## Ministerial Alliance Community Easter Week Services Something's Good About "Good Friday;" Something's Great About Easter

Everyone in the community is invited to join in two community-wide services during the Easter season, on Good Friday and Easter Sunday, sponsored by the Eldorado Ministerial Alliance.

The Good Friday Service will be held at 7:00 p.m. on Friday, April 17, at the First Presbyterian Church. Highlights of the worship include the combined choir of three churches singing "O Sacred Head Now Wounded". This song, written in the twelfth century by Bernard of Clairvaux (1091-1153), expresses the devotion of a man who entered the Cistercian monastery at the age of 22 with such zeal that he persuaded 25 friends and all four of his

brothers to join him (one of whom was married and had children). Nicknamed "The Mellifluous Doctor" for his eloquence, Bernard was the most influential church leader of his generation and preached the Second Crusade to regain the Holy Land. An epidemic in the Rhineland in 1146 unleashed a terrible anti-Semitic persecution which was halted in an enduring statement of Bernard of Clairvaux's gratitude for Jesus Christ's suffering on the cross. The music reached its final form in a harmonization by Johann Sebastian Bach in 1729 as part of his "St. Matthew's Passion."

The service will also feature the Tenebrae or "Service of

Shadows," a moving candlelight service by twelve men from various churches symbolizing the apostles at the Last Supper. Following Tenebrae will be an open service of Holy Communion.

An offering will be taken to help with the local charitable work of the Eldorado Ministerial Alliance. All funds stay within the county and are used for food, clothing, medicines, youth programming, utility hookups for the needy, and assistance of stranded travelers.

The Community-wide Easter Sunrise Service will be held at 6:30 a.m. in Eldorado Cemetery on Sunday, April 19. The service,

celebrating the victory of the Resurrection, will take place between the flagpoles, and includes a triumphal brass fanfare. Coffee and doughnuts are provided free. Ministers are traditionally available after the service to have individual prayer at the graves by loved ones.

Participation in community services of the Eldorado Ministerial Alliances is open to all and does not imply acceptance of the beliefs or doctrines of any of the churches in the Alliance.

## Proceeds Of Book To Benefit Boys Ranch

West Texas Boys Ranch of San Angelo will be receiving the proceeds of a family memoir about Gene Newman of Miles, Texas. Newman a deceased San Angelo area rancher who cared deeply about WTBR, was president from 1974 to 1976 and served on the board for many years. He was a nationally known figure in the cattle industry. President of the Texas Cattle Feeders Association, Newman also served on the boards of the National Cattleman's Association

and National Cutting Horse Association.

Newman not only was one of the founders of the National Intercollegiate Rodeo Association in the late 1940's, but also established Veribest Cattle Feeders near San Angelo and Newman & Bonner Feed Mill in San Angelo with partner Johnny Bonner. In addition to his other endeavors, he ranched in Texas, Montana, Colorado and Mexico.

"Each man is a blend of stories. Some told straight-out,

matter-of-fact. Some told with fondness and sentiment right there on the surface. Others told with words disjointed by laughter. And sometimes, certain stories are forgotten, overlooked or not told. They all make the man," said Roger Ellison, Chief Executive Officer of WTBR.

Cowman to Cutter: Remembering Gene Newman in the Words of Those Who Knew Him started out as a simple project by Newman's children to commemorate their dad. In writing,

editing and reading the stories about their dad with co-author Cynthia Buchanan Cowley of San Angelo, Suzy Watson and Nancy Newman of Miles and Johnny Newman of Carlsbad, New Mexico, say they have begun to understand their father a little better.

"This is sort of a healing process for us," said Suzy Watson. "Daddy was a very busy man, always doing something. We missed him even when we had him! Now we don't have him. But we do have the stories his friends have told us."

The family said that the book seemed to take on the characteristics of their dad as it grew to an almost overwhelming proportion. Then a purpose for the madness was discovered.

