Jeffs ruled competent to stand trial

Saying that Warren Jeffs was "much improved in his appearance and demeanor," Utah's 5th District Judge James L. Shumate ruled last Friday that the FLDS prophet is competent to stand trial.

The judge said he asked Jeffs' defense team to get an evaluation of their client's mental and physical condition after he appeared frail and disoriented at a March 27th hearing. The request for a competency evaluation was sealed by the judge, leading to a great deal of speculation about Jeffs' mental and physical well being.

A group of media outlets, asking to have the evaluations unsealed, won a partial victory when Judge Shumate said he would release redacted copies of the documents despite arguments from defense attorney Walter Bugden that his client's psychological condition should be withheld under medical privacy laws. Shumate said he would personally review the documents and "black out" the portions he deemed private.

The judge further ruled that a media pool photographer will be allowed in the courtroom for the trial, with certain restrictions. Defense attorneys had hoped to exclude the photographer after The Deseret Morning News published an enhanced photo of a note that Jeffs attempted to give Judge Shumate during the March 27 hearing.

The note reportedly said that Jeffs abdicated his position as prophet of the FLDS church, according to a photo analyst employed by The Deseret Morning News.

Judge Shumate also quashed a subpoena issued for reporter Ben Winslow of The Deseret News. The defense wanted Winslow to identify the law enforcement source who confirmed the contents of the disputed note.

The redacted report outlining Jeffs' physical and mental condition were released by Shumate on Tuesday. In it his physicians said Jeffs had spent so much time on his knees praying that he developed ulcers on his knees. Jeffs was also said to be suffering from a "Depressive Disorder" including features of agitation and depression.

Jeffs' condition is said to have improved. Apparently, he lost several pounds while

Jeffs reportedly denied having hallucinations but said that he did receive "impressions" that he considers "inspiration."


Jury selection for the Jeffs trial will begin Sept. 7, and the trial is scheduled Sept. 10-21 in St. George, Utah.

Jeffs stands accused of two counts of rape as an accomplice, a first-degree felony, for allegedly ordering the marriage, then performing the marriage ceremony between a 14-year-old girl and her 19-year-old cousin.

Masked thief grabs \$5,000 bank deposit

Money stolen as store clerk makes night deposit

A ski-mask wearing bandit made off with a bank bag containing more than \$5,000 in cash and checks Sunday night from the driveway of First National Bank.

Super "S" Foods' clerk Deena Day appeared at the Schleicher County Sheriff's Department at 11:10 p.m. Sunday evening to report that she had been robbed as she attempted to deposit the store's receipts in the night depository at the bank. Lawmen promptly fanned out across town but never saw the robber.

Sheriff David Doran reports that Ms. Day was approached by a man wearing a ski-mask as she stepped out of her car and attempted to deposit the store's bank bag. The suspect was said to be a stocky male with a deep voice, approximately 5 feet 5 inches, in his early 20s. The bandit reportedly demanded that Ms. Day surrender the bank bag. When she failed to immediately comply, he wrested it from her hands then fled on foot across South Main Street where he disappeared into the park next to the Tom Ratliff Civic Theater building.

The bank bag reportedly contained some \$3,000 in checks and \$2,000 in cash. The incident is being investigated as a felony

"It's not considered a bank robbery since it didn't take place inside the bank," Chief Deputy George Arispe explained.

Sheriff Doran notes that the robbery remains under "active investigation.



Political Correctness vs. **Historical Accuracy**

Down at the old English colony of Jamestown in Virginia, they are spending the summer celebrating what organizers call "America's 400th Anniversary."

The queen of England visited, and President Bush showed up to give a speech on the actual day of the anniversary.

It was May 14, 1607, that a small band of English settlers landed in Jamestown to try to establish a colony. There had been failed attempts before; people who attended elementary school in the United States



But Jamestown succeeded. It was the first permanent English colony in North America, predating

by 13 years the more celebrated one in Plymouth, Mass. You heard of the Pilgrims even if you paid no attention in class.

What a lot of people do not know -- even if they paid attention throughout grammar school, high school and college -- is that the first permanent European settlement in what is now the United States was not English, but Spanish.

St. Augustine, Fla., is the nation's oldest town, founded Sept. 8, 1565, by Pedro Menendez de Aviles. Spaniards in the decades that followed founded a string of Atlantic Coast settlements into the Carolinas. South Carolina's Parris Island -home of the Marine Corps' boot camp -- was once the Spanish town of Santa Elena. Florida remained a Spanish colony, except for a period of English rule between 1763 and 1783, until the young United States bought the territory in 1821.

The second-oldest city in the United States is Santa Fe, N.M., which Spaniards began to settle in 1607.

Does it matter? Is Jamestown right to mark "America's 400th Anniversary"? What about the 442nd, coming up in St. Augustine?

