Clinton Wins

104 million Americans exercised their right to vote this past Tuesday, electing Governor Bill Clinton in the 1992 Presidential election. In what has been described as a "landslide victory", the Democrat from Arkansas put an end to 12 years of Republican White House leadership. Although it may have been an electoral landslide, with 370 electoral votes to Bush's 168, Clinton did not win a majority of the popular votes.

Ross Perot, the Dallas businessman, billionaire may have made the biggest impact of all by rallying together millions of Americans wanting change. Although he garnered no electoral votes, he did very well for a third party candidate. Clinton reflected this idea of change and has referred to his followers as "New Democrats" and to himself as "a different kind of Democrat."

Clinton has promised to bring "new blood" to Washington. Said the President-elect, "We need more than new laws... We need a new spirit of community. We are all in this together." Clinton says that he is calling for a "New Beginning."

In the local race for Commissioner of Precinct 1, incumbent, Johnny Mayo won by 2 votes over Republican challenger, Randy Mankin. Mankin has filed a petition with County Judge, Johnny Griffin, asking for a recount.

Republican Jerry Jones defeated incumbent Commissioner Prissy Paxton in Precinct 3 by six votes.

In the race for County Attorney, Thomas Giovannitti held his position in the race against challenger, Marian Bland Overstreet. Overstreet did remarkably well for a write-

in candidate challenging an incumbent.

George Arispe won the position of Schleicher County Constable over Republican Burro Griffin.

14 states voted on Congressional term limits. Term limits were passed in every one of these states.

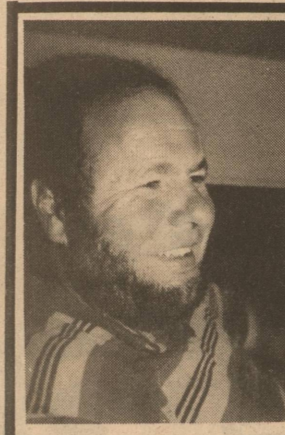

County Agents Report

One of the nice things about summer is the vast array of colorful flowers that adorn our landscapes. These same colorful flowers that decorate our gardens can also be used to brighten the inside of our homes year round. How? By making permanent dried arrangements.

Drying flowers is an old practice. For hundreds of years gardeners have preserved flowers by drying. The so-called everlasting types - like strawflower - have been among the most popular, but grandmother and great-grandmother probably tried their hands at drying many other garden flowers as well.

Today, dried flowers have become increasingly popular for interior decoration. A dried or permanent arrangement can be a year-round bright spot in any home, and drying flowers can be both easy and fun.

There are many summer flowering annuals which are excellent for drying. Globe amaranth, celosia,

marigold, salvia, cosmos, zinnia, coreopsis and gloriosa daisy are among the most popular, though agertum, dahlia, calendula, chrysanthemum, dianthus, aster and daisies also make fine dried specimens.

Drying flowers is such a rewarding experience because it is easy to do, the flowers usually dry remarkably well, and they will last for many years. Flowers can be preserved by hanging, pressing or treatment with various drying agents.

If you would like to dry your own bouquets, cut the blossoms when their color is at its peak. Remove the leaves, then try one of the following methods:

- **HANGING** - Air-drying or hanging is the easiest and best method for preserving many flowers. As a general rule, flowers need only to have the leaves removed and to be hung upside down in a warm, dry, dark place until the moisture content is evaporated.

Attics, closets or pantries are good places to hang flowers for drying.

- **PRESSING** - Pressed flowers are easy and quick, though the contour is lost and flowers are flat. For pressing use unglazed paper, such as newsprint or an old telephone book. Place the flowers so that they do not overlap between several thicknesses of the paper. Weight down with a heavy object. The time required for drying can be anywhere from two to four weeks.
- **DRYING AGENTS** - Flowers can be dried by burying them in materials such as sand and borax or corn meal and borax. These materials are successful for certain flowers, but undependable for others.

More recently, a drying agent called silica gel has been used. This compound has the capacity to absorb large quantities of moisture and can

quickly dehydrate cut flowers. Flowers, minus leaves, are buried in gel in a closed container and left for about a week. Silica gel can be used over and over by redrying the gel in a warm oven.

Silica gel should be available at florist or hobby shops.

- **MICROWAVE OVEN** - The versatile microwave oven, which has proven itself so useful to the chef, also has the capacity for drying your favorite flowers.

Whichever method you choose, the use of dried flowers for "permanent" arrangements can be colorful and rewarding, and surprisingly inexpensive.

After you've dried your flowers, put a strand of No. 2 florist's wire through each flower's head, securing the wire by bending it into a hook at the flower-head end. The final step is to wrap all wire with green floral tape and, presto, you're ready to be creative.