As the stories from friends and family about Newman rolled in, West Texas Boys Ranch was mentioned time and again. The children said, "Well, yes, Daddy had been a supporter of the Ranch and loved the boys." The message came clear as a bell what must be done.

Arrangements were made, and on a December morning at the Newman/Watson Ranch in Miles, Texas, the late rancher's children paid tribute to their father. The proceeds of *Cowman to Cutter* will now and forever go to one of Gene Newman's longtime commitments, West Texas Boys Ranch.

Cynthia Cowley says that there are some serious moments in the book, but it tends to stay on the lighter side of life. Gene Newman was an "uncommon man" as former Texas Congressman Tom Loeffler of San Antonio said in his chapter. Hopefully this book will produce uncommon results for the WTBR.

Other storytellers in Cowman to Cutter include such national and local figures as writer Elmer Kelton, publisher Stanley Frank, cutting horse legend Buster Welch, cow trader and author Wad Choate, rodeo pioneer Chili Cole, veterinarian Wes Bonner, cowboy artist Wayne Baize and agribusinessman Toad Tucker, plus a host of others.

The Crockett County Museum, Crockett County Historical Society and the Crockett County Historical Commission cordially invites all interested persons to hear Dr. Mott Davis on Tuesday, April 14th at 5:00 p.m. in the Crockett Room of the Ozona National Bank.

Dr. Mott is the Professor Emeritus of Anthropology and Archeology at the University of Texas at Austin. He received his professional training and his doctoral degree at Harvard University. He was on the faculty of The University of Nebraska at Lincoln from 1948 to 1956. He

moved to The University of Texas in Austin in 1956, and worked here in research and teaching until retirement from teaching in 1989; his research work is continuing. He is the co-founder of the undergraduate Archeological Studies Training Program at the University of Texas at Austin. He is also the

founder and Director of the University of Texas Radiocarbon Dating Laboratory.

He has done principal archeological field work in Texas and has been in East and Central Texas, and in recent historic Texas locations such as 19th-century Washington on the Brazos (where

the Texas Declaration of Independence from Mexico was drawn up) and in a Spanish mission site near Victoria. Lesser field work has been carried out in many other parts of Texas. He has also done field work in Nebraska, Wyoming, and Canada, and on a Roman site

## County Agents Report

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service (TAEX) in cooperation with the Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA) will hold private pesticide applicator training session at 2:00 p.m. on April 15th at the County Extension office in Eldorado.

The training will provide producers the information needed to pass the requirements to become a Licensed Private Applicator.

Licensed Applicators can then buy Restricted and State-Limited-Use agricultural chemicals

for their farming and ranching operations. As of October 2, 1990, there were 306 restricted-use and 175 state-limited-use pesticides.

There are two types of private applicator licenses; Certified Private Applicator and Licensed Private Applicator.

A Licensed Private Applicator status gives the licensed person the right to buy and apply restricted-use or state-limited-use pesticides. The pesticides bought are to be used to produce agricultural commodities as long as the chemicals are applied in a manner

consistent with the product label.

Chemicals can be used on property the licensee owns, rents or generally controls or on another persons property if the applicator is not paid in any way other than the trading of personal services between producers of agricultural commodities.

The second type license, the Certified Private Applicator License, is similar to the Licensed Private applicator except that it was issued before January 10, 1989. The major difference is that this-type licensee can no longer buy the chemical and supervise its application. He must apply it himself.

Records of applied herbicides are required to be kept for two years following application.

TAEX and TDA personnel have details.

To keep both licenses current, licensees are required to recertify by earning 15 TDA-approved continuing education credits or CEU's each five-year period thereafter. Of these, two credits must be in laws and regulations and one in integrated pest management. The 15 credits allow the license holder to continue buying and applying restricted-use and state-limited-use pesticides for the next five years. However, during that five-year period an additional 15 CEU's must be earned.

