EDITORS SWAT LEGISLATORS ON PRESS BILL

BRADY, April 20.— Censure for Senator Walter Woodward of Coleman and of Judge J. H. Jenkins of Brownwood for their attitude toward the publication measure defeated by the recent session of the Texas legislature was carried in a resolution passed by the Heart of Texas Press Association here Saturday. The editors and publishers present endorsed the measure which related to the publication of legal notices, which Woodward and Jenkins helped defeat.

The association at the invitation of Claude Wild, Secretary of the San Angelo Board of City Development, voted to recommend to the Texas Press Association gathering at Mineral Wells in June that San Angelo be accorded the 1930 meeting. The body voted to support Brownwood in its effort to retain Daniel Baker College and selected Ballinger for the fall meeting of the Heart of Texas Press convention the third Saturday in September.

Endorse Brownwood
The resolution relating to Brownwood read:

"Whereas Brownwood has been an educational center for years and Daniel Baker College has earned its place as one of the strong educational institutions of the state and whereas it is to be merged into a great church institutional university, and realizing the great development now coming to the great central section of Texas:
"Therefore be it resolved that the Heart of Texas Press Association at Brady most heartily and earnestly endorse Brownwood for the location of this state institution and pledge our support to the press, the people and the educational forces of Brownwood to secure and hold this great university."

R. L. Scott, president, confined his address to the service that a newspaper can render the community, R. F. Higgs of Stephenville and Henry Schwenker of Brady talked on audit of circulation and adoption of NEA rates during the morning session. 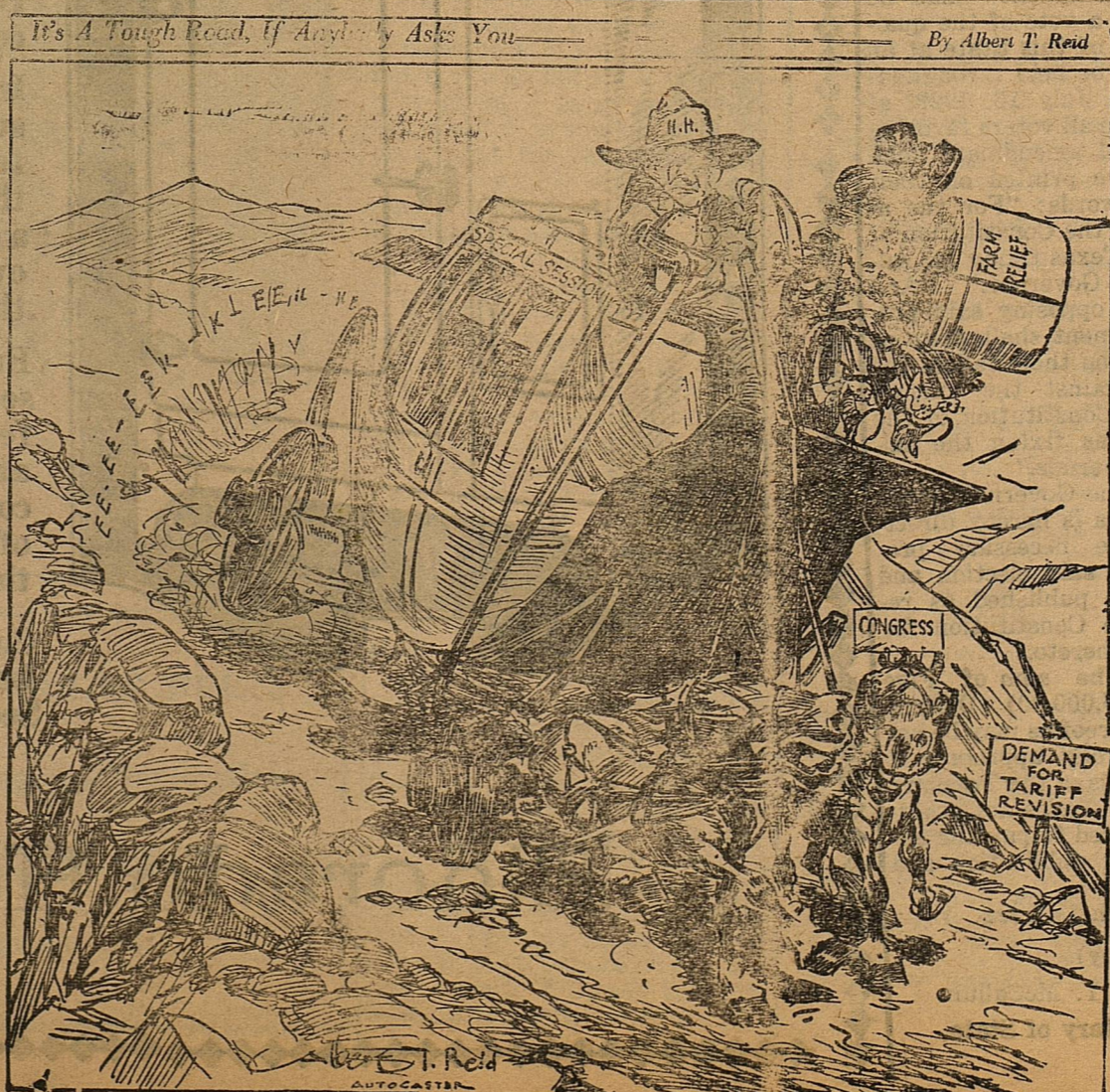

