Mighty Eagle Band earns another Sweepstakes Award

Pride of the Divide wins in Concert and Sight Reading

The Mighty Eagle Band traveled to Llano on Tuesday, April 10th for the U.I.L. Concert and Sight Reading Contest and returned home that evening with the coveted Sweepstakes Award after garnering Division 1 ratings in both events. The scores, combined with the Division 1 the band received last Fall in the Marching Contest, were enough to secure the Sweepstakes trophy.

Bands perform three prepared selections in the concert contest for a panel of three judges. The band then moves to a different location where it performs a song the band members have never before seen, this time for a completely different panel of judges. Each panel then awards a rating of one to five with one being the highest.

All judges awarded the Mighty Eagle Band a first division, the very top rating. In the world of high school band competition this is called "Straight Ones!" Eldorado was the only 1A school to receive such high marks. Wall and Brady earned the honor in 2A and Brownwood in 4A.

The EHS concert program consisted of: "Highlander Regiment" by James Ployhar, "Pinnacle" by Rob Grice, and "Shalom Chaverim" by Timothy Johnson.

"I just thought the kids did a good

job from beginning to end," EHS band director Jerry Barker commented after the contest. "They performed well under pressure with a great deal of professionalism."

Barker noted that the band faced extra pressure when it was discovered that the band from Gorman had forgotten to bring its music. The judges allowed Gorman to shuffle to the end of the competition, moving Eldorado up in the rotation.

"That put us behind Eden," Mr. Barker said. "They got a one. That meant we had to get a one behind a band that had already performed well, and that's always tough."

SCISD trustees hold monthly meeting

The Schleicher County I.S.D. board of trustees met Monday, April 16, 2007 with Kurtis Homer presiding in the absence of board president Jo Helen Kotsch. Other board members on hand that night were Jan Wanoreck, Berta Nicholson, Leanne Higgins, Lupe Sanchez and Robert Jay.

Finance director Ray Ballew briefly reviewed the district's financial reports and commented that the future financial health of the district was looking good, especially with changes the legislature recently made with the new school finance bill.

The board approved the financial reports, then voted to accept a donation of \$1,250 from Creek Swabbing and Roustabout Service for the Middle School Cheerleaders. Middle School principal Kara Garlitz explained that the money would be used

for supplies, accessories and meals.

The trustees then voted and set the date for swearing-in board members on May 21, 2007. At that time the board will elect officers and reorganize for the next year.

Among other business, the trustees voted to approve repair of the elementary school roof. The work will include a 15-year materials warranty. Superintendent Billy Collins explained that the seam running at the top of clay tile roof will be repaired in the process.

The board went into executive session at 6:20 p.m. to discuss non-certified administrator contracts and to consider the purchase of real property. The trustees returned to open session

Lady Eagles capture District 2-1A softball crown

The Eldorado Lady Eagles softball team swept aside a late season challenge from the Winters Lady Blizzards last Friday night to capture the District 2-1A championship in an 11-5 win on the Lady Blizzards' home field.

The old football adage "offense wins games but defense wins championships" could be equally applied to the Lady Eagles softball team this season. Outstanding performances at the plate were backed up by a rock solid defense.

Friday's effort seemed to mirror the way the Lady Eagles played throughout the season. Haley Higgins led the way at the plate, getting two triples and a double in five appearances as she drove home five runs.

Bridgett Mitchell was on the mound for Eldorado and was nearly unhittable as she fanned six and walked one. Short stop Cassandra Buitron turned in a stellar defensive game of her own as she vacuumed up everything that came near her and effectively denied the left side of the infield to Winters' frustrated batters.

"I'm proud of this team and all they have been able to accomplish," Coach Brian Daniels said. "Softball started here in '98 and the team won the district title in '99 and 2000 in a two-team district.

It's been a dry spell of seven years since the program claimed the district title."

By winning the outright district title, the Lady Eagles earned a bye in the Bi-District round of the State 1A playoffs. Coach Daniels explained that he has scheduled a warm-up game with Tahoka, a class 2A school, for 2 p.m. at Muggs Field in Midland. The Lady Eagles will then face the winner of the Trent/Seagraves game. The time and place of the Area Round game will be announced next week, however, Coach Daniels explains that it is likely to be played on our around May 4th.

The Lady Eagles are 13-4 on the season and finished district play at 8-2. They were led offensively this year by Haley Higgins and Cassandra Buitron, who hit for .594 and .567 averages, respectively. Meanwhile, ace pitcher Bridgett Mitchell notched up a 12-4 record on the year, dominating opposing lineups and retiring numerous scoring threats before they ever reached base.

Coach Daniels credited the district title to his players and praised his assistant coach, Keith Fulgham. He also extended his appreciation to the Lady Eagles fans. "The fans were great this year," Daniels said. "The were really great."



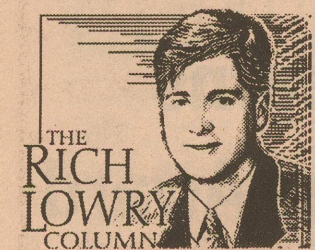

Misunderstanding and Iran

Iran wants to quit the international community, but the international community won't let it. No act of warfare against the civilized world, no defiance of the United Nations, no violation of international norms, no brazen lie is ever enough to mark Iran as unworthy of outreach, dialogue and the art of sweet persuasion. When the Iranians seized 15

British sailors in a blatant hostage-taking, the commander of the British ship purred that it might be a "simple misunderstanding."

