State Forces Dumping Regulations

Many McLean citizens have been concerned about the landfill site for dumping garbage since new government regulations went into effect in October.

For years McLean citizens dumped their trash at a site outside the city limits with no restrictions on when or how to do it.

But on April 2, 1976, the city received a letter from the Texas Department of Health Resources, signed by Ron Freeman, director of Environment and Consumer Health Protection. In that letter the city was cited for 10 violations of state regulations regarding the disposal of trash or "solid waste," in the jargon of the government agency.

Included in the violations cited were that the city had improper earth covering procedures, no attendant on duty, excessive wind-blown waste, scavenging was permitted, and fencing of the site was inadequate.

In the letter, Freeman stated, "Failure to comply with this notice (within 60 days) may result in the assessment of applicable penalties as set forth in the 'Solid Waste Disposal Act', Article 4477-7, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes."

A 56-page booklet is on file at the McLean city hall stating the regulations that the city must follow to

be in compliance with the state law regarding the disposal of solid waste.

As a result, the city now must maintain a sanitary landfill that is fenced with an attendant on duty three days of each week. Citizens must pay for every

load of trash taken in, and they may not take anything out of the dump.

City officials say their hands are tied, since they must comply with state law, and they recommend that concerned citizens write their state representatives.

Renovation Of Swimming Pool Okayed

A controversy about the McLean Country Club swimming pool was resolved Monday night when more than 50 members met with board members to air their opinions.

Spokesman for the group was F. Jake Hess, who listed needed repairs to the swimming pool and gave estimated repair costs. The need for a pool supervisor and maintenance man also was noted.

After a discussion of facts and figures for pool maintenance, board members adjourned to vote on the suggestions.

Upon their return to the open meeting, the board members announced approval of disbursement of almost \$8,000 for needed repairs and additions, including new concrete work around the pool, with an artificial turf covering to prevent further concrete erosion and to act as a non-slip surface.

Hess and Sam Haynes are co-chairmen of a committee in charge of cleaning and repainting the pool and finding a pool supervisor. The pump and filtering system also will be renovated.

A new solar heating system will be constructed and installed by Charles Williams of McLean.

Also approved was a plan to sell family pool passes for a fee of \$60 for non-members. This plan will entitle non-members to pool privileges for one season. The fee will be for each family, regardless of the number of children.

The meeting was adjourned after plans were begun for a barbecue for club members and summer pass holders. Hess will donate the beef for the event.

Two Vehicles Roll Over Near McLean

McLean's volunteer fire department was kept busy this week with two one-vehicle roll-overs outside McLean.

Thursday, a car driven by Mrs. Donna Turner of Long Beach, Calif., rolled over twice, coming to rest near the highway median about four miles east of McLean. She sustained a broken wrist.

In a connected incident, one man received superficial cuts and bruises when he was knocked down by a van as he was crossing the highway to assist the woman, and was unable to see the other man. However, the McLean fire department was not notified of the accident until an hour and 10 minutes after it occurred.

In another one-vehicle roll-over, the driver of an army truck was injured when his

City Receives Tax Funds

The State Comptroller of Public Accounts office has mailed a check for \$1,424, 23 to the City of McLean as its May share of the one percent city sales tax.

The May allocation brings McLean collections for the year to \$6,629, 30. The payment in 1977 for May was \$1,109, 91, and the total at this time last year was \$6,574, 12.

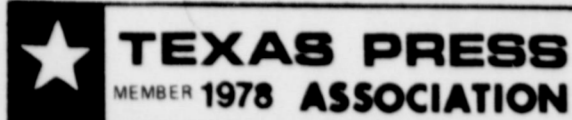

News from your County Agricultural Agent

PRAIRIE DOG CONTROL

Last Tuesday morning was the time everyone, it seemed, wanted to know how best to control prairie dogs. Inside of about 3 hours, about 5 calls or office visitors wanted to know about prairie dogs. There are numerous ways that have been used to control prairie dogs. Probably the most effective is to pour about 3 ounces of a grain fumigant in the holes and then cover the holes up with a dirt seal. Other products I have heard of and seen used include poison grain, drip gas, anhydrous ammonia, and auto exhaust fumes and hy-life.