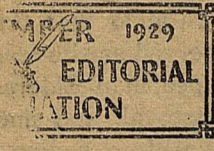

A JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an amendment to Section 5 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas fixing the salary of the Governor; providing for its submission to the voters of the State of Texas as required by the Constitution, and making appropriation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 5 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 5. The Governor shall, at stated times, receive as compensation for his services an annual salary of Ten Thousand Dollars and no more, and shall have the use and occupation of the Governor's Mansion, fixtures and furniture; provided that this amendment shall not become effective until the third Tuesday in January, 1931."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on July 16, 1929, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "For the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas fixing the salary of the Governor." And those voters opposing said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "Against the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas fixing the salary of the Governor."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution for amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

LARGE CAVERN FOUND NEAR JOHNSON CITY

JOHNSON CITY, Texas.—Petroleum geologists have discovered what appears to be one of the most extensive caverns in Texas, possibly surpassing the famous Carlsbad Caven in New Mexico. Local ranchmen have long known of this cave but few have braved the risk of extensive exploration. It is known as the Buffalo cave, about five miles northwest of Johnson City, some two miles from the new Airline Highway, Fort Worth to San Antonio. The business men and others interested in Johnson City progress will soon begin work on a good automobile road to the entrance of the great cavern.

J. B. Dickinson a widely known geologist of Tulsa, Oklahoma, who has surveyed and mapped this entire area together with other geologists, made a trip into the cavern recently and in conversation with your correspondent had the following to say: "The Buffalo cavern seems to be a most wonderful freak. We made a somewhat hurried investigation with ordinary flashlights and found many interesting situations. We entered on the north side of the Pedernales River about one thousand feet and came out on the south side, being a direct line of almost a mile. Our meanderings probably covered twice that distance. "As compared with the Carls-

bad Cavern, or the famous Kentucky cave, I should say the Buffalo cavern holds greater scientific interest, or I might say, greater curiosity to the ordinary man or woman, who feels he should delve into nature's mysteries. To those so inclined I would say it offers exceptional interest. It may prove to be the most extensive cavern in the United States, when fully explored. "The character of the limestones, of the Cretaceous age, easily erodes by the action of water, hence the immense openings and large rooms. There appears to be a dozen or more branches, some of them may lead several miles under the hills in that locality. It would require men of experience and suitable equipment to undertake a thorough study of the entire underground cavities. Suffice to say, however, that the Buffalo cavern will prove interesting and instructive to those interested in such phenomena."—The San Sabo Star.

