## Band Wins Sweepstakes

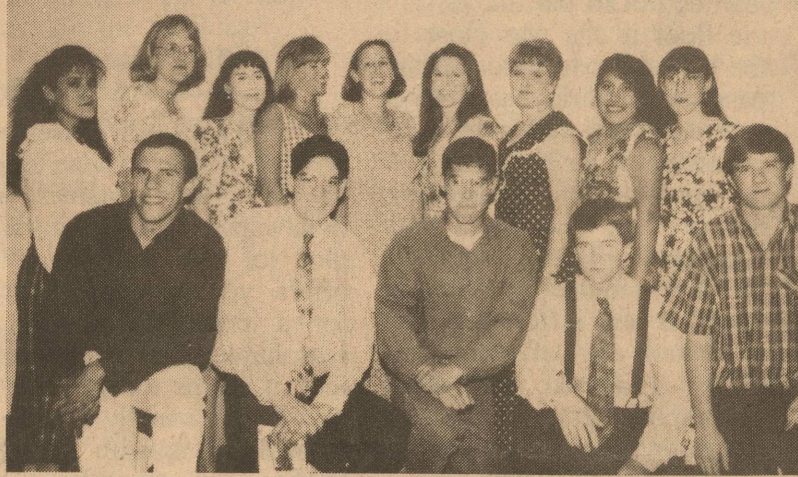

All three concert judges praised the band's

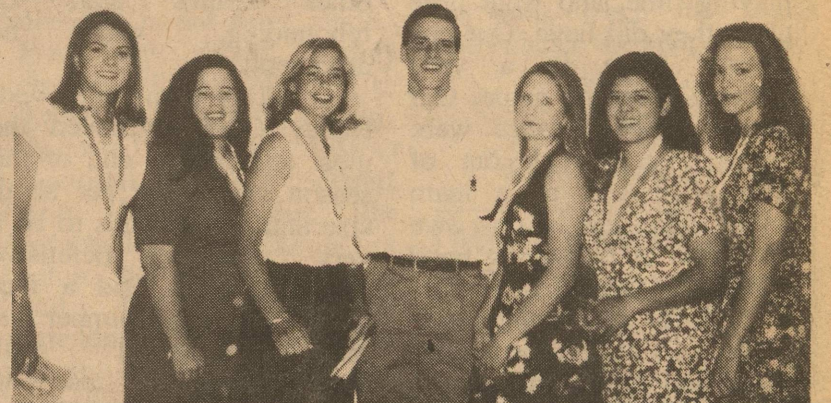

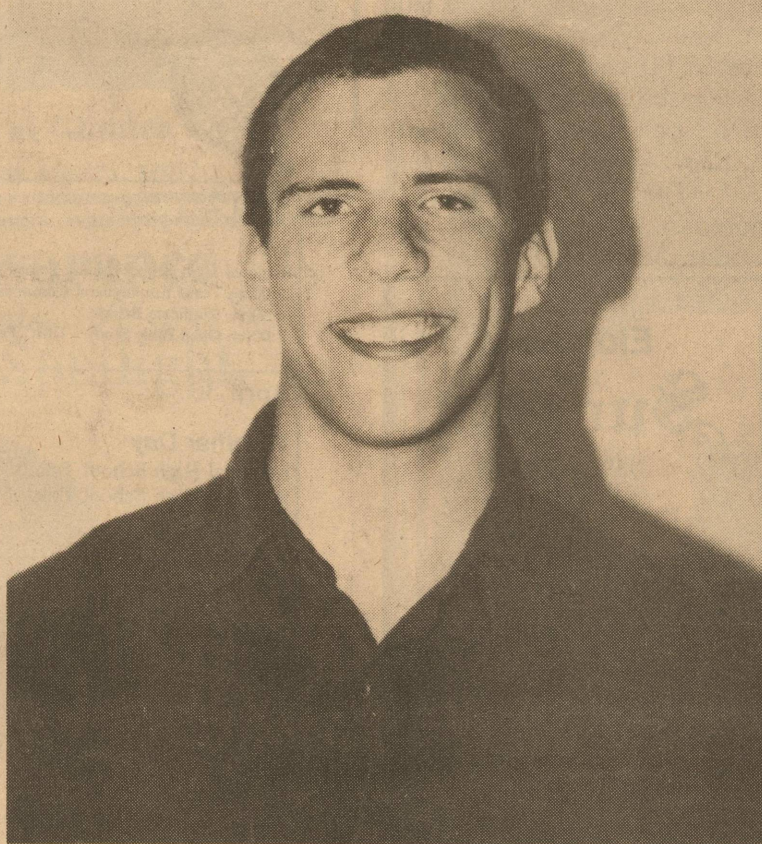

Stacey was, by far the most consistent player. She kept her poise even when the whole rest of the team would surround her. She learned not to put the ball on the floor if she was close to the basket but to shoot off the pass. Annamarie has always entered every endeavor with considerable intensity. 

## Speak Out Eldorado

Dear Schleicher County Voters,

If you are still undecided about your upcoming vote on the State amendments, read on:

There will be three propositions on the ballot. All three concern school finance issues. The controversial one is the first, namely the proposition to allow the State to shift property school-tax revenues from one school district to another. The proposal is the result of the cooperation of some educators and many legislators, presented to us, the voters. This group practically tells us: "This is the best we could come up with; vote for this proposal so we won't have to argue about this issue any more. And if you don't vote for this amendment, the schools might have to close." In my

view, that argument is not a reason to vote for this proposition.