However, I believe that for most folks the use of fumigant on individual holes is generally the best. With the recent rains now is an excellent time to use this grain fumigant. The moisture has filled most of the air spaces in the soil so that the fumigant is more effective. Also, the dirt is easy to shovel and fill the entrance holes up. Someone suggested using old quart oil cans to assist in plugging up old holes and then covering them with dirt. Prairie dog control needs to be done by everyone in a large area. Prairie dogs will travel several miles (5-8) to reinfest old dog towns. Therefore it is important for neighbors to work together in trying to control the last prairie dog in the neighborhood. If anyone has any questions about prairie dogs, please give me a call. RECOMMENDED PRODUCTS

After being around agriculture for a good many years, I've seen and heard about many different sure-fire, cure-all products. What is kind of

amusing is that many times the same product can supposedly be used as a fertilizer, weed killer, or insect killer, just depending on how you use it. These products tend to travel slowly around over the country but usually last only 2 or 3 years in any one particular area. That is usually about how long it takes most farmers to try it and convince themselves it will not produce any economic return. On fertilization, a farmer in this area should be very cautious when spending money for anything in addition to nitrogen and phosphorus. These are the only two nutrients that have been proven to give reliable response. Products applied in small quantities that are supposed to increase soil microorganisms just have not been proved by research in this area to be of any economic benefit. Generally, if a farmer took the same money and bought a fertilizer product, he would see definite benefits. Also, I hear and see people buying trees that are not recommended for this area. Then in a few years, the tree owner calls and wants to know what is wrong with his sick tree. It may have disease or insect

Here again many of the old, well known varieties just are not recommended for this area. I certainly encourage anyone thinking about buying trees to check with the County Extension office about a list of recommended varieties before buying. Although recommended varieties are not fool-proof, they certainly have less problems with disease, insects, and fruit production. BAGWORM HATCHING This is the time of year to look for the hatching of bagworms. Eggs that overwinter in the "old bags" hanging on ornamentals are now hatching. Insecticides applied while the bagworms are small are much more effective than insect-