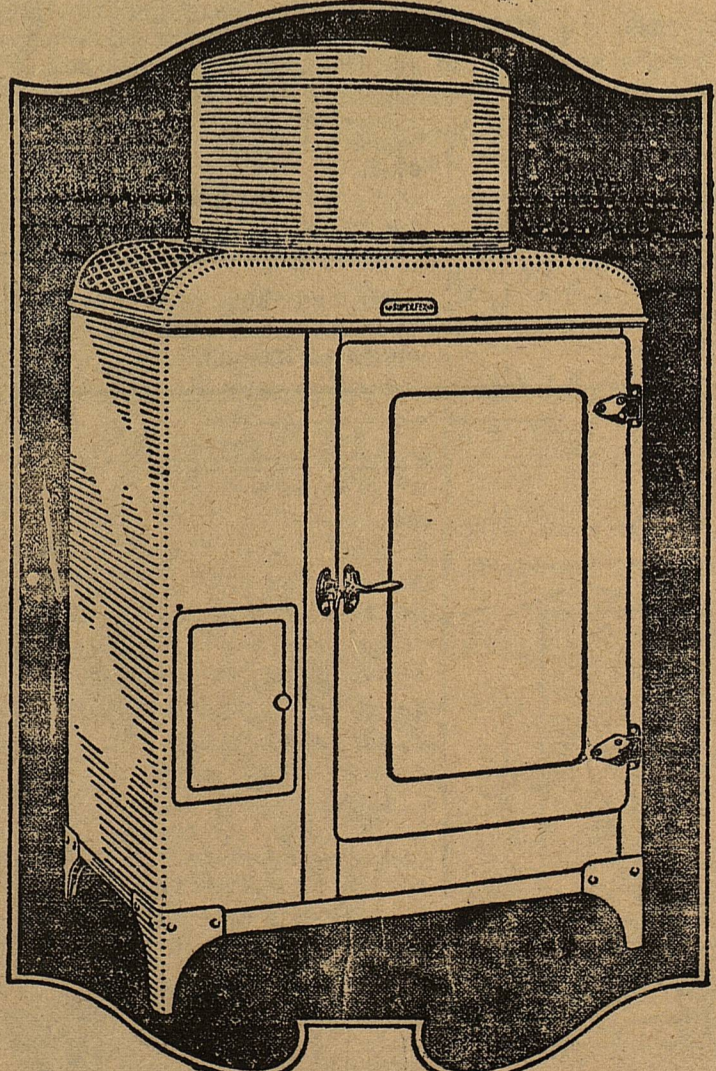

FORT WORTH.—If the cowboy sang his songs as most radio entertainers sing them, he'd get the breath knocked out of him," says Prof. Newton Gaines, head of the physics department of Texas Christian University and immediate past president of the Texas Folk-Lore Society.

"The real cowboy has to use 'horse rythm' in his singing," Gaines points out. "It is the rythm of his working day in the saddle."

Prof. Gaines has spent several years on West Texas ranches. He sings cowboy ballads as the work cowboy really sings them. He plays his own accompaniment on the gitar.

"The music of the cowboy song can usually be traced by the expert musician to some popular song of the '70s and '80s," says Gaines, in describing the music of the cowboy. "Yet, in most every case, one finds that the cowboys have altered the rythm and melody to suit their pioneer experiences and feelings."

"The rythms of the cowboy songs correspond to the three gait of the ordinary Texas cow pony—the walk, the trot and lope."

According to Gaines, the cowboy songs are characterized by freeness of expression, the persistent use of the first person,

and the soft singing of the verses "Contrary to popular belief," he says, "the cowboy usually sang his song in soft tones. His night-herding songs were always croons. Loud singing would have had a disquieting effect on the cattle. Ninety percent of a cowboy's singing is done with no one around.

As we have said above, this does not only apply to the trading people but too the business people as well. There are things that we know of that you are able to get right here in Eldorado that you send off and get. How can you

expect people to patronize you in your business when you will not patronize the other business houses in return.

"May I give father his pipe?" asked Billie.

