claims significant political clout. "We believe in getting involved in the

legislative process in matters where the economic well-being of Texas is involved. With 803 active dealers and associate members in our group, we feel that our opinions and suggestions are well received by the state legislature," said Foxworth.

In addition to legislative involvement, the Association assists its membership in areas of effective dealer services, safety, and public and employee education.

According to local manager Steve Lanik, Foxworth-Galbraith Lumber Company has operated in Eldorado since 1939.

Representative Payee's Use Of Funds

Representative payees are appointed to handle the funds of Social Security beneficiaries who are unable to handle their own funds. To carry out this responsibility, the representative payee must keep informed of the person's current and future needs.

The representative payee's first responsibility is to make certain that the person's day-to-day needs for food, clothing, shelter and personal expenses are met. Beneficiaries who can handle small amounts of spending money should have this made available to them. Social Security

benefits may then be used for any special needs, such as school expenses, rehabilitation or medical expenses, insurance, premiums, or payments on a house in which the person has an interest.

Any money that remains after basic and special needs are met must be saved or invested; money should not be kept at home where it can be lost or stolen, and should not be mixed with the representative payee's own funds. Preferred investments are United States savings bonds. These should be registered in the

name of the beneficiary and with his or her Social Security number. The representative payee is listed in his or her capacity.

Surplus funds should be kept in an interest-bearing

account that shows the beneficiary as owner.

Additional information about benefits and the role of the representative payee may be obtained from any Social Security office.

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Nabers Says Jobless Rate Looks Good!

"With the numbers this good, it ought to feel better than it does," Commissioner Mary Scott Nabers of the Texas Employment Commission said, referring to the new statewide unemployment rate that places the Texas jobless rate at the lowest level in over five years.

The March, 1990 rate is placed at 5.7 percent. "Although we are still higher than the national average, we are down from last month's rate of 7.0 percent and that's a relief," Nabers said.

"One year ago the jobless rate was 6.8 percent and the last time Texas saw a rate this low was December of 1984. This leads us to believe that the economy is stronger but we are not confident that the average household is enjoying a higher standard of living," Nabers said.

Nabers went on to say that she also believes the hiring done by the federal government in connection with the Census enhanced the state's employment picture and pointed out that those are temporary jobs.

Growth in Nonagricultural Wage and Salary Employment (the count of Nonfarm Salaried Jobs) in the State slowed between February and March, with just over 15,000 jobs added during the month. Almost three-fourths of the total increase in

March was concentrated in Services, where Health Services and Business and Repair Services showed the strongest gains. Trade exhibited moderate advances in March, as did government. Losses occurred in Manufacturing, Construction and in Finance, Insurance and Real estate.

All of the Metropolitan Statistical Areas for which data are currently available reported lower unemployment rates in March compared to February levels.

MSA's with the lowest unemployment rates in March included: Bryan-College Station, at 3.2 percent; Lubbock with a 3.9 percent; Austin with a 4.1 percent rate; Dallas, Fort Worth-Arlington and Victoria which had a 4.5 percent rate; and Houston, with a 4.6 percent jobless rate.

Areas with the highest rates in March continued to be the border MSA's. These included: McAllen-Edinburg-Mission, with a rate of 21.4; Laredo with a 11.4 percent rate; Brownsville-Harlingen, at 10.8 percent; El Paso, with 9.5 percent unemployment rate.

The Civilian Labor Force estimates for Schleicher County for the month of March show the total civilian labor force at 1,250 with total employment at 1,194 and total unemployment at 56. This means a 4.5 percent rate of unemployment.

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Not even the most efficient protective device in an electrical system will do its job unless it is allowed to function as intended. Know the functions and limitations of appliances and supply equipment; never operate beyond those limitations.

GROUNDING

Many appliances and power tools are supplied with three-wire cords and plugs; the third wire is used to ground exposed metal parts. In the event of an electrical fault in the appliance, the fault current is drained away into the grounding systems rather than exposing the user to shock. It is necessary to make sure that the ground circuit is completed at the receptacle for this safeguard to be effective.

Never cut the ground pin from the plug in order to operate the device from a two-wire receptacle. The two-wire system provides no protective ground circuit and may expose the user to dangerous current. When in doubt, consult an electrician to secure access to ground.

First Annual Wool, Mohair Contest Held In Eldorado

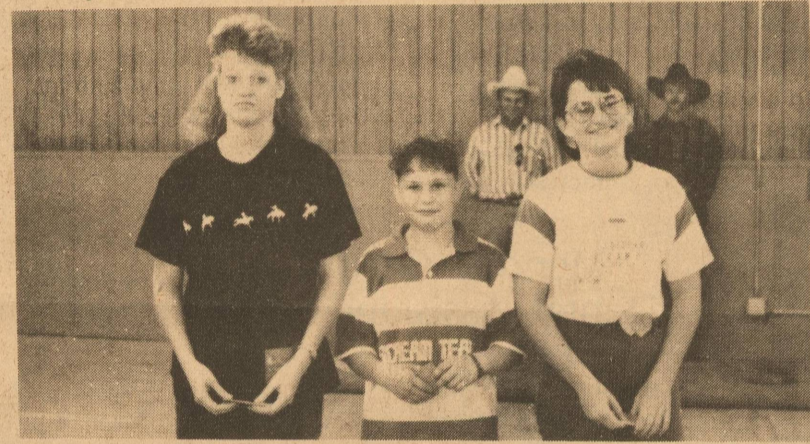

The Novice Wool and Mohair Judging Team is pictured, l-r, Lavonna Lloyd, Catherine Lloyd and Rachel Hunley.



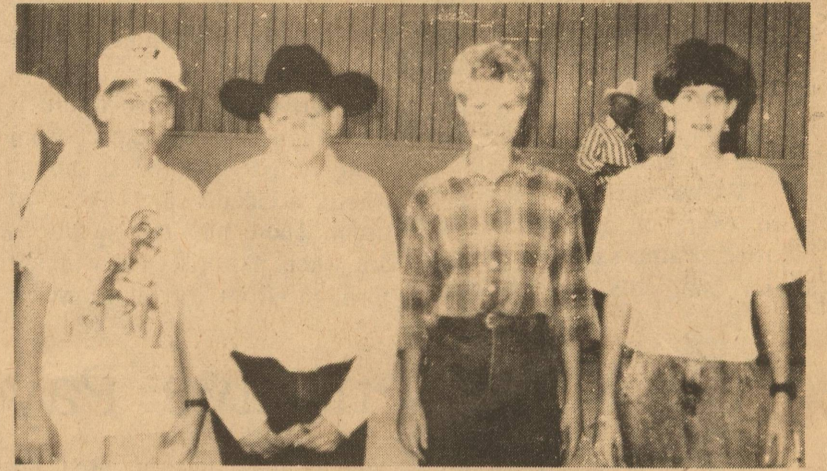
Junior Wool and Mohair Judging Team, l-r, Jody Hooten, Amy Russell and Amy Hilliard, is pictured here.

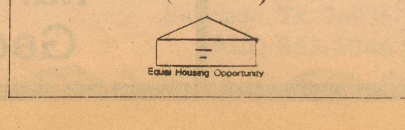


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