The dominant "Anglo" society of the United States, multicultural vogues notwithstanding, has tended to celebrate English accomplishments over Spanish. So in the national imagination, Jamestown and Plymouth take precedence over St. Augustine and Santa Fe.

Which is a perfectly accurate view of history. The United States is an English-speaking country with legal customs and political traditions inherited from England. That legacy incongruously combines a deep respect for liberty with slavery and land-grabs from Indians. But the good and the bad came from the people who founded Jamestown. Spain may be la Madre Patria of Spanish-speaking Latin America, but in the United States it is Mother England.

Which is not to say the Spanish past counts for nothing in American history. All Americans can celebrate that it was the Spanish who first brought Western Civilization here. And Americans of Hispanic heritage can take pride knowing that our presence in the U.S. began almost four and a half centuries ago. That's not just politically correct -- it is historically accurate.

As is the idea that those settlers of long ago, whether English or Spanish, were the first of tens of millions of immigrants who came and continue to come seeking better lives, and who give the American nation its soul.

Likely passage • of road bill lessens prospect for special session

AUSTIN - Here's a Friday, May 25, snapshot of what's going on at the state Capitol with sine die, the end of the 80th regular session of the Texas Legislature, set for 10 p.m. Monday, May 28.

A conference committee of House and Senate members concurred on SB

792, the transportation bill that lawmakers had to rework to avoid the governor's calling a special session. Gov. Rick Perry said he would summon the Legislature



back to Austin if the bill stripped too much authority from the Texas Department of Transportation in devising a new, comprehensive road plan.

So, the bill satisfies Perry and gives lawmakers and their constituents a twoyear study period they can use to get a better picture of how their own local and regional road plans might interface with Perry's statewide plan.

Senate kills voter fraud bill

HB 218, the "voter I.D." bill, died in the Senate. Under the bill, Texans would have had to present a valid picture identification card or two other forms of identification other than their voter registration card in order to cast a ballot.

Rep. Betty Brown, R-Terrell, the author of HB 218, said her bill was meant to prevent voter fraud. Opponents said the bill targeted minorities, the elderly and the disabled. Opponents also disputed allegations of widespread voter fraud enabled by false identification at the polls.

Sen. Mario Gallegos, D-Galena Park, who is recovering from a liver transplant, disobeyed doctor's orders by remaining at the Capitol to help block the bill from further consideration by the full Senate.

Memorial Day observance is held

Because the end of the legislative session coincides with Memorial Day, May 28, the House and Senate met in a joint session on Thursday, May 24, for an early observance.

Lawmakers, the governor, lieutenant governor and other state officials honored present and former members of the military and especially the loved ones of military men and women who have died in Iraq and Afghanistan since March 2003.

Family members and friends were seated in the House chamber and came forward to be recognized as the names of fallen military members were called.

TYC-fixing bill moves forward

Texas Youth Commission reform is in the works with the adoption of the conference committee report on Committee Substitute to SB 103 by Sen. Juan "Chuy" Hinojosa, D-McAllen, and sponsored in the House by Rep. Jerry Madden, R-Richardson.

At early presstime for this column, the legislation was due for a final vote by the full House, and delivery to the governor's desk.

Investigative reporting initially published by The Dallas Morning News spurred a growing body of detail bringing to light corruption at the agency, including rape, abuse and mistreatment of TYC inmates.

Public outcry prompted management changes at the agency and public hearings drew input from people across Texas. Lawmakers filed more than two

My daughter-in-law swears by OnStar, the computerized tracking device that can help you in all sorts of ways. She says she uses it way too much because it's so convenient.

"You can just say an address and OnStar will tell you how to get there," she says.

The other day my friend Jerry Worthy volunteered the use of his new GMC Acadia to take 5 of us to a meeting in a city 100 miles away. About 40 miles into the trip, one of the passengers needed to make a phone call to somebody at our destination. He tried to use his cell phone, but he was out of range.

Jerry, who is extremely proud of his new vehicle, said, "We'll let OnStar make the call."

He did whatever is necessary to get the OnStar operator on the line. She happened to be female. By her accent, we could tell she was probably from a place halfway around the world. In fact, she might be in a place halfway around the world while she was talking to us. The sound quality was poor. She sounded muffled and there was a slight echo at times.

Her initial greeting was cordial: "How do you do, today, Mr. Worthy, how can OnStar be of service to you today?"

Jerry Worthy: I need to make a telephone call. He gave her the number.

OnStar: Very well, Mr. Worthy. You are not authorized to use the On Star telephone yet as it has not been fully made operational. In order for you to use the service, you need to purchase a hundred minutes of telephone time to get 30 minutes of free phone service. The cost is \$14.99. Jerry: Yes. OnStar: I need your full name, Mr. Worthy. Please give it to me

Jerry: J-E-R-R-Y W-O-R-T-H-Y,


OnStar: How would you like to pay for the \$14.99? Jerry: Credit card.
