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Utah family members mourn child's death at YFZ Ranch

Seeking information regarding injured child

Joseph Rohbock of St. George, Utah says that the 3-year-old boy killed in a traffic accident at the YFZ Ranch last week was his brother and that he and his family are being kept in the dark about the accident.

Rohbock says the child, identified as Allen Rulon Jeffs, is actually Allen Rulon Rohbock. He says the child's mother Zevanda Jeffs was first married to former FLDS Prophet Rulon Jeffs but was reassigned to his father, Ron Rohbock, shortly after the elderly Jeffs died in 2002.

According to Joseph Rohbock, Allen Rulon Jeffs was born to Ron and Zevanda Rohbock in 2003, only days before Ron Rohbock was excommunicated from the FLDS Church by its new prophet, Warren Jeffs.

Joseph Rohbock says that Zevanda and her infant son were then reassigned to Warren Jeffs' brother, Leroy Jeffs, but he, too, was excommunicated from

the church. At that point, Zevanda and the child were assigned to another of the prophet's brothers, Isaac Jeffs. He became the woman's fourth husband in three years, Rohbock says.

Isaac Jeffs is the man who was driving the 2006 Cadillac Escalade in which Warren Jeffs was riding when the fugitive prophet was apprehended near Las Vegas, Nevada.

Joseph Rohbock told *The Success* this week that his father, Ron Rohbock, is distraught over the death of his son. Complicating matters is the fact that no one in the FLDS Church hierarchy, or the YFZ Ranch leadership will communicate with the his family, the younger Rohbock said.

The Success has learned that Allen Rulon Jeffs was buried this week at the YFZ Ranch.

Adding to the family's grief is the uncertainty surrounding the condition of 3-year-old Richard Rulon Jeffs, another

of three young boys who were riding in a 1996 Chrysler mini-van when it collided with a boulder located near a roadway on the YFZ Ranch.

According to Joseph Rohbock, Richard Rulon Jeffs is his nephew. His sister Elizabeth is also married to Isaac Jeffs. Their son was transported by private vehicle to Schleicher County Medical Center after reportedly being injured by the mini-van's airbag. The boy was soon transferred by AirMed-1 helicopter to Shannon Medical Center in San Angelo.

The Success has learned that Richard Rulon Jeffs was later airlifted to Cooks Children's Hospital in Ft. Worth although a spokesman for Cook's refused to confirm that detail. Neither will Cook's personnel comment on the boy's condition.

Joseph Rohbock says that he and his family got similar results when they tried to check on the boy's condition. "He is my nephew and my father's grandson and we can't find out anything," Rohbock said in a telephone interview on Tuesday. He continued by saying that he believes FLDS and YFZ Ranch officials are trying to keep him from contacting his sister, Elizabeth.

"That's not right," Rohbock stated. "It's not right that my father's rights as a parent have been violated and it's not right that we can't find out about our family members."

Rohbock went on to say that he doesn't expect Merrill Jessop, the man who oversees the YFZ Ranch, to willingly share information with him or his family.

THE ACCIDENT

Rohbock's concerns stem from a one-vehicle accident that occurred last Thursday morning on the YFZ Ranch. Authorities first learned of the accident when Merrill Jessop contacted Sheriff David Doran to report a fatality at an automobile accident on the ranch.

Sheriff Doran, Chief Deputy George Arispe and Justice of the Peace Jimmy Doyle responded to the scene of the accident, an intersection north of the

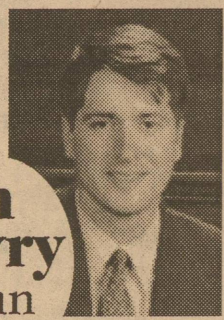

War at Gitmo

GUANTANAMO BAY
NAVAL BASE, CUBA — To enter one of the heavily barricaded camps for detainees here feels like walking into a low-grade war zone. Which is what it is. The extremists held here haven't given up their ideology, or their fight. The struggle to harm America in whatever way, no matter how minuscule, carries on.

