County revisits idea of building concession stand at rodeo arena

Insurance supplement okayed for older employees

Schleicher County Commissioners met Monday, June 25th, and spent much of their time discussing a familiar topic, the need for a new concession stand and rest rooms at the county rodeo arena. The need for all public buildings to be designed by an architect or engineer continued to frustrate the men.

County Judge Johnny Griffin explained that a pre-engineered 40 ft. x 80 ft. metal building could be purchased. That way the plans for the building would carry an engineer's stamp, which would satisfy state regulation. The only other requirement would be for the county to call for bids on the labor to erect the building.

Talk then turned to ways to pay for the project. One option, borrowing the money through the issue of bonds. During that part of the discussion, the men considered borrowing enough to also pay for paving around the Civic Center and Cemetery Chapel.

The discussion ended with Judge Griffin advising the court that he had asked County Agent Cory Stevens to find out how much the steel for a pre-engineered building would cost at West Texas Steel in San Angelo. Other than that, there was no further discussion and no action on the matter.

The meeting was called to order by Judge Griffin with Commissioners Johnny Mayo, Lynn Griffin, Kirk Griffin and Matt Brown in attendance.

In other business, the commissioners

voted to pay an increased fee for water purchased at a Christoval water station for use by the county road department.

The court then met with insurance broker Bobby Zesch concerning Medicare supplement insurance for county employees over 65 years of age. It was noted the plan would be made available at no cost to the county. Individual employees would be required to purchase the supplemental plan if they wanted it. Ultimately, the commissioner voted to approve the Medicare Silver High Plan with a prescription deductible from Aetna.

Before adjourning the Monday meeting, the commissioners approved one indigent request for the payment of an electric bill in the amount of \$166.55.

The commissioners returned for a brief meeting on Tuesday, June 26th, in order to receive bids for sale of surplus lawn items. The court received a total of 14 bids. All items except weed eaters were awarded. The various bids brought in \$1,505 to the county's coffers.

All members of the court were present for the Tuesday meeting except Kirk Griffin who was absent. Others in attendance included County Treasurer Karen Henderson and County Clerk Peggy Williams, who were present for both meetings.

The next meeting of the Schleicher County Commissioners Court is slated for 9:00 a.m. on Monday, July 9, 2007 in the meeting room on the first floor of the Schleicher County Courthouse.

Success among newspapers honored at TPA summer convention

The Eldorado Success received four awards Saturday as the Texas Press Association announced the winners of its yearly Better Newspaper Contest during the group's annual summer convention in San Antonio. The newspaper received 2nd place honors in Column Writing and Editorials, as well as 3rd place awards in Advertising and Sports Photos.

Competing for the first time in the Small Medium Weekly division, The Success garnered 250 points, enough to tie for 3rd place in the overall Sweepstakes category. The Hill Country Community Journal in Kerrville won the division, followed by The Clear Lake Citizen of Galveston County. The Success moved up from the Small Weekly division due to an increase in circulation.

Success owners Randy and Kathy Mankin were on hand for the convention. Randy Mankin serves on the TPA's board of directors. He was also conducted a training session at the convention for newspaper publishers and editors wanting to learn about electronic delivery of their newspapers. The Success was one of the first newspapers in the state to offer electronic, or "E-Delivery" subscriptions.

The Success' sister publication, The Big Lake Wildcat, also picked up a couple of awards at the convention with 4th place honors in Advertising and News Photography in the Small Weekly division.

Phil Major, publisher of The Clay County Leader in Henrietta was elected to serve as TPA president for the coming year. He succeeds Marshall Day, publisher of The Gatesville Messenger, who took over as chairman of the TPA board of directors.

Civil rights lawsuits filed against two Colorado City, AZ firms

The Arizona Attorney General's Office has filed civil rights lawsuits against the Vermillion Candy Shoppe ("Vermillion") and Big Dan's Drive Thru and their owners and operators. Both businesses are located in Colorado City, Arizona.

The lawsuits are the result of two investigations completed by the office's Civil Rights Division, which concluded there is reasonable cause to believe the businesses refused to serve Isaac Wyler, Andrew Chatwin and other former members of the Fundamentalist Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints (FLDS) because of religion in violation of the Arizona Civil Rights Act.

According to the state's complaint, in July 2006, Daniel Porter Steed, owner of Big Dan's Drive Thru, refused service to Wyler, Chatwin and Chatwin's wife and asked them to leave the restaurant. Wyler was one of more than 20 men ex-communicated from the FLDS by Warren Jeffs in January 2004.


In the second lawsuit, the Attorney General's Office alleges that in April 2006, staff at the Vermillion Candy Shoppe told Chatwin, Wyler and other former FLDS members that no more food was available and asked them to leave the restaurant. This happened after members

Seeking Immigration Reform That Works

Americans are increasingly frustrated with their federal government, and with good reason. Washington has repeatedly demonstrated an inability to fulfill its most basic responsibilities, such as enforcing our laws.

