# After the storm

## Slower pace returns week after media invasion

What passes for normal in Eldorado these days, would be considered bizarre in most Texas towns. That's how much things have changed since the YFZ Ranch story broke last

While the sight of satellite trucks and TV news crew doing sidewalk interviews might appear strange in other West Texas communities, here It has become commonplace.

Nowadays locals ask as many questions as the news crews. Things like, "When did you say this going to air? ...Oh, in May? ...So it we'll see it during sweeps?"

That's not to suggest that Eldoradoans have become jaded, only that many of them have become media

It has been a steep learning curve

and last week it got steeper as reporters and news crews from four countries and two continents converged on Eldorado, each of them wanting a frontrow seat at Warren Jeff's end-of-the world extravaganza.

But, when the promised apocalypse failed to materialize, most of the reporters found themselves trying to gauge local reaction and asking thoughtful questions like, "How do you feel this will affect your town?" Or... 'Are you frightened by the newcomers and are you worried that they will try to steal your children?"

One mans comment as he watched two camera-toting news crews pursuing a local woman (who clearly did not want to be interviewed) down the side walk in front of the newspaper office was, "It reminds me of a bunch

of ducks chasing a tick."


An audio recording of Warren Jeffs addressing a Saturday work meeting in Colorado City, Arizona, provided much of the impetus for the media storm. In the meeting Jeffs can be heard telling workers that April 6 will be the day God returns to Earth to claim the FLDS church as his holy people and unleash "the destructions" upon the rest of the planet. What is unclear in the audio, is exactly which April 6 Jeffs is talking. about.

The recent construction of the FLDS temple on the YFZ Ranch, coinciding so closely with the April 6 date, had many believing that last week would be the big week. Then there were the persistent rumors emanating See YFZ RANCH On Page 6

# New equipment goes into service at city sewer plant

recently at the City of Eldorado's wastewater treatment plant, went into operation this week, and almost immediately improved the quality of the treated effluent being disarged from the facility. Steve Dennis, a civil engineer with

project, said the hoped the city's tendent, who are salaried, were to have been corrected. lingering algae problems might finally be at an end.

The meeting was the counsamples of the treated effluent cil's regular monthly session. It was called to order by Mayor John Nikolauk with council members Bill McCutcheon, Toni Sudduth, Dora Bosmans, Tommy Minor and Richard Mendez in attendance. Also present were City Secretary Carolyn Mayo and Utility Superintendent Floyd Fay.

A major item of business involved the city's dwindling workforce. Floyd Fay explained that he has three vacancies in his 13-person staff, and that the remaining ten have be asked to pick up the slack.

It was explained that some city employees were lured away by the high wages currently being paid in the booming oil field.

After a long discussion the council agreed to give a \$1 per hour across-the-board pay raise to the city's hourly workers. Pay increases for the City Secretary and Utility Superinalso approved, using a complex formula recommended by Toni Sudduth.

In other business, the council met with Mya Griffin, representing First Choice, an electric service re-seller. Her company, Strategic Choice Energy and WTU Retail each offered quotes for providing the city with electrical service. Discussion quickly turned to differences between the three bids, and the possibility of placing some of the city's high use accounts with one provider and assigning the rest to another. Ultimately, the council decided to do nothing and tabled the item.

Next, the council asked Mayor Nikolauk to visit with Texas Commission Environmental Quality (TCEQ) commissioners to see if the \$9,900 fine the city received because its wastewater treatment plant was out of compliance could be lowered or eliminated since the problems at the wastewater plant appear

The Mayor also reported that he has received nothing new from the TCEQ on a citation the city received recently at the landfill. Neither had he heard about the status of the city's 2005-2006 grant application for a water system improvement grant. Nikolauk then advised the council that YFZ Ranch officials had declined to accept the city's proposal that the ranch transport its wastewater to the city sewer plant for 18 cents per gallon.

Utility Supt. Floyd Fay reported that the Texas Railroad Commission inspector found several minor deficiencies at the city's gas plant. He explained the problems were quickly corrected.