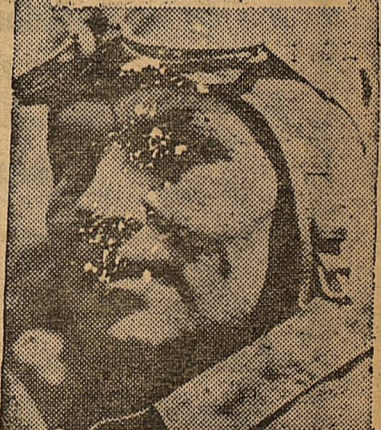

R. W. SHEPPERD TO BUILD NEW HOME AT CHRISTOVAL.

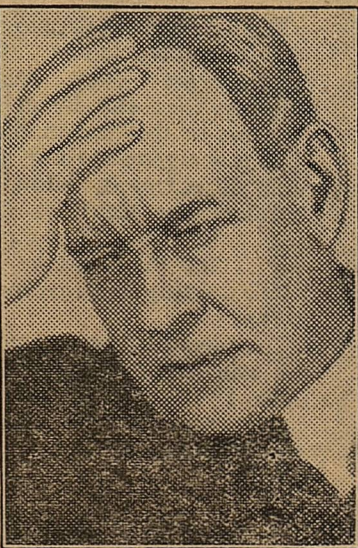

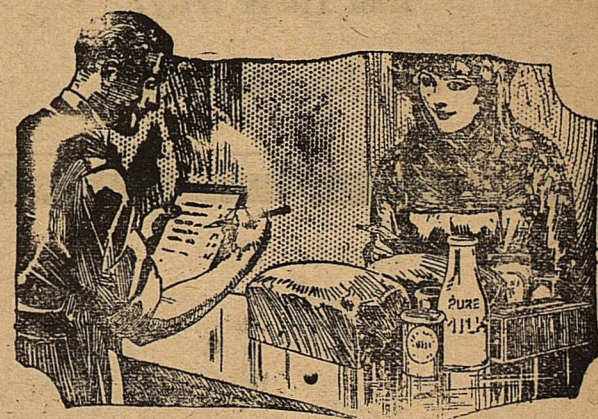

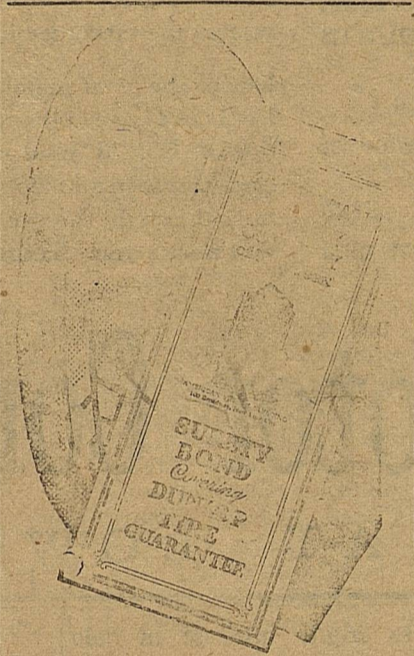
TRACK

A JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an amendment to the constitution of the State of Texas providing for a Supreme Court of nine members, and for continuous session of that Court.— **BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Section 2 and 3 of Article 5 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows "Article 5. Section 2. The Supreme Court shall consist of a Chief Justice and eight Associate Justices, any five of whom shall constitute a quorum, and the concurrence of five shall be necessary to a decision of a case; in other matters, until otherwise provided by Law, the jurisdiction of the Court shall be exercised under such regulations and orders as the Court by a majority vote may prescribe. No person shall be eligible to the office of Chief Justice or Associate Justice of the Supreme Court unless he be at the time of his election, a citizen of the United States and of this State and unless he shall have attained the age of thirty years, and shall have been a practicing lawyer or a judge of a court, or such lawyer and judge together at least seven years. Said chief Justice and Associate Justices shall be elected by the qualified voters of the State at a general election, shall hold their offices six years, or until their successors are elected and qualified, and shall receive such compensation as may be provided by law. In case of a vacancy in the office of Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, the Governor shall fill the vacancy until the next general election for State officers, and at such general election the vacancy for the unexpired term shall be filled by the election by the qualified voters of the State. The Judges of the Supreme Court who may be in office at the time this amendment takes effect shall continue in office until the expiration of their term of office under the present Constitution, and until their successors are elected and qualified. When this amendment takes effect, the Governor shall immediately appoint six additional Associate Justices of the Supreme Court for terms of office so that the terms of two of such appointed Associate Justices shall expire with the term of office of each of the present members of the Supreme Court, and, upon the qualification of such new Justices, the Commission of Appeals of the State of Texas shall terminate."