Now late June, Congress is once again attempt-

is once again attempting to overhaul our battered immigration system. Repair is long overdue. But because of past performance, critics justifiably are asking: Will any new system be enforceable and restore respect for our laws? Or will it be unenforceable and lead to even more illegality in the future?

This is not a minor matter. America has been history's most successful democracy precisely because it is a nation of laws. But we now have a situation in which

some laws are routinely ignored. If we approve yet another law that promises reform, yet again fails to deliver on its promises, our precious heritage will be in serious jeopardy.

Recent experience is not reassuring. In 1986, we approved an amnesty for an estimated 3 million people here illegally, but promised that we would enforce the law in the future. That promise was never honored. Unsurprisingly, we now have at least 12 million here illegally. Millions more are waiting to see how we handle it this time.

Even after 9/11, our record of border enforcement has been sadly lacking. For example, in 2004, demanding better control of our border, Congress approved a Western Hemisphere Travel Initiative that required a U.S. passport starting this spring for anyone visiting Canada, the Caribbean, Bermuda, Mexico and other parts of Latin America.

The State and Homeland Security departments had three full years to prepare for an easily foreseeable flood of new passport applications. However, planning and staffing for the new law was woefully inadequate, leading to chaos and confusion. As a result, the new rules were suspended earlier this month.

This has left many people wondering: If the federal government cannot even handle routine passport applications for U.S. citizens, how can it possibly do thorough background checks and issue visas for millions of foreign-born applicants?

An oversight report last year declared that the U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) already is overworked and stretched to its breaking point. Under the immigration reform bill being debated, that USCIS work-load would be tripled—without any significant increase in resources.

For example, the proposed immigration reform bill gives the USCIS all of 24 hours to review every application for a probationary "Z" visa. If 12 million apply as expected, that means USCIS would have to process an average of 48,000 applications every day.

But the USCIS is being set up for failure. It has only 3,000 staffers to process and review applications, including background checks. The current legislation would add only 100 new adjudicators each year for five years. Law enforcement personnel assure me that there is no way a reliable background check could be conducted within 24 hours

Liberty, it's not for the faint of heart

...We hold these truths to be selfevident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty, and the pursuit of Happiness. That whenever any Form of Government becomes destructive of these ends, it is the Right of the People to alter or to abolish it, and to institute new Government, laying its foundation on such principles and organizing its powers in such form, as to them shall seem most likely to effect their Safety and Happiness...

They were criminals...at least, in the eyes of King George.

The British monarch had little regard for the men who gathered on July 2, 1776 in the Pennsylvania Assembly Building in Philadelphia. Traitors, he called them and ordered their imprisonment and immediate execution.

But, the men didn't behave much like criminals. Instead of hiding their treason from public view, they went to great lengths to publicize it.

They weren't ordinary men, these signers of the Declaration of Independence, far from it. They were Patriots.

Today we revere them as our nation's Founding Fathers. There are statues and memorials dedicated to them, but little thought is given to the very real danger these men faced.

Had the Revolutionary War



failed, and it nearly did, they would have been hung. The British Army carried warrants for the arrest of the fifty-six men. Half were to be executed on American soil, at least one in each of the thirteen colonies. (All the Pennsylvania delegation were to be hung on the grounds of the Assembly Hall where they signed the treasonous document.) The other half were to be taken to London so that their executions could be witnessed by representatives of Britain's other colonies.

King George wanted an example made of these upstarts who dared to challenge his sovereignty.

So, what did the men do? Once the Declaration of Independence was completed, they asked that it be printed for the world to read. They also directed that a formal copy be delivered to King George in London. There would be no turning back.

Today, in honor of Independence Day, I take this opportunity to again recognize the men who, without regard to personal fortune or safety, dared to stand for liberty. They were:

(New Hampshire) Josiah Bartlett, William Whipple, Matthew Thornton; (Massachusetts) John Hancock, Samuel Adams, John Adams, Robert Treat Paine,

Elbridge Gerry; (Rhode Island) Stephen Hopkins, William Ellery; (Connecticut) Roger Sherman, Samuel Huntington, William Williams, Oliver Wolcott; (New York) William Floyd, Philip Livingston, Francis Lewis, Lewis Morris; (New Jersey) Richard Stockton, John Witherspoon, Francis Hopkinson, John Hart, Abraham Clark; (Pennsylvania) Robert Morris, Benjamin Rush, Benjamin Franklin, John Morton, George Clymer, James Smith, George Taylor, James Wilson, George Ross; (Delaware) Caesar Rodney, George Read, Thomas McKean; (Maryland) Samuel Chase, William Paca, Thomas Stone, Charles Carroll; (Virginia) George Wythe, Richard Henry Lee, Thomas Jefferson, Benjamin Harrison, Thomas Nelson, Jr., Francis Lightfoot Lee, Carter Braxton; (North Carolina) William Hooper, Joseph Hewes, John Penn; (South Carolina) Edward Rutledge, Thomas Heyward, Jr., Thomas Lynch, Jr., Arthur Middleton; (Georgia) Button Gwinnett, Lyman Hall, and George Walton.

