

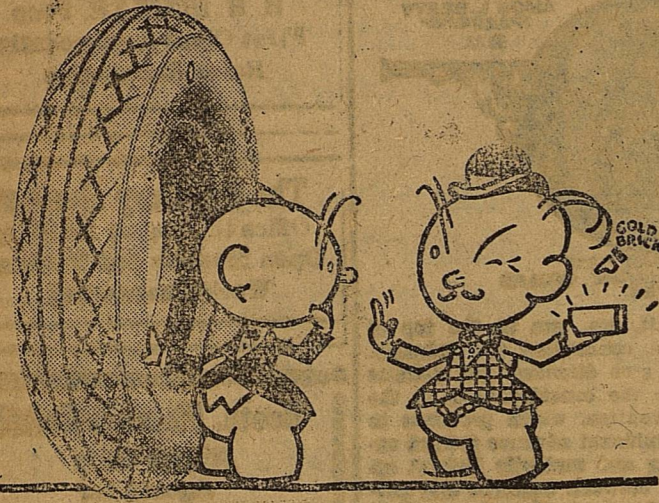

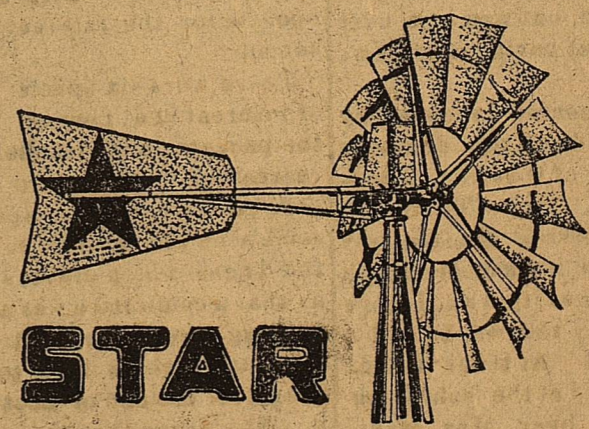

MRS. MARRS AT SONORA, EL DORADANS HEAR HER.

A number of the members of the P. T. A., of El Dorado accepted the invitation extended them by the P. T. A., of Sonora last Monday. Going down there for lunch and to hear a lecture given by Mrs. S. M. N. Marrs of Austin, wife of our State Superintendent of Education, S. M. N. Marrs. The day was a beautiful calm day, with sunshine which added to the enjoyment of the occasion.

We went to the First Methodist church where we were greeted by our district Superintendent, Mrs. Gilmore. Her friendly welcome made us all feel at home at once. We got herded in one of the rooms of the basement of this spacious building, where we were introduced to many new friends as well as the added pleasure of meeting friends of old which we had known at Sonora, Ozona and Rock Springs. We were then escorted into the dining room, after we were seated, Mrs. Gilmore introduced Mrs. Marrs and the officers of the Sonora P. T. A., after this Mrs. Gilmore had been given the names of the members of the visiting associations which she introduced by calling their name and they acknowledged same by rising to their feet. This all went well until Mrs. Childress from Ozona was introduced and three ladies stood up, we were all wondering and don't know yet just which one was the honored member.

Then came El Dorado and son of lady had failed to supply that list of names and Mrs. Gilmore ask that we introduce our selves, which we did, but was not nearly as nice as just having our name called.

We were served luncheon by the deft hands of the domestic science girls of that city directed by Miss Castur. Their efficiency in serving proved that this branch of work means much to any community and I hope that some day this will be added to our school. At three o'clock we got herded at the school auditorium to hear Mrs. Marrs speak on the National Congress of Parents and Teachers, stressing the fact that "Parents" were both men and women, and how much we could do if we worked together for the child's welfare. She then began by telling the need of such a movement which caused it to be organized in 1897 and of its growth, the changing of the name until today it is called the "National Congress of Parents and Teachers."

She next took up the emblem of the organization which is the Oak Tree. Beautifully illustrating the trunk as the National organization. The limbs as the

States, the branches as the local and the leaves were the members, explaining how each member should feel that they have something to contribute to the organization.

Next came what the organization stood for, "Child Welfare" which means, making things safe for our children at home, church, school, and community. The home being the first school of training for the child before school age. The impression formed at this age has much to do with the future life.

