Local FSA office avoids closure

Axe falls on offices in Ozona, Sonora, Junction & Menard

COLLEGE STATION - John T. Fuston, State Executive Director for the Texas Farm Service Agency (FSA), today announced that USDA has approved the Agency's plan to close 11 county offices identified in part two of a multi-faceted, statewide streamlining initiative.

According to Fuston, Texas FSA received the letter of approval signed by Acting Secretary of Agriculture Charles Connor on November 16. "After considering fully, all public input on this issue and adjusting our plans as deemed appropriate, our final proposal for this phase of our restructuring plan was issued to and approved by Acting Secretary Connor."

Receipt of Secretarial approval to proceed with the office closure plan means that as of November 16, 2007, the clock started ticking on a 120-day period in which Texas FSA begins the administrative and strategic processes required to close a county office. "Numerous logistics must be considered before we can close any one office; let alone 11 offices. We are targeting mid March 2008 as the official closure timeframe," said Fuston.

Phase I (part two) of Texas FSA's restructuring plan calls for the following county office realignments:

• Angelina/Trinity County (Lufkin) FSA office will be closed and the new headquarters will be in Nacogdoches County (Nacogdoches).

• Cass/Marion County (Linden) FSA office will be closed and the new headquarters will be in Harrison County (Marshall).

· Crockett County (Ozona) FSA office will be closed and the new headquarters will be in Reagan County (Big Lake).

• Jefferson/Orange County (Beaumont) FSA office will be closed and the new headquarters will be Liberty County (Liberty).

• Kent County (Jayton) FSA office will be closed and the new headquarters will be Dickens County (Spur).

• Kimble County (Junction) FSA office will be closed and the new headquarters will be Kerr County (Kerrville).

· Menard County (Menard) FSA office will be closed and the new headquarters will be Concho County (Eden).

· Panola County (Carthage) FSA office will be closed and the new headquarters will be Harrison County

• Presidio/Jeff Davis County (Marfa) FSA office will be closed and the new headquarters will be Brewster County

• Shelby County (Center) FSA office will be closed and the new headquarters will be Nacogdoches County (Nacogdoches). Note: This move applies to Commodity Program Operations only - Farm Loan Programs will continue to be administered out of Shelby County.

• Sutton County (Sonora) FSA office will be closed and the new headquarters will be Schleicher County (Eldorado).

By early January, producers, landlords for FSA business office locations and affected employees can expect to receive written correspondence from FSA management regarding the process for closing FSA offices in Texas.

"Upon receipt of their letter, producers will have 60 days in which they can elect to move their respective business records to a county 'of their choosing' if a county other than the default headquarters location is more convenient," Fuston emphasized. "However, after this window of opportunity has expired, all producer records in the county slated for closure will be automatically transferred to the new headquarters of record."

According to Fuston, the original plan for this phase of the restructuring process called for closing 12 County Offices. However, after thorough review and careful consideration of supporting facts, the five-member Texas FSA State Committee voted in favor of Van Zandt County remaining operational.

"Our employees do an outstanding job under our current structure with the resources available to them, but I believe that realigning our agency will, in the end, prove beneficial to our employees by maximizing agency resources and to our customers through improved customer service."

YFZ Ranch finally gets sewer permit from TCEQ

Four years after the former Red Cheek Ranch was acquired by a fundamentalist Mormon sect from Utah and Arizona, and nearly three years after the group applied for a wastewater permit, the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality has signed off on the project.

The move paves the way for construction to resume on a large wastewater plant on the northeast corner of the 1,791 acre ranch. Work on the plant was halted a couple of years ago when TCEQ inspectors discovered that construction had begun before a permit had been

The YFZ Land LLC, the company

that owns the property, has been cited numerous times by TCEQ inspectors for violations of state environmental rules. So many times, in fact, that the YFZ recently earned its second consecutive "Poor" compliance rating from the

Facilities with poor ratings receive increased scrutiny from TCEQ inspec-

The original permit application was opposed by neighboring ranchers, as well as the Upper Colorado River Authority. Once the YFZ revised its application to provide for irrigation with instead of discharge of the treated wastewater, the groups dropped their protests.

Continuing Ag policies that work

Five years ago, when commodity prices were low and the national economy was reeling, Congress approved a controversial major farm bill. The 2002 law shored up nutrition, conservation and commodity support programs, and brought benefits to rural and urban areas alike.

Now that legislation has expired. Because of gridlock in Washington, Congress has had difficulty approving a new farm bill. We need to get to work this month and get legislation to the President. Delays are already affecting planning deci-

sions in South Texas and will soon be felt statewide.

The bill under consideration is similar to the 2002 version that has helped boost our national agricultural exports to record levels, nearly \$80 billion this year. This economic stimulus is vital to our national economy at a time when the U.S. has a trade balance deficit that has helped weaken the U.S. dol-

lar. The proposed bill

would continue substantial federal crop subsidies at a time when farm income is high. That concerns many legislators. But a safe, dependable domestic food supply is now linked with our national security, and the expanding world population depends on U.S. supply and technological advances.