If so, Iran is cursed with terrible luck. Another such misunderstanding lasted 444 days back in 1979-81. In the latest incident, the accident-prone Iranians have had the misfortune of showing the captured British sailors on television and of telling provable lies about where they seized them.

Showing the captives and coercing a confession out of one of them (a woman the Iranians have thoughtfully outfitted in a head-covering to protect her virtue) are violations of the laws of war, not to mention holding them in the first place. Where are the human-rights groups expressing their outrage? The liberal filmmakers readying their scathing documentaries? The European opinion-makers condescendingly tut-tutting? Nowhere to be found, because they never want to give up their pilgrimage to the shrine of Our Lady of Perpetual Engagement.

If talking with the Iranians doesn't work, it is because we aren't talking to them enough, or the wrong people (i.e., not the U.S.) are talking to them, or when we're talking to them, we aren't saying the right things, or we haven't talked to them long enough, or maybe they don't realize just how very sincere we are in our talking. But, surely, sometime soon, if we just keep talking and offering to talk, all these "misunderstandings" will fade away.

The old saw about a liberal being someone who won't take his own side in a fight applies here. When the Bush administration presented evidence that the Iranians have provided material used to kill American troops in Iraq with roadside bombs, Democrats exploded in outrage -- at the Bush administration, for not being convincing enough, for having delayed the release of the intelligence, for being overly belligerent toward Iran, which just wants to talk to us.

To the contrary, Iran wants to destabilize Iraq so we will leave and Shia radicals will inherit the country. It wants to acquire a nuclear weapon to become the hegemonic power in the Middle East. And it wants to humiliate the United States and its allies at every opportunity. It can't merely be talked out of any of these goals. To the extent we try, we are ensuring the abject failure of diplomacy, which can succeed only after we demonstrate that we aren't to be trifled with.

The United Nations twice has passed resolutions sanctioning Iran for its illicit nuclear program. The first resolution banned nuclear-related exports to Iran but stopped short of banning travel by key officials. The second blocked Iranian arms exports and froze the assets of some officials and entities. Iran, understandably, is unbowed.

If we think the current course will ever fundamentally change Iranian behavior, the misunderstanding is all ours.

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Ashes to Ashes

Rolling Stone Keith Richards recently broke an old taboo by announcing in public that he had snorted his father's ashes.

Richards had been asked what was the strangest thing he had ever snorted, and he replied — perhaps to the interviewer's surprise — that he had snorted his dear old dad, who, conveniently enough, had been cremated.

"I couldn't resist grinding him up with a little bit of blow," was how Richards described this stage of his grieving process.

Many experts list five stages of grief, but the desire to snort the ashes of the deceased is becoming recognized as a separate — and meaningful — sixth stage.

(Richards' agent and later Richards himself tried to pass off his description of the funeral rites he held for his father as a joke, but I'm inclined to accept it as authentic.)

While Richards' expression of grief remains relatively uncommon, as cremation becomes more popular — making ashes more readily available for snorting — this custom is sure to become more accepted and even fashionable, especially now that it has received the seal of approval from an A-list celebrity. But that doesn't mean it's right for everybody or for every family.

The first consideration is, how

would the deceased himself feel about being snorted?

Richards, for example, was quite sure where his father stood.

"My dad wouldn't have cared — he didn't give a [Rolling Stone-esque expletive deleted]. It went down pretty well."

In many cases, however, the recently departed have expressed no opinion on the subject.

Many people help plan their funeral — often including location, type of casket, music, etc. — but relatively few specify their preference about being snorted.

While it may seem hip now, experts say, it's a mistake to assume that everyone would want to have his memory celebrated in this manner.

Hopefully, Richards' recent announcement will encourage people to be more open about discussing the issue.

Here are some commonsense "dos and don'ts":

- Do make the ashes available for all those who would like to acknowledge their grief by snorting the remains of the dearly departed. A funeral is not the time to settle old scores. It is acceptable, however, for families not comfortable with this approach to announce,

"Private snorting services will be conducted following the funeral."

- Do provide plenty of tissues and moistened towelettes so that people can give themselves a good wiping down afterward.

- Don't feel you have to have a "snort service" because it's become trendy or because "everybody's doing it."

- Don't mix ashes with any another other substance that might cause people to sneeze. Sneezing at such a moment is common enough as it is, and experts say it detracts from the solemnity of the occasion.

- Don't make people feel their grief is any less genuine if they choose not to snort.

- Don't have the entire service revolved around the "snorting of the ashes." Most experts recommend a smaller gathering where the snorting can be conducted with the proper respect and dignity.

And if you remain unsure about how to proceed, ask yourself what Keith Richards would have done.

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Senate passes version of 2008-2009 state budget

AUSTIN — Both houses of the 80th Texas Legislature have fulfilled their main constitutional duty: to produce a budget for the 2008-2009 biennium.