## Health News

With spring here people are getting out more playing golf, working in the yard or garden and many other outdoor activities that expose them to the sun and increases their chances of getting skin cancer. Wearing a hat could save your life according to a study from Brown University. Surveying deaths from nonmelanoma skin cancer in Rhode Island between 1979 and 1987, researchers found that more than half were due to squamous cell carcinoma and, of those, nearly half started on the ear.

Most of the fatal squamous cell carcinomas in the study was due to exposure to the sun over the years. The greater majority of those who died were men probably because their hair did not cover their ears.

For those people who are outside in the sun they should wear a hat that covers their ears, not just a cap. Also if they are outside in the sun they should use sun tan lotion and take anti-oxidants like vitamins A&E and selenium to protect them against cancer.

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# State School Budget

In 1990-91 school trustees budgeted 30 percent more for operating high schools than for elementary sites. Statewide an average of \$3,280 per student was budgeted for high schools, \$2,645 for the 1,073 middle schools, and \$2,543 per child for the 3,594 elementary schools in Texas. In addition, \$1,014 per student was budgeted for the central office.

For the Schleicher County ISD the figures were \$3,384.16 for high schools, \$2,532.96 for middle schools, and \$2,395.97 for the elementary campuses while \$1,547.34 per student was budgeted for the central office.

The figures come from a new report *Tidemarks 1990-91 School Camous Budgets in Texas*, a publication of the Texas Research League, an Austin-based, educational corporation engaged in governmental research.

The report also lists the amounts for direct classroom instruction. The statewide averages were \$2,366 per student for high schools, \$1,965 for middle schools, and \$2,030 for elementary campuses. For the Schleicher County ISD, the comparable figures were \$2,836.20 for high schools, \$2,249.56 for middle schools, and \$2,173.35 for elementary grades.

The report is designed to provide reference points for site-based committees and the taxing public to evaluate future school budgets by types of campuses and for individual high school sites.

Excluding small single-campus schools, there are 1,059 high schools in Texas ranging in size from 83 schools with less than 100 students to seven campuses with more than 3,000 students. For these high schools, \$2,328 was budgeted per student for classroom instruction, or 72.3 percent of the \$3,221 per student for total operating expenses. Locally, Eldorado High School had \$2,836.20 for classroom instruction and \$3,384.16 for total current operating expenses.

Eldorado High School had \$306.76 per student for school administration, \$95.57 for cocurricular activities including

extra curricular, \$0.00 for guidance and counseling, and \$0.00 per pupil for plant maintenance.

The legislature provided in HB 2885 for site-based decisions relating to goal setting, curriculum, budgeting, staffing patterns, and school organization. Proponents contend that school boards and superintendents should grant greater latitude to campus level educators in exchange for an initial promise of more productive educational services for the students.

While there is little evidence to indicate that by itself school-based management will improve student achievement, as a management tool in the right hands, the report concludes that it may be helpful.

### Veterans Receive Reduced Interest Rate

The Texas Veterans Land Board (VLB) has reduced the interest rate on veterans home loans to 7.25 percent interest - the lowest rate offered by the VLB since the home loan program was started in 1984.

"Lowering the interest rate to 7.25 percent makes our home loan program far and away the best deal in today's market for a veterans looking for affordable housing," said Garry Mauro, chairman of the VLB. "It places us below the U.S., below FHA, and below conventional rates."

The new rate is effective immediately. The rate had been 8.5 percent.

Mauro urged any Texas veteran thinking about a home loan to call the VLB at 1-800-252-VETS.

"These changes mean substantial savings for Texas veterans," Mauro said. "For example, the new 7.25 percent rate means the monthly payment on a \$45,000 home loan would decrease from \$346 to \$307 (principle and interest) - a savings of \$39 per month. That amounts to \$14,000 in savings over the life of a 30-year loan."

"That \$39 a month can mean the difference between qualifying or not qualifying for thousands of Texas veterans that are struggling with the rising costs of home ownership," Mauro said.