"Article V. Section 3. The Supreme Court shall have appellate jurisdiction only except as herein specified, which shall be co-extensive with the limits of the State. Its appellate jurisdiction shall extend to questions of law arising in cases of which the Courts of Civil Appeals have appellate jurisdiction under such restrictions and regulations as the Legislature may prescribe. Until otherwise provided by law, the appellate jurisdiction of the Supreme Court shall extend to questions of law arising in the cases in the Courts of Civil Appeals in which the Judges of any Court of Civil Appeals may disagree or where the several Courts of Civil Appeals may hold differently on the same question of law, or where a Statute of the State is held void, and shall extend to such other questions as may be within the Court's Appellate Jurisdiction under the Statutes of the State in force when this amendment takes effect. The Supreme Court and the Justices thereof shall have power to issue writs of habeas corpus, as may be prescribed by Law, the said Court and the Justices thereof may issue the writs of mandamus, procedendo, certiorari and such other writs, as may be necessary to enforce its jurisdiction. The Legislature may confer original jurisdiction on the Supreme Court to issue writs of quo warranto and mandamus in such cases as may be specified, except as against the Governor of the State.

The Supreme Court shall have power, upon affidavit or otherwise as by the Court may be determined, to ascertain such matters of fact as may be necessary to the proper exercise of its jurisdiction. The Supreme Court shall be open at all times and shall sit at the State Capitol for the transaction of business at such times as may be designated by the Court. The Supreme Court shall appoint a clerk, who shall give

bond in such a manner as is now or may hereafter, be required by law, and he may hold his office for four years and shall be subject to removal by said Court for good cause entered of record on the Minutes of said Court who shall receive such compensation as the Legislature may provide."

Sec. 2. Said proposed Constitution submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a throughout the State on Tuesday July 16, 1929, at which election each voter opposing said proposed amendment shall scratch off of the ballot with a pen or pencil the following words printed on said ballot: "For the amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Supreme Court of nine members, and for continuous session of that Court.", and each voter favoring said proposed amendment shall scratch off the ballot in same manner the following words printed on said ballot: "Against the amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Supreme Court of nine members, and for continuous session of that Court." If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and said election held as provided by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of the State Treasury to pay for the expenses of said publication and election.