Oh, by the way, when the final vote was made on July 2, 1776, none of the men voted against the declaration...neither did any of them abstain. The men, who identified themselves as the Continental Congress, waited until the Declaration of Independence was printed to formally sign it. That happened on July 4th, which became a national holiday.

And, the red brick building where it was signed...it's now known as Independence Hall. An even more remarkable document, the U.S. Constitution was signed there a few years later.

Lawmakers ask State A.G. about speaker's powers

AUSTIN — The 80th Texas Legislature was a contentious five-month gathering that may have seemed to end quietly on May 28.

Speaker Tom Craddick, R-Midland, had come out on top of a parliamentary battle to stay in office. Then, House members used the closing hours of the session to pass hundreds of pieces of legislation, instead of pressing issues with Craddick to the bitter end.

But the battle over the speaker's authority and the way challenges were rebuffed raised questions.

The speaker refused to recognize members seeking to make a motion

calling for a vote to remove him from office, or in House parlance, "vacate the chair."

Reps. Jim Keffer, R-Eastland, and Byron Cook, R-Corsicana, in an at-

cana, in an attempt to resolve questions about the legal and constitutional scope of the authority of the speaker, asked Attorney General Greg Abbott to render an opinion.

Those who are interested in the details of the request can find RQ 0589-GA on the attorney general's Web site.

Alexis DeLee, Craddick's press secretary, said the speaker welcomes Abbott's opinion.

The state constitution requires the attorney general to issue a written opinion on a question affecting the public interest. The attorney general is required to issue the opinion not later than the 180th day after the date that it is received, unless before that deadline the attorney general notifies the requesting person in writing that the opinion will be delayed or not rendered and states the reasons for the delay or refusal.

At the beginning of the legislative session, Craddick appointed Keffer chairman of the powerful House Ways and Means Committee and Cook chairman of the Civil Practices Committee.

Keffer and other House members have let it be known that they want to serve as speaker of the House in the 2009 legislative session, but Craddick has said he intends to seek re-election.

Personnel changes are coming

Education Commissioner Shirley Neeley announced on June 20 her resignation, effective July 1.

Perry appointed Neeley in January 2004. As commissioner, she served as the head of the Texas Education Agency, overseeing 1,037 school districts and a number of charter schools.

Secretary of State Roger Williams resigned earlier. He will be succeeded in office July 1 by Gov. Perry 's former chief of staff Phil Wilson.

The governor's current chief of staff Dierdre Delisi resigned. Perry appointed Brian Newby to replace her on July 1. Newby currently serves as the governor's general counsel.


Perry also announced the appointments of senior adviser Kathy Walt and deputy legislative director Kris Heckmann as deputy chiefs of staff, effective July 1.

And, Perry announced Donna White, a member of his senior staff for more than six years, will move to a position at the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality. White earlier served in the office of then-Lt. Gov. Rick Perry and in the office of the late Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock.

Audubon counts. Over a 40-year period from 1967 to 2006, Bald Eagle sightings have gone up ninefold and increased an average of six percent per year every year. The top five states with the most dramatic increases were Ohio, Pennsylvania, West Virginia, Vermont and Michigan, which all had at least a 13-fold increase over 40 years.

"Audubon's bird count data confirms that the Bald Eagle has recovered across America," says Greg Butcher, Audubon's Director of Bird Conservation. AUSTIN -- Funding for Round V of the Texas Historical Commission's (THC) Texas Historic Courthouse Preservation Program is included in the appropriations bill passed in the recent legislative session. The 80th Texas Legislature included \$62 million in bond funding for the Texas Historical Commission's nationally recognized Texas Historic Courthouse Preservation Program. Funding will be made available after a November bond election subject to approval by voters.

The much anticipated Round V funding will permit additional Texas counties to participate in the highly successful program that restores the grandeur and architectural integrity of these historic landmarks, while also upgrading their operational systems to meet modern requirements, making them both beautiful and runctional.

Since its inception in 1999, the program has assisted in the full restoration of 35 county courthouses with an additional 29 projects under construction or having finished a phase of work toward complete restoration. Established as a unique partnership, the state has contributed \$145 million and county governments have matched more than \$62 million to restore these Texas icons.