While new legislation that took effect in September raised the amount of a home loan a veteran can receive through the VLB to \$45,000, veterans are not limited to homes in that price range. Veterans who want to buy a home costing more than \$45,000 can combine their VLB loan with a FHA, VA or conventional loan.

Since all Texas veterans home loans are funded by bond

sales and there are no discount points charged on a loan, the loans have consistently been below the existing market rate for home mortgages. This results in lower monthly payments for Texas veterans.

Mauro said Texas veterans can also use the \$45,000 loans to bid on hundreds of available Resolution Trust Corp. (RTC) and Housing and Urban Development (HUD) properties that fall into the \$45,000 price range. The program cannot be used for refinancing.

The board also reduced the rate on a veterans home improvement loan from 10.5 to 9.25 percent interest. The home improvement program enables Texas Veterans to borrow up to \$17,500 at 9.25 percent interest (plus FHA insurance) for 15 years to make improvements to an existing home.

In addition, the Veterans Land Program will lend up to \$20,000 at 7.99 percent interest for the purchase of five or more acres.

Not only are native Texans eligible for these programs, but so are many transplanted Texans. The only residency requirement is that a veteran must have lived in Texas for at least five consecutive years immediately prior to filing an application with the board or must have entered the service while a resident of Texas.

### Depression In Men

Men often hide depression because they feel it shows a weakness of character, says a psychiatrist at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

"Men generally do not pamper themselves and many believe that depression is 'unmanly,'" said Dr. Betsy Comstock, professor of psychiatry at Baylor and director of the Affective Disorders program.

"The physical symptoms are often explained away and patients do not seek treatment," Comstock said. "In some cases, patients fool others until the symptoms are quite severe."

Depression can cause sleep disturbances, loss of appetite, loss of sexual interest and the inability to concentrate. Other indicators of a depressive illness include having the "blues" for more than two weeks, feeling sad without understanding why and experiencing no relief from depression.

More than 10 million Americans suffer from depression. On the average, twice as many women will seek treatment. Most depressive illnesses are biological in

nature and can be successfully treated with a combination of medication and psychotherapy.

According to Comstock, depression sometimes runs in families, but for men and women at risk, there is hope.

"We can treat a patient who has a family history of depression before it ever sets in," she said.

Teaching coping skills and awareness of early signs and symptoms is the first step. Long-term therapy can help reduce internal conflicts that may contribute to depression at a later stage.

Since women are more likely to recognize the need for therapy, Comstock urges family, friends or co-workers to look for symptoms especially in men.

"It is important to ask questions and encourage them to get help," Comstock said. "Depression is a very serious illness whose outcome can be fatal."

### Lead Poisoning

Are your children being poisoned in their own home? They may be suffering from lead poisoning without showing any symptoms. Lead poisoning is a widespread problem that affects people from all socioeconomic groups, geographic areas, and racial or ethnic populations. Children are especially susceptible to lead poisoning.

Several causes of lead poisoning exist. Lead-based paint is the most dangerous and widespread. Although lead has been banned in house paint since the 1970s, it remains a hazard in older homes or homes that are being renovated. Children are poisoned when they ingest paint chips containing lead. Lead paint also is used in painted steel structures, such as bridges and expressways. Lead-contaminated dust and soil is another source of lead in the environment.

Lead paint and dust are the major sources of lead poisoning, but others exist. The level of lead in air has been significantly reduced with the elimination of leaded gasoline, but inhalation remains a cause of lead poisoning. Other sources include water, food, and occupations or hobbies involving lead, such as construction work or working with stained glass. It also is found in some traditional or folk medicines and in some cosmetics.

Lead poisoning can be a serious medical problem. The ideal blood lead concentration is zero, but even small levels can be dangerous. Lead affects virtually every system in the body and is especially harmful to the developing brain and nervous system of fetuses and young children. Even low lead levels can result in decreased intelligence and growth, hearing loss, unexplained seizures, developmental delay, and behavioral disorders, including hyperactivity.

