BUILDING IS PROMINENT IN HISTORY OF PAST YEAR'S PROGRESS IN ELDORADO

On The Divide

We who plod up and down Main street each day of the year, looking at the pavement and occassionally raising the eyes to greet a friend with, "Hello, how are you." might find ourselves lost right at home one of these West Texas davs.

What we mean is that this man's town has growing pains; it's voice is changing and is already thinking about a long pair of pants.

Visitors on the divide just a year ago, would hardly know the place at the close of 1939-probably couldn't even find the postoffice. And, if our predictions are right, there will be even greater advancement during the next dozen months.

Eldorado will probably have a textile mill in operation before 1940 is half gone-the first for West Texas. There will be great improvements in both the business and residential districts.

In short-Eldorado is a growing West Texas town.

An extensive program of residences and business construction has taken a prominent ulace in the news during the past 12 months in Eldorado and Schleicher county. Dwelling construction has topped the list with approximately 35 new homes being built by citizens of the county.

By this plan cash awards in varying sums are given for suggestions actually adopted by the management.