The Asian-style toilets on the floors of the cells used to have footrests, until detainees wrenched them from the floor to use as bludgeoning weapons. The guards are splashed routinely with urine and feces. The detainees have even been known to try to kick their soccer balls out of their recreation area into barbed wire, to cost the infidels the price of one ball.

All the disturbances or suicides have taken place in the camps where security has been loosened. It was in Camp Four, where the best-behaved detainees are allowed to live communally, that a minor riot took place this past spring. A detainee faked a suicide attempt to lure the guards into the living area, where the floor had been smeared with urine, feces and soap. When they slipped, the detainees attacked them with light fixtures and other makeshift weapons. The man in charge here, Adm. Harry Harris, says his conclusion was "there is no such thing as a medium-security terrorist."

While always mindful that they are dealing with dangerous men, the Americans treat them humanely, even sensitively. Seemingly every surface has a painted arrow pointing toward Mecca. Every detainee gets a Quran, and should it be necessary to search one, it is done by a Muslim translator, not a guard. Detainees are offered 4,200 calories a day. U.S. combat troops get 3,800. The average detainee has gained 18 pounds.

Interrogators rely on the soft sell. Detainees sit in a La-Z-Boy chair during interrogations, and beverages and movies are available to put them at ease. The most effective interrogator is said to be an older woman who adopts a nurturing attitude.

Roughly 300 detainees have been released or transferred for detention in another country. Of those, roughly 20 have been confirmed to have returned to fight, and probably others too. Nonetheless, roughly another 130 out of 460 are set to be transferred or released. The rest are considered too dangerous. One detainee has said that 85 percent of the Saudis would return to the fight if released.

The facility here has been used, of course, to smear the United States. The press still uses photos from Camp X-Ray -- the Spartan, temporary facility used for just four months in 2002 to house detainees -- in its Gitmo stories, although it has been overgrown with weeds for years and replaced by modern facilities. The detainees are aware of the power of the media, so they time their suicide attempts and disturbances for maximum attention. The principle among the guards is to respond to any provocation with minimal possible force to avoid giving critics any new propaganda.

Dealing with unappeasable murderous fanatics, while at the same time honoring our civilized norms, is never going to be easy. Gitmo is an attempt to find that balance, in the midst of what everyone here -- the detainees and their minders -- recognizes as an ongoing war.

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Get Busy and Play!



no knowledge of their troubled and misspent youth.)

Many parents thought the scourge of free playtime had been banished and have no intention of allowing it back into their homes.

"There's no free lunch, and there's no free playtime," was a typical response from one parent. "These 1- and 2-year-olds need to understand that toddlers in other countries are out to eat their lunch."

"I'm not saying to pressure them when they're too young. If your child is 5 months old, sure, give him a little downtime. At 6 months, though, they need to start thinking seriously about what college they want to attend."

Other parents may be tempted by what seems fun and easy but are concerned about just letting a child "play."

That's why I've developed "How to Have Spontaneous Playtime," a set of 24 one-hour lessons -- which can be taken online and are eligible for college credit -- that describe in detail how to set up non-structured "free playtime."

Take chasing butterflies. Watching a young child wasting his time chasing butterflies can be pretty stressful for a modern "super par-

ent." Here are some guidelines to ease the transition for both you and your child. Instead of frightening your child by suddenly saying, "Go out there and chase butterflies," outline some simple questions for your child:

- How many butterflies can you count?
 - How many different kinds are there?
 - What are their names (both common and Latin)?
 - What genus do they belong to?
- Later, after your child has had 10 minutes or so of free playtime, you can bring him back inside and discuss the butterflies' life cycle and how they fit into the overall ecosystem.

As children get older -- say, over 18 months -- you can add more-challenging activities, such as academic research papers.

And if your child's paper is accepted by a peer-reviewed scientific journal, by all means, allow your child some more free playtime. Just don't overdo it.

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Candidates put on final push for November 7

AUSTIN — Candidates in the major races must not think you've heard quite enough from them.

They're packing the few days remaining until election day (Tuesday, Nov. 7) with ads on TV and radio to make sure you're crystal clear on their campaign slogans.

If you want facts about the candidates and information such as where to vote you can mute your TV or radio and:

- Get a free voter guide from The League of Women Voters of Texas; and

• Go to the Secretary of State's Web site to find out where to vote, based on your home street address.

