The Long Bros., on the 'Uncle' Billy Williams land, in north Schleicher county are drilling in White Sand and Chalk at about feet. The well was spudded in last Friday at noon—the driller is Frank Spears, a veteran at the business and has probably brought in more Wild-cat wells than any driller in the State at the present time.

This test will give north Schleicher county a chance to get in the head lines as an oil producing county, if there is anything to Geology. According to various reports from Geological sources, the whole west side of Schleicher county, is one big structure—this fact with the tests at Christoval and Mertzon make the chances of getting production in this test. The operators expect to run two crews as soon as they get the first water shut off.

used for a variety of products. Experiments made in 'covering cotton with cotton' for shipments across the water have proved successful. Bales so covered—instead of with the jute wrapping—have made the journey over and back with far less deterioration than the ordinary bale, and the cost of the cotton covering has been little more than the jute", Duvall stated.

CONNALLY WOULD REDUCE TARIFF

Coleman.—Dwelling chiefly on the farm relief proposals, advocating either a reduction of protective tariff under which Northern and Eastern manufacturers are operating or an increase of the protective tariff toward agricultural and stock products of the South, Tom Connally, candidate for United States Senate addressed several hundred people here Saturday afternoon.

During his address here, Connally said reports that his farm relief policy would cost the agriculturists \$200,000,000, were "either the work of a totally ignorant person or that they were made with a malicious intent." Connally assailed the record of the present Senator, Earl B. Mayfield, with reference to his vote on the electrical power investigation.

Accompanying Connally on his tour through Central West Texas was the Marlin Band. Judge E. M. Critz of Coleman introduced Connally, following R. V. Woods calling the meeting to order. After his address here Mr. Connally left for speaking engagements in Rising Star and Eastland.

Howard Peters, of the First Christian church, in charge of the service. Interment was made in the Eldorado Cemetery Wednesday afternoon in the presence of many sorrowing friends.

Mrs. Mills statement issued in an "hour of peril," calls the women of Texas to "rally together to help save home and native land" from the "rattle-snake of rum."

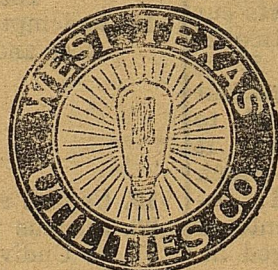

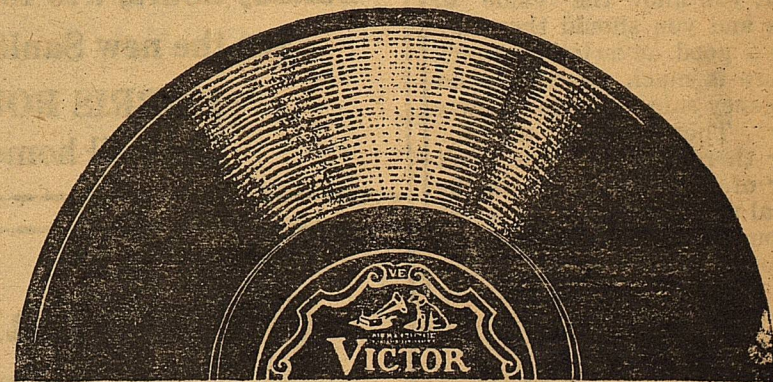

Science could determine. All we know about it is - that the ball is there in the hole and we have taken only one shot or drive. Similarly, no one knows whether success is entirely purposefully achieved or accidentally entered into. Perhaps it matters little so long as the act of achievement is honestly intended and faithfully carried out.

WHERE DO WE LOSE MOST?

At this time the American people are thinking about the election of a President of the United States, of Senators and Representatives in Congress, and various state and local officials. Minds will be centered upon issues and candidates until the elections are over. It is natural that voters will want the best men elected and the party in power which offers the best platform with the greatest assurances of backing it up.

