Courthouse Dedication Set

Mustard Yellow! Did you know that our beautiful limestone rock courthouse was painted yellow in about 1937? Needless to say, Schleicher County judge C.S. McKinney was not too popular after this paint was spread!

A cleaning job and new lettering was added and the courthouse looked better than when it was built in 1924.

Many festive, fun, as well as serious events have taken place in and around this beautiful old courthouse.

Some of the fun things are the Mias Amigas Club annual reunions held for ex-students of Eldorado schools; Annual Schleicher County Days Celebrations honoring our rich heritage; 4th of July barbecues; parties, dances and dedications.

One such festive affair was February 27, 1941 when Eldorado's population quadrupled for the dedication of West Texas's first Woolen Mill - a ceremony attended

by Gov. W. Lee O'Daniel and other dignitaries from throughout Texas. A crowd of about 6,000 watched as a grand parade, starting the days celebration, marched around the old courthouse.

July 4, 1957 - the courthouse was the scene for another important affair. Gen. Luedcke Day was attended by hundreds of locals and visitors.

In the early days, before T.V., on sunny summer Sunday afternoons, young people spent time on the courthouse lawn visiting.

Important events have taken place in the Schleicher County Courthouse also. October 2, 1940, State Attorney O.C. Fisher presented the Calcote murder case to twelve jury members who found Emilians Benavidez guilty, and he was sentenced to the death penalty. Benavidez was also charged with the murder of three other members of the Calcote family. Hundreds of spectators, Texas Rangers and news reporters came to hear this trial.

Many stories were written about these brutal murders.

Today, the courthouse looks great after a cleaning job and repairs and years of excellent care. It has served Schleicher County for many years and will serve the citizens for years to come.

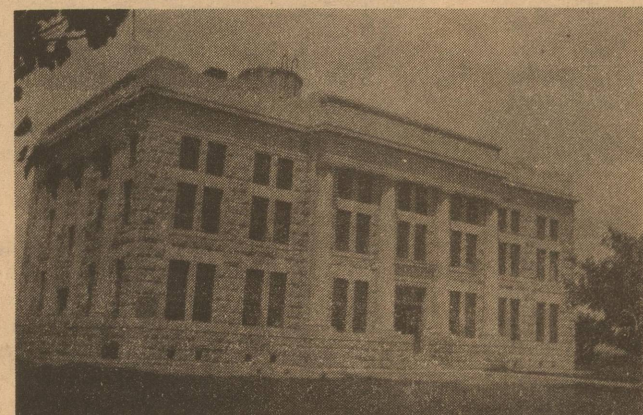
The courthouse has recently received an Official Texas Historical Marker from the State Historical Commission in Austin. Qualifications required in order to be eligible for an official marker are:

Structure must be 50 years of age, must be historically significant, and must not have had major structure alteration; Approval from THC Marker Committee (takes a minimum of six months); The marker process takes about one year or longer. Schleicher County citizens should feel very honored to have received a marker for the courthouse. A dedication will be held Monday, March 23, at 2:00 p.m. on the courthouse square. Everyone is invited.

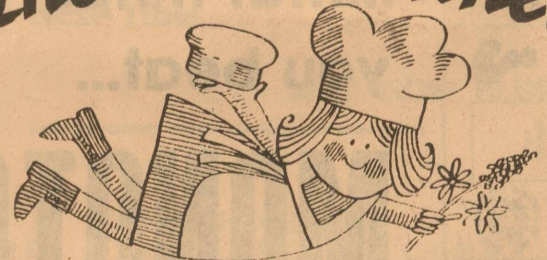
