Eldorado School to Open September 2nd.

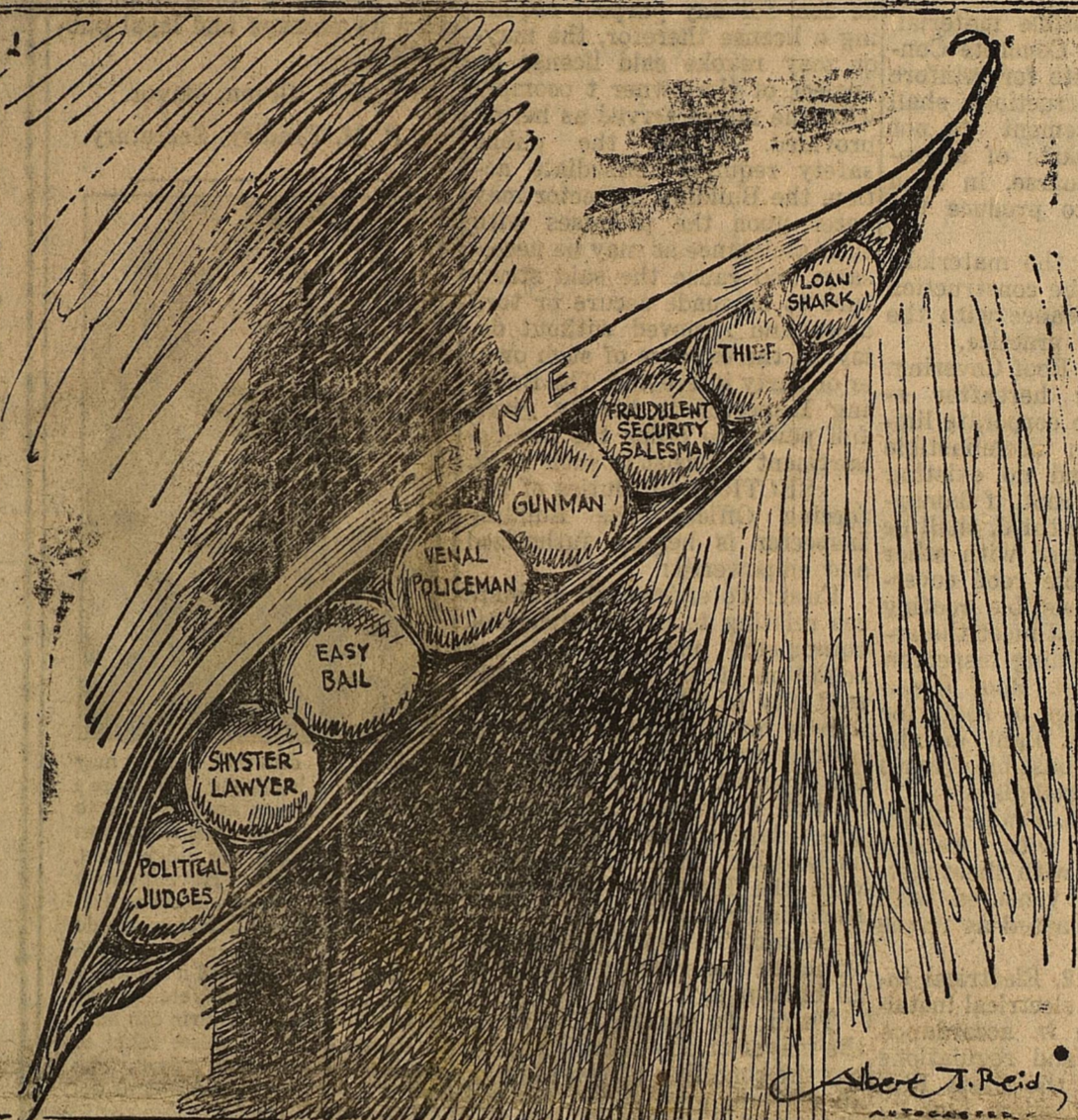
W. N. Ramsey, secretary of the Eldorado School Board reports that the Eldorado Public School will begin its 1929-30 term on September 2nd.

WEST TEXAS SUPPORTING EASTERN SCHOOLS

MENT TO EQUALIZE DISTRIBUTION OF MONIES

TAX LEIGUE HAS AMEND-

During the years 1915 to 1923 Tom Green county paid into the school aid fund the sum of \$101,181 and received in return as rural school aid the sum of \$80,743. The county schools would have been \$20,438 to the good had not a cent been paid to the state.