Yes, Texas' children must have equalized opportunities for education—regardless of their parents' economic status. However, local property tax should not become the scapegoat for insufficient school funding by the state. Let me explain:

(1) While roughly 1/3 of the Schleicher County ISD budget is carried by the State, 2/3 are already shouldered locally.

(2) There is no denying that school expenses will rise every year as teachers and other staff (justly) expect pay raises, as medical expenses (such as insurance for school employees) increase by about 22% per year, as building maintenance costs rise, and as information technology becomes more sophisticated

(and expensive). In contrast, property values in Texas have dropped (or, in the best cases remained the same) in the recent years. Thus the property tax rate had to be increased substantially to keep up with the rising demand. Even without the new amendment local taxes in the coming years will rise and continue to do so, because the state continues to underfund education. It is not hard to see that this trend cannot continue indefinitely. The Proposition #1 will legalize a system that shifts financial burdens increasingly to the local level while it increases the State's control over these revenues.

(3) I believe that the State should provide the funds for an adequate education of all its students, but it will always be the extra commitment by each community to go beyond this minimum that will make the difference for each school, and each of its students. Communities like ours make up for the relative isolation from cultural and job opportunities by an increased

commitment to education. I don't believe community commitment can or should be ordered about by the State.

(4) In my view, the proposition has come about because our legislators are afraid to increase the funding of schools through such measures as a state income tax, or increasing the sales tax, because, of course, they don't want to lose the next (1994) election. It will politically be much less painful to siphon the needed money from existing (or not yet existing!) local revenues. Passing the first amendment will make this political passing-of-the-buck legal. If we vote for this amendment, we agree with our legislators that their re-election is more important than anything else.

I will not vote for such a lack of political courage on behalf of our State Government. I will vote against Proposition #1.

Jenny will appear in the United States Achievement Academy Official Yearbook, published nationally.

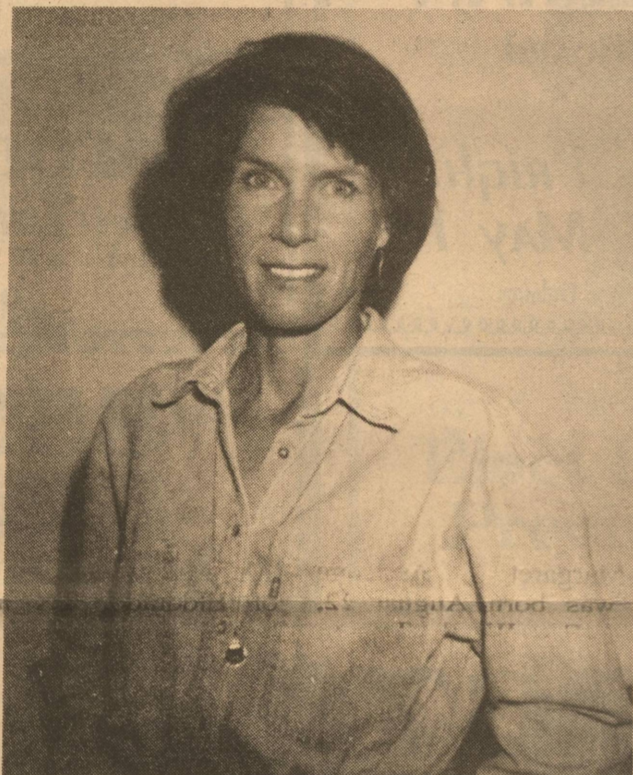

## Letter To The Editor

To the Editor:

Has anyone noticed that every governmental body, including the Texas Education Agency, wants a larger percentage of our income so they can create and mandate more programs?

Did Washington, Jefferson, or others make this land great by creating bureaus to mandate burdensome programs of questionable worth? Jefferson was quoted as saying "the least government is the best".

Bureaus have insatiably long lists, and their solutions center on a common denominator known as billion dollar tax increases. Our pockets are not deep enough to fund everything they dream up, nor do we want their new "sex education" which sounds more like a "how to become a homosexual" course.

Have you ever wondered about the constitutionality of a non elected TEA body mandating to an elected "Independent District Board"? Shouldn't our courts determine if our districts are independent? If they aren't, lets rename them "State Subservient School Districts" and quit beating around the bush!

Proposition No. 1 is going to allow the state to levy, collect, and redistribute the ad valorem revenue. This

is also known as taking from the "haves" and giving to the "have nots" so that we are all equally poor. If you took 100% of the ad valorem revenue from a few small "wealthy" districts in West Texas and spread it statewide it is doubtful that the poor districts would ever feel the effect. By the way, isn't "to each according to his needs and from each according to his abilities" the program that just failed in Russia?

Proposition No. 2 sounds like a step in the right direction by allowing a district to refuse to comply with a unfunded mandate that occurs after December 31, 1993 provided the legislature or the comptroller of public accounts agrees that the mandate is not fully funded. First, why should a duly elected district board be forced to comply with any mandate that the district electorate is against. Second, who believes that the comptroller will know or admit that the mandate is under funded. Won't this amendment hasten the state income tax? If this passes,

can't your hear the TEA in the legislature stating that "we must provide funding by law for this essential mandate".

Proposition No. 3 involves state guarantees for certain local district bonds along with a provision allowing the state to forgive repayments. Sounds like this could get bigger than the national debt!

Certain state leaders have told us we must approve one of the above or the public school system will be shut down in June. We should not respond to fear tactics nor should we approve any of the above. It's time for a return to local control. Local boards are controlled by people who know how to prune unneeded curricula, teach the basics and balance the budget.

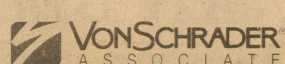
