New FLDS compound uncovered in S. Dakota

Is Jeffs hiding in the Black Hills?

A 100 acre parcel of land in a remote corner of the Black Hills of South Dakota turns out to be owned and operated by loyal followers of FLDS Prophet Warren Jeffs, and may be one of the fugitive prophet's hideouts.

The Success received an anonymous e-mail tip about the property, followed by an equally anonymous phone call in which the caller provided details about the property and the people who bought it.

It was a very familiar story. A man named David Allred had fronted the purchase of the property on Oct. 3, 2003, for the sum of \$135,000.00. Allred was acting in his capacity as president of Details Unlimited, Inc., a

state license plates, women wearing pioneersyle dresses, large log cabin-style homes being erected, and guards on 4-wheelers who challenge anyone approaching the property line.

All that, combined with one last piece of information, was enough to convince Success editor Randy Mankin that the tip was legitimate. The final tidbit of information involved trucks bearing the company name Z-Trans coming and going from the South Dakota property.

Z-Trans, Inc. is a corporation registered in St. George, Utah. The company's director and registered agent is Robert Dockstader Allred, another of Warren Jeffs' loyal followers.

Z-Trans trucks are routinely seen entering and leaving the YFZ Ranch here in Schleicher County


Certain that the anonymous tipster was onto something, The Success staff began tracking down any corporate records that could be accessed over the Internet. Noted author Jon Krakauer and Utah private investigator Sam Brower, were also called in. They had previously helped The Success dig up information on the FLDS property near Mancos, Colorado.

Krakauer and Brower traveled to South Dakota where they scoured Custer County land records and scouted out vantage points from which they could watch the property.

What the men found was a 100 acre parcel of land on which several large buildings have

been erected, some of them almost identical to the dozen log cabinstyle residences now complete on the YFZ Ranch. They also saw and photographed another warehouse type building onto which a large two-story office and/or residential section was being added.

There was an assortment of trucks, construction equipment, farm equipment, and miscellaneous equipment such as generators and feed storage silos. There were even eight pig feeders clustered together under a

clump of trees. And there were numerous women and children. The women and girls were all clad in long pioneer-style dresses.

Krakauer told The Success that he is convinced the property is a hideout for "FLDS bigwigs," and may even be one of the places where Warren Jeffs has hidden himself in order to avoid arrest by state and federal law enforcement officials.

Jeffs was indicted in 2005 by a Mohave County Arizona grand jury on charges of Sexual Conduct with a Minor and Conspiracy to Commit Sexual Conduct with a Minor. The charges stem from Jeffs' alleged involvement in arranging and officiating over marriages between adult male and under-aged female SEE FLDS ON PAGE 8

April Fools Day parade purse grows

Prize money for the Eldorado, Texas Elgoatarod April Fools Day Parade continues to pour in and now, in addition to a \$100 prize for the parade entry most exemplifying the April Fools theme, an additional \$75 will be awarded to the most humorous entry plus another \$75 to the largest group in the parade. This is the fourth year for the Elgoatarod, a spoof of Alaska's Iditarod, but since the event falls on April 1 and 2 this year, this will be the first such parade to be incorporated into the event.

The parade will begin at 2 PM on Saturday, April 1 and will highlight this year's goat racing event. There is no entry fee, but interested individuals or groups should contact organizer Jim Runge at eoboc@hotmail.com for further details and an entry form. Entrants are encouraged to enter early in order to increase the pos-

sibility of even more prizes, but may enter as late as the day of the parade. Entries are being accepted from across the state, because to the knowledge of organizers, there is not a major parade for this special day anywhere in Texas.

The only guideline for parade entries is that they appeal to common decency, since this is a family event. Any type of pedestrian, equine or vehicular entry is welcomed, the more outlandish, the better. Besides being judged on it's adherence to the April Fools theme, points will be awarded for action, costuming, creativity, humor, originality and general foolishness.

This year, due to the popularity of the goat races, riders must provide their own "pullers." Goats and carts are provided and anyone may ride, but a teenager or older must accompany riders in order to

lead/pull the sometimes stubborn goats. Of course, anyone wishing to bring their own goat and/or cart is not only welcomed, but encouraged. Persons owning a goat but without a cart can bring their goat and hitch him to our "stars." Goats do not have to be trained to run without guidance and unusual conveyances are especially welcomed.

Big Government Falls Flat

During the past year, one of the philosophical justifications for the Bush administration's approach to government has collapsed. It held that President Bush was a "big-government conservative," or in the more striking formulation of the influential, Bush-friendly journalist Fred Barnes, a "strong-government conservative."

In theory, strong-government conservatism is alluring. If government is going to do something, it ought to do it well. In practice, however, strong-government conservatism has mostly been a rationalization for lazy and politically expedient accretions to government. It hasn't given us a strong



government, but a further-sprawling government that in many ways is contemptible.

Take the response to Hurricane Katrina. The Department of Homeland Security should be

a perfect forum for strong government. Congress and the president identified a goal -- preventing terrorists from attacking us on our soil -- and named a new federal department after it: Homeland Security. They threw 22 disparate government agencies together, apparently on the theory that bigger is stronger.

