## EAGLES DEFEAT OWLS 25-0

The Eldorado Eagles closed a successful season last Thursday by defeating the Big Lake Owls 25-0 on the home field.

The Owls arrived about 10 o'clock with the intentions of winning, having brought with them "Red" Haley, an ineligible player who was hired to play with them but Supt. Holt objected to Hal-ey's playing and he was not permitted to go on the field.

The game was called at 2:30 with the Eagles kicking an the Owls defending the west goal. During the first quarter the Eagles fought desperately to show their superiority over the Owls and as the quarter ended the Eagles felt their victory assured, although they had not scored, they had kept the ball within scoring distance all the time and had gone over the goal line twice, only to be called back each time and penalized for off-side by the hede linesman.

During the second quarter the Eagles succeeded in crossing the goal line twice, each one counting this time.

On a quick hike from spread for mation, Stewardson ran to the 15 yard line and then took a pass from Ratliff, crossed the goal line. The try for point failed.

The Eagles kicked to the Owls again and they were soon forced to punt. W. Murphy returning the ball almost back to the line of scrimmage. By a series of off tackle plays and cut backs, McClatchey crossed the line for another six points during the second quarter. The extra point was made by a pass to Graves.

The second half began with Eldorado kicking and Big Lake defending the east goal. The Eagles soon gained possession of the ball and after drawing a 15 yard penalty were forced to punt for the first and only time during the game.

Big Lake seemed to have taken advantage of this break and made two first downs, only to be stopped and forced to punt near mid-field.

The Eagles marched rapidly down the field for another touchdown. Stewardson plunging the ball over for the score. The try for extra point failed as the quarter ended.

The last quarter seemed to mean a great deal to the boys. With their hard tackling and outstanding offense, Big Lake was not allowed to keep the ball but very little. Prince Murphy crossed the line on a cut back for the final score. The extra point failed.

Again the Eagles kicked and after several attempts to gain the Owls punted. Eldorado gained possession of the ball and marched rapidly up the field to the ten yard line as the time keepers blew their whistle, cheating Captain Ratliff out of a touchdown.

Big Lake team was the outstanding star for the visitors. Playing a very hard game, both on offense and defense.

Officials of the game were: Lyonelle Ballew, referee, Joe Williams, umpire, and head linesman was furnished by Big Lake.

Leidecker, John Funderlater, Mart Funderlater of San Angelo, and Tom Henderson, an Eldorado ranchman, encountered the pay sand at 3,075 feet and was flowing irregular heads at an initial rate of 300 barrels daily.

No. 1 Loving is being drilled by the Bryson Oil and Gas Company, which is owned by the three San Angelo men and the Eldoradoan. The company has drilled one other test in the county in which oil was encountered, but casing trouble prevented a complete development of the showing.—San Angelo Standard

## TERRACING DEMONSTRATED ON DECEMBER 11th.

L. E. Sumner, County Agent, announces that a one day terracing school will be held in Schleicher County on Wednesday December 11th. The first meeting will be at the Fair Grounds and will start at 9 o'clock a. m. At this meeting M. R. Bently, Agricultural Engineer for the Extension Service of A. & M. College will explain the use of farm level and other instruments and machinery used in constructing terracing. He will also discuss the different types of terraces used and especially the ones best suited for this county for water conservation.

A. K. Short representing the Federal Land Bank of Houston in its conservation department will speak on the value of terracing and soil conservation.

After the morning meeting the party will go to some farm where several terraces will be constructed so that those attending may see the proper type of construction. The place of this meeting will be announced at the close of the morning meeting. All farmers and other business men are urged and invited to attend this meeting.

muddy and confused, his speech will show it. So why not prepare yourself so that you can express your self as a person who is trying to make an impression on your fellowmen as one who is at least partly educated.

2. Gentle manners; This means that one should have such a bearing as indicates self respect, independence and courage together with a constant regard for other people's rights and feelings. The best bred man in any company is one who makes the fewest people uncomfortable, says Swift.
3. Good taste; All education is a matter of getting rid of certain tastes and acquiring others. One is not necessarily educated when he reads good books; he is educated only when he likes to read good books. The only way to like the best things is to get familiar with them.
4. Reflection, intellectual growth and efficiency: Reflection is turning things over in your mind. The ignorant judge by jumps. They receive and respond to impression only. In the educated mind every near idea must have time to incubate. It is the educated man who turns chaotic things into facts.

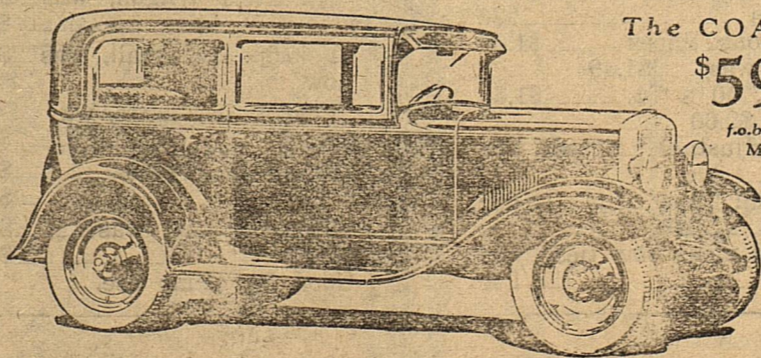

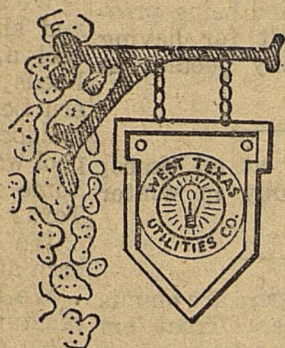
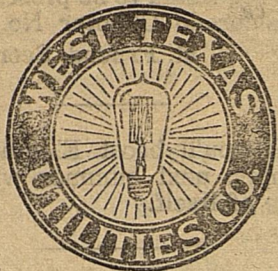

They admitted that the officers had no right to enter his home without a search warrant and the learned judges expressed doubt as to the guilt of the bootlegger had he taken a shot at the officers but they maintained that the evidence had lost none of its power even if it were obtained illegally.

What are the ethics in the case? Which court takes the sensible viewpoint?

But why talk of ethics in governmental procedure? Doesn't the U. S. Treasury Department encourage its citizens to spy on one another by offering a bribe to the informer whose story enables the government to convict the man or woman that brings a hundred dollars worth of goods out of the country without paying duty? A percentage of the duty and fine goes to the informer—and Uncle Sam pays it.—Sunset.