Now, Democrats may gain a few seats in the Texas House of Representatives, but Republicans are expected to retain their majority.

Incumbent Gov. Rick Perry holds a solid lead in the pre-election polls, but the lead could vanish if more than a third of registered voters actually cast ballots.

An unusually high turnout would give each of Perry's challengers, Democrat Chris Bell and independents Kinky Friedman and Carole Keeton Strayhorn, a shot at victory.

Whether the war in Iraq, ethics scandals in Washington, D.C., falling gas prices and a soaring stock market will affect voters' ballot choices is anyone's guess. Voters could head for the polls in droves or take a pass from their civic duty out of cynicism.

For those who are agonizing over choices on the ballot, maybe the extra hour of sleep thanks to the Oct. 29 end of daylight-saving time won't hurt.

Aid coming for flood zone

Gov. Perry on Oct. 23 issued a disaster proclamation for nine southeast Texas counties affected by severe storms and flooding since Oct. 15.

Those counties include Hardin, Jasper, Jefferson, Liberty, Newton, Orange, Polk, San Jacinto and Tyler.

Qualifying communities with populations less than 50,000 and counties with populations less than 200,000 are eligible to receive up to \$350,000 in emergency grants from the Office of Rural Community Affairs for infrastructure losses.

But only homeowners who have an active National Flood Insurance policy can make a claim for damages if their home floods.

Comptroller says end contract

Comptroller Strayhorn said Texas should terminate its five-year contract with Accenture L.L.P.

The global company with \$16 billion in net revenue last year has been responsible for administering through its call center Medicaid, the Lone Star Card, and other health and human services to needy Texans since Dec. 1, 2005.

Last May, a trio of state law makers, Sen. Eliot Shapleigh, D-El Paso; Rep. Carter Casteel, R-New Braunfels; and Rep. Carlos Uresti, D-San Antonio; asked Strayhorn's office to study the Accenture contract.

After a five-month study, Strayhorn's office found that through August of this year, enrollment in CHIP, the Childrens Health Insurance Program, decreased by 8.5 percent, or 27,567 children. Also, enrollment in children's Medicaid fell by 53,937 over the period.

Strayhorn said the next Legislature, SEE CAPITAL ON PAGE 7

A recent headline left many modern parents scratching their heads: "Want Healthy Kids? Let Them Play."

The article actually called on parents to give children what it called "free playtime."

This announcement, made by a wacky radical group called The American Academy of Pediatrics, shook American parents to the core, especially since many didn't understand what "free playtime" meant.

WARNING: Parents should not allow children under the age of 18 to read the following graphic descriptions of "free playtime."

"Spontaneous, free play -- whether it's chasing butterflies, playing with 'true toys' such as blocks and dolls, or just romping on the floor with mom and dad -- often is sacrificed," said the report.

Chasing butterflies? How much do you want to bet these so-called pediatricians grew up in the '60s?

The last known instance of free playtime in the United States was during the afternoon of Aug. 17, 1978, when two 9-year-old boys spent the afternoon "goofing off," as they put it.

(The two boys, now grown up, later joined the Witness Protection Program and assumed new identities. To this day, their wives have

Jimmy has four children ranging in age from thirty-four to three.

"I had to outdo my dad. I have a little brother who's thirty and I'm fifty-three."

Defensively, Ivan Cardenas recovered a fumble. The defensive line recorded five tackles and three sacks.

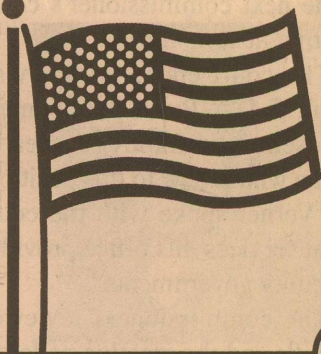

County withholds final sewer payment

The Schleicher County Commissioners met briefly Monday, October 30 for their second meeting of the month.

Present were Commissioner's Bill Clark, Matt Brown and Kirk Griffin. Commissioner Johnny Mayo was absent.

