CALENDAR REFORM

We hear a lot about reforming the calendar, or dividing the year into 13 months of exactly 28 days each, but we don't seem to be doing it.

This forward step in world economy should be taken at once. Because it is a world problem, instead of a local problem it becomes a question of what's everybody's business is nobody's business.

There is an association carrying on educational propaganda in favor of the change. This is a committee associated with the National Retail Dry Goods Association, headed by C. LeRoy Austin. They are asking endorsements of calendar reform from local civic organizations in the various communities of the English speaking people.

Because of the magnitude of the undertaking, (simple as it would be in final action) that is in getting all nations and peoples to agree to the revision of the present unscientific, inequitable and meaningless division of calendar time, individuals and even local civic bodies have evaded the issue and heitated to take a definite stand. When as a matter of fact a 13-month calendar would benefit the business man, and the farmer, the working man, in short—every body. Slaves to custom and tradition, we are computing yearly time according to the notion of an old Roman emperor, probably and undoubtedly drunk when he made the calendar and named a month after himself and another month for a thirty-third cousin. The Greeks had a 30-day month; likewise the Egyptians. But every now and then they had to hop skip and jump to catch up with the solar year. Romulus is said to have divided the year into ten months, and nobody knows what became of the other 65 and one-quarter days. We have as great a right to change the calendar as did the ancients centuries before they found out the earth was round instead of flat.

Calendar reform is something that is close to our interests and not something remote in beneficial possibilities. Many large corporations now pay wages on a 13-month basis, recognizing its efficiency. This is one of those movements everybody seems to be in favor of, yet few are doing anything to bring it about. Because of its great help in bringing about a simplification of all forms of human transaction its sponsorship has been taken too much for granted. The vision would be for somebody or some group of people to oppose it. This would bring the issue to a head. There is little doubt in our mind which side would win.—Pikerill Service.

WORDS OF SAFETY

Carelessness due to indifference causes the majority of motor traffic accidents. We just "don't think", expresses the sum of a substance of risks resulting in injury to persons and destruction to property. What a duty one owes when driving an automobile! A sacred trust is imposed upon one who takes hold of a steering wheel and starts a motor. His first duty is to himself and passengers - often members of his own family. Every child riding in an automobile at the hands of another is entitled to be carried safely to the given destination. The law compels adults to protect the rights of children to decent moral surroundings, to good health and to education. Likewise should it zealously guard the child's rights to safe transportation—indeed, to life.

Another duty a driver owes is to fellow motorists. This duty has two meanings. First, to give the other drivers an equal chance for safety. Secondly, to set a good example to others, especially to new and young drivers—an example of prudence, of caution and of common sense under all conditions and in all circumstances.

The trend of traffic safety is coming more and more to the responsibility of the drivers than upon arbitrary and artificial factors as guides under all conditions. Several of the States have lifted the speed limit in the interests of safety and convenience. Such a move sounds paradoxical, yet it has its good points. Time and experience are the necessary guides to all improvement in the safety of highway transportation.

Safety is not a settled fact, and never will be, because the principles of gravity and percussion, and the laws of displacement and friction remain forever fixed. It is not, then, the human element that will have to be more than ever the subject of future legislation an deregulation in the safety. An absolutely hazard-proof motor car will never be built, nor will a danger-proof highway ever be constructed or maintained. An appeal, therefore, to drivers, passengers and pedestrians for safe and sane conduct while on the public streets and highways is always in order. It has been said that death and taxes reduce all people to the same level. We would add to these a third great human leveler—the automobile.—Pikerill Service.

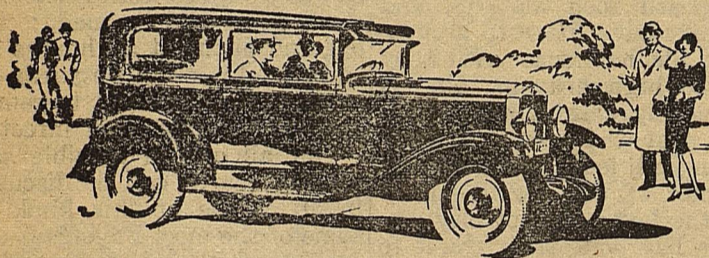

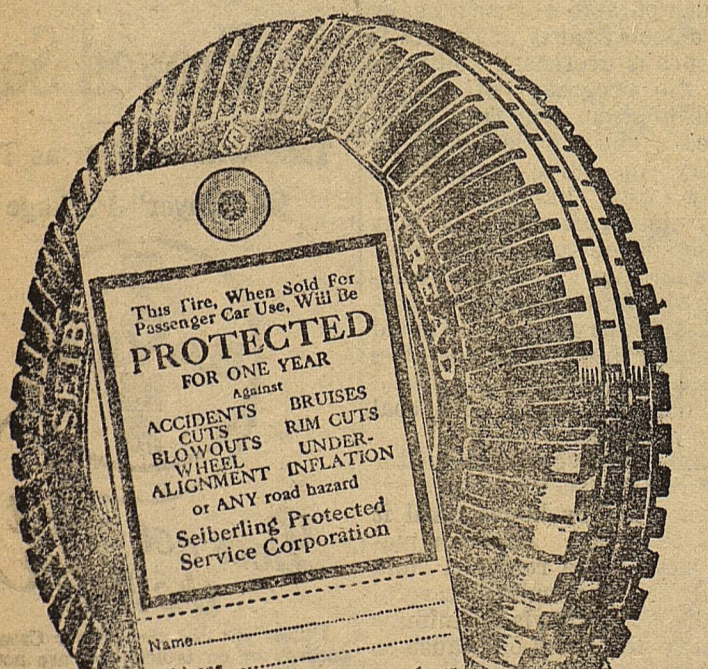

Each of the slaves signed the document by mark, and it was filed with Thomas Bayly, colonel in the United States Volunteers, sub-assistant commissioner in the Bureau of Refugee Freedom and Abandoned Lands.

