

On this hearing, the farmers immediately bbrbought out a petition to retain the Agent and that the county put him back on the pay roll.

We are not familiar with the trouble between the Court and the present Agnt but the trouble seems to be in the failure of the County Agent to mak necessary reports on his work and his not meeting with the Court at any time. # YOUTH--AND THE NEW LEADERSHIP

By CRAIG B. HAZLEWOOD President American Bankers Associa

LEADERSHIP is a picturesque word. With it, one pictures Hannibal fighting his way through the passes

of the Alps— Napoleon in his campaigns-or Washington holding together his half-frozen army by the sheer magnetism of his character at Valley Forge. But I risnalize some thing that holds a more astounding spectacle in many respects

than any of these. It is the onrush of our business life.

Our economic progress plunges ahead at a rate unheard of in the history of the nations of the world and every industrial and financial leader is daily brought face to face with new and perplexing problems requiring the highest courage and intelligence for heir solution. Ninety billions a year, they tell us,

this country is now producing in new wealth. The rate of increase is even more staggering than the amount. It is difficult to say where it may lead us in even ten or fifteen years.

We are moving exceptionally fast. Our economic and industrial structure is placing before us problems of greater and greater magnitude. Few men can see far ahead. Few are in complete control, for this is a changing world, as even the most inexperienced business man will readily testify. Our methods of adjusting ourselves rapidly to economic changes and of cooperating are far from per-

What an opportunity the leadership of five, ten or fifteen years from now presents! What an adventure it will be! What responsibilities it will lay upon the broadest shoulders that may be found! 

# AMERICA'S RADIO LEAD IN DANGER

en. J. G. Harbord Sees a Threat to Our Nation's Place in British Merger.

The recent successful effort of the witish to bring about consolidation of beir cable and radio interests is a perious challenge to the radio supremsey of the United States, and of more importance to our country than pil or merchant marine at this moment, according to General J. G. Harord, who was chief of staff of the A.

E. F. and now is President of the Radio Corporation of America.

"Great Britain being the great cale-controlling power of our planet," eneral Harbord explained, "the com-ination there of cables and radio im-

perils American leadership more directly than that of any other country. "The answer to this challenge cannot be made by private interests under our existing laws. It is for our people to decide whether they think It is worth making, and if so, to make it possible. It is a case where no action, or action much delayed is surrender; or even worse, aid and comfort to foreign against American industry."

Other Countries Alert The effect of this advanced system of international communication is a subject of discussion in the chancelleries of the world, General Harbord says, and is not viewed with indiffer-Othe by any great nation aspiring to Loreign commerce, unless it be the United States.

"Communications play an important part in national defense," he continues. "This is especially true of radio, and with countries having distant possessions such as the Philippines, Alaska and Hawaii or Australia, Canada, South Africa and India."

Great Britain approached this probm with the seriousness its impor-General Harbord, and on March 15 of bet year, as a result, the principal communications rivals in Great Britain, the Eastern Telegraph Company, Limited, representing cables, and the Marconi company, radio, announced a merger in the form of a holding company. The government will have representation on the board of directors, which with the vote of either the cable or radio interest, will be controlling. The press approved this merger.

"This new combined British commu nications interest will affect American relationships in every part of the world," General Harbord asserts. "There will hardly be a port or principal city on the planet which will not be reached by British communica tions. American trade in every quarter of the globe cannot but be profound ly affected. The national defense of the United States must reckon with the planetary domination of commumications by the British. such is the result of the action of the farseeing British race under the lash which American progress in radio has applied-a wise old people which centuries ago underwent the diseases of mational adolescence through which we still are passing. Her politicians abuse one another, as do our own, but as against the outside world Britain's policy changes little with the advent of one party or another on the politial stage.

#### Hard to Understand

The time when Great Britain, France, Italy and Germany are uniting radio and cables seems to be the time taken by our country to keep them apart. What others unite to secure leadership in communications we divide. The long deliberations which preceded the consummation of the cables-radio merger in Great Britain saw in our country the enactment of the White Act of 1927, which in plain terms forbids any purchase of radic by cables or vice versa. While this provision is understood to have been inserted under the minority lash in the last days of the drafting of the law, its purpose no doubt was to preserve the competition, in form at least, between the two methods of international communication - radio and



# New Sets Use Screen Grid Tubes



new AC screen grid tubes and a new power amplifier in a specially designed circuit to bring out their full capabilities, have been announced by E. A. Nicholas, vice president of the Radio-Victor Corporation of America.

One of these sets, Radiola 44, is a table model, and the other, Radiola 46, is a console with a built-in electrodynamic loudspeaker. Both receivers are encased in cabinets of two toned walnut veneer.

"Radiola 44," the announcement of Mr. Nicholas explains, "utilizes three UY-224 screen grid tubes, two of which serve as radio frequency amplifiers, and the third as a power detector. The new UX-245 power amplifier tube is used in the single stage of audio, amplification. The receiver has three tuned radio frequency circuits, but because of the characteristics of the screen grid tubes, has as much selectivity as a set having four tuned cirsuits and using the standard three-element tubes. The two UY-224 tubes which are used as radio frequency amplifiers give as much amplification as four of the ordinary three-element

"The screen-grid power detector tube gives such a strong signal that it makes possible the elimination of one stage of audio frequency amplification, reducing to a minimum the possibility of distortion, sometimes present where successive stages of audio amplification are used. The output energy from the plate of this power detector tube is transferred by a choke and filter system to the UX-245 power amplifier tube instead of through a transformer. This results in an exceedingly high quality of musical reproduction and brings out particularly well the full tones of the bass register. As an additional presaution to insure undistorted reproduction, the UY-224 power detector tube has a radio frequency filter which prevents any radio frequency disturbance from being carried over into the audio

"The UX-245 power Radiotron used as an audio amplifier is capable of delivering a power output equal to hat of the UX-210 Radiotron, but pperates with a lower plate impedance which results in a greatly im- of the Model 106 type.

proved quality of tone reproduction. As used in Radiola 44, the UX-245 Radiotron will give undistorted volume in execess of the requirements of the average home."

An unusual type of selector dial is employed in Radiola 44. In addition to the usual scale markings of zer one hundred, the selector dial has proximate kilocycle markings to facile tate tuning. When the set is in operation, the scale markings and numbers, greatly magnified, are projected upon a small translucent, composition screen in the center of the escutcheon plate. Another unusual feature is a two-in-one tuning and volume control,

arranged concentrically so that they appear to be one control, adding materially to the external appearance and enabling the user to operate both controls simultaneosly with one hand. A local distance switch maintains the quality of reproduction for both strong local and weak distance stations.

The same radio circuit and Radio-trons as used in Radiola 44 are incorporated in Radiola 46, together with a built-in electro dynamic loudspeaker

# RADIO TELEGRAPH NOW GOES INLAND

Fourteen Cities in Nucleus of Network, With Plans for Twenty-nine as Wave Lengths Are Granted.

Plans for the immediate establishment of a radio-telegraph system serving all the interior of the United States through fourteen strategic cities just have been announced by General James G. Harbord, president of the Radio Corporation of America. The service will be managed and operated by the Corporation's subsidiary, R. C. A. Communications, Inc.


The stations will be at New York, Chicago, San Francisco, Los Angeles, Seattle, Denver, New Orleans, Kansas City, Detroit, Cincinnati, Cleveland, St. Louis, Boston and Washington, General Harbord's announcement reveals.


