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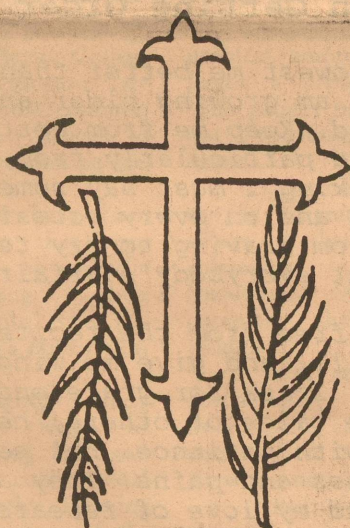

Ministerial Alliance Plans Easter Services

Good Friday



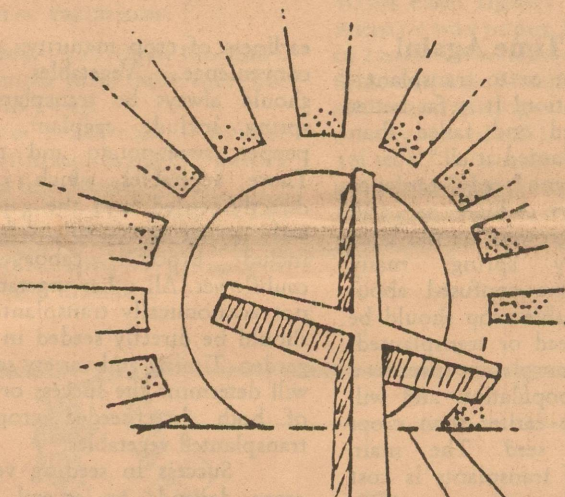
GOOD FRIDAY: tomorrow night, 7:00 p.m. (April 17), First Presbyterian Church - Holy Communion and Tenebrae, joint Community Choir.

The Easter Service, commemorating the Resurrection of Christ from the dead on the first Easter morning, will take place at Eldorado Cemetery. The service will include singing, prayer, scripture reading, and celebration of victory over death. Participating clergy include Father Jerry McCarthy of Our Lady of Guadalupe, Rev. Paul Lynn of First Methodist, and Rev. Hawley Wolfe of First Presbyterian. Music will include the youth choir at Our Lady of Guadalupe led by Cindy Veliz.

Worship leadership is being provided by Father Jerry McCarthy, a member for 42 years of the Missionaries of the Sacred Heart. The order was founded in France in 1854 to help establish education and worship in poor or developing areas. Ordained Sept. 25, 1950, in Cork, Ireland, Father McCarthy spent 16 years in South Africa (1950-66), and came from California to Texas in 1975, where he was attached to Sacred Heart Cathedral in San Angelo and then came to Our Lady in Eldorado.

Music will be a mixture of sacred music and contemporary, and will include favorites such as "Jesus Christ Is Risen Today", "I Am the Bread of Life", "This is the Day that the Lord Has Made", and "The Church's One Foundation", "The Church's One Foundation", written in England in 1866, was composed by Episcopalian pastor Samuel Stone as part of a series of 12 hymns defending the Apostles Creed. This hymn, the ninth in the series, explained the phrase "I believe in the Holy Catholic Church". The music is by Samuel S. Wesley, grandson of Methodism's great hymn-writer Charles Wesley, and thus unites two great streams of the church.

After the Easter sunrise service refreshments will be provided and prayers of remembrance for deceased loved ones may be offered.

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County Agents Report

Planting Time Again!

"To plant or to transplant - that is the question! It is far better to have planted and failed than never to have planted at all." This is a quote from some "seedy" gardener of olden days which is still applicable for growers in the 20th century. Every spring, many gardeners become confused about whether a vegetable crop should be planted from seed or transplanted. The use of transplants insures a reliable plant population and will usually produce earlier than crops planted from seed. The main disadvantage of transplants is cost per plant.