The Texas House passed House Bill 1 by Reps. Warren Chisum, R-Pampa, and Ryan Guillen, D-San Diego, its \$151 billion state budget, on March 30. The Senate completed its \$153 billion version, SB 1 authored by Steve Ogden, R-College Station, on April 12.

When adjusted for inflation, these budgets — the largest in state history — represent about an 8 percent increase over the state's 2006-2007 budget.

Under the Senate version, the Children's Health Insurance Program would get an 80 percent increase, moving total funding for the program to \$1.8 billion for the biennium.

Ogden said this amount plus additional appropriations for state Medicaid will ensure that every eligible child in Texas will receive health coverage.

Now the two versions go to a conference committee of five senators and five House members who must reconcile the differences. Once reconciled, HB 1 and SB 1 return to their respective chambers for final passage. The deadline is May 28, the last day of the session.

House passes utility legislation

The House on April 13 passed legislation supporters say will increase competition and lower electric rates.

But opponents say the bill doesn't fix ongoing problems or necessarily help consumers in the long run.

Rep. Phil King, R-Weatherford, serves as chair of House Regulated Industries, the committee that molded the legislation. King said SB 482 will give power companies the incentive to reduce rates and will switch to a lower-cost rate plan for those customers who are paying the highest rates in the state.

King also said that during hot summer months the bill would prevent power companies from cutting off electricity to customers who have not paid their utility bill.

Opponents, however, pointed to high electricity rates related to spikes in natural gas prices after hurricanes Katrina and Rita and alleged market abuses by TXU.

Opponents also said the proposed acquisition of TXU by Kohlberg Kravis Roberts and Texas Pacific Group could be a way to remedy these past concerns, but the legislation might put the transaction at risk and leave Texas "stuck" with TXU.

Now the legislation returns to the Senate where members must vote on whether to concur with the 27 floor amendments House members made to the bill. Any differences would have to be worked out in a conference committee.

Marital course bill passes House

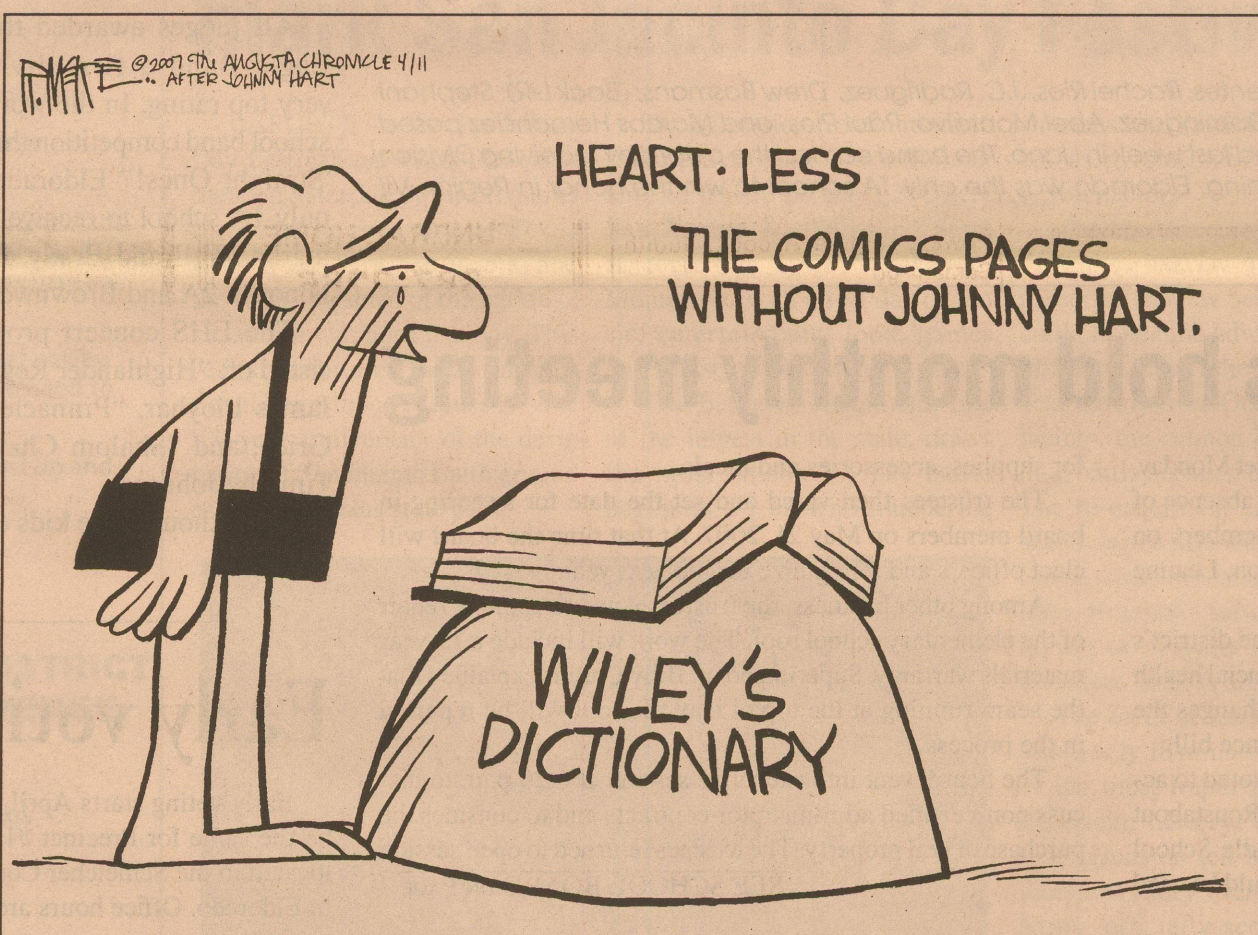
The House passed legislation authored by Rep. Chisum to nudge couples toward taking a course on marriage before they officially tie the knot. If a couple passes the 8-hour course, the marriage license would cost them nothing.