In the House report on Katrina, there was one target for criticism that has gone unnoticed -- big government itself. The report notes how important it was to share information "within agencies" and "across departments." It didn't happen: "Unfortunately, no government does these things well, especially big governments."

Another signature Bush foray into expansive government is the Medicare prescription-drug plan. It takes one of the nation's problems -- exploding entitlements for the elderly -- and makes it worse. As Michael Mandelbaum argues in his new book, "The Case for Goliath," a major threat to the dominant U.S. role in the world is a declining public willingness to pay for it. Piling up new entitlement costs makes this dynamic even more likely.

Some government programs actually promote strong government. A large, capable military is a foundation of national power. The Patriot Act and the National Security Agency spying program -- by updating governmental capabilities to deal with a new national security threat -- represent strong, flexible government.

But these kinds of programs hardly necessitate an ever-expanding federal government. According to Brian Riedl of the Heritage Foundation, nondefense, nonsecurity and non-Katrina-related discretionary spending has increased 34 percent since 2001. Huge entitlements like Medicare, Medicaid and Social Security are growing at 6 percent to 9 percent annually.

None of this makes for strong government in the conservative sense. It creates a self-perpetuating appetite for even more government. As spending increases, so does pressure for higher taxes. This threatens the most successful Bush domestic initiative, which is of the old-fashioned limited-government variety: tax cuts that helped boost the most important factor in national strength and well-being, a strong private sector.

When the GOP begins its post-Bush departure -- roughly after the midterm elections in November, when the 2008 presidential nomination race begins -- "big-government conservatism" will probably end up on the ash heap. The party will have to relearn what it used to know: A strong government is a limited government.

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Global Secruity Begins at Home

The idea "Think Globally, Act Locally" has influenced many decisions since its first use at an international conference in 1972. It conveys the idea that effective solutions to large problems often begin with steps taken in your backyard.

Today, keeping America safe requires the same concept. While our federal government protects us by meeting global threats abroad, we also need to act locally, addressing the potential security threats posed by illegal immigration.

We are all aware that important military missions are ongoing in dangerous parts of the world, and we are grateful for the courage of our military men and women. However, it would be a dishonor to their service if we did not protect our interests at home with the same dedication and vigor that they show overseas.

Domestic security requires our attention and cannot be overlooked. We must devote additional resources to securing our nation's borders. Our southern border has become a sieve, and protecting Texas's border with Mexico is one way that we can fight the war on terror at home.

Monitoring Texas' border with

Mexico is no easy task; it spans 1,248 miles – about the distance from Houston to Washington, D.C. But just because something is difficult does not mean it cannot be done. We have to do whatever it takes to secure our borders because the alternative is simply not

Securing the Texas-Mexico border is also critical to our economy, because illegal immigrants can become a serious expense to local communities in the form of overwhelmed emergency rooms and overburdened schools.

President Bush's recent budget request is a good first step toward dealing with some of the immigration problems facing our state. The president requested \$450 million to provide 1,500 new border patrol agents. While this increase is a step in the right direction, it is not enough.

Terrorists are counting on southern border policy to be weak, and we cannot allow that to happen. The 9-11 Commission recommended adding 2,000 new border patrol agents a year each year from 2006 to 2010 - at a minimum. This increase was also recommended in the National Intelligence Reform Act that became law in December 2004. Leading the fight for new border patrol agents in the Senate, I introduced a budget amendment providing full funding for them.

Last year, we caught over 160,000 other than Mexicans (OTMs) crossing into our country illegally, and we do not know how many we failed to catch. The Census Bureau estimates that over 10 million people reside in our country illegally - that's more than twice the combined populations of Houston, San Antonio, Dallas and Austin. Immigrants from countries other than Mexico

drug benefit. Attorney General Greg Abbott, on behalf of Texas. Kentucky, Maine, New Jersey, and Missouri, presented the U.S. Supreme Court with a com-



plaint about the requirement that states pay a portion of the costs associated with federal Medicare drug coverage for persons eligible for both Medicare and Medicaid.

Abbott questioned the constitutionality of annual "clawback" payments — money states must send each month to the federal government to compensate for savings Congress anticipates states will realize from no longer providing prescription drug coverage for individuals enrolled in Medicaid.

The program is projected to result in net losses to Texas of approximately \$100 million from 2006-2009.

Texas Lottery drops bonus ball

After soliciting public comments on how to shore up sagging participation in Lotto Texas the Texas Lottery Commission on Feb. 27 jettisoned the "bonus ball."

The commission revised the game, which debuts April 23, so that players will pick six numbers from a field of

"While there may not be an immediate and magic fix to the decline of our Lotto Texas game," said Lottery Commission Chairman C. Thomas Clowe, "I feel it's our responsibility to take action today to remove the one feature we've heard players disapprove of the most, the bonus-ball feature, and change Lotto Texas back to a pick-six game."

Without the bonus ball, the odds of winning the jackpot will be one in 25.8 million and overall odds of winning any prize will be one in 71, the agency said.