Because of the cost involved, only certain vegetable crops should be transplanted. Whether a crop should be transplanted or directly seeded into the garden depends on: (1) the cost of seed; (2) plant population needed; (3) desired

earliness of crop maturity; and (4) convenience. Vegetables which should always be transplanted in spring include eggplant, onion, pepper, sweet-potato and tomato. Those vegetables which can be directly seeded into the garden in early spring or transplanted a later include broccoli, cabbage, and cauliflower. All other vegetables are not economically transplanted and should be directly seeded in to the garden. Timing and variety selection will determine the success or failure of both direct-seeded crops and transplanted vegetables.

Success in seeding vegetable crops depends on several factors, such as seed vigor, soil moisture, planting technique and soil fertility. New, viable seed should be used to insure a good plant population.

Seeds need to absorb moisture before growth can begin. In order to insure adequate soil moisture during periods of dry weather, water prior to planting seed. When planting, be careful not to cover seed with too much soil. Generally, a seed is planted 2 1/2 times as deep as it is wide. Large seeds, such as beans, corn, cantaloupe, okra, peas, pumpkin, squash and watermelon, can be planted up to 2 inches deep. Smaller seeds, such as broccoli, cabbage, carrots, collards, lettuce, mustard, parsley, radishes, spinach and turnips, are planted 1/4 inch deep by gently raking seeds in to soil. Soil fertility and especially the availability of phosphorus are very important. The use of high-phosphorus are very important. The

Summer Health Hazards

Although it does not come with a warning from the surgeon general, summertime can be hazardous to your children's health.

"Summer should be a fun and relaxing time for children, but there are certain dangers to be aware of," said Dr. Joan Shook, an assistant professor of pediatrics at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. "Each year, we see a dramatic increase in the number of drownings—most of them preventable."

Drownings are most common among children ages 1-5 and often result because parents fail to adequately observe their children in the water.

"Some parents think that if they give their young children 'water babies' lessons that they are waterproof," Shook said. "But these kinds of lessons only teach them how to swim; they do not teach them good judgement. You cannot expect 2-year-olds to know what to do if they fall in the water."

Shook suggests that parents place barriers around the family pool and visit and inspect other pools in the neighborhood likely to be used by their children. A portable phone for conducting business or answering calls can help keep parents by the poolside.

Other common summertime hazards include motor vehicle accidents, bicycle-related injuries, heat stroke and sunburn, fractures,

insect, dog and snake bites, and jellyfish stings.

"Bicycles, in particular, are another big cause of injuries during the warmer months," Shook said. "Kids are out more and taking more chances, and they often forget to wear helmets."

"Helmets do not prevent injuries, but they help reduce the number of serious head injuries which cause 80 percent of bicycle-related deaths," she said.

Approximately 600 children are killed in bicycle accidents each year. An estimated 400,000 children require hospitalization for bicycle-related injuries.

Car accidents among teenagers also increase during the summer months. Shook said she sees more and more cases of injuries caused by under-aged drivers. Car accidents account for almost half of all fatal childhood injuries.

Another potentially lethal summer-related danger is heat exposure. Shook urges parents to be careful when taking infants outside on hot days.

"Babies do not sweat like adults," she said. "They do not perspire as efficiently and can dehydrate faster. Being left out in the hot sun uncovered or, worse, in a locked car with the windows up, can be fatal in a surprisingly short amount of time."

Other summer-related hazards and prevention tips include:

* Shook suggests teaching the children about sunscreen lotions early and making sure there is plenty on hand when playing outdoors. Sunscreens of sun protection factor (SPF) 15 or higher should be used to prevent sunburns.

* Summer rains can increase the number of venomous snakes. Children should be careful around creek banks, ditches and lakes during times of high water when snakes are more prevalent.

* Rafts, water wings, inflatable dolphins or dinosaurs and other pool toys can entice children into deeper water with false assurances. These are not considered safety devices.

* Parents should learn cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR). Courses are available in most communities.

Shook urges parents to take extra care during summer months to inform their children about possible dangers, and that they receive adequate supervision.