County Judge Johnny Griffin, County Clerk Peggy Williams, Treasurer Karen Henderson and County Road Superintendent Clay Burlison were also present.

The first item on the agenda, giving County Judge Johnny Griffin authority to set the salaries of a new maintenance supervisor and helper positions was approved.

Following a discussion of roofing material and colors of current county building roofs, Bill Clark made a motion to put a new metal

roof over the existing shingle garage roof next to the old jail. The commissioners voted in favor of the measure.

The court then decided to table a resolution to accept the sewer grant project in Orient Heights as completed per engineer David Todd's recommendation. The county is holding the final 10 percent payment to the contractor. Bill Clark who lives in the addition stated he feels the job is not complete and wants the engineer to inspect the project before the county released the final payment.

The commissioners spoke with David Todd at last Commissioner's meeting and inquired about his responsibilities with the project and informed him about the conditions of the roads after sewer lines were

installed. Todd told the court he was unaware of any problems and would inspect the job. The court chose to table action on releasing the funds until they heard from Todd again.

Judge Johnny Griffin informed the court that Bobby and Connie Andrews had resigned from the Schleicher County Emergency Medical Service. Judge Griffin then distributed a balance sheet and new officers list provided to him from EMS President TJ Rodriguez.

County Treasurer Peggy Williams informed the court the Schleicher County Election Board hired Brenda Mayfield as a full time Election Administrator as of January 1, 2007. The court will approve the salary recommendation at the next commissioner's court meeting next month.

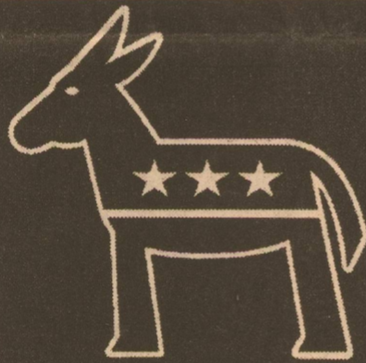

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

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
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Accident claims life of 3-year-old boy at YFZ Ranch

temple on ranch property. Meanwhile, three injured boys and a young woman were taken to the Schleicher County Medical Center emergency room. The injured were accompanied to the hospital by Dr. Lloyd Barlow who lives and practices at the YFZ Ranch.

Allen Rulon Jeffs, 3, was pronounced dead at the emergency room by Dr. Pat Johnson. Richard Rulon Jeffs, also age 3, was treated and transferred to Shannon Medical Center by AirMed-1 helicopter. A third boy, Isaac Steed Jeffs, Jr., 3, and the van's driver, a young woman named Barbara Joy Jessop were treated and released.

Meanwhile, the investigation at the YFZ Ranch revealed that the 1996 Town & Country minivan was traveling down a caliche roadway on the YFZ Ranch when the driver, Ms. Jessop, became distracted at which time the van reportedly swerved and hit a boulder located near an intersection.

Doran reports that the van, which he believed he was traveling about 20 mph, struck the boulder a glancing blow, sending the van careening sideways. At that time, Allen Rulon Jeffs, who was reportedly standing in the back seat, was thrown over the seatback causing him to strike his head. It is believed that he died of a broken neck.

Isaac Steed Jeffs, Jr., age 3, was

also riding in the back seat. He sustained much less severe injuries and was treated and released from Schleicher County Medical Center.

Such was the case with the van's driver, Barbara Joy Jessop, who suffered only minor injuries. She, too, was treated and released.

The third boy, Richard Rulon Jeffs, 3, was reportedly riding in the front seat at the time of the accident. He bore the brunt of the van's air bag which deployed during the wreck. As stated previously, the boy was taken by helicopter to Shannon Medical Center in San Angelo and then airlifted to Cook Children's Hospital in Ft. Worth.

Sheriff Doran told *The Success* that the driver's description of the wreck coincided with what he found at the scene. He noted that none of the van's occupants were wearing seat belts but noted that Texas' seat belt law does not apply to vehicles traveling on private roads.

Deputy Jason Chatham responded to the ER to handle the investigation from that end. He was later joined by Sheriff Doran and Deputy Arispe.