But Chisum's House Bill 2685 gives couples an option: take the course or just pay \$60 for a marriage license. Presently, the cost is \$30.

The bill authorizes marriage educators, clergy or their designees, licensed mental health professionals, faith-based organizations, and community-based organizations to provide courses.

If the Senate approves the bill, it will become law Sept. 1.

Blue Bell Ice Cream is 100 Years Old

The Brenham Creamery Company opened on August 3, 1907 as a butter manufacturing company. The company bought cream and milk from area farmers to make butter. Nineteen stockholders put up \$2200 to start the business. In 1911 it started making ice cream at the rate of two gallons a day. By 1919, the company was floundering and some thought was given to closing the company. A new manager, EF Kruse, was hired at a salary of \$60 a month. He was 23 years old, just back from World War One and had the opportunity to get a job as superintendent of schools in a nearby community. But he accepted the offer from Blue Bell. He didn't cash any of the checks from Blue Bell for six months because he didn't want the company to go into the red. In 1930 he changed the name of the company to Blue Bell Creameries, named for a flower that blooms in July.

Blue Bell's growth has been slow and steady. Its ice cream entered the Houston market in 1959, the Austin market in 1965 and the Dallas market in 1978. Waco felt slighted and put up a

billboard with the words "YOU CAN'T GET BLUEBELL ICE CREAM IN WACO." Soon Blue Bell entered Waco. When the distribution center for West Texas opened in Big Spring, Blue Bell had its biggest sales week in the company's history up to that time. Blue Bell is now in 16 states, from Arizona to North Carolina and is the 3rd largest ice cream company in the country. 2800 people work at Blue Bell, 800 of them in Brenham. The employees own 40% of the company.

EF Kruse managed the company until he passed away in 1951. At that time his son Ed Kruse took over as manager. Ed's brother Howard followed him and now Ed's son Paul is president and CEO of Blue Bell. The Kruse family has run the company for 88 years.

Milk for Blue Bell ice cream

comes from a 200-mile radius of Brenham. The company uses milk from 50,000 cows daily. "The milk we use today was grass yesterday," says Howard Kruse. "It's fresh." Blue Bell uses 500 tons of pecans each year. Howard has been responsible for many of Blue Bell's flavors. He says it took two years to develop Homemade Vanilla, the company's bestseller. Cookies and Cream is number 2. To celebrate the company's centennial, a new flavor named Century Sundae was introduced. It is Homemade Vanilla with caramel and chocolate sauce, whipping cream and a cherry garnish.

A big moving van carrying displays and the history of the company is traveling to areas where Blue Bell is sold. Big events are planned at the Brenham plant leading up to the August 3rd anniversary. That plant, by the way, gets more than 100,000 visitors a year.

Howard Kruse says ice cream is the fun food in America. "It's the happiest food in the world. You eat it when you're feeling good, walking down the street, at a party, in your backyard. It's just fun."