These figures were revealed here Saturday by Gus Reiminger, manager for the Texas League for Equal and this city's "real convention spirit." He is aiding the counties in the distribution of the rural aid fund. He is at work to correct this condition, seeking now to get an amendment to the rural aid law assuring equal distribution of the rural aid fund.

Citing the inequalities Reiminger has prepared a list of counties showing the following for the period 1915 to 1923:

Dallam county paid \$62,619, received back \$3,945, an excess paid in of \$58,674; Potter paid in \$147,497, received back \$720, an excess paid in of \$146,777; Tom Green paid in \$101,181, received back \$80,743, an excess paid in of \$20,438; Lubbock paid in \$98,821, received back \$81,398, excess paid in \$17,423; Schleicher paid in \$27,079, received back \$4,610, an excess of \$22,469; Mason paid in \$43,584, received back \$18,970, an excess of \$24,614; and Gillespie county paid in \$50,350, amount received back \$16,778, an excess paid in of \$33,572.

On the other hand there is a group of counties receiving back far more than they paid in as for instance, Camp county paying in \$24,684, getting back \$69,381, thus getting back an excess of its payments \$44,697; county paying in \$106,565, getting back \$173,107, or an excess over payment of \$66,542; Upshur paying in \$45,333, getting back \$154,807 or an excess in the county favor of \$109,474; and so on through a long list.

The records show that the counties composing the seventh senatorial district with Hopkins county added received from the aid fund during the 13-year period the sum of \$1,169,365, the total being paid into the aid fund by these counties being only \$396,675.

These figures, declares Mr. Reiminger, disclose an alarming situation which should arouse the people to undelayed action. Securing the rights of the children of this section of Texas, as guaranteed under section 5,

article 7 of the state constitution The scholastic population considered in conjunction with the state aid received further emphasizes the Reiminger. Camp, Smith, Upshur, Van Zandt, Wood and Hopkins counties have 30,876 pupils and the aid received for the 13-year period amounted to \$1,169,365. Another group of counties including Bexar, Guadalupe, De Witt, Fayette, Gonzales and Lavaca had 32,051 scholastics and the rural aid given those counties in 13 years amounted to \$157,846.

Heretofore the rural aid fund has been distributed in accordance with the vision that no district is eligible to receive aid unless it has a 75 cent local school tax levy. Mr. Reiminger points out that the provision of the law eliminates those counties having a high percentage assessed valuations. In other words the county with a high rate on proportionately high valuations, playing fair with itself and the state in the matter of its schools does not get the break that the county does with the low valuation. Moreover under the old law, no county may receive from the rural aid fund if the districts have sufficient funds to operate six and one half months. Mr. Reiminger points out that the county with a 25-cent rate with three times the valuation equalizes itself with the county with a 75-cent rate and a low valuation, but by reason of the low rate is ineligible to get aid of the state fund. Thus it becomes shrewd business to keep the valuation low, and affords a chance to play politics, as Mr. Reiminger charges has been done under the regulations.

Mr. Reiminger charges that the legislators sponsoring the present measure are fully aware of the benefits to be derived for their counties, where there are low percentage assessed values. The Texas League for Equal and Uniform Taxes has already prepared a brief to take the question of constitutionality of the

present state aid law before the courts.

Mr. Reiminger has been attending the sessions of the Tax Collectors here, and is leaving Sunday for Mason and Gillespie counties enroute to San Antonio taking up the fight for equalization.—San Angelo Standard.

The Well Overflowed About Six Times During the Day Gas and Oil Hit at 4925 Feet.

The first commercial oil production will likely be found in Phillips Petroleum Company's No. 1 J. A. Whitten, when Tuesday was making gas estimated at 1,000,000 or over, by heads every few minutes. The fluid reported to be pure oil, which stood 1800 feet in the well Tuesday night and coming over the top early Thursday morning.

The oil and gas struck at 4,925 was the second showing found in this well, the other at 4112 feet. Work has been suspended in drilling and Thursday morning casing was being put in the close the 1440 open hole.

The oil is sweet and tested 35, compared to 36 gravity at 4112 feet. The first showing of oil has been bailed out as the drilling proceeded. The amount of oil forming in the hole while drilling was in progress was estimated at one half bailer hourly or twelve or fifteen barrels daily.

There is very little water in the well and most of the fluid is pure oil.

The last oil and gas struck has not been estimated as to the amount but all evidence show it to be a strong well.

Oil leases and royalties are being sold fairly fast.