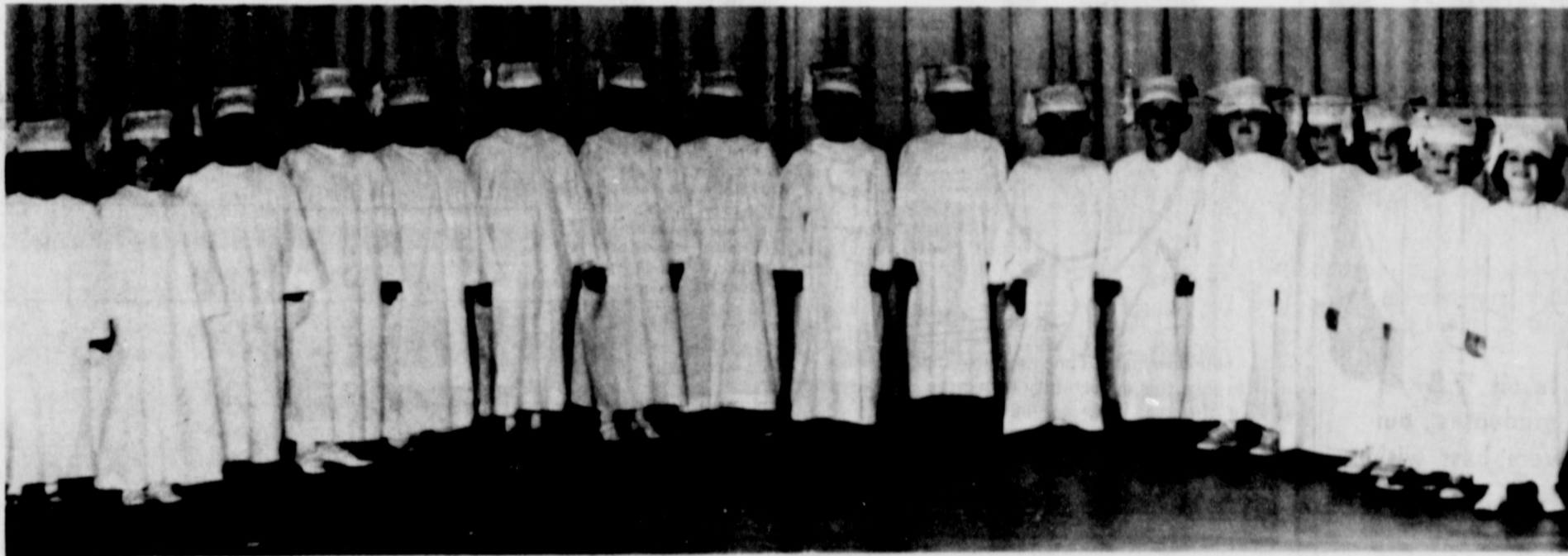
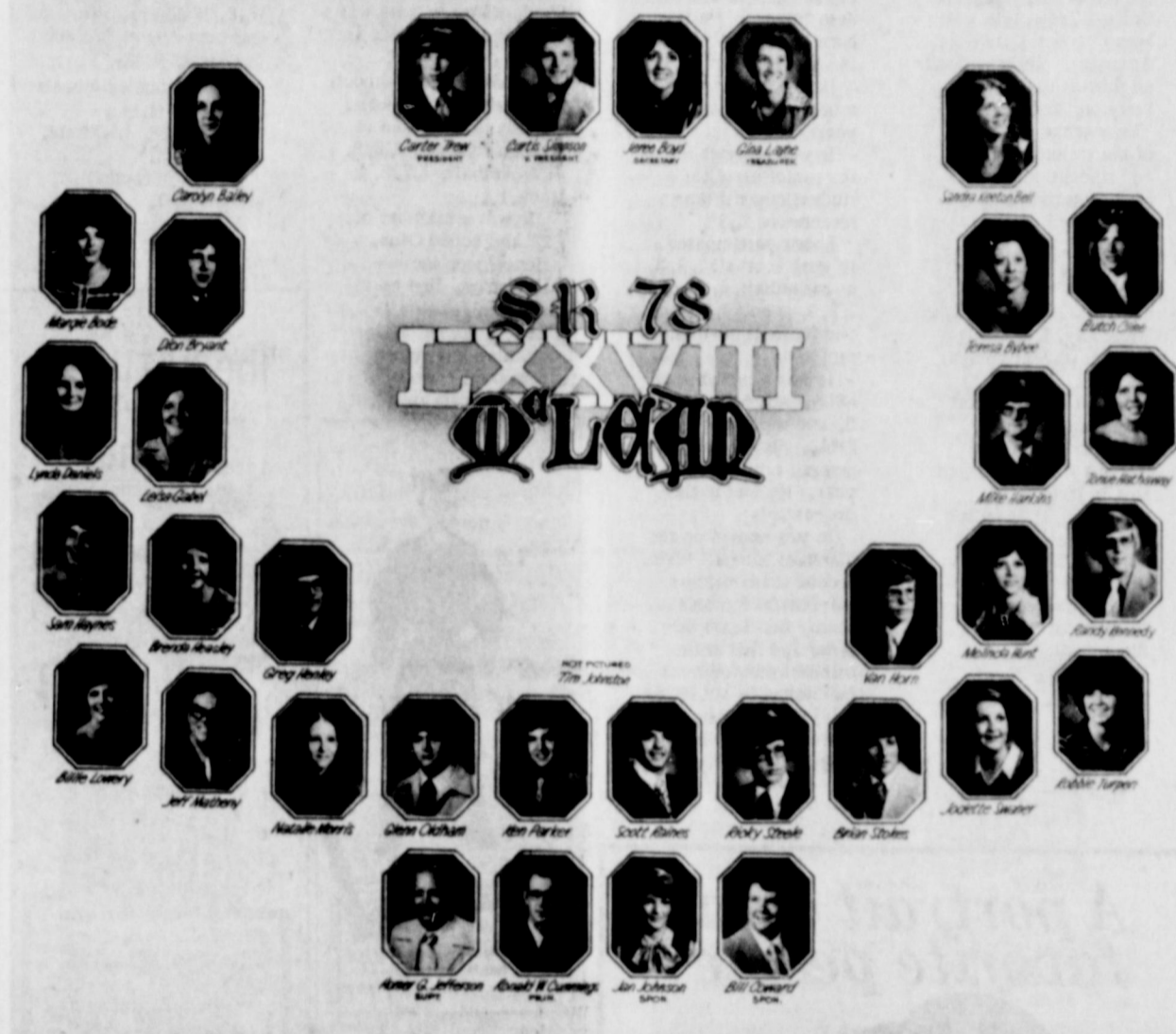

