Dr. Johnson Resigns

Local physician, Patrick Johnson announced Monday night, that he would be leaving Eldorado at the end of May. The announcement was made to the Board of Directors of the Schleicher County Medical Center at their regularly scheduled meeting.

Doctor Johnson and his family will be moving to Farmington, Missouri, where Doctor Johnson will be joining a large group practice.

Jim Blum, hospital administrator said that Dr. Johnson would be greatly missed. According to Blum, Johnson has been, "wonderful for our hospital and nursing home. We really hate to lose him."

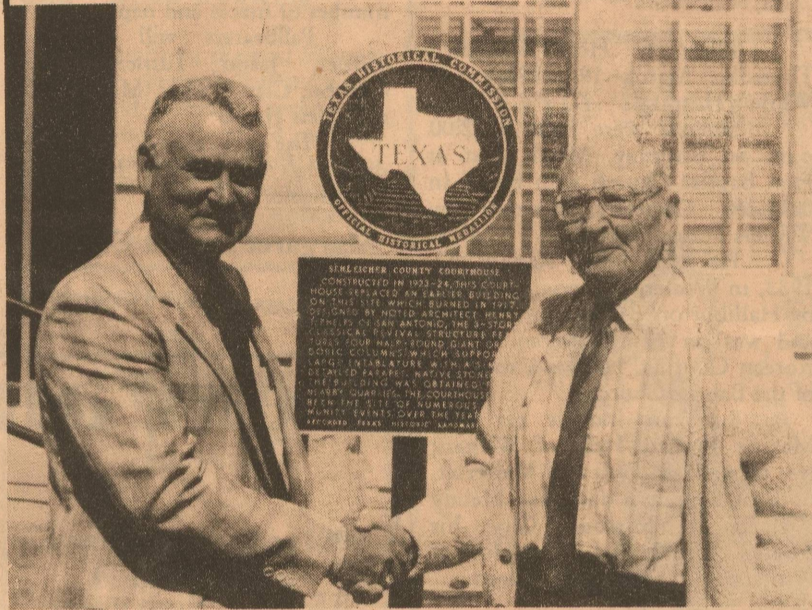
The hospital board has started a search committee for a new doctor. William Edmiston, DVM, will be chairing the committee.

"We are sad that Dr. Johnson is leaving. I will miss him both as a

member of the hospital board and personally. I think that they are moving to be closer to family. We are actively searching for a family physician who would like to move into an established practice," said Dr. Edmiston.

The March wind carried the bright red, white and blue ribbons back and forth around the newly placed Texas Historical Marker. The marker stands at the front entrance of the Schleicher County Courthouse, symbolizing the county's rich heritage.

68 year old courthouse. The older citizens reminisced of past days around the old government building. Dick Bearce, who served as judge of Schleicher County from 1955 until 1967 stated that he remembers well when the beautiful limestone rock building was elected. He said he also remembered when the old wood frame courthouse, built in 1902, burned to the ground, on March 24, 1917.

Missionary Couple To Present Program

Next Wednesday, March 25th, a missionary couple who have worked in the Far East for forty years, will present an audiovisual report on their work in the mission field. The program will begin at 6:00 p.m. with an informal potluck supper in the basement Fellowship Hall of the Presbyterian Church.

Malcolm and Jean Carrick are both ordained ministers of the Gospel. Their career in missions, beginning in 1952, has included the founding of three churches in an

Asian nation where Buddhism, Shintoism, and secularism claim most followers and where Christians form only 2% of the population. Their latest church development was in Kawanishi, a suburb of Osaka, located on the bullet-rail commuter line. "This was the first church we have started with ZERO people. The first four months we worshipped alone. We now have a thriving church. Some who responded are what we call 'sleeping Christians' - they live far from their home

churches and, not knowing there was a church nearby, have not attended church for many years. Most, however, are not yet Christians and know very little about Jesus. Intense family pressures often deter baptism even where there is great interest in the Gospel."

The Carricks will share what Christ has done (and is doing) in that industrial giant of a nation, Japan. All friends in the community are invited to come and hear their inspiring message.

Rabies Risk Present

According to local veterinarian, William Edmiston, rabies has been found in domestic animals in Schleicher County. Rabies is a deadly disease that can be transmitted to humans though the body fluids of animals.

Although rabies is endemic to wild animals in this area, it is rarely discovered in domestic livestock.

According to Edmiston, any animal who, swaggers, falls, foams at the mouth, has convulsions or strange eye movements should be suspected as possibly having this disease.

Make no contact whatsoever with any nocturnal animal (coons, possums, skunks, etc) that is seen in the daytime. If you see a nocturnal animal during the day, you should kill it and leave it alone. Keep dogs

and other domestic animals from the possibly infected animal. After it has been in the sun for several hours, put on gloves, and use a piece of wire to grab a leg of the animal and dispose of it. You could also pick the animal up with a shovel. Sunlight and air will destroy the rabies virus but it takes several hours after the animal dies for the virus to die.

Anyone who is exposed or has an animal who has been exposed to a potentially rabid animal should contact Doctor Edmiston or another veterinarian immediately. If you cannot immediately get in touch with a veterinarian, after killing the suspect animal, it should be kept cool, but not wet until a veterinarian can be contacted.

TOP OF THE DIVIDE

The last thing was because Tennessee schools ranked higher than Texas schools. Sorry folks, the only equitable way

to fund schools properly is through a graduated income tax. Right again, the rich ought to pay more even though they usually have less kids. The thing is, if we educate those poor kids better they get better paying jobs and spend more money on the things that make the rich people richer. This is called the "Trickle up" theory of economic recovery. You see, this theory was used in 1933 and it worked. Maybe we ought to try it again.

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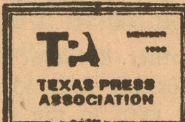
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Pina Attends Cancer Update 1992

Delia Pina, RN at Dr. Patrick Johnson's office, and chairman for the Services and Rehabilitation for the American Cancer Society in Schleicher County attended the third annual Cancer Update 1992 for Physicians and Nurses on Saturday, March 14th.

The symposium was sponsored by the Baptist Memorial Hospital System in San Antonio. The conference was intended for Primary Care Physicians in Family Practice, Oncologist, Internal Medicine, Pathologist and nurses that work with this Doctors or as Oncology Nurses.

This year's program was planned in conjunction with a week-long educational focus on cancer and cancer prevention for the community and health professionals.

The critical aspect was the focus in the involvement of a

multidisciplinary team which reflects the reality of effective cancer care today.

There was a wide range of topics including Pain Management, Diagnostic and Screening Modalities, Curable Cancers, Discussion of Success and Survivorship. The annual Dr. A.O. Senerouche Pathology lecture was held on advances in colon cancer detection and treatment.

Delia Pina is a 1954 graduate of Baptist Memorial Hospital School of Nursing in San Antonio and was a student of Dr. A.O. Senerouche while in Nurses training. Mrs. Pina has served as a Volunteer Service and Rehabilitation Chairman for Schleicher County since 1970 and has served on the board of the American Cancer Society for District 4, the San Angelo area.

On October 2, 1989, she was given the Sword of Hope Award. This award is reserved for those special volunteers exemplifying the spirit of cancer control symbolized by the Sword of Hope.
