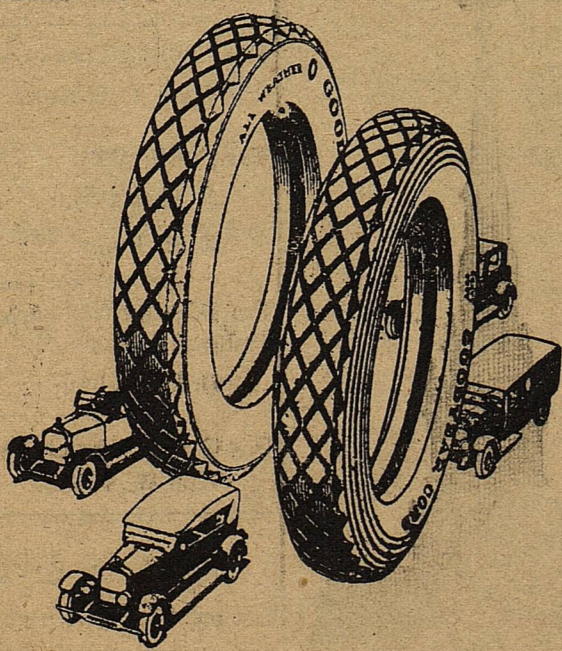

"ZIM" OPENS CAMPAIGN.

Outlines Platforms Upon Which He
Expects to be Elected Governor
of Texas.

Rev. O. F. Zimmerman, better known to Texas as "Zim" the Tithing Evangelist, opened his campaign for Governor, at his home town, Naples, Texas, Saturday, May 15th, according to the Naples Monitor a monster crowd greeted the speaker and gave him a rousing reception.

"If the friendship of my home folks mean election, I shall surely be your next governor. I want to make myself clear as regards my attitude toward our Texas mud slinging campaigns, and I want you to get this if you blot out every other plank in my platform, viz; Zim is keeping absolutely clear of this mud slinging political machine in Texas.

I shall bring no reflection on the ministry of Texas. My friends shall never say that Zim trailed God Almighty's flag in the slime of Texas politics. Texas knows me, I have held revivals all over Texas. If Texas prefers the preacher to a politician she has the opportunity to get him, I am clean and I am going to stay clean."

"Every candidate who has offered himself, or herself, as a martyr to save our oppressed, shackled, bled white State from her agony would have you believe that the salvation of Texas depends absolutely upon their election. That reminds me of this stuff that runs out of an ash hopper. The salvation of Texas from any standpoint does not depend on the election of any man, or any kind of a man, and when you hear a candidate scream and rant about Texas having gone to hell, spit it out and forget it, for Texas is nearer Heaven than she has been in a hundred years."

Zim refers to Ferguson and Moody as the most delightful vaudeville acts ever pulled on an innocent public is the present Kilkenny cat fight between Jim and Dan.

He claims to be a friend of labor and says if he is elected they will have no cause for regrets.

The speaker came out strong for law enforcement, would increase the ranger force and advocates several changes in the present law.

He advocates that nine jurors out of 12 should decide a case. He advocates the raising of the Governors salary, wants lawyers eliminated from the House and Senate, and the membership reduced to 25 and 12 and pay them \$5,000 and \$7,000 salary per year. He favors the present primary election law, but wants all foreign vote eliminated.

In speaking on evolution he says, it is a far greater danger to Texas than a mill'ion Jim Fergusons.

He terms the World Court and League of Nations as "this two- o l child of hell," and says if he is elected Governor that the world would know that Texas is for the United States.

Zim's speech is too long for full publication in The Success. The Dallas News is the only daily coming to us that gave his opening address in full.

A CREAM STATION TO BE ESTABLISHED.

We are very anxious to see this creamery established and have taken the agency not merely for the remuneration it brings, but to get the this much needed business in the community, so joins with us and help put the thing over, at least come in and talk it over with us. GREAT RIVER WILL ATTEMPT COMEBACK

St. Paul-New Orleans Barge Line Planned.

Moline, Ill.—Is the Mississippi river to stage a comeback?
With the assured operation of a barge line on a six-day schedule between St. Louis and Minneapolis, following the great success of the federal barge line for several years past between St. Louis and New Orleans, there appears to be a new and brighter day dawning for the "Father of Waters," at least from a freight standpoint.

An agreement, reached after a series of conferences between Minneapolis and St. Paul business men and Secretary of War Davis and Gen. T. Q. Ashburn of the Inland Waterways corporation, means that the government will supplement the \$600,000 subscribed by the upper river cities to the extent necessary to provide adequate transportation service above St. Louis.

At the outset the equipment will include three boats of 600 horsepower each, 132 feet in length, 32 feet beam and a mean draft with fuel of 3 feet 6 inches. There will also be fifteen steel barges of 400 to 500 tons capacity each.