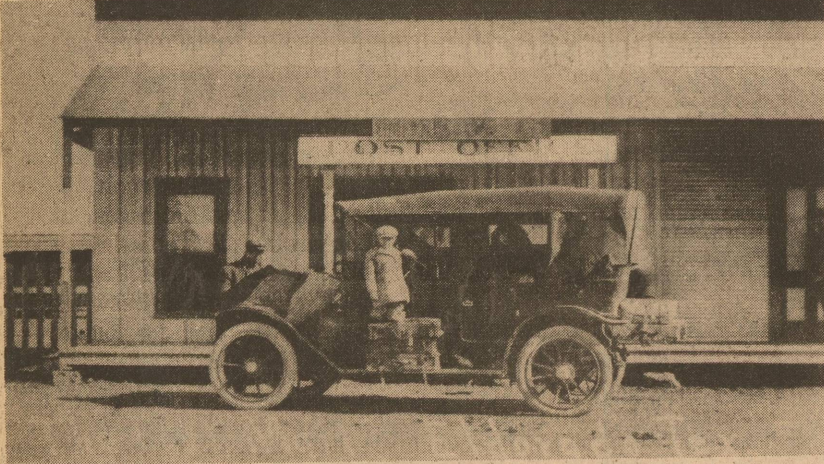

In 1895, when Eldorado was established, and C.C. West was postmaster, there was not a suitable building for the post office. A large wooden box was hauled to a huge old mesquite tree that grew southwest of the West home.

The stage coach delivered and picked up mail from this site called "The Post Office Tree." When the stage coach was approaching a town, the driver would blow a loud bugle announcing the arrival of the mail.

This mail service was important to early day residents, being their only means of communication.

The Old Post Office tree was cut down several years ago, but Mr. Topliff saved the tree trunk with some of the old

July 20, 1895, Willie Gray was postmaster and the first post office building was in the W.T. Gray and Co. Store. This location was Block 14, lot 1 & 2, which is where Perry's is today. H.M. and Sallie Bates Murchison were co-owners in the W.L. Gray & Co. Store.

The next Post Office building was a wooden frame structure east of Glidden Food Store. This old building was owned by W.L. McWhorter and he moved it to his ranch around 1925. A new concrete block building was erected on Gillis Street to house the Post Office. This building still stands behind the Way Off Broadway Theatre.

The next Post Office building was the Mary Cloud Kempsey building that once stood between the present First National Bank of Eldorado and West Texas Utilities. This was in the 1940's.

In 1959 a new brick building was built at 100 South Cottonwood.

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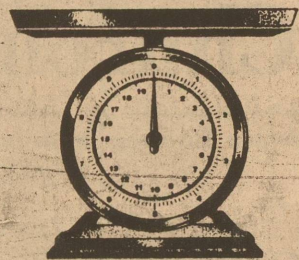

ASCS Update

The official grazing period opened November 1, 1992, for acreage conservation reserve (ACR), or land designated as conserving use (CU) for payment under the 1992 acreage reduction programs.

Ronnie Mittel, County Executive Director of the Schleicher County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, said farm program participants are now authorized to graze their ACR and CU acreage.

Farm program participants are not permitted to graze ACR or CU for payment land during the 5-month nongrazing period set by the State ASC committee. The nongrazing period in Schleicher County runs from June 1 to November 1.

The 1992 farm program enrollment report showed that 1,041 acres of Schleicher County cropland were diverted from production to the ACR and CU for payment. "This acreage has since been planted to cover

crops such as grasses, small grains or put into approved conservation practices," Mittel said.

Now that the prohibited grazing period has passed, Mittel cautions farmers against overgrazing the acreage so as to maintain sufficient cover to prevent wind and water erosion.

"Producers must comply with grazing and conservation regulations as stipulated in the program contract to maintain farm program benefits." ASCS official Ronnie Mittel said those who fail to do so will be out of compliance and could lose payment and other program benefits.

Commodities will be distributed on Monday, November 9, 1992 on the Courthouse Lawn, or in the Memorial Building if bad weather prevails. Distribution will begin at 1:00 p.m. with the Senior Citizens being served first.

According to an article published in the *American Journal of Clinical Nutrition*, consciously limiting the amount of food one consumes is not necessary to lose weight, provided you limit the fat.

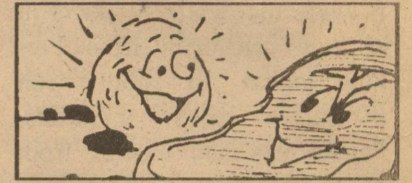
Cakes were baked by Mabel Blaylock and Bobbie Sanders. Coffee and hot apple cider were served.

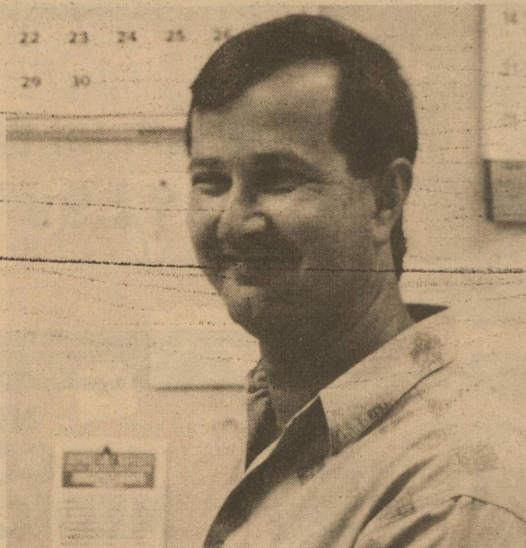

PRECAUTIONS AGAINST FARM HAZARDS

Harvest time is hazardous on the farm. Today's sophisticated machinery, built to take the place of a tremendous amount of manpower, is usually tall, large, very complex, and prone to get into electric power lines.

If you are moving a module maker from one location to another, be sure the tamper is not in the "up" position.

Never park cotton trailers under or near an electric line. When baskets are emptied into the trailers, they just might contact the line. Never raise baskets up under a line.

Safety is no accident. Plan to be safe.