But while we are listening to the arguments for this and that candidate in national affairs, let us investigate carefully those seeking office in our own community and county. A virtue sometimes apparently overdone is the importance attached to the candidate running for the most honored position or highest place in government, a virtue overdone only when it is too much distracted from local affairs. Suppose, for example, that a federal official misappropriated a million dollars, or that his inefficiency of administration resulted in that amount of economic loss. While the act would be reprehensible or deplorable as the case might be, the individual tax-payer would hardly feel the loss, because the loss would be distributed over so great a number. It would not be felt as much as the loss of a thousand due to the mal-administration of a local or county official.

Our own local government up to and including the State government, after all, and in many respects, is the more important. It is more important because it affects directly our homes, schools, transportation, peace and order and general welfare. There are fewer upon whom the responsibility must rest; therefore individual responsibility becomes greater in local government. Every problem affecting the nation in general affects our own community in particular, and the reverse is true. It is certainly no disgrace to get out and work for the best people to administer our local affairs. It is the kind of politics of which no one should be ashamed: because politics honestly entered into and faithfully engaged in, is a mark of good citizenship and becomes of genuine civic and community interest.

A far-off President is none the less important because he is far off. But in the general run of affairs a local official who goes wrong can come nearer breaking us. It is the man or woman whose voice we can hear, whose hand we can shake, who is close at home and whose destiny is undeniably linked up with ours that should engage a near and dear interest on the part of every citizen.

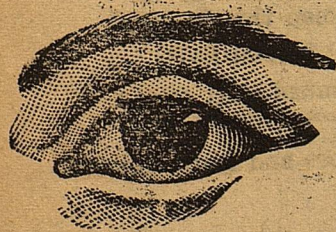

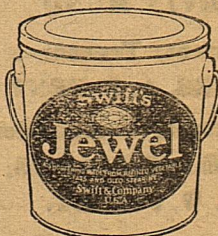

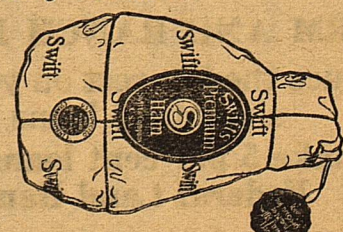

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Thousands in Dallas See Phenomenon of Sky

Like a giant theatre curtain stretched across the north, its silken folds made brilliant with powerful stage lights, first red, then lavender and finally white, the aurora borealis colored the sky Saturday night and was viewed for several hours by Dallas residents.
The wide streamers of light forming the folds of the curtain extended skyward in fan shape. There were five of these streamers distinctly visible and numerous others of fainter hue extending alongside the main shafts of light.
When the display first became

visible about ten o'clock, the predominating color was a brilliant carmine. All the colors of the spectrum were apparent, but were subdued except the red. Then the fan shaped phenomenon faded gradually into orange, brightening after a time. The orange beams then gave way to glowing purple and finally changed to a pure white.

The display usually called the northern lights, extended over an area from northwest by north to northeast by east.

It presented a remarkable spectacle for Dallas students of astronomy, who said that it was the first time that such a brilliant showing of the aurora borealis had been viewed from Dallas. The northern lights were faintly seen here about seven years ago, but nothing like the display this time, said Dr. A. D. Laugenour, a member of the Dallas Astronomical Society.

A group of the society members with Dr. Laugenour went to a point on the Scyene road about five miles east of Dallas to view the spectacle. They were impressed with the volume of light apparent, which they estimated to be many times brighter than the combined lights of Dallas, which they could see to their left. The remainder of the sky was black.

The wide streamers seemed stationery, while tiny beams flickered across and alongside of them like small dancing men. The minute flickers are sometimes called merry dancers.

"It is a rare occurrence for the aurora borealis to be seen so far south," said C. A. Howard, President of the Dallas Astronomical Society. "I believe that this is the only time that it has been so brilliant and so perfectly and beautifully displayed. Probably, it may never be witnessed

again from Dallas".

Mr. Howard attributed the visibility in Dallas to the reason that the present time is the maximum period for sun spots. The illumination apparently interfered with radio reception. Numerous persons reported an unusual amount of static.