Fay noted that a new shipment of patching oil has been received and that the pothole patching machine was back

# **County must** move three polling places

County Clerk Peggy Williams notified Schleicher County Commissioners Monday that the county would not be able to hold its May 7 tax freeze election in a single polling place, as she once had hoped. Instead, the voting will take place in the four regular county polling places.

The news means that many city and school voters who will cast their May 7 ballots in the Memorial Building, will be forced to travel to another polling place to cast their county ballot. Only the county's Precinct 2 voters will be able to complete their voting without leaving the Memorial Building since it is the official polling place for that precinct.

Williams said that Elizabeth Hanshaw Winn, an attorney in the Secretary of State's elections division, told her last week that the consolidation of commissioners precincts would be unlawful. That was contrary to the advice she had gotten a few weeks earlier from and attorney in the same office, Ms. Williams said.

The news didn't please the commissioners. Nor did it please County Judge Johnny Griffin who pointed out the added cost to the county. Griffin then explained that Sutton County continues to hold its special elections in one polling place.

Ms. Williams agreed and said she mentioned it to the attorney in Austin only to be told that Sutton County had been lucky that they had not been caught.

Ultimately the commissioners chose not to argue with the state, mainly because they didn't want the results of the May 7 election to be challenged. Judge Griffin commented that if the tax freeze proposal fails, he didn't want the results contested because of polling place irregularities.

With that Ms. Williams said she would publish a notice in the paper and post other notices informing voters of the polling place locations. They are:

Pct. #1 - Methodist Church Education Building.

Pct. #2 - Memorial Building.

Pct. #3 - County Annex. Pct. #4 - Catholic Church Education

# Your right to know about government depends on editorial freedom

> For over 200 years, the only help that newspapers needed to report on the workings of government (or anything else) was the First Amendment to the Constitution.

The founders of this country believed

that a free press is so important, that "right" was enshrined at the very top of the Bill of Rights.

Unfortunately, over the last several years, decisions handed down by state and federal courts have slowly stripped away that First Amendment remedy until it affords virtually no protection at all.

This means that publishers have to weigh the chance of a libel suit or a district attorney's subpoena each and every time his or her newspaper reports a controversial story.

Some newspapers could have information that, if published, could expose corruption in government or force the local "good old boy" network into the sunshine. But few newspapers can write and publish those stories because most of this information depends on a confidential source. In Texas, that confidentiality cannot be guaranteed and sources know it so these stories go unreported.

Just like most of our advertisers, most community newspapers in Texas are small businesses that operate on very thin profit margins. If small newspapers had to literally keep an attorney on retainer to fight potential libel suits or defend against adventurous state prosecutors, very few could stay in business for very long.

That situation is why two Texas legislators have filed bills (one in the Texas House, one in the Texas Senate) that would grant reporters and publishers a limited, sharply defined ability to protect themselves and confidential sources.

Senate Bill 604 by Rodney Ellis, D-Houston, and House Bill 188 by Aaron Pena, D-Edinburg, would bring into existence what is known by the media as a "shield law," something 31 states and the District of Columbia already have, to help reporters resist the disclosure of information or a confidential source.

The protections in the original bills don't extend to information relating to violent crimes or eyewitness accounts. Reporters wouldn't be able to shield evidence of a murder or use these protections to avoid testimony regarding an incident they witnessed. But it would help reporters and publishers shield government "whistle-blowers."

Obviously, many in government — especially in law enforcement — don't like this idea. Just read this item that was posted on the Texas District and County Attorney Association's website after a hearing in the Texas Senate last week:

"We ... wonder what public policy interest justifies requiring [prosecutors] – and the defense bar – to fight the media for evidence in their possession?"

As if it's a newspaper's job to collect information for prosecutors. It's not.

A free press has a place in our society and that place is just as important in a town like Eldorado as it is in Austin or Washington.

The function of a newspaper in our democratic society is to help readers (taxpayers, citizens) monitor local government. That objective look at the workings of local government is the service small newspapers across Texas provide their readers each week.