The laws of our country were to be considered, not that we would become a political body. Oh! no, but vitally interested in the laws for the protection of women and children.

The child labor law being one that every parent should be interested in, and there are over 180,000 children in America today working without a permit from the county judges which is unlawful.

One of the greatest benefits to be derived from this organization is to bring a closer relation to the home and school that parents and teachers can co-operate more intelligently so that we can better train the child. The public opinion must be that all may be interested in creating a better home church, school and community.

Mrs. Marrs urged that we know more about our National Congress of Parents and Teachers. She said that some school boards got the impression that P. T. A., was to direct them about the management of the school and a good many times they had just cause to think this, which was a mistake created by a mistake made by the P. T. A. The P. T. A. being only an organization to help and co-operate for the interest of the school.

There were six special things of interest she pointed out to the parents and teachers, 1st, recreation, every child should have good wholesome sports of some kind and not left to drift. 2nd, The motion picture, she told us that a committee was at work to bring before our children pictures that would help to build character instead of destroying it. She urged that we be careful of the motion picture. 3rd, Safety, being careful of the law that are being made in our land. 4th, Reading, Urging us to watch the literature our children read. 5th, Home Training, study that we may become more capable of moulding the character that are given to us. 6th, Spiritual Training. She said that she had no use for the man or woman signing the petition to have the Bible read and taught in school that did not do some of in the home. She pointed out the Child Welfare magazine which should and could be in every home at small cost.

Convention to Mark Cooperation Between Business and Government



THE annual convention of the American Petroleum Institute at Tulsa, December 7, 8 and 9, will bring together the largest and most representative gathering of leaders in the petroleum industry that has ever been held. From 1,500 to 2,000 chiefs of corporations, technical experts, scientific authorities, state and national officers, economists and engineers, will consider in the broadest way the questions that relate to permanently supplying fuel to America's 20,000,000 motor cars, and meeting the multitude of other demands on petroleum. Officers of The Institute are shown in the illustration. All rank among the leaders of the industry.

President Coolidge recognized these problems when he created the Federal Oil Conservation Board, nearly two years ago, and commissioned it to study them. The board's report recognized the desirability of a close co-operation between the industry and the government in planning constructive, practical measures. It declared that these must rest chiefly on the initiative of the industry itself.

Since that report was issued, Secretary of Commerce Hoover, a member of the Oil Conservation Board, has declared emphatically in favor of such modification of the anti-trust laws as will open the way to desirable co-operations within the industry, prevent wastes and encourage economies. The aspects of demand, supply, future sources of oil, possible substitu-

tes for it, etc., are at the top of all thought concerning the industry. They will give direction and definite purpose to the considerations at the Tulsa convention, which promises to mark a significant advance toward understanding and mutually helpful co-operations between business and government. Secretary Hoover, speaking on this point, said the other day:

"The way to do business in America today is to do it with glass pockets, and show the public what you really have, and what you really are doing. You may take the case of several industries, which have adopted this policy, and observe the very satisfactory results which have been obtained."

"I believe that the oil industry is clean and has nothing to fear from a program such as these other industries have adopted. When one considers the widespread distribution of gasoline and the very limited amount of profit in a gallon of gasoline, surely not over 2 cents a gallon considering everything, it is surprising. It is a wonderfully distributed product."

"You have the annual meeting of the American Petroleum Institute coming to Tulsa in December, and if members of this body can get together and formulate some plan regarding modification of the Sherman anti-trust act, as applied to drilling flush fields, and properly present this plan, I see no reason why it should not receive favorable action at the hands of Congress."

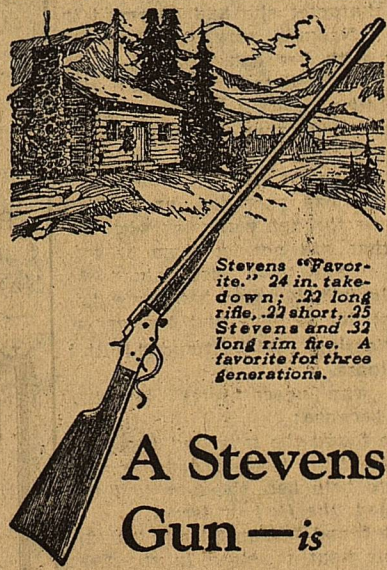

Lesson for December 5

RUTH AND NAOMI

LESSON TEXT—Ruth 1:14-22.
 GOLDEN TEXT—Thy people shall be
 my people and thy God my God.
 PRIMARY TOPIC—The Story of
 Ruth.
 JUNIOR TOPIC—Ruth a loyal
 daughter.
 INTERMEDIATE AND SENIOR TOP-
 IC—Ruth the Loyal.
 YOUNG PEOPLE AND ADULT TOP-
 IC—The Message of the Book of Ruth.