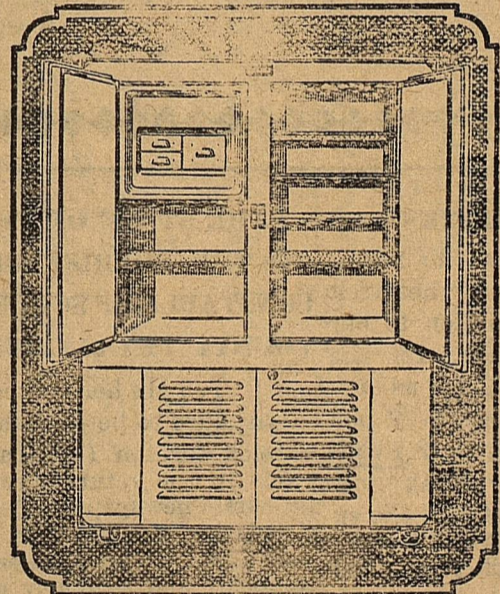

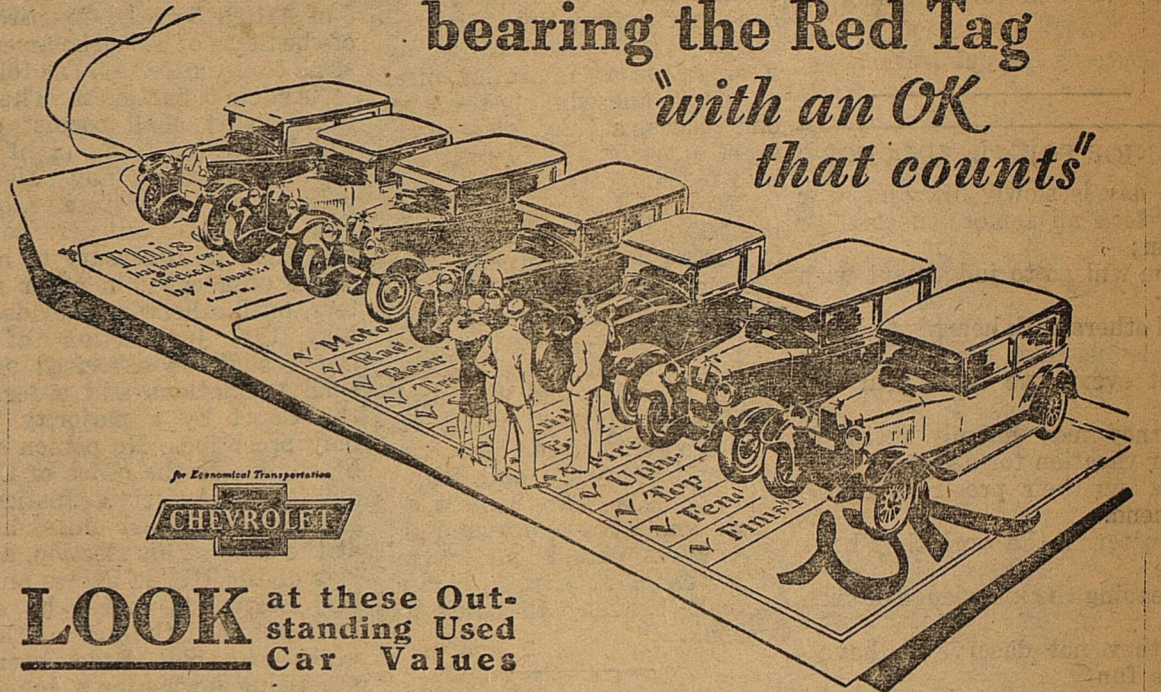

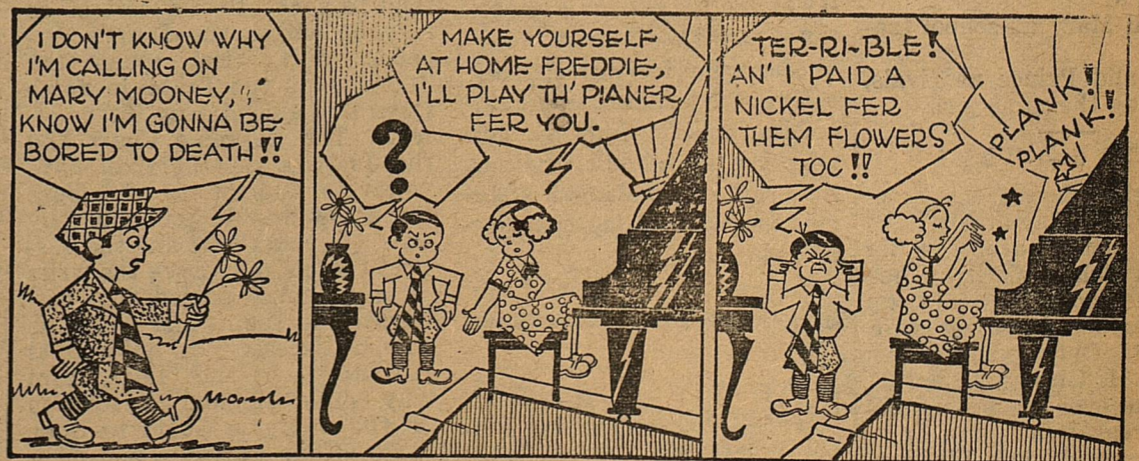