"For two-career families, a reliable solution for how to watch children out of school is accredited summer day camps offered by the YMCA, churches, public libraries and other organizations," Shook said. "Relatives and friends may also help to keep the summer months safe for your children."

use of high-phosphorous starter solutions and/or placing a line of superphosphate fertilizer (1 tablespoon per linear foot of row) 1 inch below planted seeds have increased vegetable yields two-fold.

Bigger is not always better when selecting transplants for your spring garden. Research conducted by universities and institutions has confirmed what commercial growers have suspected all along - when they are set in the garden, the age and size of seedlings or transplants can make a striking difference in yield. Research has generally shown that the best results are achieved when transplants 6 to 8 inches tall with 5 to 7 leaves are set out. As a rule, transplants of this size have not yet begun to flower. The transplants should be about as tall as they are wide and dark green in color. They should also be vigorously growing and be free of spots or lesions on the leaves, which could possibly indicate disease problems. Believe it or not, transplants of this description will usually give you greater yields than will larger and older transplants.

Most transplants purchased at garden centers or local nurseries are available in some type of

plantable container, usually a peat container. If the transplants are large, chances are that the roots have outgrown the container, thus affecting transplant growth. This early "stunting" will usually show up at harvest time.

What can you expect if you set out larger transplants in your garden that might even be blooming or might even have set a few small fruit? Most likely, the first mature fruit, although early, will often be small and misshapen. These first early fruit may cost you early as total yield can be seriously reduced. To obtain early production, it is highly preferable to select smaller plants of an early-maturing variety rather than to use large, older transplants of a later-maturing variety.

You may have difficulty in finding the ideal transplants at local garden centers or nurseries. This year, take your time, look around and find good transplants at local garden centers or nurseries. This year, take your time, look around and find good transplants for the right varieties. Remember it is always great to have the first fresh vegetables in the neighborhood, but don't let those first few fruit be the bulk of your harvest.

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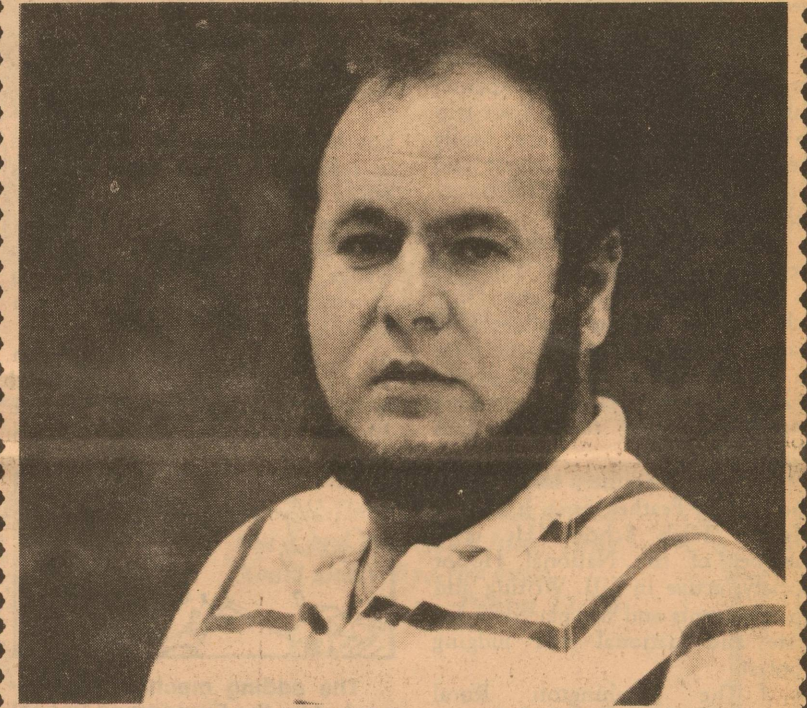

All the participants in Texas' Youth Tour are eligible to compete to represent the state on NRECA's Youth Consulting Board. Texas' representative will attend NRECA's February 1993, annual meeting in Dallas, Texas and participate in a variety of other activities throughout the year.

