On this day in 1607 pilgrims from England landed at Ply mouth Rock and founded the Jamestown colony. In 1874 Harvard played McGill in the first college football game where admission was charged to spectators. In 1878 the trademarked name Vaseline, a brand of petroleum jelly, was registered. In 1904 the Olympic Games were opened in St. Louis, Missouri...it was the first time the games were held in the United States.

News of yesteryear

The March 3, 1939 edition of the Success reported:

A fire department is expected to be organized in the city of Eldorado in the near future, it was pointed out by Mayor A.T. Wright in an interview early this week. The city is now contemplating the purchase of fire fighting equipment, and by the time the new system has been set in operation, the city should have a volunteer department training in preparation to combating any fire that might threaten property and lives of citizens.

The August 16, 1940 edition

of the Success reported: Work is expected to begin soon on a fountain on the courthouse lawn opposite the Bev McCormick monument according to members of the Mias Amigas Club who are in charge of its erection. The fountain is to be constructed of native stone and topped with the school bell that was used in early days.

AUSTIN—Over the past decade, the Texas Legislature and state courts have gone around and around to make the financing of public education as fair as possible, but a number of poorer school districts want a better deal.

Last week, a group called "Plaintiff Intervenors Committee" filed a petition in state district court to readdress the issue of public school finance. The committee released a statement alleging "persistent and progressive erosion of the equity and efficiency standards" set forth in a 1995 Texas Supreme Court ruling on school
