



Locals implicated in Meth ring Two apprehended, one remains at large

Three Eldorado residents were included in a list of thirty-three suspects indicted by a Tom Green County grand jury on June 5th of

The list remained sealed for several weeks as area lawmen rounded up many of the accused.

John Swinford, 37, of Eldorado was arrested on July 20th by Schleicher County officers and charged with Engaging in an Organized Criminal Activity, a first degree felony. He also faces a motion to revoke his previous probation of a conviction for theft. Bail was set for Swinford at \$150,000.00 but he is being held without bail on probation revocation.

The indictment against Swinford alleges that he and fellow defendants Billy Jack Horton and Rebecca Simmons conspired to deliver a controlled substance, methamphetamine in an amount more than 4 grams. The indictment continues by saying that Swinford possessed methamphetamine with intent to deliver.

Rebecca Simmons, 23, of Eldorado was arrested on July 30 by Schleicher County officers on a Tom Green County warrant for Engaging in an Organized Criminal Activity, a first degree felony. She was apprehended by Sheriff David Doran at a mobile home near Ft. McKavett.

Simmons was transferred to Tom Green County Jail on August 3, 2007 where she is being held in lieu of \$150,000.00 bond. She is also being held on a criminal trespass charge, a theft charge and a charge of failure to identify as a witness.

The indictment against Simmons alleges that she conspired with fellow defendants Paula Gillit, Billy Jack Horton and Tammy Evans to delivery a controlled substance, methamphetamine in an amount more than 4 grams. The indictment continues by alleging that Simmons distributed methamphetamine.

Meanwhile, former Schleicher County Jail inmate and former Schleicher County employee Mark Patrick Franke, 42, of Eldorado remains at large following his indictment for Engaging in Organized Criminal Activity, a first degree felony enhanced to carry a 25-99 year or Life sentence.

Franke was convicted in 2002 in Tom Green County of attempting to manufacture a controlled substance, of 4 grams but less than 200 grams. He had been previously convicted in San Angelo in 1993 of possession of a controlled substance, of less than 28 grams. Both earlier convictions were second-degree

Franke was jailed on the 2002 charge and came to Eldorado as a jail trusty. While in jail he was employed by the Schleicher County Commissioners Court as a maintenance man. The job continued briefly after Franke was released but he soon

The new indictment against

Franke accuses him of conspiring to deliver a controlled substance with fellow defendants Allen Patrick Norris, Melissa Garfias, Michael Trammell, Hermengildo Meza, Jr. and Robert Bledsoe. The indictment continues by saying that Franke obtained methamphetamine for distribution from fellow defendant Melissa Garfias.

At least twenty-nine of the thirtythree accused have been rounded up by press time. Included among those behind bars are:

Eldorado City Council, the meeting that wasn't...or was it?

The Eldorado City Council met Monday evening, August 6th, and conducted several items of business, even entering into a closeddoor executive session, despite the fact the agenda for the meeting was improperly posted and city personnel were made aware of the mistake prior to the start of the meeting. Mayor John Nikolauk convened the session with council members Dora Bosmans, Dorothy Dacy, Dr. Pat Johnson, Richard Mendez and Stan Meador in attendance. Council member Stacy Haynes was not present for the meeting.

Mayor John Nikolauk acknowledged Tuesday that the meeting was held improperly. He explained that he was calling a special meeting for Monday, August 13, 2007 so that the council could meet again and problems with this week's meeting could be corrected.

The saga began Friday, August 3, 2007 when The Eldorado Success received an email copy of the City Council's agenda. Kathy Mankin read the email and noted that the agenda was dated July 9, 2007. She replied to the email suggesting that the date be checked and corrected.

The Texas Open Meetings Act requires that agendas for public meetings be posted 72 hours prior to the start of a meeting. Among the items required on the agenda are the date, time and location of the upcoming meeting.

On Sunday, August 5, 2007, Mankin stopped by City Hall to see if the agenda had been reposted. The agendas displayed near the building's front door and the door to the Council Chamber still bore the July 9th date.

The following morning Mrs. Mankin received an email from City Secretary Carolyn Mayo acknowledging the error. Mankin replied with an email asking to be advised when the meeting would be rescheduled.

That evening Kathy Mankin drove by and was surprised to see cars gathered at City Hall. She stopped and went in, arriving just as the council meeting began. New agendas with the proper date were provided for each

of the council members. Ms. Mayo advised them that the official agenda was posted at the front door and that it had been corrected and changed.

At one point, Antonio Contreras appeared to discuss zoning issues, particularly whether a mobile home his family owns can remain on property bordering North Street.

Contreras questioned why the meeting was being held without it being advertised in the newspaper. He was advised that the agenda for the City Council's meetings are posted by the building's front door and that the council is not required to further advertise a regular meeting.