The body of Allen Rulon Jeffs was picked up by Johnson's Funeral Home of San Angelo. Private services were held for him at the

YFZ Ranch where he was reportedly buried this week.

ANOTHER CONVICTION

David Romaine Bateman, 49, of Colorado City, AZ was convicted Wednesday, Oct. 25, 2006 on felony charges of sexual conduct with a minor and conspiracy to commit sexual conduct with a minor. It took a Kingman jury only 40 minutes to return with the verdict.

Bateman, a follower of FLDS Prophet Warren Jeffs, was represented by attorney Bruce Griffen. Griffen argued during the trial that prosecutors couldn't prove that the victim, 17 years old at the time, and Bateman conceived their child in Arizona.

Bateman's conviction is the second in three attempts for Mohave County Attorney Matt Smith. Another of Jeffs' faithful followers, Kelly Fischer, was convicted on similar charges in July of this year. A third case ended in a verdict of not guilty. There are five more cases pending against others in Jeffs' flock.

SPLIT IT UP

Utah District Judge Denise Lindberg ruled on Wednesday, Oct. 25, that property in the United Effort Plan Trust, once the mighty financial arm of Warren Jeffs' FLDS Church, may be privatized. The ruling effectively ends the dominance the church held over the lives of people in the twin cities of Hildale, Utah and Colorado City, Arizona.

Judge Lindberg seized control on the UEP Trust in July 2005 amid a steady drumbeat of allegations that Jeffs and his FLDS lieutenants were pillaging the \$110 million trust. At that time she appointed Bruce Wisan, a Salt Lake

City accountant, to act as special fiduciary and oversee the everyday activities of the trust. Former UEP trustees were stripped of their power and removed from office and a new board, consisting of current and former members of the FLDS church, was appointed.

Lindberg's latest ruling paves the way for deeds to be issued to persons living on UEP property. Also, in cases where the court is concerned the property might be deeded back to Jeffs or otherwise improperly managed, the judge allowed the creation of "Spendthrift Trusts" so that trustees can oversee the property until they are convinced the recipients can properly control their newfound assets.

SOUTH DAKOTA LAND RUSH

The Custer County Chronicle reported last week that members of the FLDS Church near Pringle, South Dakota, have purchase an additional 40 acres of land from adjoining property owners and have received permits to construct \$1.11 million building. The permit application called the structure a hotel/motel/dormitory. Documents indicate the 14,256 square foot structure will include 14 bathrooms.

The FLDS property near Pringle was purchase about the same time as 1,691 acres near Eldorado that would become known as the YFZ Ranch. Also purchased at that time was another tract of land near Mancos, Colorado. *The Success* broke the story about the Colorado land in October 2004. The property in South Dakota remained a secret, however, until spring of this year when an alert South Dakota neighbor tipped *The Success* to the property's existence.

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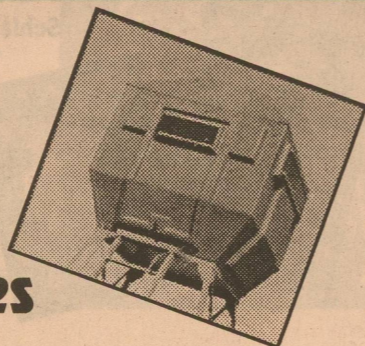

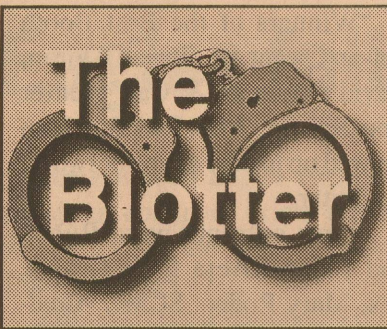

NOTICE OF GAS RATE INCREASE REQUEST**

On May 31, 2006, Atmos Energy Corporation, Mid-Tex Division ("Atmos" or "the Company"), filed a Statement of Intent with the Railroad Commission of Texas ("Commission") and each city within Atmos' service territory, to increase its gas rates and implement a new schedule of rates and riders applicable to all customers in the Mid-Tex Division. The proposed revisions to the rates and riders will impact all classes of service, and each of Atmos' approximately 1,500,000 customers (1,371,625 residential, 121,643 commercial, 235 industrial, and 715 transportation customers).