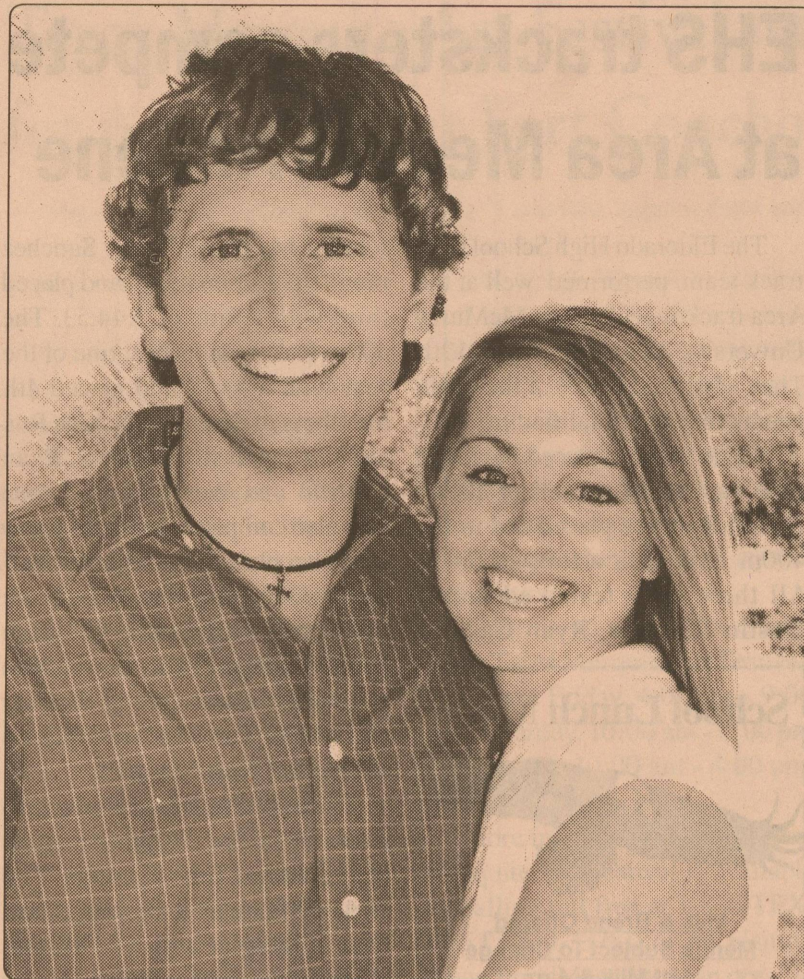

A wedding date of May 27 is planned at the Oasis on Lake Medina.

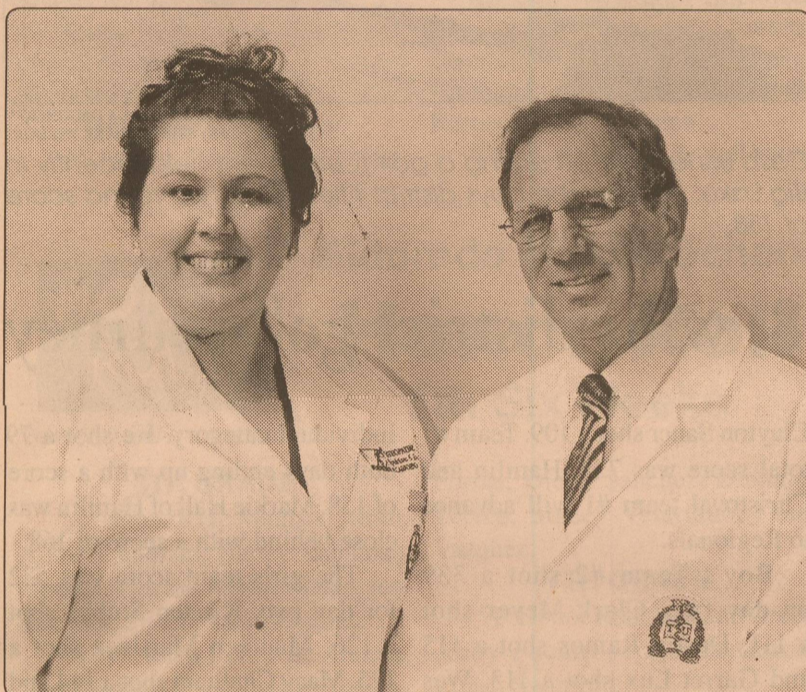

Janek bill requires steroid test

More than 700,000 students who participate in athletics at Texas public schools would be subject to random steroid testing under legislation approved by the Texas Senate on April 10.

SB 8 by Sen. Kyle Janek, R-Houston, if also approved by the House, would go into effect Sept. 1.

Texas primary date shift in works

HB 2017 by Rep. Helen Giddings, D-Dallas, also would shift the candidate filing period two months earlier, from December to October.

The governor's homeland security office is tasked with gathering information on a wide range of activities in Texas. The database resides in Kentucky, the Texas Observer reported.

