TCEQ hits YFZ Ranch with more environmental fines

State wants additional \$4,503 penalty

YFZ Land, LLC, a Texas corporation known locally as the YFZ Ranch, has reached an agreement with the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality to settle a third round of environmental violations on YFZ property.

According to an 'Agreed Order' released Tuesday by the agency, YFZ Land, LLC, has agreed to pay \$4,503.00 as an administrative penalty for violations uncovered in December of 2005.

At that time, TCEQ-personnel cited the ranch for failing to obtain a license before engaging in landscape irrigation. Specifically, the YFZ began construction of a lawn sprinkler system at the FLDS temple before obtaining a license.

The ranch was also cited for failing to prevent an unauthorized discharge of wastewater from a wastewater holding tank. The citation notes erosion and saturated ground were documented surrounding the riser of a holding tank at a residential structure immediately east of the temple.

Additionally, the YFZ was cited for failing to prevent an unauthorized discharge or disposal of process wastewater

from a holding pond that collects storm water and process water from a concrete batch plant.

Finally, the YFZ was cited for failing to prevent unauthorized discharge of petroleum hydrocarbon. The charge relates to an area "several feet in diameter" of hydrocarbon stained soil near a welding shop.

Ranch officials were notified of the violations in February of 2006. While the ranch continues to deny all the allegations, an agreement was recently reached that will allow the ranch to correct the violations and pay the administrative penalty.

The first round of fines, for environmental violations discovered in 2004, topped \$18,000. A second round, for violations in 2005, came in at \$14,400. The third and latest round brings the overall total to just less than \$37,000.

Commissioners appropriate \$219,000 for new track loader

The Schleicher County Commissioner's Court opened bids Monday morning for a new 963 C track loader for the Road and Bridge Department.

Commissioners Bill Clark, Johnny Mayo, Matt Brown and Kirk Griffin were present to receive the bids with the winning bid for a Caterpillar loader being submitted by Holt Equipment in the amount of \$219,929.00. Yellowhouse Equipment submittted a bid of \$225,000.00 for a John Deere loader. The men then voted to award the bid to Holt and purchase an additional warranty for a sum of \$7,900.00. They also decided to pay for the purchase our of the county's contingency or reserve fund.

The men then received sealed bids

for the sale of the county's old track loader, a 953C Caterpillar. Warren Caterpillar of San Angelo won the bid with an offer of \$80,742.00

In other business the men voted to join the West Texas Wind Energy Consortium and pay annual dues of \$250. They also approved travel fees for commissioner-elect, Lynn Meador to attend the Texas Association of Counties New Officials Prep School in Austin.

The commissioners then voted to call for bids for diesel fuel to be opened on December 11, 2006.

Judge Johnny Griffin then advised the court that the Texas Department of Transportation had agreed to install a left turn lane on U.S. Highway 277 at SEE JEFFS ON PAGE 8

Warren Jeffs disagreed, according to Ms. Doe, and told her that his father meant she should change her heart.

Jane Doe's wedding day was shared with several other young girls, all of whom were taken to the Caliente where Warren Jeffs presided over the marriage

Afterward, Doe said that Jeffs joined her hand with that of her new husband and told them, "go forth and multiply and replenish the earth with good priesthood children."

That night Jane Doe IV locked her self in the bathroom and cried. She said that she did not have sex with her husband on their wedding night adding,


Some weeks later, Doe said, her husband told her it was time for her to be a wife and he forced himself on her.

Ms. Doe said she asked Warren Jeffs to allow her out of the marriage but was told to give herself to her husband and to have children with him.

The marriage became so bad, Doe said, that she began sleeping in the couple's truck in order to stay away from her husband.

During cross-examination by attorney Tara Issacson, Ms. Doe acknowledged that Warren Jeffs never told her directly to go and have sex with her husband. Instead he told her to submit, Ms. Doe stated.

The day-long proceeding included testimony from two of Ms. Doe's sisters, one of whom said she made her younger sister's wedding gown. Both testified that SEE JEFFS ON PAGE 8



The Amnesty Fallacy

Little did voters know it, but on Nov. 7 they were delivering a mandate for amnesty for illegal immigrants. Most of them probably thought they were voting on the Iraq War or on corruption, but elite opinion-makers have decided that they also were panting for a laxer immigration policy.