This fleet will insure sailings six days of the week, connecting at St. Louis with the Mississippi-Warrior service.

Bids will be opened in time to permit construction during the coming year and starting of the service with the opening of navigation in the spring of 1927.

Channel to Be Deepened.
Some improvements of the river are planned. Forty-one miles of the channel between Moline and St. Louis will be deepened. In the Moline district of 658 miles, about 450 miles have a minimum depth of six feet at low water. It is the purpose to deepen the remainder by either dredging or scouring before the new barge service opens.

There was a time when this artery of commerce was big with importance, both for the transportation of passengers and freight. A trip on the river was regarded as a treat. The cuisine of the lordly steamers was world renowned. And to add to the lure there was always the chance of a test of speed, sporting events of no mean importance.

Perhaps the most treasured memory of the veterans was the great race between the Natchez and the Robert E. Lee in 1870. These boats ranked with the largest and fastest craft on the river. The Natchez was built at Cincinnati and was commanded by Capt. T. P. Leathers. The Robert E. Lee was launched at New Albany just after the Civil war, John W. Cannon being in command.

There was the greatest rivalry between the two companies owning these boats and it was finally decided to arrange a race, purely for the

purpose of determining speed superiority.

Captain Cannon stripped the Lee for the race, removing all the upper works and rigging that could be dispensed with. He refused all business of any kind, and no passengers were carried.

The race was to be upstream from New Orleans. On the afternoon of June 30 the Lee backed out from the levee and five minutes later the Natchez followed.

The Lee Wins Handily.
The entire nation watched the race with breathless interest. The telegraph reported the progress and the relative positions of the two craft at every point. At the principal cities of Natchez, Vicksburg, Helena and Memphis thousands assembled on the river banks to watch the flight of the river leviathans.

The Natchez lost, due to some ill luck in running into a fog bank north of Cairo, which caused a delay of six hours. Captain Cannon reached St. Louis with the Robert E. Lee an easy winner, his time being 3 days, 18 hours and 30 minutes.

With the passing of the river steamers also went the gamblers. The spirit of adventure was rampant in those romantic days. Large sums of money were carried by the planters. The betting spirit was rife, and the card sharks found rich pickings.

Time Lost by Finest Official U. S. Clock

Washington.—America's most timely clock clicks off the fleeting moments with a variation of only one-hundredth of a second a day.

Enclosed in an air-tight chamber, especially constructed to keep outside influences away from the government's master timekeeper, the standard clock at the bureau of standards, which has this small variation in time, is used as a yardstick for measuring time intervals at the bureau. The clock is electrically wound twice a minute.

Its time is checked each day by comparison with the noon-signal from the naval observatory, which uses solar observations to set the nation's time.

