A TRIBUTE TO MAIN STREET (By Herbert Hoover)

In an address delivered at E lizabethton, Tennessee, October 6, 1928, Herbert Hoover paid the following tribute to Main Street in referring to the opportunity given him for service to the South following the Mississippi

flood disaster:

I, with other Americans, have perhaps unduly resented the stream of criticism of American life, the stature and character of our people. More particulirly have I resented the sneers at Main Street. For I know that in the cottages that lay behind the street rested the strength of our national character. When it came to the organization necessary to meet that great catastrophe the pressure of time alone made it necessary to rely wholly upon the leadership, intelligence, the devotion, the sense of integrity and service of hundreds of towns and villages on the border of the flood. It was they who must undertake the instant work of rescue, the building of gigantic camps, the care of children, the provision of food, the protection of health of three-quarter of a million of homeless people. All that we who were in the direction could do was to outline the nature of the service that every town and village should perform and assist them with resources. In the face of that terrific problem that would test the stamina and quality of any people there was not a failure in a single case. This perhaps stands out larger in my mind than in most men because under similar conditions of great emergency I have had the duty to orfanize populations abroad. And in no country does there exist the intel ligence, take devotion the probity, the ability to rise to a great emergency that exists in the Main Street of the American town and village. I do not wist to disparage the usefullness of Broadway, Pennsylvania Avenue or State Street but it is from Main Street and its countryside that the creative energies of the nation must be replenished and



Simplicity of cooling system is a feature of the new Ford







are in the poultry yard instead of the dinning room. He will howl his head off if Junior tracks a little mud onto the living room rug, but he will allow droppings, decomposed food material and other offensive litter to accufulate in his henhouse until they smell to high heaven. He is scrupulously careful about the lawns near the house, but his chicken yard looks like that lower corner of the "south forty' after the last batch of city picnickers had done their worst to it. Then he wonders why his

The discoverise of Dr. Gorgas in Panama and of Dr. Noguchi, who recently died a martyr to science in Africa, have shown how certain kinds of mosquitos transmit the germs of yellow fever. This suggests that such parasites as lice, fleas, mites, ticks and bedbugs, which so often infect chickens, may also be carriers of disease. There is reason for believing that such is the case, but whether they do or not, such parasites cause a heavy drain on the vitality of the fowls Thet means decreased ability to block the progress of disease should infection ocur from other sources. The simplest kind of sanitary measures will make poultry very unhealthy for germs and parasites, so why they should be tolerated is past understanding. Simple cleanliness is the first essential of santation. Poultry houses should be made so they can be scrubbed out occasionally and they should be regularly sprayed with coal

tar dip and disinfectant.

No animal or vegetable matter should be allowed to remain exposed in yard or house until it begins to decay. All such material should be removed and burned. Be particularly careful so to dispose of fowls or animals that have died from one cause or



[These may be picked up by fowls not already affected, thus prevailed the province for the province fo Most grown-ups recognize the worse for fowls than to be comdesirability of personal cleanliness and common sense sanitation in the interest for flows than to be compelled to roost just above a filthy droppings board. The odors and tion in their homes and places of gasses ariseing from droppings taminated weakens the lungs, thus making easy the progress of any disease which may be contracted later on. Both roosts and droppings board should be frequenly cleaned and disinfected, as well as the whole house. It is also advisable to cover the droppings board with wire neting so the fowls cannot get into

the droppings with their feet. Birds that show signs of disease should always be put to hemselves and treated until it s safe to return them to the lock. If any considerable number show signs of the same ailment, they should all be taken out of the flock and a wholesale clean up should be made; clean out and disinfect all houses and equipment; clean up yards and in every wey attempt to remove all possible sources of infection.

Not all of the possible sanitary measures can be discussed in an article of this kind, but some of the most important ones are described above. A good dip and isinfectant used regularly and conscientiously will go a long way toward making disease impossible in your paultry flock, not forgetting the most effective of all—God's own great sterilizers, fresh air and sunshine. It is not easy to keep things sanitary as it is to let them go to pot but it does keep down disease and THAT PAYS.