It is not a newspaper's place to be an informationgathering arm for local prosecutors. Newspapers cannot meet that obligation very well if they have to practice defensive journalism.

These two bills would help change that and return a measure of freedom to the press in Texas.

Urge your Senator to vote with Sen. Ellis for the original version of this bill.

# Lady Bears' NCAA Championship win demonstrates the value of women's sports

basketball championship, I was cheering for Baylor University's Lady Bears. They defeated the tough Michigan State University Spartan team by 84-62 to win their first NCAA national basketball title with the second-highest margin of victory in a woman's NCAA title game ever. In five years, Coach Kim Mulkey-Robertson took a team with a 7-20 record and took it to the pinnacle of women's collegiate competition. Both she and her team have made Baylor, Waco and all of Texas very proud.

Baylor's success was built on hard work, commitment and sacrifice. They were able to take setbacks, such as last year's loss to Tennessee in the Sweet 16 round of the NCAA tournament, to galvanize their play. Coach Mulkey-Robertson and her players rebounded from that disappointment to win this year's national championship.

The Lady Bears are part of a trend toward more female participation in organized sports.

# House approved \$137.5 billion state budget

AUSTIN - It's just the next step in the process, but it sounds impresive: The House approved a \$137.

billion twoyear budget TEX. April 7 that would provide more money for public schools, more to protect children and the elderly and more for social services.



But the Senate earlier passed its own version of a budget, and the upper chamber is not expected to approve the House version. That means the budget goes to a joint conference committee. And that's where the real numbers will start to emerge.

#### State raises looking likely...

Texas' 142,000 state employees are probably going to get a pay raise, but the House and Senate have different ideas on what's fair. The Senate thinks 4.5 percent in January 2006 and another 4.5 percent in January 2007 would be proper. The House version is 3 percent, one time.

#### "I do, Governor..."

A state representative has a bill in the hopper that would make it legal for members of the Legislature and other state officials to hear couples say "I do" to the "love, honor and obey" question.

House Bill 1228, filed by Rep. Dianne Delisi (R-Temple), would add representatives, senators and current and former statewide elected officials to the list of people allowed by state law to conduct a marriage

Lawmakers, the governor and other statewide officeholders would not be allowed to charge a fee, and they could only marry a man and a

The bill languishes in committee, likely until death do it part.

#### Safety seat law may get boost...

The House Transportation Con mittee has unanimously approved House Bill 183, a measure that would require children up to age 8 and shorter than 57 inches to ride in an approved child safety seat.

The current law covers only children to age 4 or shorter than 36 inches. Those extra years and inches will translate into lives saved, says bill sponsor Rep. Fred Brown (P-College Station.)

#### Battle reenactment set...

The history of the world changed on April 21, 1836, when a rag tag Texas army defeated Mexican Gen. Antonio Lopez de Santa Anna at San Jacinto.

It won't look quite the same with petrochemical plants and oil tankers in the background, but the historic battle will be reenacted at 3 p.m. April 23 at the San Jacinto Museum of History.



The most moving documentary I've ever seen happened to be produced by a friend of mine, Bob Johnson. He and I studied drama together at Baylor.

He played the part of a pie man in our comedia dell arte (low Italian comedy) class. We did some skits for a full house as part of our spring drama recital. Some members of the audience are still laughing from our performance. The Baylor Theater probably hasn't produced such guffaws since.

Bob has been successful. He recently donated a million dollars to the Dallas Children's Theater. He has a production company near Washington, DC, which stages among other things the lighting of the national Christmas tree. He is good at what he does.

He read in the newspaper about Tennessee (population 1,600) who were collecting paper clips.

The kids were studying the Holocaust. Many of them had no knowledge of it. When they heard that the



Nazis killed six million Jews, they had trouble realizing 6 million of anything. To put it in perspective, rope. Movie stars got involved. The film is now in nationwide release. The National Board of Review named it one of the top 5 documentaries of 2004.