The effects of lead on the nervous system are irreversible, but lead poisoning can be prevented. If you live in an older home, have lead paint removed from your house by experts. Because pipes may contain lead solder, let water run from the tap for several minutes each morning before using it and always draw from the cold tap for drinking, cooking and making infant formula. Make sure your child does not have access to peeling paint or surfaces like window sills painted with lead-based paint.

hands before meals and wash toys and pacifiers frequently. If the soil around your home is contaminated, plant grass in the yard and plant bushes around the outside of the house so children cannot play there. Do not store food in open cans, especially if the cans are imported. Finally, do not serve or store food in leaded crystal or inadequately fired or decorative ceramics and pottery.

Low-level cases of lead poisoning often have no symptoms, and symptoms that occur at higher levels can be confused with other illnesses. If you think your child may suffer from lead poisoning, see your physician. He or she may recommend a blood test and can tell you more about prevention and treatment.

Family violence can be defined as an act of force between family members that would be illegal if it occurred between strangers. The statistics of family violence are shocking:

\* approximately 2 million women, 2 to 4 million children, and 1 million elderly in the U.S. suffer from violence and abuse annually;

\* the incidence of child abuse, pediatric sexual assault, elder abuse, spouse abuse, and rape has increased dramatically during the past five to 10 years; and

\* domestic violence is the leading cause of injuries for women in the United States; according to the Journal of the American Medical Association, 22 to 35 percent of women who visit emergency departments are there for symptoms related to ongoing abuse. But perhaps the most frightening statistic of family violence is that 30 percent of children from violent households become abusive as adults.

Such exposure to violence in the childhood home is one cause of family violence. Other factors include unemployment of the family's major breadwinner, alcohol or drug abuse in the family, and isolation of families that are new to a community or involved in few

activities.

Symptoms of family violence often are difficult to detect. Physical symptoms, such as bruises or broken bones, may be explained away by the victim. Abused children often react to abuse in one of two ways: they withdraw and develop feelings of low self-worth or they turn their emotions outward, sometimes reaching out for attention or affection.

The effects of family violence are widespread and long-lasting. Besides physical injury, which can be serious or even life-threatening, abuse takes a psychological toll. Victims of abuse can develop suicidal feelings, depression, substance abuse problems, shame, and the inability to trust or develop intimate relationships later in life.

Families can work to prevent violence in their homes. Parents can create an environment that discourages violence and encourages alternatives for resolving conflicts.

### IRS Offering EIC

The Internal Revenue Service is giving up to \$2,000 to low-income families who qualify for Earned Income credits (EIC) on their tax returns. The trouble is that many just don't apply.

"Many families miss the opportunity to receive this tax credit because they don't make enough money to owe taxes, so they don't file an income tax return," said Joyce Cavanagh, family file for it

It is believed that more than 12 million families now earned an adjusted gross income of less than \$21,250 in 1991, and who have at least one child who has been living at home for more than six months, Cavanagh said. Both married and single parents can qualify.

The EIC is a refundable credit, she said, which means that federal income tax or have no income tax withheld from their IRS in the amount of their credit.

"If a family does owe income tax, the EIC reduces the amount greater than the taxes owed, the family's tax bill will be reduced to zero and the IRS will send the family a check for the

To receive the EIC, a person must file a federal income tax EIC." A taxpayer can fill out both sides of the form or fill out first side and allow the IRS to complete the rest and calculate the credit.

Cavanagh said that those

families who use the "married couple filing separately" status should check with the IRS to see if they qualify to receive the EIC.

The amount of refund families receive, according to Cavanagh, depends on how much income was earned and whether they qualify for two extra EIC benefits that are now available:

\* The basic EIC for 1991 for families with one child is worth a maximum of \$1,192. The maximum is \$1,235 for those with more than one child. Most families who earned between \$6,000 and \$13,000 last year should receive at least \$1,000.

\* Families with 3 child born in 1991 can receive an extra benefit of up to \$357.