There's no doubt that electing a Democratic Congress furthers the cause of an amnesty and guest-worker program by removing the main obstacle to both: the Republican majority in the House. But there is no good evidence that championing



strict immigration enforcement was a loser for Republicans, or that voters elected Democrats explicitly to permit illegals already in this country to stay and to invite more of their

brethren to come. Any suggestion otherwise comes from advocates of amnesty who interpret anything voters do -- now up to and including expressing their discontent with an unpopular war -- as a call for more immigration.

The epicenter of their case is in Arizona. Two immigration-restrictionist Republicans lost House races in a state that experiences more illegal border crossings than all the other states bordering Mexico combined. If strict-enforcement conservatives can't make it there, the argument goes, they can't make it anywhere. But Arizona wasn't really a restrictionist rout.

Arizona's Senate race was a truer test of the political merits of the issue. Republican Sen. Jon Kyl is an opponent of the "comprehensive bill" -- effectively an amnesty -- passed by the Senate last year. But he is also a thoughtful policymaker who will never be mistaken for a bomb-thrower. His Democratic opponent forthrightly supported the Senate bill and a guest-worker program. Kyl won.

It's disingenuous to argue that Arizona rejected enforcement when, as Mark Krikorian of the Center for Immigration Studies points out, it approved ballot measures to deny bail to illegals, bar them from collecting punitive damages, keep them from receiving certain state subsidies and make English the state's official language. If Arizona had recoiled from a get-tough approach to immigration, it would have rejected these measures rather than approving them by 3-1 margins.

The fact is that the immigration issue wasn't killing off Republicans; it was discontent with the war and a general disgust with the GOP brand. The true acid test on the issue is how Democrats handled it. They ran what everyone acknowledges was a brilliant campaign. Yet, they tried to minimize differences with Republicans on immigration and mentioned it nowhere in their post-election agenda.

Finally, there is the matter of the Hispanic vote. The Republicans' share of it declined to 30 percent this year from 38 percent in the last congressional midterms in 2002. This datum -- often characterized as disastrous -- has to be put in the context of a decline in the GOP share of the white vote, from 58 percent to 51 percent. Republicans were equal-opportunity losers this year, alienating everyone from new immigrants to descendants from the Mayflower.

For all of this, it seems that President Bush and House Majority Leader-elect Nancy Pelosi might still accept the "immigration enforcement lost" interpretation of election. They both do so at their political peril.

How 'bout them Cowboys?

I know better than to do this, but I just can't help myself. As a long-suffering Dallas Cowboys fan, the past month has been wondrous.

. And...when I say long-suffering, I truly mean long-suffering. I remember when Eddie LeBaron was the quarterback of America's Team even before America realized it had a team.

Then along came Dandy Don Meredith, then Craig Morton, and Roger Staubach.

I used to grab the Abilene Reporter-News every Monday and clip out the story about the Cowboys performance the day before. (This was way before anyone had even dreamed of Monday Night Football.) I would clip the stories together with a huge clothes pin I found somewhere and hang them on the wall above my bed.

Actually, I think the big clothes pin was meant to hang memos next to the telephone, but I requisitioned it anyway and my Mom was nice enough to let me keep it.

I would take the bundle of clippings down, read through them and relive the games...over and over. The day I left home for college that clothespin still hung there over my bed. The last and most recent clipping was about the Cowboys' 24-3 win over Miami in Superbowl VI. The game was



played on January 16, 1972 at Tulane Stadium in New Orleans. Roger Staubach threw for 12 of 19 and two touchdowns on the way to being named the game's MVP. I know all this, not because I remember watching the game, which I did, but because I read that same frayed newspaper clipping a couple of hundred times.

One of my childhood idols was Cowboys defensive tackle Bob Lilly. He had grown up in Throckmorton, just up the road from Anson, my hometown. Lilly was the Cowboys first-ever draft pick and played in an amazing 11 Pro Bowl games.

I met Bob Lilly when he came to Abilene on a promotional tour for a paint company. I don't remember the name of the paint but I do recall standing in line for a couple of hours in Gibson's discount store (on a pair of crutches no less) just for a moment with the legend.

He spotted me as I neared the

head of the line and motioned for me to make my way to the front where he pointed to the A on my letter jacket and asked, "You play for Albany?"

"No, Anson." I replied

"Oh, the Tigers," he said as he autographed a photo. Then he nodded at my gimpy leg and asked, "Get that last Friday night?"

"Yes sir." I said.


"I'll bet they carried the other fella off the field," he said as he handed me the photo and a little plastic football he had signed. "You heal up now and get back out there."

I didn't need the crutches the rest of the day. I was floating.