Court hears redistricting case

The U.S. Supreme Court on March 1 heard arguments in the Texas redistricting case relating to the November 2004 election and the dynamics that set the stage for a shift from a 17-15 seat majority for Democrats to a 21-16 seat majority for Republicans.

Attorneys for Mexican-American and African-American plaintiffs said the Texas Legislature violated the federal Voting Rights Act by watering down communities of interest and thus, voting power, in moving district

Furthermore, attorneys for Democratic state legislators said it was unprecedented for district boundaries to be redrawn in the middle of a decade. Federal law requires redistricting after the U.S. Census is taken every 10 years, at the beginning of each decade.


In its defense, the state of Texas argued that it is the Legislature's privilege and legal responsibility to redraw districts when the collective will exists.

The court is expected to render a decision on the case before its term ends in June.

A Visit to the Money Factory

Last summer we took a tour of the Bureau of Printing and Engraving in Fort Worth. It sure was fun seeing all that money. The multi-million dollar facility is modern, state of the art and produces more than half (52-54%) of the US currency. Although it opened in 1991, it didn't get much publicity until a couple of years ago when a visitors' center opened. A website, www.moneyfactory.gov gets millions of hits and provides information on our dollar bills.

Only two places in the world make US paper currency: Washington, DC and Fort Worth, Texas. To see where your bill was made, look at the top of the bill on the portrait side. If there is a small "FW" at the top, it came from Fort Worth. If there's no "FW" it came from Washington, DC.

Early this year I talked with Charlene Williams, the CEO of the Western Currency Facility. It produces ones, twos, fives, tens, twenties and fifties. "We actually did all the printing on the new fifty dollar bill and we're doing all the printing on the new ten dollar bill which will be released March the second," says Charlene. US Cur-



rency started having color with the new 20 dollar bill. Charlene says color makes the bills safer, smarter and more secure. She says about 67 percent of our nation's currency is circulated overseas.

The Western branch of the BEP employs more than 700 people who take an immense pride in their work. "They want to turn out a good product. They don't think of it as money. Engravers go thru a seven to ten year apprentice program before they begin their official duties. Printers and pressmen have a four year apprentice program."

The Bureau of Engraving and Printing decided to add a second plant in 1982 after an Air Florida plane crashed into the 14th street bridge in Washington, DC. "Had that plane been closer to the Bureau," says Charlene, "that would have caused a major economic devastation. There had already

been talk about putting another plant outside the Washington area. That incident helped to push along that effort. The Bureau in Washington is interesting. It's in what was once an office building that was made into a production facility, so it's a multi-level operation. It's probably the second most popular tourist spot in Washington after the White House." Eighty cities wanted the facil-

ity, but Fort Worth wanted it more than the others. Charlene says it's the civic pride that got the plant in Fort Worth. "Fort Worth people were very committed to getting the facility to locate here. They donated 100 acres of property and a 240,000 square feet building. For the first 100 jobs offered here, we had 14,000 applications. When people come to work here, they pretty much make this their life. Sometimes I ask my employees to guide people on tours because it gives them a chance to talk about what they do and show the pride in their work." The facility makes about 5 billion bills a year. A one lasts 2 months, 5's and 10's last about 3 years, 20's last 5 years, 50's and 100's last about 9 years. Twos have never worn out.



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

Spending Cap:

Every governmental body in Texas should be required to limit any annual increase in spending to the combined increase of population and inflation, except for additional spending authorized by vote of the people or for official state of emergencies declared by the federal or state government.

Appraisal Cap:

In order to address the inequity of homeowner's property taxes increasing at a rate far above the rate of inflation, the current 10% cap on the rate of increase of appraised value for all homesteads shall be reduced to 5% or less.







PUBLIC NOTICE BY SCHLEICHER COUNTY

Chapter 258 of the Texas Transportation Code (AChapter 258") authorizes a county to clarify the existence of a public right of access over certain county roads. Under Chapter 258, the commissioners court of a county may propose and, after an opportunity for affected landowners to object to the inclusion of certain roads, to adopt a county roads map that includes each road in which the county claims the existence of a public interest because of documented county ownership or as a result of the county having continuously maintained the road since before September 1, 1981.

Schleicher County (ACounty@) claims the existence of a public interest in certain county roads that are included on a county roads map that has been proposed by the County Commissioners Court for adoption by the County under Chapter 258. A map that shows the county roads proposed to be included on the Chapter 258 county roads map will be available for public inspection during regular business hour in the Schleicher County Courthouse.

Under Chapter 258, any person asserting a private right, title, or interest in a road which the County has included in the proposed county roads map may protest the County=s claim of a public interest by making a protest at the public meeting described below, or by filing a written protest with the County Judge at any time before the public

The Commissioners Court of Schleicher County will hold a public meeting for the purpose of allowing any person asserting a private right, title, or interest in a road in which the County has claimed the existence of a public right of access, by including it on the proposed county roads map, to protest the County=s claim under Chapter 258. That meeting will be held beginning at 10:00 a.m. on March 13, 2006, in the Commissioners Courtroom at the County Courthouse, 2 North Divide Street, Eldorado, Texas.



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