There is now a national consensus on the necessity of maintaining a steady and predictable food supply, using a federal agricultural safety net. We can do it without encroaching on the traditional independence of our farmers and ranchers.

At the same time, two-thirds of the five-year, \$288 billion price tag goes to nutrition programs for lower income Americans, including food stamps and subsidized school meals. In this year's bill, there's also a \$5 billion annual disaster fund. That will replace annual emergency appropriations that are often loaded up with earmarks and Congressional pork.

The stakes in this bill are high for Texas. Nearly one in seven Texans still make their living in agriculture-related jobs. Texas leads the nation in the number of farms and ranches, the amount of land in production, and the number of cattle, horses, sheep and goats. We're among national leaders in a score of crops, and number one in cotton, wool, mohair and hay.

Over the last century, Texas agriculture has become vastly more efficient. Our pioneer settlers were largely self-sufficient. But the typical rancher or farmer now produces food or fiber for 129 people, here and abroad.

That efficiency means more land can now be devoted to protecting farmland for future generations. The 2007 bill increases funding for grasslands and wetlands reserve efforts that support a variety of natural habitats. That should please environmentalists and hunters alike.

Unfortunately, the bill was stalled last month in large part because the majority party refused to guarantee a full opportunity for consideration of amendments by individual Senators. Some of these amendments bear directly on agriculture policy, and deserve an up-or-down vote.

I have an important amendment, for example, that would make combating childhood obesity a priority in the largest Agriculture Department

Texas House will see new faces

Change is certain in at least seven the 150 seats of the Texas House of Representatives.

Not seeking re-election are state Reps. Dianne White Delisi, R-Temple; Robby Cook, D-Eagle Lake; Mike Krusee, R-Round Rock; Fred Hill, R-Richardson; and Mike O'Day, R-Pearland.

State Rep. Anna Mowery, R-Fort Worth, already resigned, and will be replaced in a Dec. 18 special election runoff to fill her vacant seat.

State Rep. Robert Talton, R-Pasadena, gave up his seat to run for Congress. He is seeking his party's nomination for U.S. Congressional Dist. 22, the seat held from 1984-2006 by former U.S. House Majority Leader Tom DeLay. Now holding the seat is U.S. Rep. Nick Lampson, D-Stafford.

State Rep. Rick Noriega, D-Houston, on Dec. 3 announced he will seek his party's nomination to run against incumbent U.S. Sen. John Cornyn, R-San Antonio.

As far as can be discerned at this point, all sitting state senators intend to hold onto their seats.

Agriculture Commissioner Todd Staples announced on Nov. 29 record agriculture production estimates for

For the first time in history, he said, projections show the Texas agriculture industry will surpass \$100 billion in economic impact for the state. The previous high was \$85 billion in 2004.

Some of the largest increases this year are from crops used to produce biofuels. Production of grain sorghum was up 440 percent compared with last year, while corn production increased 91 percent, Staples said.

Prevention key to slowing Oak Wilt spread

Use caution when selecting, transporting Oak firewood

AUSTIN - Texas Forest Service is encouraging Texans to be careful when collecting and purchasing firewood at this time of year. Transporting and storing diseased wood is a known means of spreading the devastating oak wilt fungus to previously uninfected neighborhoods.

Utilizing these prevention steps is the key to safeguarding against spreading the disease

the selection and use of firewood:

• Select well-seasoned firewood. Well-seasoned wood is cut before the summer and is typically dry with loose bark and cracked ends. Avoid oak wood that appears unseasoned, that may have tight bark and cut ends which show no cracks or signs of aging. The extreme heat and drying of a full Texas summer effectively destroys the fungus in cut firewood.

· Safely store unknown sources of firewood. If the oak wood comes from an unknown source and it is not well seasoned, cover the

woodpile with a clear piece of plastic. Burying the edges of the plastic will prevent the entry or exit of insects that might have been attracted to diseased wood and fungal mats.

· Destroy diseased red oaks. A knowledgeable arborist or forester should diagnose red oaks (i.e., Texas red, blackjack or shumard oak) that die rapidly (2-3 weeks) or in groups (2 or more trees over several years) for oak wilt. Trees suspected to have died recently from oak wilt should be destroyed by burning, burying or chipping. The heat of a fire destroys the fungus and the smoke emitted poses no threat to healthy trees. When planning to do any outdoor burning, be sure and check with local officials to see if an outdoor burning ban is in place for your county and take care not to burn on windy days with low

· Avoid wounding oaks during vulnerable seasons. The general recommendation is to avoid injuries to oaks from February through June. The best times for pruning of oaks are during the heat of summer (minimal spore production) or the cold of winter (minimal insect activity).

• Paint all oak wounds including pruning cuts. Throughout the year, immediately apply a thin coat of latex or pruning paint to all fresh wounds and other injuries that expose the inner bark or sapwood of oaks. This prevents contaminated sap beetles from infecting the wound with oak wilt spores.

Oak firewood is an important commodity to Texans, whether it is used for firing up the barbecue pit or for warming up the home on a cold winter day. By selecting well-seasoned, disease-free firewood and by following other disease prevention guidelines, homeowners are taking the correct steps to prevent a new oak wilt disease outbreak in their neighborhood.