McLean News Poll: Seniors Like Rock Music, John Wayne

If the results of a recent poll are any indication, the McLean High School seniors of 1978 have a wide range of preferences and are not inclined to follow the crowd.

The McLean News, in an attempt to discover some of the likes, dislikes, and opinions of this year's seniors, conducted a survey last week. Twenty-three members of the senior class responded, and there were almost that many different answers to most of the questions.

Many of the topics asked about were on the light side, such as, "What is your favorite TV show?" There were a few more serious questions. In answer to that first question, two programs did collect several votes. "Three's Company" was on top with 6, edging "Saturday Night Live," which got 5 votes. Others receiving more than one vote were "Baa Baa Black Sheep" with 3 and "Eight Is Enough" and "Grizzly Adams" with 2 each.

In the best movie category, there was a clear winner: "A Star Is Born," with 5 votes. "Saturday Night Fever" and "Star Wars" were the only other films taking more than one vote, with 2 each. "Bambi" was the choice of one senior.

A surprising choice for best actor was John Wayne, with 6 votes. Apparently the Duke has picked up new fans among the younger generation. Tied for second were Jan Michael Vincent, John Belushi, and Kris Kristofferson with 3 each. Henry Winkler got 2. An actress who hasn't been around as long as John Wayne but still is no newcomer ran away with her category. The seniors gave Barbra Streisand 7 votes, while Ali MacGraw and Cheryl Ladd got 3

each. Barbi Benton got 2. In a choice between rock and country music, rock won handily with 12 votes, while country had 5. Three other types of music were mentioned, and three seniors indicated they like both rock and country.

A wide range of musical groups received votes in that category. Kiss won with only 3 ballots. The Bee Gees, Queen, and Foghat each got 2, and many others were named once each.

In answer to "Who is your favorite singer or musician?" the people mentioned varied even more widely. Gene Simmons, Boz Skaggs, and Peter Frampton, all rock musicians, each got 2 votes, while many others got one.

The same was true in the best song category, although "Always and Forever" did come out on top with 3 votes. The only other song with more than one vote was "Let There Be Rock," with 2. One voter (the "Bambi" fan) picked "Winnie the Pooh."

The 1978 seniors' favorite magazine is "Seventeen," which garnered 7 votes. "Mad" and "Playboy" each received 3, while "National Lampoon" and "Redbook" took 2 each. Basketball narrowly topped the field as the sport the seniors like most to play. It got 5 votes to 4 for baseball and 3 each for volleyball and football. Dancing, water skiing, and rodeo each got 2. Softball received one vote, which, if added to baseball,

puts that sport in a tie with basketball. One sport listed which can't be participated in too often around McLean was canoeing. The recent rain might make canoes more popular here, however!

Football was an easy winner as the favorite spectator sport with 9 votes. Basketball and baseball each took 3, while tennis had 2. "Bowling for Dollars" was one of the sports which received one vote ("Bowling for Dollars"?).

When asked what was their favorite sports team other than McLean, most of the seniors named the Dallas Cowboys. Seventeen votes went to the world pro football champs. The only other teams to receive more than one vote were the Cincinnati Reds, Clarendon, and Pampa, with 2 each. Our bowling fan voted for the Red Army hockey team.