\* Families that pay at least part of the premiums for a health insurance policy that includes health care coverage for a child may receive an extra credit of up to \$428.

Low-income parents with a foster child also may qualify for the EIC, Cavanagh said. However, the foster child must have lived with the family for that entire year.

## Passion Play To Be Held In Junction

On a rugged hillside deep in the heart of Texas, four score amateur thespians faithfully commemorate Christ's last days on earth. The emotional Passion Play is staged near Junction each Easter eve by local men and women from all walks of life who volunteer to relive events that comprised Holy Week two thousand years ago.

The dramatic production is sponsored annually by the Men's Bible Class, a non-sectarian group who organized in 1948 for Christian fellowship, Bible study, and the singing of gospel hymns. In the early days of the following year, the class constructed a 24-foot concrete lighted cross atop Lovers' Leap Mountain as "mute testimony to the sincerity and goodwill of the men of all faiths who are united in the Men's Bible Class."

An early-morning Easter service in April, 1949, was broadcast

from the cross to 1500 Christian worshippers gathered in the valley at the foot of the mountain. Former Governor Coke R. Stevenson spoke to the assembled throng below, his amplified voice declaring that for the believing there is a "better life in a better world." Musical selections enhanced the program, and the far-sighted members of the Bible class visualized the project of producing an Easter pageant that would declare to the world "He is Risen."

Armed with faith, determination, and sparse funds, this group of diligent men embarked upon a mission of creating a pageant that has now become a legend. A concrete stage, measuring 40 feet by 100 feet, was constructed on a picturesque mountainside owned by Hill County Fair Association. On Easter eve in 1950 some forty persons reenacted scenes portraying the

events of the days between the first Palm Sunday and the ascension of Christ. The pageant was climaxed by the reenactment of the Resurrection and the Ascension.

During the early days of the production, the male cast members grew beards to authenticate their roles. Through the years, vast material improvements have been made, with a dozen stages now comprising the setting in the natural amphitheatre. Today, more than eighty actors in authentic costumes present twelve impressive scenes that alternate between the stages arranged among rugged rocks and native shrubbery.

Production of the pageant is supported by readers and background music in a broadcasting booth, and the scenes are illuminated by spotlights. Willing actors, who volunteer their time and talent in depicting Christ, his disciples and his adversaries, remain anonymous and will not permit their names to be published. The entire cost of producing the Easter event is financed through contributions.

Each presentation is attended by thousands of spectators from all parts of the nation who may view the play from the convenience of their automobiles. There is no charge for admission, parking, or programs. A freewill offering is accepted, however, to help defray costs.

A local civic organization sells sandwiches and soft drinks, or visitors are invited to bring their own picnic supper to be eaten on the banks of the nearby Cedar Creek. Free coffee is available.

The pageant has received wide acclaim, and members of the Men's Bible Class, offer the recommendation "ask those who saw it last Easter."

The 1992 Easter Pageant will begin at dark on Easter Eve - Saturday, April 18th. To get to the Easter Pageant grounds, take the loop 1/2 mile south of Junction to the Texas Tech Center, turn left on Cedar Creek Road and continue left 1/4 mile to the pageant grounds. Signs will clearly show the way. Come and enjoy the pageant this year.

### Spanish - Growing Language In Texas

More and more Texans are talking these days—in Spanish. In a state where one out of three residents is Hispanic, Anglos by the thousand are deciding to become bilingual.

Spanish is hardly a new language in Texas. It has been spoken here since 1514 when Alonso Alvarez Pineda, the first European to touch these shores, arrived to map the Gulf of Mexico.

Most graduates of state high schools have had at least a beginning course in Spanish as a second language. In cities like San Antonio, where about half the population is Hispanic, almost everybody has a rudimentary knowledge of the language. Many Anglos along the border speak it fluently.