The meeting progressed through several agenda items and ended with a closed-door executive session for the discussion of personnel. The meeting ended without any action

The following day, Success publisher Randy Mankin met with Mayor Nikolauk concerning the agenda question and discussed the chain of events leading up to the meeting. He also met with City Council member Dorothy Dacy and telephoned Councilman Stan Meador concerning the issue. Mankin offered to show them a time-stamped photo his wife had taken early Sunday evening of the July 9th agenda still posted at the front door to City Hall.

Tuesday evening, Mayor Nikolauk notified The Success that he had concluded that Monday's meeting had been improperly conducted. He emphasized that none of the City Council members had been aware there was a problem and said the council will meet on Monday, August 13, 2007 to revisit the items on the previous night's agenda.

"We want to make sure we do this right," Nikolauk explained. "Citizens like Mr. Contreras need to know that they can rely on the officially posted agenda to be accurate."

The Mayor went on to say that anyone seeing the agenda dated July 9th would naturally assume it was an old agenda that had not been taken down.

Rev. Flores came to Christ after a three day drinking binge. That night he faced a choice between going to another keg party or giving



Rev. Flores went home and told his wife: "From this day, you will never see me drink again. You will never see me use drugs again."


The keg he carried in his truck was put away and he stopped drinking," he said. But after a month he fell back into smoking marijuana.

The Soldier and the Mango

There is a story about a bar owner in Miami who some years ago decided to attract Cuban customers, so he put out a sign announcing drink specials for a holiday he had heard about, July 26. He must have thought it was some sort of Cuban Cinco de Mayo.

What he got was angry exiles demanding the guy explain why he wanted to celebrate the anniversary of the start of Fidel Castro's revolution. "26



de Julio" is to Cuban Miami like fingernails on a blackboard, a date that will live in infamy.

The story might be apocryphal. Nobody I ever heard tell it, always with a chuckle, can actually

name the joint.

But like all good fiction, it contains in its heart a hard truth.

My parents' generation lives with a pain few outsiders understand. They had left Cuba behind because they found it impossible to live without basic liberties. But they loved their birthplace deeply.

I was 9 when I left, too young to feel the pain like my parents. But two childhood memories give me a hint of the bitter and the sweet that is part of the everyday lives of my parents' generation, elderly Cubans who are now Cuban-American and resigned to not ever seeing their old country free.

The bitter memory is of Cuban soldiers armed with submachine guns, going through each room in our home noting every item. We had recently applied for permission to leave the country, and one of the steps we had to endure was a government inventory of everything we owned. These inventories were to be followed by a second inventory the day of departure -- during which everything needed to be accounted for. It was Castro's way of making sure his political opposition left all their possessions behind.

Then there is my sweet memory, literally.

Across from that house ransacked by soldiers was a park, and on the far side of the street an orthopedics clinic. I was 7 or 8 years old and scared of the patients, their arm or leg in a cast. I stayed

But on a dare from my friend Euclides one Havana afternoon, I walked up to the clinic by myself. The place looked closed -- there was nobody around. With Euclides egging me on across the street, I walked behind the whitewashed building into a backyard with a mango tree. I grabbed a mango and sat down to eat.

I remember the fresh, ripe flavor bursting in my mouth. I have never, since then, tasted a more perfect piece of fruit.

The soldier and the mango are individual moments in my life -- fraught with symbolism, sure, but just things that a little kid went through. To my parents' generation, however, those two moments sum up a lifetime as adults, fully aware of the beauty and the suffering that Cuba brought them.

I barely understand that pain, so it is no wonder most Americans cannot feel it either. And it is no wonder, either, that the pain intensifies when it's chic to wear a Che T-shirt, or when a Michael Moore holds up the Castro regime as an example of anything.

AUSTIN — Now consumers have a way to find out if they got all they paid for at the gasoline pump.

Agriculture Commissioner Todd Staples on July 31 said the Texas Department of Agriculture is posting results of gas pump inspections on its Inter-

"We want Texans to know our inspectors are on the front lines, ensuring they are receiving what

they are paying for, "Staples said.

The agriculture department employs 72 weights and measures inspectors who check more than 65,000 gasoline pumps a year, according to an agency news release.

If an inspector places an "out of order" tag on a pump, the station owner or operator must have the pump repaired by an agriculture departmentlicensed service company before the pump can be used to sell fuel.

Tested, properly operating pumps get a new seal placed by an agriculture department inspector.

More action on funding veto

The idea of getting Gov. Perry to undo his veto of \$154 million, a sizeable yet thin slice from the \$151 billion state budget, for community colleges may be gaining momentum.

Forty-seven members of the Texas House of Representatives called on Perry to restore the funding that in 2008-2009 would have been used to pay for employee health insurance at public junior and community college campuses.

Rep. Jim Dunnam, D-Waco, one of the 47, went an extra step, asking House Speaker Tom Craddick to "join the call publicly and unequivocally to restore these critically needed funds and correct Gov. Perry 's unwise

No word yet from Perry or Craddick, but Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst has already said he wants to get lawmakers and higher education people together and see what can be done to restore the funding.

