"Youth will be served" so runs the old proverb. Of course, no reference to poultry was intended, but it happens to fit just the same. As a rule, pullets lay more eggs druing their first layng season. Consequently, if natches are correctly timed so hat plenty of pullets will be rought to maturity some time luring the latter part of August or September, a banner winter egg season is bound to follow. Pullets hatched during February or March, according to breed should begin laying just about Pullets should not be allowed to come into maturity too quick ly. Normally, a pullet starts to lay eggs as soon as she has reach ed maturity and her body has ceased to grow. Sometimes lay-

ing starts somewhat before full growth has been reached and ter egg production merely befurther growth may cease.
