The Schleicher County Commissioner's Court met Monday, March 12 with Commissioner Johnny Mayo and

Election administrator Brenda Mayfield asked the court if they had any objections if she asked County Maintenance employee Mike Haynes to help with moving election equipment for the May 12 election. The court oiced no objection.
County Road Superintendent Clay Burleson then asked the court to call
for unleaded fuel bids to be opened on March 26, 2007.
An agenda item calling for the county to return to the practice of do ing private road work on a fee basis was tabled until the full court could be present. The county was forced to stop doing private road work three decades ago after a judge ruled that the county was not applying its policy equally In other business, Judge Griffin explained that he received a bid for paving the cemetery and other country roads from the contractor who wil pave the golf course. The bid exceeded 160,000 . No action was taken.

## National Guard offers city help to demolish dilapidated buildings

The Eldorado City Council met Monday evening, March 12, 2007, with Sgt. Jim Levine of the Texas National Guard. Levine offered help with troops and heavy equipment to demolish buildings within the city considered to be a health hazard or a place where illegal activity, such as drug use and/or trafficking, occurs.
Levine says that ever since Hurricanes Katrina and Rita ravaged the Gulf Coast demolition training has become essential to the Guard and its mission. Prior to the hurricanes the Guard was not trained to assist with demolition projects.
Sgt. Levine presented the council with a list of requirements the city must meet, including cooperative activities, before the Guard could proceed with a demolition project
A recent survey indicated that there are presently 55 houses or buildings within the city that could be considered as health hazards or as attractive to il legal activity. A number of the structure have not been occupied for several year and it is believed that they have becom so run down that it is unlikely that they will be renovated or repaired
As yet, the city has no standard for d termining which, if any, of the structures
should be demolished. However, there appeared to be interest on the council for such a program and it was agreed that the county and other local jurisdictions should be involved as a workable plan is developed.

If and when the city asks for help, the Guard stands ready to furnish personnel, machinery, fuel, housing for the troops and transportation to and from the work site. The city would be required to furnish dump trucks and a place to dispose of the demolition debris

As an added benefit, once demolition is complete, each lot would be cleared completely, ready for new buildings. In a related matter, it was noted that the city and county may legally assist individuals in obtaining low interest loans for the construction of new homes on the lots. Sgt. Levine reported that en tire neighborhoods in the Corpus Christi area have been renovated and are now back on the tax rolls. He added that the crime rate in such neighborhoods has dropped significantly.

Moving on to other business, the council extended a warm welcome to local Boy Scout George Chavez, a guest of council member Dr. Pat Johnson. It SEE CITY on Páge 7

## Jeffs indicted yet again

Warren Jeffs, jailed leader of the Fundamentalist Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints, faces yet another felony charge this, faces yet another felony charge this week, after a federal grand jury in Salt Lake City, Utah indicted him on a charge of
Flight to Avoid Prosecution.
Flight to Avoid Prosecution.
The charge came down Wednesday morning, March 7, 2007. It carries possible penalty of five years in jail and $\$ 250,000$ fine.
Jeffs, whose followers are building a new town on the YFZ Ranch just four miles from Eldorado, was on the FBI's Ten Most Wanted list until his capture during traffic stop near Las Vegas las year. An "illegible license plate" promp ed a Nevada state trooper to pull over the Cadillac Escalade driven by Isaac Jeffs Warren Jeffs, and one of his wives, was ound in the vehicle.
But that wasn't all. The Cadillac contained computers, documents, mask wigs and cash. The seized evidence lie
at the heart of a legal fight between Jeffs lawyers and federal prosecutors. Government attorneys want to hold the evidence and use it against Jeffs in court while his attorneys claim the evidence includes "privileged" communications between a prophet and his followers.
Warren Jeffs is already facing charges of Rape as an Accomplice in Utah's 5th District Court, where he is slated to stand trial in April. In that case he is accused of forcing one of his 14 -year-old fernale followers to marry and have sex with her 19-year-old cousin.

Meanwhile, Jeffs faces similar charg es in Arizona.

Jeffs remains in Jail in the Purgatory Correctional Facility in Hurricane, Utah pending his trial in April. His attorney Walter Bugden has petitioned the court to move Jeffs' trial away from St. George Utah. He has also asked that the rape charge be dropped altogether because it is "unconstitutionally vague."

## May elections draw little

 interest from candidatesThere will be no contested races in the local elections slated for May 12th and it is likely that all of the elections xcept one, will be cancelled
The county must still conduct a special constitutional amendment election for the State of Texas
The Eldorado City Council will have two empty seats following the election Mayor Pro Tem Bill McCutcheon is stepping down and long-time council member Richard Mendez did not file or re-election.
Dr. Pat Johnson filed for a two-year term in Ward 1 and Stan Meador, who was appointed to fill the unexpired term of Toni Sudduth, filed for a two-yea erm in Ward 2. Dorothy Dacy filed for a two-year term in Ward 3 while the
council's longest serving member, Dora Bosmans, filed for a one-year term in Ward 3. That leaves vacancies in Ward 1 and 2
The School board had only two of its trustees up for re-election, Berta Nicholson and Kurtis Homer, both of whom filed.

The Hospital District board of trustees will also have a vacancy. Randy Mankin filed for re-election, but Dr Jim Brame did not. George Arispe filed for a two-year term, but there was an additional vacancy on the board and no one filed for it.

The water district had only two seats up for election and incumbents Ronnie Sauer and Ray Ballew were the only ones to file for those.