Only in the last couple of years, however, has bilingualism become the vogue. Now schools like The University of Texas at Austin, UT San Antonio, UT El Paso and other institutions around the state are being hard put to find enough teachers for the spiraling enrollment in Spanish classes.

Interest in learning to "hablar espanol" is not limited to college students, however, Berlitz Language Centers in Texas report a 60% increase in Spanish class enrollment.

The National Autonomous University of Mexico (which operates its only U.S. campus in San Antonio) has been forced to rent space from a nearby hotel to handle the overflow of students wanting to take Spanish. Enrollment already has increased 50% over a year ago - and is still going up.

Why the sudden interest in learning a second language one that

has been spoken here for almost 500 years? Language school officials say there are two reasons.

The proposed North American Free Trade Agreement is one. This expansion of economic ties with a country that already has contributed so much to the history and culture of Texas has created a heightened interest in learning each other's language. Schools south of the Rio Grande report that they're also flooded with students enrolling in English classes.

Another reason is demographic. Experts predict that one third of Texas residents will be Hispanic within a decade. By 2035, if projected birth rates and immigration figures are accurate, Anglos will be a definite minority.

Looking to increased trade with Mexico, Texas businesses are rushing to build bilingual staffs. One language school says its institutional enrollment—employees enrolled by their company—jumped 70% this year. Even the security detail for Governor Ann Richards may soon attend Spanish language classes.

Even without the trade agreement with Mexico, a knowledge of Spanish has become increasingly important as the Hispanic population of almost every Texas city and hamlet increases. Lawyers, physicians, sales people, politicians and others who serve the public are discovering that learning the second language is good business.

"Unlike the people of most other countries, Americans are lazy linguist," one spokesman says. "With this new interest in speaking Spanish, it may be that Texas will gain another first—that of becoming the only truly bilingual state in the nation."

### Hearing Aid Study

Two hearing aids are better than one. Or are they?

According to an audiologist at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston, some elderly people may hear better with a hearing aid in one ear only.

"It is usually the right ear," said Dr. James F. Jerger, a professor of otorhinolaryngology at Baylor, who believes that some hearing problems result from how sound is processed in the brain, rather than from an imbalance of hearing sensitivity in the ears.

Speech processing is controlled by the left side of the brain, said Jerger, which means that sounds received in the right ear travel directly to the left hemisphere. Sounds received in the left ear, however, travel first to the right side of the brain, and then cross to the left side along a bridge of nerve fibers called the corpus callosum.

"This is probably the basis for the right-ear advantage," he said.

For some time, researchers have noticed that people with age-related hearing loss tend to process sounds entering the right ear more efficiently.

Jerger studied topographical brain maps of more than 100 patients. The group included people with normal hearing, patients with hearing loss caused by diseases such

as encephalitis and stroke, and patients with age-related hearing loss.

Three maps were made for each patient: one showing the brain's response when sound entered the left ear, the right ear, and both ears. Dark areas of the maps indicated positive electrical activity generated by the sound.

The brain maps of patients with normal hearing showed the most activity when sound entered both ears. But some patients with hearing loss showed more activity when the sound entered only one ear.

"There appears to be some type of interference," Jerger said. "Sound going into one ear interferes with sound entering the other ear, when both ears are stimulated simultaneously, but we don't know why."

Jerger's observations could have important implications for how the elderly use hearing aids.

"One of our biggest problems is getting them to use hearing aids. We need to find the best conditions for their use."

For example, said Jerger, since the right ear often has an increasing advantage over the left ear from age 50 on, a hearing aid for the right ear only may be the best choice for some people.

### Land Opening For Bids

A catalogue listing 407 tracts of forfeited state land reserved exclusively for bids from Texas veterans is now available from the Texas Veterans Land Board (VLB) by calling 1-800-252-VETS. Bids will be opened on April 28, 1992 at 1 p.m.

Located in 128 counties (with the majority in North, Central and East Texas) the tracts, known as Type I properties, range in size from five to 80 acres.