Approximately 1,000 Youth Tour participants from 37 states will meet in Washington, D.C. for the 30th National Rural Electric Youth Tour.

Rabies Update

Less than 4 months into 1992, 41 rabid animals have been reported from Coke, Concho, Crockett, Kimble, Menard, Schleicher, Sutton and Tom Green Counties. These same counties experienced a total of 72 animal rabies cases in all of 1991.

While most cases have been in wild animals, pets and livestock are also involved. Forty-two rabid skunks were reported from these counties in 1991 and 20 so far this year. Foxes are second on the list with 15 in 1991 and 7 this year. Other rabid wild animals in 1991 include 5 raccoons, 1 porcupine, and 1 deer. Three bobcats, 1 raccoon, and 1 ringtail have been confirmed rabid in the first months of this year.

Due at least in part to the mild winter temperatures and abundant moisture, the wild animal populations are high. This results in more frequent animal-to-animal contact and rapid spread of rabies.

People are more likely to be exposed to this fatal disease be infected domestic pets and livestock. Eight domestic animals (3 cats, 2 cows, 1 dog, 1 goat and 1 horse) were reported from the area last year and the same number so far in 1992 (3 goats, 2 dogs, 2 cats, and 1 cow).

Since rabies cannot be eliminated from the wild animal populations, our measurers must be taken to protect ourselves, our pets and our livestock. Of utmost importance is the vaccination of dogs and cats. State law requires that all dogs and cats 4 months of age and older must be vaccinated against rabies every year. In addition, horse owners in the Concho Valley should seriously consider having their horses

vaccinated. Vaccines are also available for sheep and cattle.

Livestock owners and their employees are urged to wear protective apparel, such as heavy rubber kitchen gloves, when drenching, shearing, lambing or kidding their animals. Since some rabid animals become very aggressive, people should not approach any wild animal or any domestic animal with which they are not familiar. Children must be taught not to attempt to contact a seemingly tame wild animal. Any animal exhibiting abnormal behavior or paralysis should be suspected of having rabies and must be avoided.

By using common sense and following these suggestions, the very real threat of rabies can be greatly reduced. Persons who are exposed to a potentially rabid animal are urged to contact a physician immediately. Pet and livestock owners whose animals may have been in contact with a rabid animal should consult their veterinarian as quickly as possible.

Pull The Plug On Sleep

Shakespeare probably was right when he wrote that "sleep knits up the raveled sleeve of care."

But there was no electricity around then to create a short-circuit.

There is now. And Russell Reiter, a researcher at The University of Texas Health Science Center-San Antonio, says that the electrified world we live in is costing us our ZZZZ's.

That's because of a hormone called melatonin. It controls the

body's circadian rhythm, signaling the brain when to rise and when to sleep.

Scientists have known for a long time that light interferes with melatonin production. When this happens, sleep patterns are changed or totally disrupted, causing the individuals to become cranky, tired and prone to mistakes.

Now Reiter's studies indicate that even in the dark, melatonin may be unraveling "the sleeve of care" rather than repairing it. He blamed it on the electromagnetic fields that surround us whether awake or asleep.

He has been experimenting with rats and mice, since melatonin is the same hormone that controls the body rhythms of both rodents and people. He has found that the brains of the vermin respond to the non-visible radiation from a simple electric wall switch exactly as they do to light. Melatonin production is disrupted and sleeplessness is the result.

Reiter advises "prudent avoidance" of electromagnetic fields, including not sleeping under electric blankets or sitting close to video screens.

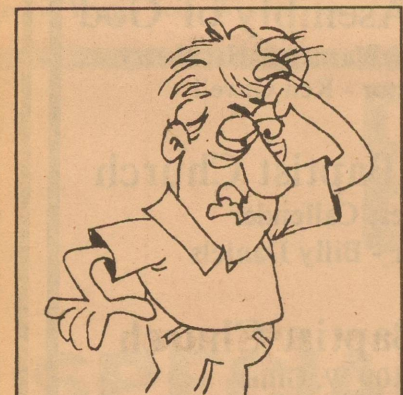

Health Department Warns Of Child Safety Seat Defects

The Texas Department of Health (TDH) has warned that thousands of unwitting Texas parents may be buckling their infants and small children into safety seats which have been recalled by their manufacturers because of defects.