EHS tracksters compete at Area Meet in Abilene

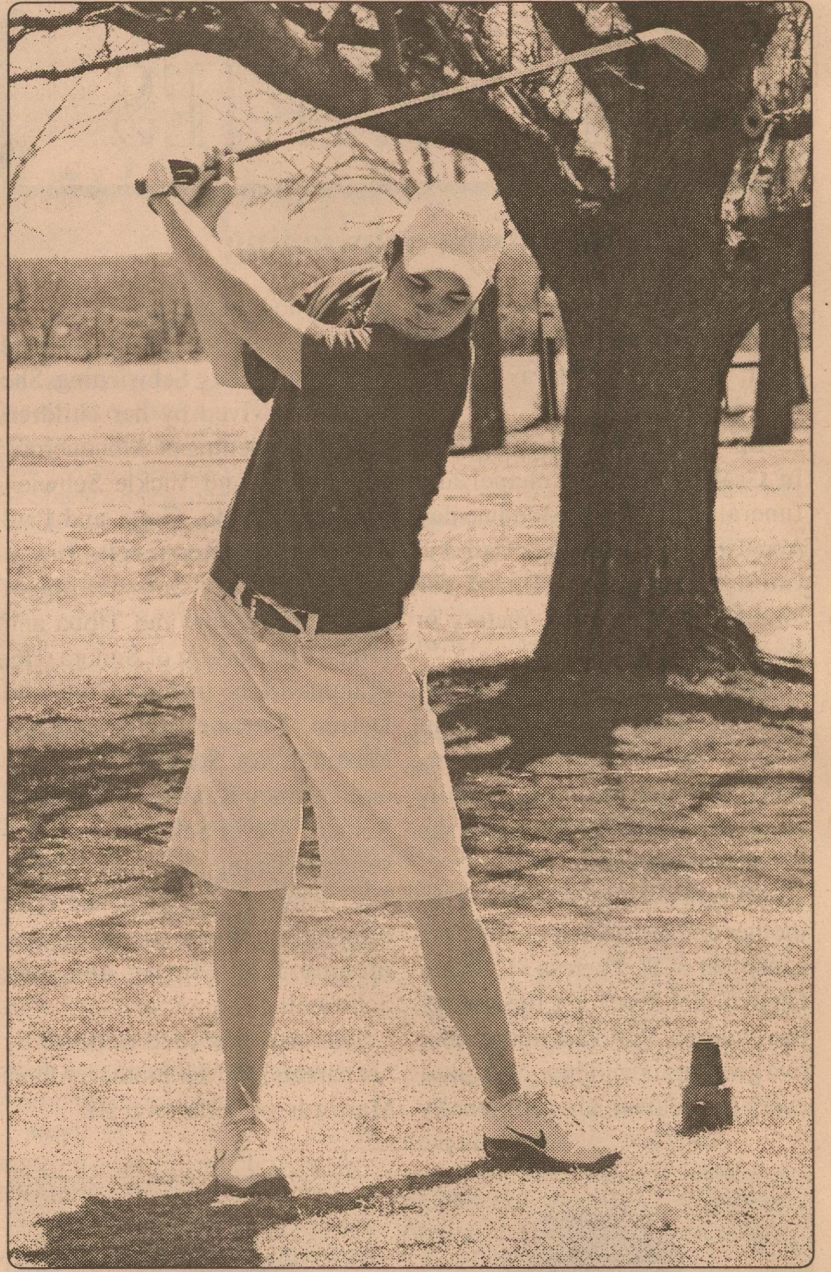
The Eldorado High School boys track team performed well at the Area track meet held at McMurry University Thursday, April 12th. They advanced in five of the seven events they had qualified in.

Kevin Dykstra placed 3rd in the pole vault with a vault of 10'0". Dustin Ramirez placed 3rd in the 400m dash with a time of 54.04. All three relay teams advanced. Dustin Ramirez, Ryan Castillo,

Johnny Mejia, and Ivan Sanchez ran in the 1600m relay, and placed third with a time of 3:44.53. The 400m Relay ran its best time of the year with a 44.77 and placed 4th. Members of that relay include Russell Cathey, Ivany Sanchez, Ryan Castillo and Wes Brown. Those four also comprise the 800m Relay who also placed 4th with a 1:36.5. 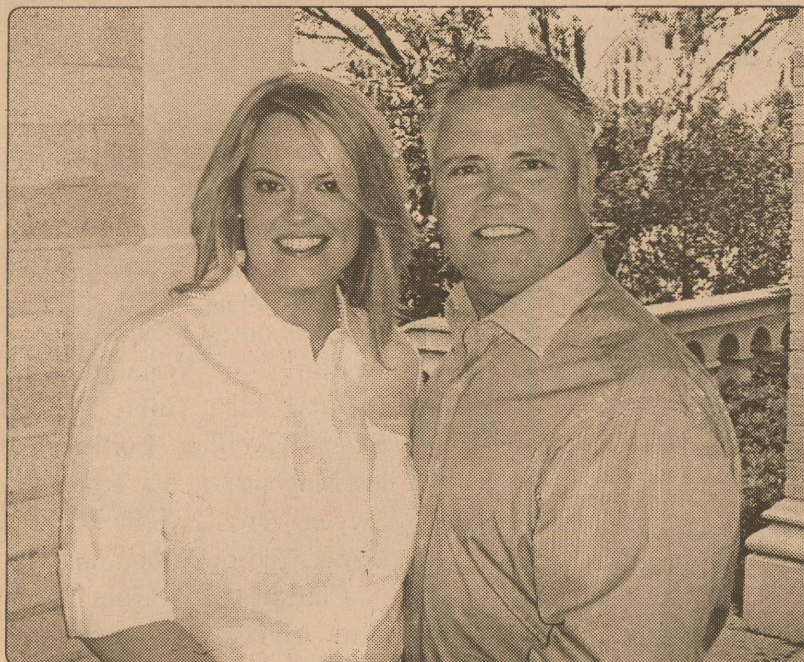
Mrs. Corinne Robinson's marble collection is a fascination to all who visit the Schleicher County Museum. Everyone is anxious to hear the story about the marbles and the collector. There are approximately 150,000 marbles in her collection.

Mrs. Robinson came to Eldorado as a young school teacher in 1919. Her name was Corinne Richmond. She was born and raised in Blanket, Tx., and attended college at Howard Payne. On May 12, 1923 she married a young Eldorado man named T.P. Robinson. She continued her teaching career in the Schleicher County School system for forty one years, an estimated 1,200 students. She was said to have taught three generations of some

local families.

Mrs. Robinson had always been a collector. She collected post cards, photo's of Texas courthouses and miniature pitchers. The idea of collecting marbles started when one of her students gave her some marbles, and she put them on her desk in a jar. After that, students would put marbles in the jar as a gift to her. She forever avowed that she never took marbles from the students, they gave them voluntarily.