The VLB will finance the full amount of all winning bids. There is no limit on the amount loaned or on the number of tracts that an individual can bid on. However, eligible Texas veterans are limited to one land purchase in the sale.

"Texas veterans should take advantage of this sale if they are in the market for land to use for recreation or as an investment," said Garry Mauro, who serves as chairman of the VLB. "Since these tracts have never been offered for sale by the board, this sale gives Texas veterans an excellent opportunity to buy good land with

100 percent financing." Mauro noted that setting aside new forfeitures exclusively for bids from Texas veterans is a long-time VLB policy.

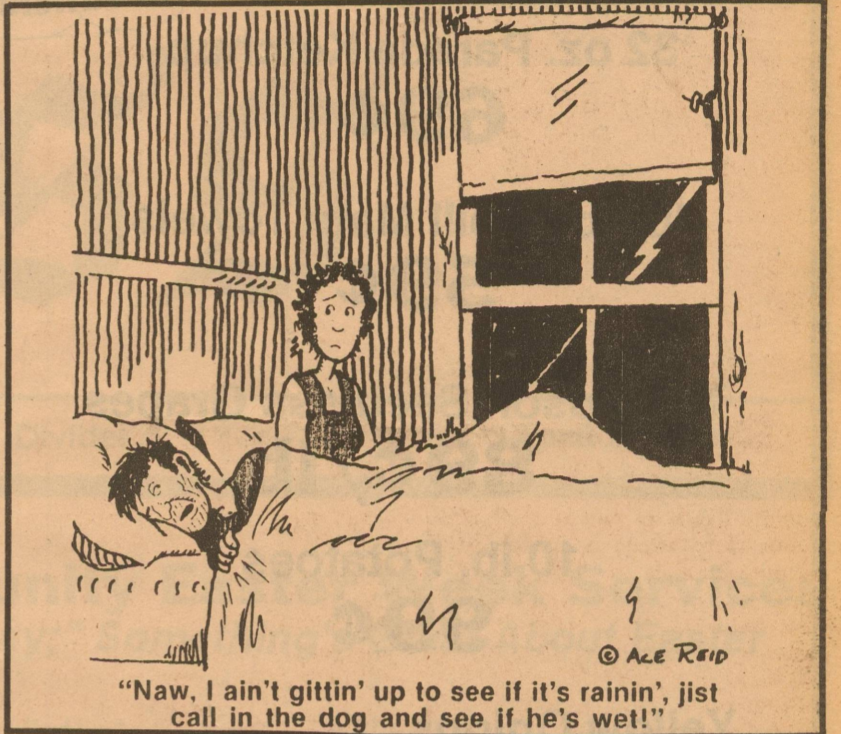
"The land program is a Texas way of saying thanks to our veterans," Mauro said. "It's only fair that they should get first shot at these tracts."

Tracts not sold in the April sale will be offered to both veterans and non-veterans through local real-estate agents.

Eligible Texas veterans will receive a 7.99 percent interest rate with a 30-year assumable fixed-rate loan. A \$25 non-refundable fee for each bid submitted is required.

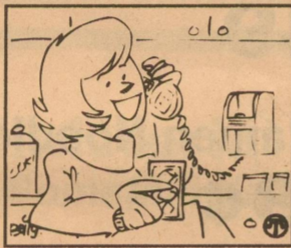
The sale will be by sealed bid only, with a minimum bid set on each tract. All bids must be received by April 28 at 1 p.m. Bidders need not be present at the bid opening in Austin.

1990 and 1991 Disaster application data is being transmitted this week. A National factor will be determined and all county offices notified by April 15. Disaster checks are scheduled to be issued between April 16-30.

We have received authorization to print wool/mohair incentive checks on April 22, 1992.

The County Office is busy enrolling producers in the farm

programs. April 17 is the final date to sign-up.

May 1 is the final date to certify your planted acreage of wheat, oats and barley.

Measurement service is available if you need help in determining the amount of acreage you have planted.