Dewhurst said he wanted to head off the need for colleges to raise tuition or fees in order to make up for money lost to the veto.

Dewhurst and Craddick are joint chairs of the Legislative Budget Board, a 10-member entity that has budget execution authority and can restore the funding.

The other eight members of the board are Sens. Steve Ogden, R-Bryan, Robert Duncan, R-Lubbock, John Whitmire, D-Houston, Judith Zaffirini, D-Laredo; and Reps. Warren Chisum, R-Pampa, Jim Keffer, R-Eastland, Fred Hill, R-Richardson and Sylvester Turner, D-Houston.

Judge says programs do comply

Senior U.S. District Judge William Wayne Justice of Austin ruled July 30 that public school bilingual programs, as currently delivered in Texas, comply with federal law

The League of United Latin American Citizens and GI Forum in 2006 asked the judge to force the state to improve education programs for limited-English students.

The ruling means those programs need not be upgraded.

Judge Justice also said low test scores and high dropout rates among Hispanics cannot be linked to the state's bilingual and English as a Second Language programs, the Associated Press reported.







> "Visitors are advised and pulled off the river during floods, but everything returns to normal within a couple of days," VanBaarle said. "This has been a good year for river activities, but a bad year for occasional heavy showers and a little mud in camping areas. All in all, our park visitors have been a bit inconvenienced, but they're having a whole lot of fun."

East Texas parks, too, have had their share of heavy rain, but it hasn't been all bad news for water recreation, according to Ellen Buchanan, regional director of Texas state parks in Tyler. "We are green and beautiful, and the fish are biting," she said, adding that all the East Texas lakes are at or above pool level.

Buchanan noted, for example, that Cooper Lake northeast of Dallas, which was down 18 feet in December, is full again. And, she said that Lake Bob Sandlin State Park's boat ramps, which had been closed all spring and half the summer due to low water levels, are operational.

Even in West Texas, which can be quite parched and hot this time of year, regional state park director Mike Hill reports cactus blossoms are the showiest in decades and grasslands are looking great.

"Images from the movie 'Giant' not withstanding," Hill said, "the grasslands in West Texas are green, green, green. Purple sage has already started blooming around Devils River State Natural Area and Seminole Canyon State Park and promises to put on a spectacular display for weeks to come."

Though stormy weather has caused temporary weather closures at Kickapoo Cavern State Park and Devil's River State Natural Area, cooler temperatures are making visits to Big Bend Ranch State Park near Presidio and Davis Mountains State Park, both of which sit at above 4,800 feet elevation, quite pleasant.

"West Texas parks are open for business," Hill said.



A Test of Faith: Former Muslim who converted to Christianity takes his message across Texas and beyond

Afshin Ziafat

Ziafat strode up to the pulpit at First Baptist Church in Stephenville. His face was cleanshaven. He wore a sport coat and spoke English without an accent.

"Before September 11, people could walk right up to the gate at the airport with a sign that had my name on it," Ziafat told a crowd gathered for a college retreat. "When I said, 'I'm Afshin,' they're always amazed. he'd done smacked him in the face. They're like 'you're Afshin?' Well, you kinda look like us." "

"Yes, I am human," the evangelist added with a laugh. "All right, let's work on my name. Think of the hair product 'Afro Sheen.' Take the 'r-o' out, and you've got my name."

Ziafat brought a message of hope and faith to Stephenville students and residents. Now he is taking his evangelic tour across Texas and beyond at a time when relations between Muslims and Christians remain strained due to conflict in the Middle East.

Ziafat knows those conflicts all too well. He rejected his Muslim upbringing and converted to Christianity, risking disownment from his father. retaliation from extremist members of the Muslim community and lingering prejudice about his heritage.

Born in Houston to Iranian parents. Ziafat's father, a doctor, was a devout Muslim and expected his children to be. When Ziafat was 2, the family moved back to Iran and lived there until the late 1970s. Then came the Islamic revolution. When Ayatollah Khomeini overthrew the Shah of Iran, Ziatat's father rushed the family out of the country before the Iranian hostage crisis.

Arriving back in Houston at age 6, Ziafat entered the first grade. Even though he was a native Houstonian, he spoke Farsi and very little English. Prejudice and persecution against Iranians made adjusting to American life even more difficult.

"When people found out we were Iranian, we had rocks thrown through our windows and our tires slashed," Ziafat recalled in a solemn tone of voice. "My brother and I were kicked off the soccer team. We were threatened to get beat up."

All REPs are required to offer deferred payment plans to eligible customers who express an inability to pay. REPs also offer balanced billing plans, which allow eligible customers to pay an average amount each month year-round.

Additionally, many community action agencies may be able to help with electric bills or energy efficiency programs.