I don't know if this year's incarnation of the Cowboys have what it takes to make it to the Superbowl, but they are certainly playing better. And...for the first time in a long time I think they've found a quarterback worthy of the uniform.

Tony Romo is quick to dismiss comparisons to Cowboy greats like Meredith, Staubach and Aikman. But he's got a lot of people, including me, rooting for him.

Besides, it's time for another Cowboy legend. You know, the kind who make the kids from small Texas towns want to stand in line for hours just to be in their presence.



It's Amazing What One Person Can Do

JG Baker of Friona has a lot to show for his time on earth.

"I've always wanted to see what was around the next corner," he says. "By the time I was seventeen I had been to 28 states riding freight trains.

He left home in 1931 when he was sixteen.

"There'd be sometimes as many as three hundred bums on freight trains back then."

He learned an important lesson about getting on a moving train.

"Never try to catch a train you can't outrun."

He says during depression years nearly everybody was out of work.

"I've worked for as little as a nickel an hour and done a lot of it. Money was scarce. Fifty cents a day was a good wage for several years. First fourteen months me and my wife was married we spent a total of 74 dollars for gas and oil and groceries. Now you spend that every other day."

He started a custom grain harvesting business that took him



all over the western states. As a hobby he made furniture.

"Run them old combines all summer and come home in winter and work in my woodwork shop."

JG's workmanship is of a high quality. He makes church furniture and gives it away.

"I give it to churches that had some sort of disaster. I try to give away a set every year and I've done that several years. A set has a pulpit, communion table, two chairs, two lecterns, and two flower stands."

He has made 1,250 clocks and given most of them away. He gave me one and it's in a prominent place in my office. His name is on every clock he makes.

He carves things. He made a

pocketknife with two blades from one piece of wood. People ask him to make things, like a pool cue or oversize dominoes for a man with limited sight. He has made dozens of pet caskets. He made 175 meat blocks, 54 during one winter season.

Mr. Baker has a store in downtown Friona filled with furniture he has made. His workshop is the size of a hangar. Of course he built it by himself. Mr. Baker plays the didgeridoo, raises geese, collects Indian baskets and has a large garden filled with rhubarb, asparagus, okra, tomatoes and peppers.

JG Baker is 90 years old. He has made some of the tools and equipment he uses. His daughter bought an old hotel and turned it into a residence. Mr. Baker helped with the renovation and made a lot of the furniture in it. When I asked him for an interview I told him I had about 30 minutes to spend with him. I left about three hours later. It was time well spent.

State school board hikes high school graduation requirements

AUSTIN — The requirements for high school students entering two upgraded graduation programs next fall just got a little bit harder.

The State Board of Education

increased the number of math and science credits and the total number of course credits students must earn under the recommended high school program and the



distinguished achievement program. Students now will need 26 credits, up from the current 24.

The new stricter requirements were spelled out in HB 1 but neither the legislation nor the new board rule affect the minimum graduation program, which requires 22 credits. Under that plan, students must earn at least three credits in math and two in science.

Appraisal group wraps up

The Texas Appraisal Tax Reform Commission held its final public hearing Nov. 21 in Austin to address "sky rocketing" appraisal values and concerns with the current appraisal tax system, chairman Tom Pauken said.

Pauken said the commission's goal is a system that provides oversight with responsibility while lowering the dependency on property tax.

Representatives from builder groups, Realtors and other businesses, as well as taxpayers, spoke at the final hearing.

Bill Hammond of the Texas Association of Business said the business community was providing its fair share of taxes, and opposed gross receipt taxes.

Bill Allaway with Texas Taxpayers and Research Association voiced the need to focus on market value for property tax, truthfulness in taxation, a percentage-based system and a long-term study.

The commission, appointed by Gov. Rick Perry, hopes to make a recommendation to the Legislature by the end of the year.

State to privatize IT services

The Department of Information Resources signed a nearly \$1 billion contract with IBM Corp. to take over the information technology departments in at least 27 state agencies.

The Texas State Employees Union earlier had asked lawmakers to delay the contract after expressing concerns over two other IT contracts at the Health and Human Services Commission.

The consolidation is part of HB 1516, which calls for a massive restructuring of the state's information technology system.

IBM already holds a state contract awarded last March to design, develop, operate and manage the state e-mail

Lawmakers seek coal plant delay

A bipartisan group of lawmakers is asking state officials to halt the fast-track approval of seven of 18 proposed coal-fired power plants across the state.

The group wants more research done on the plants' impact on local communities and air quality.

The letter was circulated by Rep. Donna Howard, D-Austin, and signed by 25 other legislators.