Eldorado, meaning "the land of Gold" is now merging into its real meaning. When the Whitten well went over the top Thursday morning. Whether Hon. W. B. Silliman in naming the town, some 35 years ago, knew that underneath it or near it lies the liquid gold or not, but its there just the same. When too, we understand that all towns named Eldorado have developed an oil field near them. Eldorado with its other fields of opportunity is destined to be a city worth while in the near future.

AN ORDINANCE

To Regulate The Construction, Alteration, Maintenance, Repair and Removal of Buildings Within the City of Eldorado and Prescribed Penalties for Violation

Be it ordained by the City Council or Commission of the City of Eldorado.

SECTION 1. Fire Limits.—The provisions of the ordinance shall apply to and be co-extensive with the territory within the boundaries now designated or which may hereafter be established as the fire limits of the city of Eldorado, except such provisions as are by special reference made applicable to all the territory within the corporate limits of said city, and the said fire limits as now established are hereby declared to be as follows:

- East half of Block 2.
- East half of Block H.
- East half of Block G.
- East half of Block 6.
- East half of Block 10.
- East half of Block 14.
- All of Block 17.
- All of Block Y.
- All of Block E.
- All of Block C.
- All of Block A.
- All of Block I.
- All of Block J.
- West half of Block 3.
- West half of Block K.
- West half of Block 7.
- All of Block B.
- All of Block D, thence across Cottonwood Street to Northwest line of Block 84; thence Southeast 140 feet to a point; thence Northeast 300 feet to the Northeast line of said Block 84—140 feet Southeast from the Northeast corner of said Block 84.
- All of Block F.
- All of Block Z.
- All of Block 18.

SECTION 2. New Buildings and Buildings to be Altered.—No wall, structure, building, or part thereof, shall hereafter be constructed in the city of Eldorado except in conformity with the provisions of this ordinance or moved, or built upon in any manner that would be in violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance, or the approval issued thereunder.

SECTION 3. Permit Required.—Before the erection, construction, or alteration of any part thereof, or of any platform, staging or flooring to be used for standing or seating purposes is commenced the owner or lessee or agent of either, or the architect or builder employed by such owner or lessee in connection with the proposed erection or alteration, shall apply to the Building Inspector for a permit to do such work.

Structures hereafter erected without permit, or not in conformity with this ordinance, shall be removed.

No building shall be moved until a permit has been obtained from the Building Inspector; and such official shall not issue such a permit if, in his judgment the proposed new location of the building would seriously increase the fire hazard of the surrounding buildings.

Each building permit shall recite this section.

SECTION 4. Incumbustible Walls, Cornices, and Roofs Required Within Fire Limits.—Every building hereafter erected or enlarged within the fire limits shall be enclosed on all sides with walls constructed wholly of stone, well burned brick, terra cotta, concrete, or other equivalent incumbustible materials; and shall have the roof also the top and sides of all roof structures, including dormer windows, covered with incumbustible material. All cornices shall be incumbustible material.

SECTION 5. Permissible Wooden Structures Within Fire Limits.—No frame or wooden structure shall hereafter be built within the fire limits as given herein, or as they may hereafter be established, except the following; all roofs placed upon such buildings or structures shall have an incumbustible covering.

- (a) Temporary one-story buildings for use of builders
- (b) No frame building shall be moved from without to within fire limits.

Buildings with wooden frame work clad with sheet metal, stuccoed, or veneered with brick, shall be classed as frame buildings.

SECTION 6. Repairing

Frame Buildings Within Fire Limits.—Any existing frame building within the fire limits, which may hereafter be damaged by fire, decay or otherwise to an amount greater than one-third of its present value, exclusive of the foundation, shall not be repaired or rebuilt, but shall be removed.

SECTION 7. Fire-Resisting Buildings Required for Certain Occupancies Within Fire Limits.—No building within the fire limits shall hereafter be occupied as a public garage, automobile repair shop or dry cleaning establishment, unless it be of fire-proof construction. Provided that buildings only one story in height may be so occupied if properly cut off from other occupancies, and if the floor is of non-combustible material.

SECTION 8. Concrete Construction.—Concrete for reinforced concrete construction shall part Portland cement to not more than six parts of aggregate, fine and coarse, in such proportions as to produce the greatest density.

The quality of the materials, the design, and the construction shall be in accordance with the best engineering practice.

SECTION 9. Roof Covering.—Every building hereafter erected within the corporate limits shall have an incumbustible roof covering and no existing wooden shingle roof, if damaged more than one-third, shall be renewed or repaired with other than incumbustible roof covering. All incumbustible roofing material used must meet the approval of the Building Inspector.