In the voting for favorite athlete, the preferences again were spread thin. But Bruce Jenner, the Olympic decathlon champion, emerged victorious with 6 votes. In second place was Toot Tall Jones with 3 votes. Those receiving 2 votes each were O.J. Simpson, Harvey Martin, Bob Seagren, Roger Staubach, Golden Richards, and Tony Dorsett. All of those mentioned above ex-

cept Jenner, Simpson, and Seagren are members of the Dallas Cowboys. A couple of unlikely candidates receiving votes in this category were Linda Lovelace and Mae West.

The answers again were spread around when the seniors were asked what they like to do in their spare time. The number one answer was dancing, with 4 votes. Reading was named by 3 seniors, while each of the following activi-

ties got 2 votes: listening to music, playing the guitar, singing, and dating.

Some other answers were: run around, play golf, play tennis, party, just be myself, be with friends, get loaded, rest, work with Little League, sports, rope, ride horses, work on cars, electronics, play pool, play volleyball, design, hunt for ancient artifacts, go to the lake, sleep, and "some things are personal."

The most common answer to "What is your favorite kind of car?" was Ford, with 5 votes. Camaro and TransAm each got 3 votes. Thunderbird, Chevy, and Datsun 280Z each received 2. One senior just wanted "one that runs."

The seniors stuck mostly with entertainment personalities when asked who are the people in the world that they admire

most. John Wayne tallied the most votes again with 4, edging Carol Burnett, who had 3. Receiving 2 votes each were Barbra Streisand, Brian Hall (former Texas Tech placekicker with artificial foot), Clint Eastwood, Johnny Carson, and Ayn Rand (writer). Several athletes received one vote each, and animal expert Marlin Perkins got one.

In answer to "Who is your favorite politician?" the most common reply was "none," which was listed 5 times. Jack Hightower possibly was the most mentioned name, with 3. However, two of those listed "John Hightower," so there could be some confusion with John Tower, who received one definite vote. One of the votes was for "Jack Hightowel."

Receiving 2 votes each were Gerald Ford, Jimmy Carter, Richard Nixon, and George Wallace. One interesting choice was Tongsun Park, with one vote.

As the questions got more serious, the answers still varied widely. Seventeen seniors indicated plans to attend college, but those students were spread over nine institutions. West Texas State University and Texas Tech University were the most often named, 4 times each. Colleges listed twice each were Amarillo Junior College, Clarendon Junior College, and Southwestern Oklahoma State University.

Two seniors said they have plans to be married soon. Six listed jobs they intend to take when they graduate.

The seniors of '78 have a wide range of locations in mind to live after graduation or after college. Hawaii, Colorado, and Amarillo were the most frequently mentioned places with 3 votes each. McLean was mentioned specifically by only one senior, but two others said they wanted to live in or near a small town.

The President of the United States is considered the most prestigious job by the seniors. That position received 5 votes. Entertainer was second with 3 votes, and operator of own business took 2 votes.

The occupations the seniors plan to enter vary widely, with business receiving 3 votes and secretary/clerical receiving 2. Other occupations listed were: coaching, pharmacy, psychologist, work with children, oil-field, data processing/computer, physical therapist, electronics, farming, commercial art, architectural design, interior decorating, teaching, drafting, and forestry.

The 1978 graduates came the closest to being unanimous on the question, "Do you believe in God?" Twenty-two of the respondents said "yes," while one gave a qualified "no."

The seniors were asked to rank the following in order of their importance to them: education, family life, occupation, recreation, religion,

and social life. Ranked number one the most (11 times) was family life. Education was ranked first on 6 ballots, while religion was first on 3. Occupation was on top twice, social life once, and recreation did not get a