The Company has requested a systemwide increase of its revenues to \$1,758.7 million, resulting in an increase in annual revenues of approximately \$60.9 million or 3.6%, including gas costs, or 14.1% excluding gas cost. In addition, the Company has requested that it recover its rate case expenses and any rate case expenses for cities that are ordered by the Commission. The proposed change in revenues constitutes a "major" change as that term is defined by state law.

The monthly bills of typical customers would be affected by the proposed changes as follows:

**The calculation of bill impacts assumes monthly consumption of 6 Mcf for residential, 30 Mcf for commercial, and 300 Mcf for industrial and transportation customers.

The Company is also requesting approval of its revised depreciation rates, a weather normalization adjustment rider based on 10-year normal weather, a revenue stabilization adjustment rider, the recovery of uncollectible gas cost as well as the cost of required odorant for natural gas through Rider GCR instead of through base rates, and updated upstream pipeline cost allocation factors. The Company is further requesting rate design changes to Rates R, C, I and T. In addition, the Company is seeking a determination that its interim rate adjustments for 2003, 2004, and 2005 are just and reasonable in accordance with Texas Utilities Code § 104.301; the impact of these interim rate adjustments is reflected in the table above.

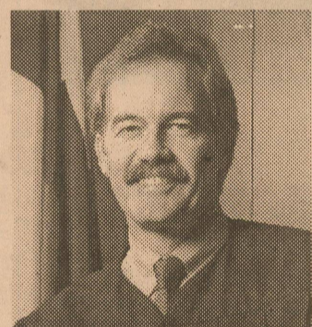

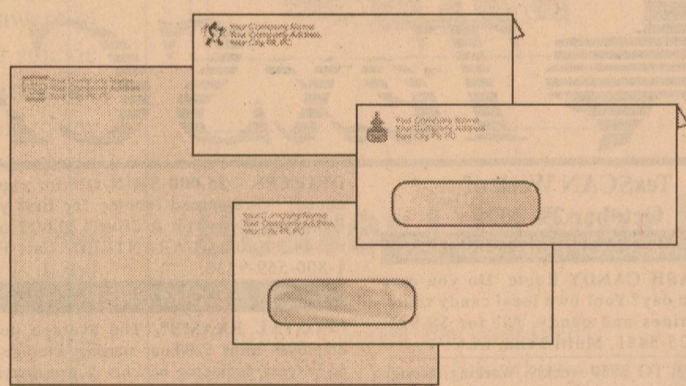

Texans urged to begin planning for long-term care

Healthy active lifestyles also important as Texans age

AUSTIN – Gov. Rick Perry today announced that Texas is one of six states selected by the federal Department of Health and Human Services to participate in a long-term care planning promotion campaign called “Own Your Future.”

“This campaign will focus on encouraging Texans age 45 to 65 to begin thinking about their long-term care needs, such as long-term care insurance, legal decisions about major life decisions, physical fitness and retirement savings,” Perry said. “It’s never too soon to prepare for long-term care.”

“Own Your Future” is an aggressive campaign the federal Department of Health and Human Services developed to promote long-term care planning among state residents.

Perry said the importance of planning for later years is underscored by the fact that only 8 percent of older Texans today report personal savings as their largest source of income and that one in three Americans provide unpaid care for a friend or a relative over the course of a year.

“In addition, many people mistakenly believe that Medicare will meet all their long-term care needs,” Perry said. “This is not the case, and if a Texan age 65 or older develops a disability while living in the community, they can expect to pay an average of \$175,000 over the remainder of their lives on care for that disability.”

Perry also highlighted the importance of Texans leading active, healthy lifestyles because poor diet and physical inactivity are on the verge of replacing tobacco use as the leading preventable cause of death.

“Texas is working to combat preventable illness with the Aging Texas Well Initiative, which is aimed at ensuring Texans age with dignity and independence,” he added. “In addition, programs like the Texas Roundup and Texercise are designed to help improve the health and well-being of millions of Texans, ensuring a healthy lifestyle as each of us advance in age.”