## How Faith

Moved a Nation
How does a society vanquish a social ill that is deeply ingrained, that benefits the economy and that directly harms only the utterly powerless?
That is the question addressed by the new movie Amazing Grace," and the companion book of the same name by author Eric Metaxas. They tell the story of William Wilberforce, the British parlia mentarian whose decades-long fight against the slave trade finally resulted in its abolition in 1807 This year is the bicentennial of what was, to use contemporary argot, one of history's most success

## ful "faith-based initiatives"



Wilberforce was a committed Chris tian, whose faith in formed his opposition
to slavery and steeled to slavery and steeled him against the re-
verses that inevitably attended his agains the-odds battle. His model is a useful corrective in the current debate concerning the proper role of faith in American public life. Defenders of faith's importance tend to get squeezed on one side by secularists railing against imagined offenses to liberty and the Constitution and on the other by the buffoonis
Abolitionists confronted a forbidding landscape as Metaxas makes clear in his spirited, moving account of Wilberforce's life: "Slavery was a accepted as birth and marriage and death, was so woven into the tapestry of human history that you could barely see its threads, much less pull them out. Everywhere on the globe, for 5,000 years, the idea of human civilization without slavery wa unimaginable.
Abolition was, strictly speaking, impractica According to Adam Hochschild's history of abo ition, "Bury the Chains," Britain was a country where profits from West Indian plantations gave large boost to the economy, where custom duties on slave-grown sugar were an importan source of government revenue, and where ... the levels, bringing prosperity to key ports, including London itself.
How to overcome all this? The abolitionist called on the British people to live up to their professed faith. If they believed that all men were created in the image of God, how could they sanc tion treating some of them as chattel? They pushed he public's nose down into the facts of wha happened on the slave ships, countering the pro paganda about slaves enjoying their journey. They mobilized public opinion in an unprecedented way, producing petitions signed by hundreds of thousands of people
And they were persistent. In 1796, a vote to abolish the trade lost by an agonizing four votes It wasn't for another decade that the abolitionists won.
Such reformers can be humorless busybodies "Well, Henry, what shall we abolish next?" Wi berforce asked his earnest cousin Henry Thornton after the victory against the slave trade. Thornton, missing the lighthearted nature of the comment, eplied "The lottery, I think."
They also can be farsighted advocates for change at, once it occurs, we all accept as inevitable and ight. The abolition of the slave trade was such change, championed 200 years ago by people in public life.

## Access to public information unearthed TYC scandal

If you ever needed an example of the importance of our state's open government laws, you need look no further than the current scandals rocking the Texas Youth Comission
Last month, the Texas Observer broke the story about how TYC of ficials ignored, then tried to cover up evidence that administrators

molested several boys in 2004 molested several boys in 2004 and 2005.
The Dallas Morning News broke its coverage Feb. 19, two days later and, the next thing you know, everyone knew about it.
Texans exploded in anger and the revelations touched off a leg islative firestorm. The more the story came into focus, the more the vastness of the problem became ap parent, the more enraged everyone became

The governor appointed a special master and a new administrator. Last week, Texas Rangers, DPS troopers and attorney general staffers staged an unannounced oc cupation of TYC offices statewide Newspapers carry tales of new horrible discoveries every day.

There are allegations of ph cal abuse, extortion, and
instances of sex abuse
Certain TYC officials had managed to keep it huried - even

hough the Texas Rangers inves figated early allegations - but, once people started digging, it just all spurted out like pus from a gangrenous sore. It shows no sign of abating any time soon.
And it all came to light because Texas has laws protecting your right to know what your government - and its various, labyrinthine agencies - are doing in your name.

A handful of diligent reporters heard a tip then used the Public Information Act to unearth all the documents, records and emails they needed to build the story
hen they started asking Lots of them.
Before long, a different group of very powerful people started asking some rather pointed quesions of their own
And that shows no sign of abating either. Thank God and, apparently, it's about time.
We can't tolerate this kind of criminal behavior against people put in the state's care. Never mind hat these juveniles are serious rouble, many of them. As individuals, they are very nearly helpess in the clutches of the State. No matter what they ve done to earn their time in the TYC, they shouldn't have to fear physical or sexual abuse at the hands of the people who control their fate.
This awful circumstance is exactly what our open government aws were intended to uncover. It's a shame that not everyone really inderstands importance and intent of those laws.
According to an Associated Press story published Sunday, handful of Texas newspaper recently conducted an informa public records audit and the result

State lawmakers hear of abuses at youth commission facilities

AUSTIN - Reports of sex abuse beatings and allegations of official cover-ups in the Texas Youth Com mission surfaced in late February, dominated the news in early March and are expected to continue
Seventy law enforcement officers and other officials under the direction of pecial master Jay Kimbrough fanned out to the 23 TYC facilities across the state. Their mission is to gather information about the goings-on at those facilities and to
gather reports alleging abuse of inmates. The Joint
Committee on Operation and Management of the Texas
 sion summoned
TYC board members to the Capitol to estify in a March 8 public hearing.
This special committee of seven state representatives and seven state senators heard testimony and asked questions to pinpoint wrongdoing, to dentify and remove wrongdoers, to orrect problems and to prevent future wrongdoing.
One widely reported finding aired the four-hour hearing was that the TYC hired a convicted sex offender as a guard, and that agency policy allows the hiring of a convicted felon if a top TYC official approves. Another finding regarded a former TYC o
with a 16 -year-old inmate.
The committee also heard about order by Kimbrough, shredded official documents.

Committee members took a vote expressing "no confidence" in the TYC board of directors.