State law requires that all children younger than 2 must be buckled into safety seats while riding the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA). To be approved, each new seat model must pass federal crash-test standards for a child's safety in a 30 mph collision.

An emerging problem, though, is that many approved seats have been recalled by their manufacturers, usually because of defects they develop after a few months of use. Defects ranging from buckles which cease to work properly to flammable cushions have been common.

According to Steve Anderson at the Texas Department of Health, "Notices of the recalls, though mandatory, routinely go only from the makers to the wholesale and retail outlets—not to parents who may already have bought the seats."

"Consequently," Anderson said, "few parents are aware that even some of the most popular safety seats have been found -unsafe, much less whether the specific model they own is on the recall list. Legally, the manufacturers must provide a repair kit, if the defect in a seat is minor; a substitute seat, if NHTSA has canceled its approval of a given model; or a refund of the purchase price."

Anderson is statewide coordinator of the Occupant Protection Programs of the TDH Public Health Promotion Division. He said that dozens of different models of child safety seats have been recalled by their makers in the past two years. "Several manufacturers have had at least some of their seat models recalled this year," he said.

Some seat makers have now gone out of business, he added. Yet there is growing evidence that defective seats—which should have been returned by retailers to their

makers—are still being sold to the public.

"Our immediate concern is the safety of kids. We want to inform the public about whether the seats they own are on the recall lists, and we want to know which retailers are selling seats in violation of the recalls," Anderson said.

Anderson said that he is distributing lists of the recalled seat model numbers and manufacturers' phone numbers to all local health departments. More detailed lists, which also describe potential defects, are available in each of the TDH regional offices, as well as in the central office in Austin.

"We also are distributing copies of the list to each of our 256 Child Passenger Safety Seat Loaner Program administrators throughout the state, as well as to regional Public Health Promotion staff members," he said.

He urged anyone who is uncertain about the safety of their child's passenger seat to contact a local health department, a TDH regional office (see numbers listed below), or the toll-free Occupant Safety phone line, at 1-800-252-8255. Callers should be ready to give the brand name of their safety seat, its model number and manufacture date, which usually is found on the side of the seat shell.

The TDH Product Safety Program also needs information about any Texas retailers known to be selling any previously recalled models of safety seats. Reports of such sales should be made to Charles Branton, director of the program, at 512-458-7519.

Anderson added, "So far we have not learned of any injuries or fatalities directly related to use of the recalled seats. But the potential for tragedy is very real. Use of safety seats is not just a matter of choice. All 50 states have laws requiring millions of parents to transport babies and toddlers in NHTSA-approved safety seats."

"It is essential that we make sure that the seats available to Texans are, in fact, as safe as they are supposed to be," he explained.

Falling Behind

Texas' Hispanic population continues to grow, but the proportion of students from this minority enrolling in college hasn't changed much in a decade.

It's true that larger numbers of Hispanics are going on to college. Latest figures show 61,287 Hispanic students enrolled in Texas public universities compared with 58,765 a year ago. As a percentage of the total Hispanic population, however, the number is dwindling.

Grandchildren of Mexican immigrants to Texas are getting less education than their parents,

according to Dr. Jorge Chapa, a professor at The University of Texas at Austin Lyndon Baines Johnson School of Public Affairs. A breakdown of data by age, sex and generation reveals this picture:

Second-generation Mexican-Americans attain higher levels of education than the first, but the third generation fails to reach the levels of the first.

Dr. Chapa says these younger "Latinos are not catching up educationally, and in some cases, they are falling behind."

Real Lemonade for a Real Thirst

When sultry weather calls for a real thirst quencher, forgo the yellow powdered instant drink mix and go for the real thing—freshly squeezed lemonade.