SECTION 10. Roof Openings.—All openings in roofs for the admission of light or air, shall have incumbustible frames and sash with wired glass.

SECTION 11. Frame Buildings.—Buildings with wooden frame work clad with sheet metal, stuccoed, or veneered with brick, shall be classed as frame buildings.

SECTION 12. Electrical Installations.—All electrical installations shall be in accordance with the rules and regulations promulgated by the State Fire Insurance Commission, and no installations of electrical equipment shall be made, except in conformity thereto.

SECTION 13. Smoke Pipes.—No smoke pipes shall pass through any floor, or a roof having wooden frame work or covering.

SECTION 14. Trash Receptacles.—All receptacles for ashes, trash, garbage and refuse shall be of galvanized iron or other incumbustible material.

SECTION 15. Unsafe Buildings.—Every building, structure or part thereof, which shall appear to the Building Inspector

to be dangerous, by reason of bad condition of walls, defective construction, overloaded floors, lack of guards against fire or other causes, shall be held to be unsafe. The Building Inspector shall immediately notify the owner or lessee to cause the same to be made safe, and shall also affix a notice of the dangerous character of the structure in a conspicuous place on the exterior wall of such building, and no person shall remove or deface such notice affixed. The owner or party having an interest in such unsafe building or structure, being notified thereof in writing by the Building Inspector, shall immediately cause the same to be made safe and secure, and if any such building shall be used for any purpose requiring a license therefor, the mayor may revoke said license on neglect of the owner to comply with the notice served as herein provided. Where the public safety requires immediate action, the Building Inspector may enter upon the premises with such assistance as may be necessary, and cause the said structure to be made secure or torn down and removed without delay, at the expense of such owner or party interested. The Building Inspector is hereby given full power to order the fire department to assist in such work.

SECTION 16. Duties of Enforcing Officer.—The Building Inspector is hereby authorized and empowered:

First: To enforce all ordinances relating to the construction, equipment, management, and condition of all property within said city of Eldorado; and it is hereby made the duty of the departments of police, health, and fire to assist in the enforcements of this ordinance, and each of these departments shall, so far as possible, act in connection with the Building Inspector in such enforcement.

Second: To supervise the construction or reconstruction of all buildings.

Third: To report monthly to the mayor or city council regarding the condition of the town on all matters pertaining to fire prevention.

SECTION 17. Penalty for Violations.—Any and all persons who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance or fail to comply therewith, or who shall violate or fail to comply with any order or regulation made thereunder, or who shall build in violation of any detailed statement, or specifications or plans submitted and approved thereunder, or any certificate or permit issued thereunder, shall severally for each and every such violation and non-compliance, respectively, forfeit, and pay a penalty in the sum of not less than ten nor more than one hundred dollars. The imposition of one penalty for any violation of this ordinance shall not excuse the violation, or permit it to continue; and all such persons shall be required to correct or remedy such violations or defects within a reasonable time; and when not otherwise specified each ten days that prohibited conditions are maintained shall constitute a separate offense.

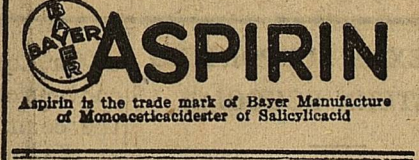
The application of the above penalty shall not be held to prevent the enforced removal of prohibited conditions, as provided in Section 3 of this Ordinance.

SECTION 18. Date of Effect.—This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and legal publication.

Mem stared longest at the various pictures of Tom Holby. She found him in all manner of costumes and athletic achievements and she read the rhapsody on him first.

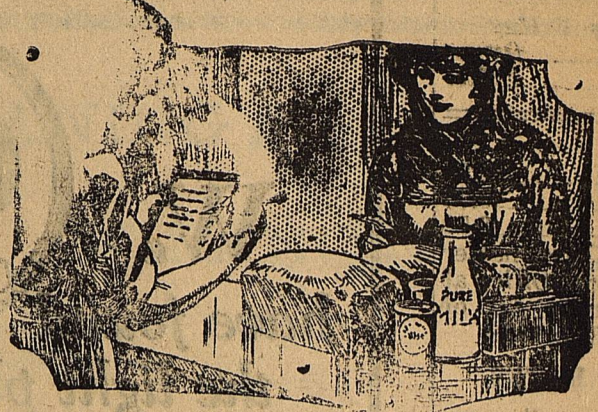