Moderate temperatures prevailed in Dallas during the day the maximum being 83 degrees and the minimum 74. A trace of rain fell during the day. Partly cloudy to cloudy weather with probable thundershowers is the prediction of the United

States Weather Bureau for Sunday. —Dallas News.

J. P. Alexander of Christoval, father of Mrs. Barrie Curry of Eldorado died at Christoval Monday afternoon, age 82 years.

The Rev. Sterlin Fisher, Presiding Elder of the San Angelo District of the Methodist church conducted the funeral services. Mr. Alexander came to Texas about 20 years ago from Tennessee.

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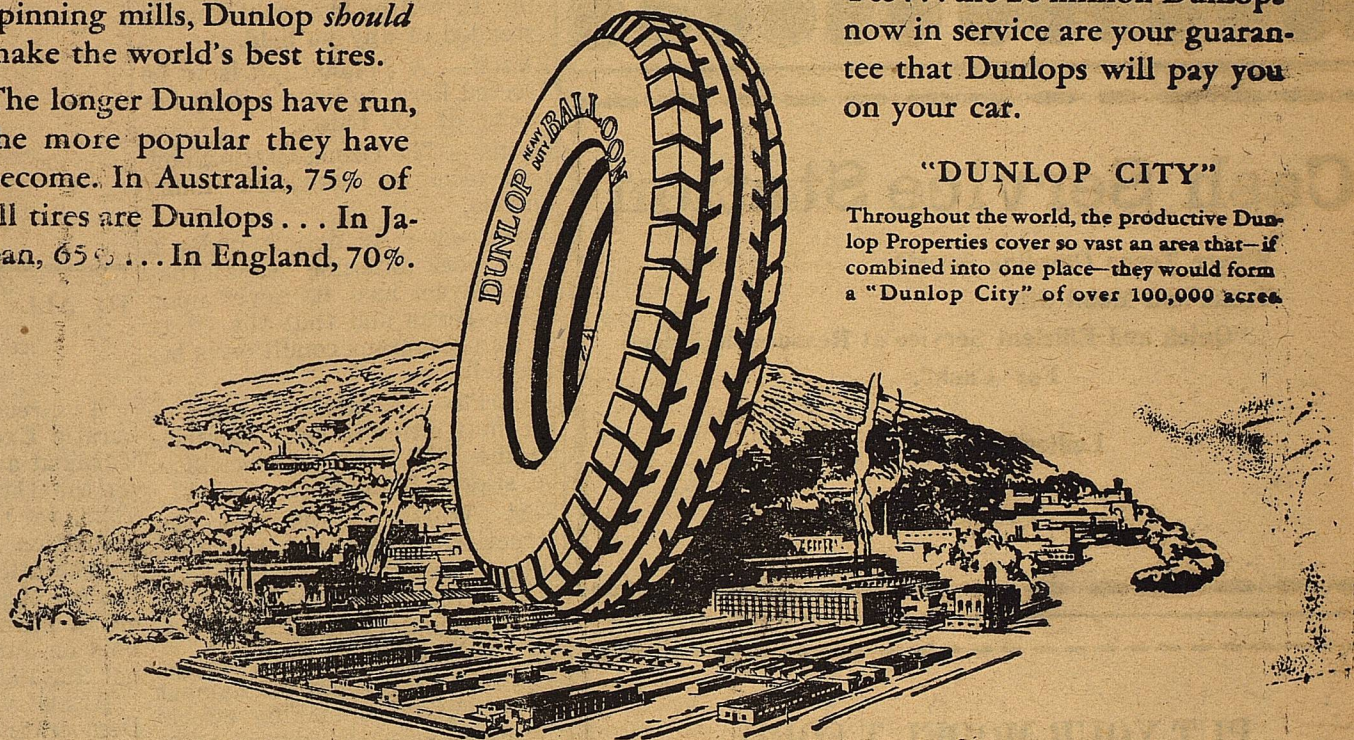
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