In order to grasp the matter con-
 tained in the lesson subject, there
 must be swept into view the whole
 book of Ruth. The lesson text which
 is to be printed has been confined to
 the first chapter, verses 14-22.

I. Ruth's Connection With Naomi
 (1:1-15).

On account of famine in Bethle-
 hem of Judah, Naomi with her husband
 and two sons sojourned in the land of
 Moab. After the death of her husband
 her two sons married Moabitish wom-
 en. After a time her sons died also.
 After the death of her sons Naomi re-
 solved to return to her homeland, hav-
 ing heard that the Lord had visited
 his people in giving them bread. They
 went to Moab to escape trouble but
 only got into more. It was not until
 Naomi was thus chastised that she re-
 solved to return. One purpose of God's
 chastisement is to cause His children
 to return. Naomi had the good sense
 to recognize that the hand of the
 Lord was upon her for good. When
 the time came for her to go, Ruth
 and Orpah accompanied her for a
 distance. This she permitted but
 determined to place before them frank-
 ly the difficulties which would neces-
 sarily confront them.

II. Ruth's Noble Choice (1:16-18).
 Much as Naomi loved her daughters-
 in-law, she would not have them go
 into this matter blindly. She wished
 them to know the seriousness of their
 undertaking. She told them the worst
 that could come upon them. This prin-
 ciple ought to be carried out by us
 in all our relations in life. In this
 respect Jesus is our supreme example.

1. No chance to marry again.
 Naomi told her that she had no more
 sons for whom she could wait. In
 that day to be unmarried was the
 greatest disgrace. Society differed
 then from now. No avenues were left
 open by which a woman could earn
 her living and be independent. Fur-
 thermore, it was against God's law
 for the Jews to marry outside of their
 own people.

2. She must renounce her gods.
 Her idolatrous worship could not be
 carried on in the land where God's
 people dwelt. This was delicately
 touched upon when Orpah went back
 (v. 15). Orpah went back when it
 was plain there was no chance to get
 a husband. Now Naomi puts an ad-
 ditional test upon Ruth, that of giv-
 ing up her religion. Ruth was equal
 to the occasion. Her mind was fully
 made up. She was willing to accept
 as her God the one who was able to
 produce in His subjects the nobil-
 ity of character she had observed in
 Naomi. Naomi's very frankness in
 dealing with her caused Ruth to be
 more determined to cast her lot with
 her. Ruth's position was so definite
 and unflinching that the very expres-
 sions have come down to us in words
 which "no poetry has outrivaled, and
 no pathos has exceeded, and which
 have gone through centuries with the
 music that will not let them be for-
 gotten." She was determined to
 share Naomi's journey, her home, her
 God, her lot in life, and her grave.

III. Blessings Which Attended Ruth's
 Faithfulness.

Ruth was never sorry for her
 choice, because:

1. She found the true God (1:16).

Instead of her heathen god who was
 unable to help her, she now had the
 living God, the God of Israel.

2. She found human friends (ch. 2).
 As she went to glean in the field
 she was led to the field of Boaz, a
 man of wealth and grace. The serv-
 ants of Boaz treated her with consid-
 eration.

3. A good husband and a happy
 home (chs. 3, 4).

She not only secured a husband, but
 a man of God who had an abundance
 of this world's goods.

4. An honored place in the Israeli-
 ish nation (4:13-17).

Though she had to forsake her own
 people she became one of a nobler
 people.

5. She became a link in the chain
 of Christ's ancestry (4:18-22; cf.
 Matt. 1:5).

The one who fully decides for
 Christ and gives up all for Him shall
 gain a hundredfold in this life, and in
 the world to come eternal life.

Depend on God