Local long time residents, and friends tell of Mrs. Robinson being on the TV show, "I've Got a Secret." That would be a pretty good secret. I don't think the panel guessed it.

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Cervical Cancer Reduction

There is a vaccination available for young women age 9-26 which warrants further discussion and education. This vaccine is to further aid in prevention of cervical cancer which is a preventable cancer.

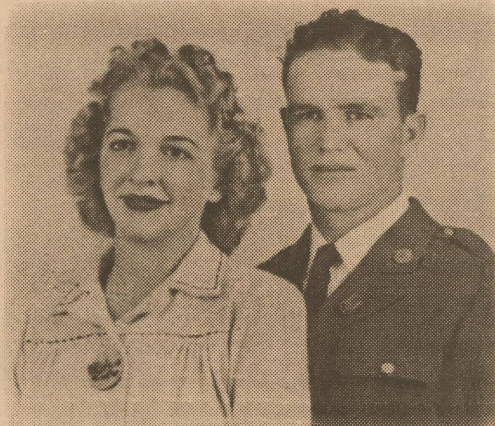
Human papillomavirus (HPV), is the most common sexually transmitted infection. Most people who are sexually active are infected with HPV at some point and a natural immune response usually clears within eight months after exposure. The development of cervical cancer is what can be reduced (a 70% reduction) by the use of the vaccine, Gardasil.

Symptoms of HPV infection are essentially non-existent and the virus is usually only discovered through routine PAP results. Treatment options range from minor to major surgeries. Also, research studies on boys and men have been completed and the data is being examined for use in this specific population.

Currently, there are several states looking at legislation to make this a mandatory immunization for girls ages 11-12 as this is the appropriate age related to the National estimation of sex initiation. More questions can be answered and/or vaccine administered through Schleicher County Family Clinic 853-3137.

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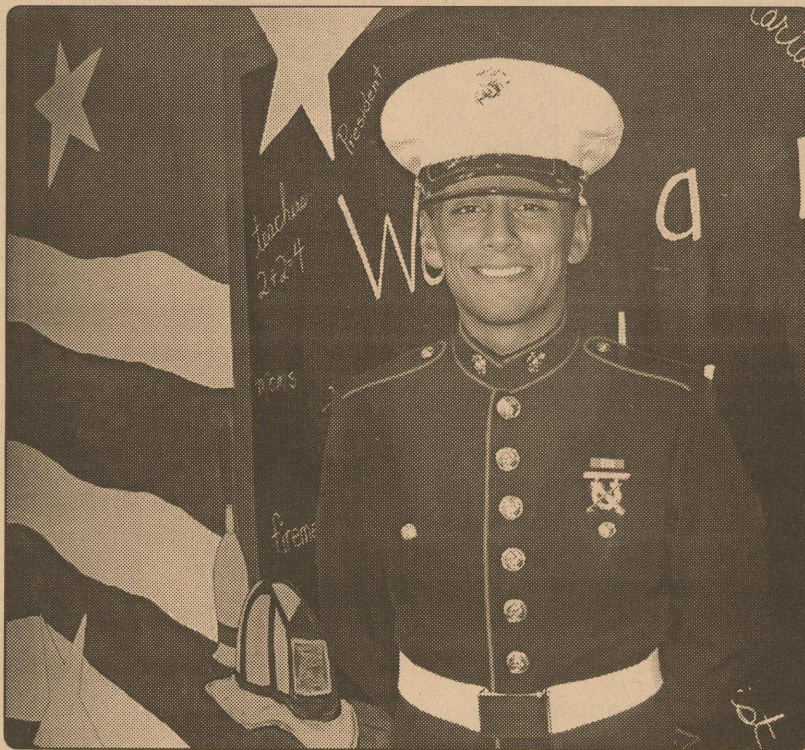

Texas Mesquite Art Festival set for April 20-22 at Fort Concho

Thousands of shoppers, hobbyists, and collectors will soon throng to the largest collection of mesquite art in the world at the 4th Annual Texas Mesquite Art Festival, set for historic Fort Concho in San Angelo on April 20, 21, and 22, 2007.

More than 40 juried artisans will offer home decor, fine art, furniture and more for show and sale during the free weekend event. Shoppers can buy everything from exquisite pen and pencil sets, tree ornaments, turned vases, and scroll saw filigree, to solid mesquite beds, chairs, tables, sculpture, and gun stocks, all crafted from the Texas native wood and sure to be treasured by generations to come.

"You will find something for every pocketbook and for all types of different expression in the common medium, which is mesquite," Ellison said. "We'll have items that sell for \$5 or that sell for tens of thousands of dollars, everything from a modest-priced ornament or cardholder to a bedroom suite and cabinetry."

Exhibitors are selected for their uniqueness, craftsmanship, and quality of work, according to show coordinator Roger Ellison.

"We are looking for something other than the mundane, something attractive and creative," Ellison said. "Our vendors are artisans - experts who make things that are useful, but also things of beauty."

Mesquite continues to grow in popularity with builders, architects and craftsmen, and is in greater demand than even 5 years ago. The wood, once ignored, is now highly sought for its beauty and durability in trim work, doors, railings, everything from flooring to balustrade.