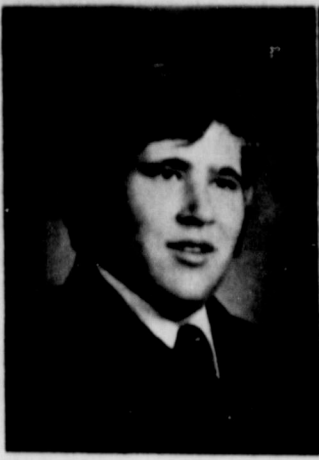

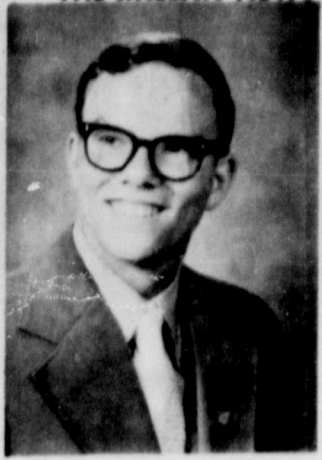

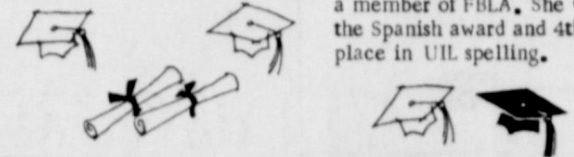

and education and recreation each were second on 2.

In a compilation of the rankings, the votes by the seniors would put them in this order: 1-family life, 2-religion, 3-education, 4-occupation, 5-recreation, 6-social life.

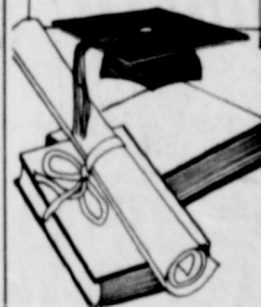

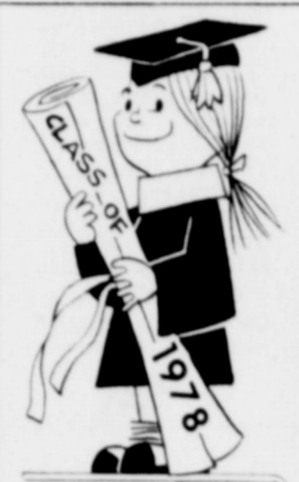

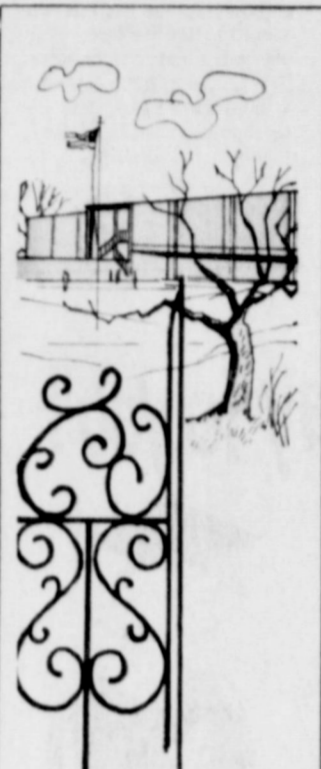

IT DOES MAKE A DIFFERENCE....
 We are living in an age of indifference. Nearly anything in the name of religion is all right as far as many people are concerned. In essence they say, "The Bible is a book of broad principles in which man is guided in a general way, but the details are left up to him." Does it really make a difference whether or not we follow the word of God precisely as it is given?
 Cain and Abel testify that it does! God instructed them to offer a sacrifice. Abel was careful to do exactly as God said, but Cain substituted something he thought was just as good. God accepted Abel's sacrifice, but rejected Cain's. (Gen. 4:1-4)
 Nadab and Abihu testify that it does! These were the sons of Aaron whose duty it was to offer incense upon the altar. They were to use a certain fire which God had commanded; but, when they offered "strange fire" before the Lord, fire went out from the Lord and devoured them. (Lev. 10:1-2)
 Uzzah testifies that it does! God had commanded that the ark of the covenant be transported on the shoulders of men of the tribe of Levi by the use of staves placed through rings in the ark. When the ark was placed upon an ox cart, this was a substitution of God's arrangement. Uzzah raised his hand to steady the ark and when he touched it, he died! (2 Sam. 6:6-7)
 Many other examples could be given; but these show that God will accept no substitutes. If YOU cannot give a "thus saith the Lord" for what you teach and practice in religion, consider what resulted in similar actions on the part of Cain, Nadab and Abihu, and Uzzah. 