Contrary to popular belief, making real lemonade isn't much more work than stirring up a batch of instant, and the taste difference can't be beat. To make one quart only requires four or five lemons.

Fresh Lemonade

Combine 3 cups water, 1 cup of freshly squeezed lemon juice (about 4 or 5 large lemons) and ¾ cup sugar. Mix well and serve over ice. The recipe can easily be doubled or tripled to serve a crowd.

Try these variations:

- **Limeade**—Substitute lime juice for lemon juice and increase sugar to 1 cup.
- **Minted Lemonade**—Bruise fresh mint leaves in glass before adding lemonade.
- **Pink Lemonade**—Add two to three drops of red food coloring or 2 tablespoons grenadine syrup to lemonade.

The perfect mate for ice cold lemonade is the following **Buttery Sugar Cookies**.

Buttery Sugar Cookies

- 1 cup (2 sticks) butter or margarine, softened
- 1 cup sugar
- 2 eggs
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 3 cups sifted Martha White All-Purpose Flour

Cream butter and sugar together in mixing bowl until light and fluffy. Add eggs and vanilla; beat well. Stir in flour. Divide dough into two equal portions. Form each half into two rolls about 2 ½ inches in diameter. Wrap each tightly with plastic wrap or wax paper. Refrigerate 1 to 2 hours. Preheat oven to 350°F. Slice roll into about ¼-inch thick slices and arrange one inch apart on ungreased baking sheet. Bake 10 to 12 minutes or until light golden brown. Cool on wire racks. Decorate if desired. Makes about 64 cookies.

Hearing Devices Tested

Researchers at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston are comparing the two most common types of hearing assist devices to learn better ways of overcoming age-related hearing loss.

"These devices have been tested in patients as they were developed, but we have no scientific evidence comparing their effectiveness in patients," said Dr. James Jerger of Baylor's Huffington Center on Aging.

Two-hundred-eighty study participants will be tested to determine their hearing loss and evaluated using a conventional hearing aid, an assistive listening device and a combination of the two devices.

The five-year study will give researchers a base of information about which technology is best suited for eliminating background noise, the hearing problem faced most by older people.

"Background noise is the single most common hearing

problem among the elderly," said Jerger, a professor of audiology. "The patient has difficulty picking out conversation from other sounds."

Conventional hearing aids can be programmed to lessen the effects of background noise by enhancing certain sound frequencies. Still, some patients complain that conversation is muddled.

With an assistive listening device, the patient places a microphone at the source of the conversation, making background noise less noticeable.

"Attitudes about hearing aid use will also be discussed during the study. Many older people do not want to wear hearing aids because they see them as a sign of senility, or of growing old," Jerger said.

Half of all people older than 60 experience some hearing loss. By age 80, 90 percent of all people will lose some hearing.

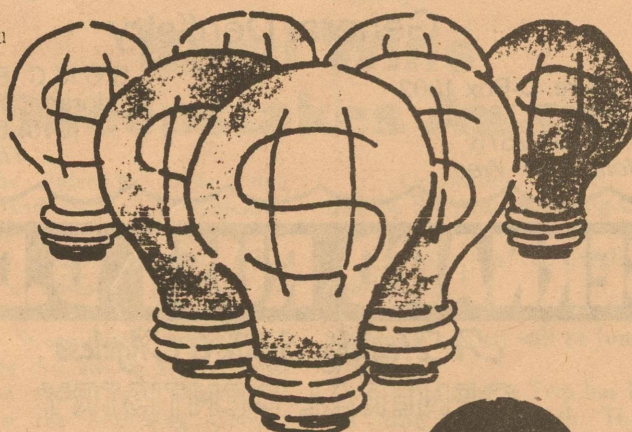

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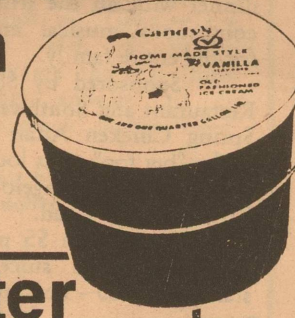