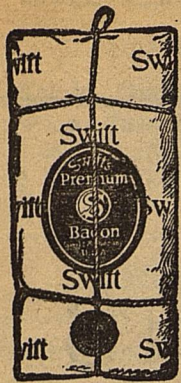

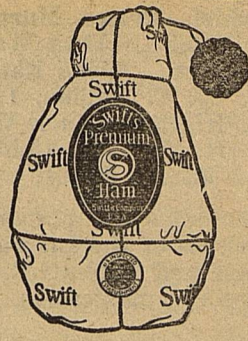

How to Raise Poultry

CASH VALUE OF CLEANLINESS

Little Jonny, in his bath, with ears full of soap and soul full of rebellion, undoubtedly has no use whatever for the doctrine that cleanliness is next to Godliness. To him it is just a pain in the neck—a devilish invention of grown ups to keep a boy from his rightful occupation of play. Left to himself, he will most certainly have as little as possible to do with that par ticular kind of Godliness.

Most grown-ups recognize the desirability of personal cleanliness and common sense sanitation in their homes and places of business. It is more comfortable to be clean after one has reached maturity and too inconvenient to suffer the expensive ills that result from unsanitary surroundings. When it comes to their poultry, however, that is quite a different story in all too many instances.

The same man who would recoil in horror from a filth-encrusted place before him on his table allows his fowls to eat and drink from utensils that are no less an offense to decency because they are in the poultry yard instead of the dining room. He will howl his head off if Junior tracks a little mud onto the living room rug, but he will allow droppings, decomposed food material and other offensive litter to accumulate in his henhouse until they smell to high heaven. He is scrupulously careful about the lawns near the house, but his chicken yard looks like that lower corner of the "south forty" after the last batch of city picnickers had done their worst to it. Then he wonders why his fowls are such poor layers, look so droopy and dispirited and so readily take on all the ills that chicken flesh is heir to.

The discoverise of Dr. Gorgas in Panama and of Dr. Noguchi, who recently died a martyr to science in Africa, have shown how certain kinds of mosquitos transmit the germs of yellow fever. This suggests that such parasites as lice, fleas, mites, ticks and bedbugs, which so often infect chickens, may also be carriers of disease. There is reason for believing that such is the case, but whether they do or not, such parasites cause a heavy drain on the vitality of the fowls. That means decreased ability to block the progress of disease should infection occur from other sources. The simplest kind of sanitary measures will make poultry very unhealthy for germs and parasites, so why they should be tolerated is past understanding. Simple cleanliness is the first essential of sanitation. Poultry houses should be made so they can be scrubbed out occasionally and they should be regularly sprayed with coal tar dip and disinfectant.

No animal or vegetable matter should be allowed to remain exposed in yard or house until it begins to decay. All such material should be removed and burned. Be particularly careful so to dispose of fowls or animals that have died from one cause or another.

Drinking vessels and feeding equipment should be watched carefully. All fountains, troughs and hoppers should be so constructed that the fowls cannot get in them with their feet or roost on them, thereby befouling the contents with dirt or droppings. Fresh water should be

given at least once a day. All feeding and watering equipment should be thoroughly scrubbed out, scalded or disinfected at frequent intervals.

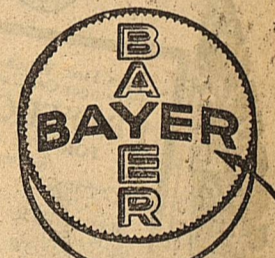
Droppings are perhaps the most dangerous of all possible sources of infection. They are almost invariably breeding grounds for disease germs and also frequently harbor intestinal worms. These may be picked up by fowls not already affected, thus spreading the evil. Furthermore, nothing could be worse for fowls than to be compelled to roost just above a filthy droppings board. The odors and gasses arising from droppings are extremely unhealthy. Continued breathing of air so contaminated weakens the lungs, thus making easy the progress of any disease which may be contracted later on. Both roosts and droppings board should be frequently cleaned and disinfected, as well as the whole house. It is also advisable to cover the droppings board with wire netting so the fowls cannot get into the droppings with their feet.

Birds that show signs of disease should always be put to themselves and treated until it is safe to return them to the flock. If any considerable number show signs of the same ailment, they should all be taken out of the flock and a wholesale clean up should be made; clean out and disinfect all houses and equipment; clean up yards and in every way attempt to remove all possible sources of infection.

Not all of the possible sanitary measures can be discussed in an article of this kind, but some of the most important ones are described above.