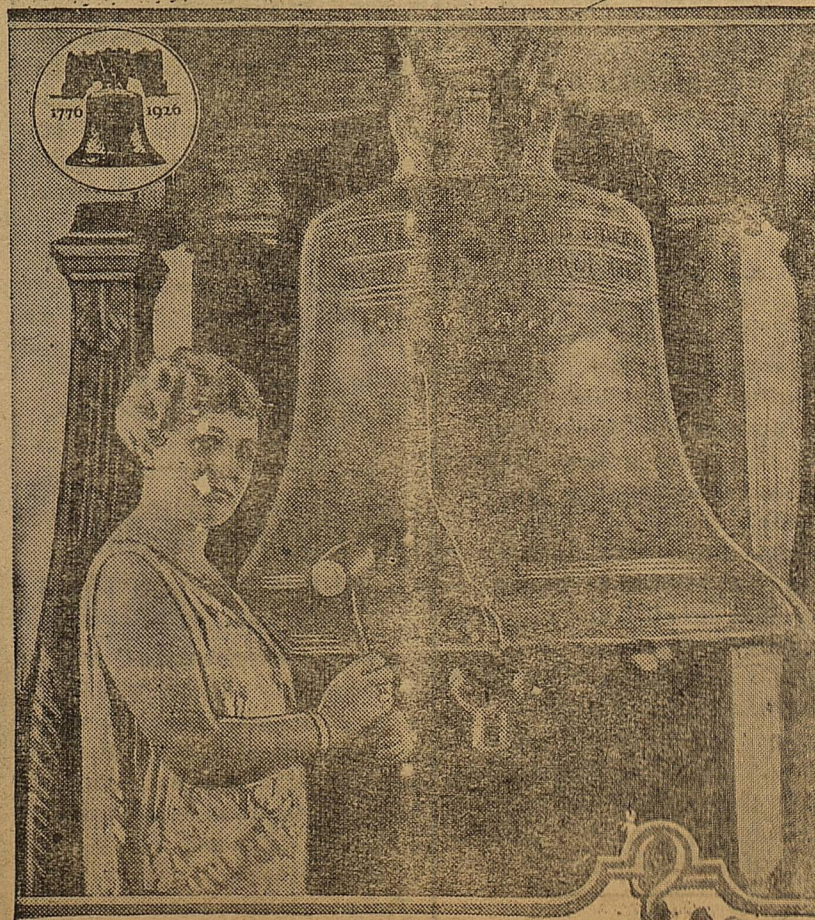

Lesson for May 23

ISAAC AND HIS WELLS

LESSON TEXT—Genesis 26:12-25.
GOLDEN TEXT—A soft answer turneth away wrath, but grievous words stir up anger.—Prov. 15:1.
PRIMARY TOPIC—Isaac Refuses to Quarrel.
JUNIOR TOPIC—Isaac Refuses to Quarrel.
INTERMEDIATE AND SENIOR TOPIC—Isaac the Peacemaker.
YOUNG PEOPLE AND ADULT TOPIC—How to Deal With Aggressors.

Isaac was a child of the covenant and given in the time of the old age of Abraham and Sarah in fulfillment of God's promise (Gen. 15:1-5). His name means laughter, a reminder of the gladness of the heart of his mother when she learned that she was to have a son. As to character he was gentle, meek, meditative and peace loving. He was a remarkable contrast to his father Abraham. Two things may have affected him to his disadvantage.

1. The shadow of his illustrious father.

Sons of great and rich men commonly do not make much of life. The necessity of struggle is not forced upon them.

2. He was brought up as the only child of his mother.

The tendency in such a case would be to shield him from the necessity of self-effort so that he would be unable to meet life's stern realities. Every child should be compelled to think for itself and to fight its own battles. While not a mighty man by nature's gifts, through the blessings of God's grace he became the inheritor of the covenant promise. He was not only a meek man, but a man of prayer as well (Gen. 24:63; 25:21; 28:23-25).

1. Isaac in Gerar (vv. 12-17).

1. The Lord appeared unto him (vv. 1-4).

Because of famine in the land Isaac went into the country of the Philistines. This distress should have moved him to call upon the Lord (Jas. 5:13). It were better to suffer in the land than to go among the enemies of God's people. The Lord graciously appeared to him there and directed him not to go into Egypt, thus avoiding the error of his father.

2. His lapse (vv. 7-11).

He fell into the same temptation as Abraham many years before (Gen. 20:13). When one goes into the enemy's country he can expect to be tempted to do wrong.

3. His prosperity (vv. 12-17).

Isaac did not intend to make Gerar his permanent place of abode. He intended only to sojourn there. While there he sowed and reaped bountifully. This prosperity was no proof that God approved of his course.

11. Isaac's Enemies (vv. 18-22).

Isaac was not permitted long to enjoy this fruitful land. His prosperity incited the envy of the Philistines. Success in any calling in life will provoke envy. Ministers and Sunday school teachers sometimes become envious of each other. The Philistines ordered Isaac to leave them. Wherever envy has begun its deadly work there must be separation. They took as the method of getting rid of him the stopping up of the wells. Isaac did not contend with them but peaceably withdrew to another place where he proceeded again to dig the wells of his father. The Philistines again strove with him. He named this place Esek, which means contention, and again he removed from them. The second name he gave was Sitnah, which means enmity. This willingness to remove from the enemy shows his willingness to be imposed upon rather than to fight. The third time he dug wells there was no strife. The name given to this was Rehoboth, which means room. We should learn from his behavior that the way to have peace is to wear out our enemies with patience.

111. Isaac in Beersheba (vv. 23-33).

Immediately upon Isaac's going up from among the Philistines the Lord appeared to him. The Lord permits envy and strife in the world in order to get his children separated from them. Following this visitation by the Lord, Isaac built an altar and called upon His name. As soon as a meeting place with Jehovah was established he pitched his tent there. Following this his servants dug a well. No use going among the Philistines to get water.

After Isaac was established in Beersheba, Abimelech came desiring to make an alliance with him. He gained influence by peaceably withdrawing from them. Being thus convinced they desired to enter into covenant relationship with him. The way to gain influence with the world is to withdraw from it.

Noblest of All Victories

For a man to conquer himself is the first and noblest of all victories; whereas to be vanquished by himself is the basest and most shameful of all things.

Believing in Truth

Trying to have the courage of other people's convictions is a difficult task. One must really believe in a truth himself before he is willing to suffer for it.

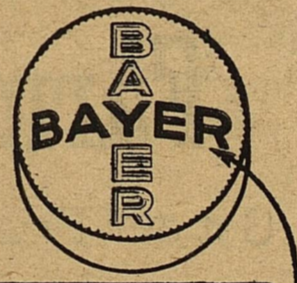

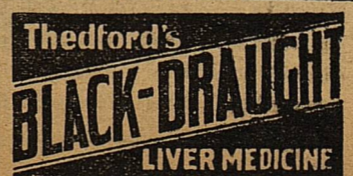