"We find women looking for decorative items for the home, and the men enjoy the visual appeal," Ellison said. "Kids like to watch the work and feel the wood. Everyone comes because they know they can find something unique, something special."

Throughout the weekend, demonstrators will be working on a scroll saw, sawmill, and lathe, turning out small projects and explaining the process. Exhibitors also like to answer questions, show tools, and share techniques and tips at their booths.

"People who come to the Mesquite Art Festival are going to be astonished by the variety, the beauty, and the mystique of mes-

quite. I see that happen time and time again."

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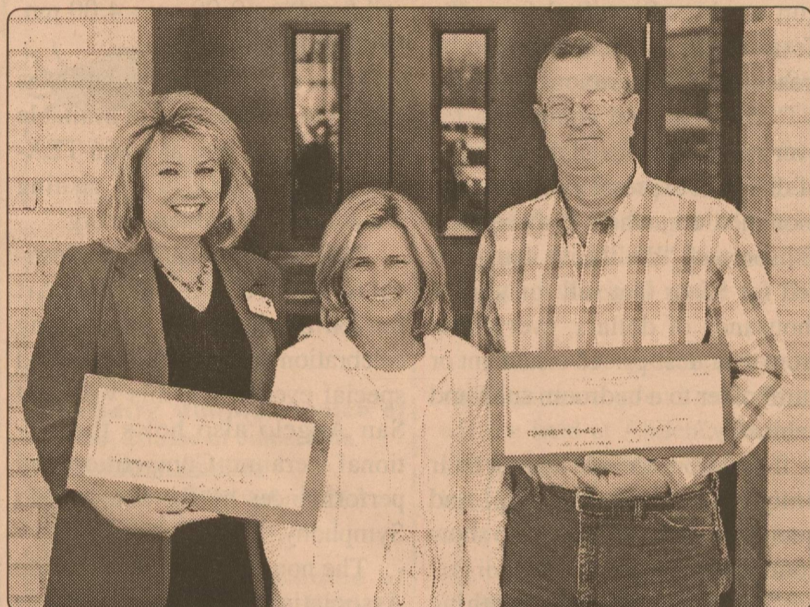

Historical Commission hosts grant writing workshops in June

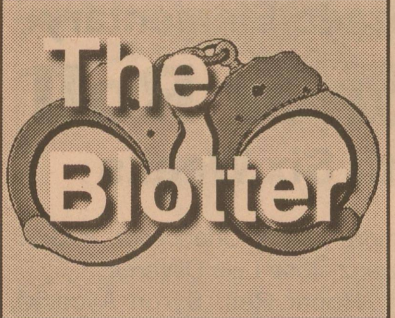

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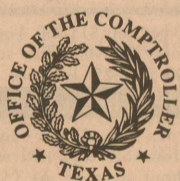

Battle re-enactment, host of activities mark San Jacinto Day Festival on Saturday

LAPORTE — The San Jacinto Day Festival and Battle Re-enactment on Saturday, April 21, marks the 171st anniversary of Texas' famous Battle of San Jacinto and the enduring spirit of the nation of Texas that was born that day. This year's celebration takes on additional importance because it is the 100-year anniversary of the designation of San Jacinto Battleground as the first Texas state park.

The admission-free San Jacinto Day Festival takes place from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. on the 1,200-acre San Jacinto Battleground State Historic Site at the San Jacinto Monument, with a full day of music, entertainment, food, games and fun set amidst living history. The battle re-enactment, one of the largest in the state, draws the most onlookers. The battle begins at 3 p.m. with thundering

cannons and muskets, galloping horses, pyrotechnics and hundreds of re-enactors.

The costumed re-enactors replicate the Runaway Scrape (Texans gathering the few belongings they could to flee the advancing forces of Santa Anna,) the march of the Texas army from Gonzales to San Jacinto, the cannon duel, and the final battle between the two forces. The re-enactment ends with the surrender of Mexican Army Gen. Santa Anna to Texan Army Gen. Sam Houston, followed by the laying of wreaths to honor the sacrifices of both armies.

The Battle of San Jacinto, which lasted only 18 minutes, is truly one of the most important battles of American history. On April 21, 1836, Houston led his Texan soldiers to victory over the Mexican Army, officially securing Texas' independence from Mexico and eventually leading to the addition of one million square miles to the United States.

The San Jacinto Day Festival

begins at 10 a.m. with the official State of Texas ceremony on the steps of the San Jacinto Monument. Congressman Ted Poe will address the crowd. Ron Stone will serve as the master of ceremonies.

The observance includes a reading of General Houston's battle report and the laying of a wreath in honor of those who fought at San Jacinto. The West Houston-Katy Children's Choir—a professional, non-profit community choir of over 40 children from the 3rd to 8th grades—will sing patriotic songs; historic re-enactors in period dress will act as honor guards and fire a gun salute.

Instead of 1836 fare such as possum and cornmeal mush, the Texas-style food and beverages offered for sale will be more pleasing to today's palates. Sutlers (civilians who sold provisions to military posts) will be on hand to sell or show their wares. Unique hand-crafted items by artists such as basket weavers and ironsmiths will be demonstrated and sold.
