## TIGERS LOSE TO MUSTANGS 16-14

There was an overflowing crowd of cold and disappointed Tiger fans at Wheeler last Friday night as they watched the Tigers lose the game to the Wheeler Mustangs and also lost their chance at the District 2-A title. The disappointment of the fans was nothing, however, compared to what the Tigers and their coaches felt. The coaches, the managers and the team are to be commended on the fine football they have played this year.

Wheeler gained an 8-0 lead during the first period as they ran 35 yards for their first touchdown and went over on their conversion try.

This touchdown helped to get the Tigers started and they ran 88 yards in 16 plays, with Jim Hester for the score, midway in the second period. Hester then ran the conversion to tie the score 8-8 at half time.

Wheeler Mustangs had the opening kickoff in the third quarter and marched 41 yards in 16 plays.

Goad carried the ball the last three times, going in from the two to score Wheeler's second touchdown. Bobby Vamool scored what turned out to be Wheeler's winning two points.

But McLean's Tigers came roaring back and tallied two minutes later, making a touchdown with a pass-run that covered 85 yards. But on the big conversion try which was necessary to tie the score with Wheeler, the Tigers were unable to make it.

Neither team scored in the fourth quarter, with the Tigers going to the Wheeler 46 before time ran out.

McLean received the best of the statistics, out-first-downing the Mustangs, 11-10, picking up 146 yards on the ground to 126 for Wheeler and 85 air yards to none for the Mustangs.

The Tigers lost the ball twice on fumbles and one through the air, and picked up 40 yards in penalties.

The McLean High School Tiger Band put on a fine performance during halftime. They used the formation that they won superior rating with in Canyon recently.

This week the Tigers will meet the Gruver Greyhounds this Friday at 7:30 p.m., at Duncan Field. The Tigers will crown their football queen at this week's game.

## PUBLIC INVITED TO VIEW THE EXPANSION

The American National Bank of McLean will observe an open house in their beautifully remodeled building Sunday, Nov. 13. This will be just one of the many steps forward it has made since it was founded in 1909.

Organized as the American State Bank in August of 1909, the local bank was converted to a national bank in 1917.

R. H. Collier served as the first president of the then American State Bank. Some of the other organizers and early stockholders included A. P. Clark, D. B. Veatch, T. J. Bailey and J. T. Foster.

Since the bank's remodeling has been completed, they have a much larger building in which to serve the needs of the public. The building that once served as the Greyhound Drug has been added to the bank building.

Many new features have been added, such as a new conference room, new party and meeting room with kitchen facilities (which will serve for business and club meetings), new rest rooms, basement refinished for permanent record storage, additional awnings, new drapes, additional counters and more working area, new tile on floor and new phone lines with inner-office system.

The remodeling was under the supervision of John H. Jones, building contractor of Clarendon. The architect was John S. Ward Jr., and interior decorating was by Mrs. Frances Ward. Odus Electrical Co. did the electrical work, Bailey Bros. were in charge of the plumbing, James Hinton did the painting, and Builders Supply Co. of Amarillo was in charge of the floor covering.

Clifford Allison, who has been active in the bank since 1931, became president after the death of J. L. McMurtry. Elmo Whaley is the head cashier and Jim Allison is assistant cashier. J. Alfred McMurtry is vice president. The bookkeepers are Fern Boyd, Rita Jo Crockett and LaVerne Back. The directors are J. W. Collins and Milton Carpenter.

The public is invited to come Sunday and see the many changes that have been made. Refreshments will be served.

## Military Overseas Mail to Be Airlifted

Postmaster Frank Simpson of McLean today announced that personnel all first class mail, personal sound recordings (voice letters), and parcels weighing 5 pounds or less and measuring not more than 60 inches in length and girth combined, will be airlifted on a space available basis between the United States and all military post offices overseas.

Also, under Public Law 89-725—the Dulski Military Mail Act—which was signed by President Johnson on Nov. 2, 1966, second class publications such as newspapers and magazines published weekly or more often, and featuring current news of interest to the military, will be airlifted from San Francisco to the armed forces serving in Viet Nam.

Postmaster Simpson explained that parcels weighing 5 pounds or less and not exceeding 60 inches in length and girth combined, paid at surface rates, will be moved by surface transportation within the United States from the points of mailing to the port of embarkation.

The postmaster also reminded mailers that Christmas parcels weighing 5 pounds or under, though they are given airlift priority from San Francisco to Viet Nam on a space available basis, should be mailed no later than Dec. 1. Airmail, he said, should be sent no later than Dec. 10.

The deadline for Christmas packages weighing more than 5 pounds going to Viet Nam and other overseas military post offices by surface means is Nov. 10.

## NEWS OF CONSERVATION

A seep type pond was staked for Mrs. Vera Dial Dickey on her ranch southeast of Lefors. Seep type ponds are excellent sources of water for livestock. They are usually constructed where water is within four feet of the surface. They have to be constructed with a dragline.

Raymond Barrett has completed an underground irrigation pipeline on the farm he operates just southwest of Pampa. Dean Burger has also completed an irrigation pipeline on his farm south of Kingsmill.

### Don't Burn Residue

Burning of crop residue can be very harmful to the soil. Burning residues causes the soil structure to gradually deteriorate as the soil organic matter is reduced. The water intake rate, aeration, and porosity are lessened. Erosion becomes a greater hazard due to exposure of the soil to wind and rainfall.

As the organic matter is reduced, our soil becomes more compacted. This compaction restricts the movement of the roots, and reduces aeration. This causes a reduction in yield.

Gaseous elements such as nitrogen and sulphur will be completely lost by the burning. This amounts to about 30 pounds of nitrogen and three pounds of sulphur. Certain bacteria depend upon organic matter for their food. These bacteria which fix gaseous nitrogen into available nitrogen at an unusual rate of about 10 to 50 pounds per acre. Burning destroys the food for the bacteria.

One study carried out showed

the water intake rate of 1.56 inches at the end of one hour where the stubble was left on the land. Where the stubble was burned off the intake rate was only 0.83 inches per hour at the end of one hour.

At least 14 Texas streams are known as Hackberry Creek.

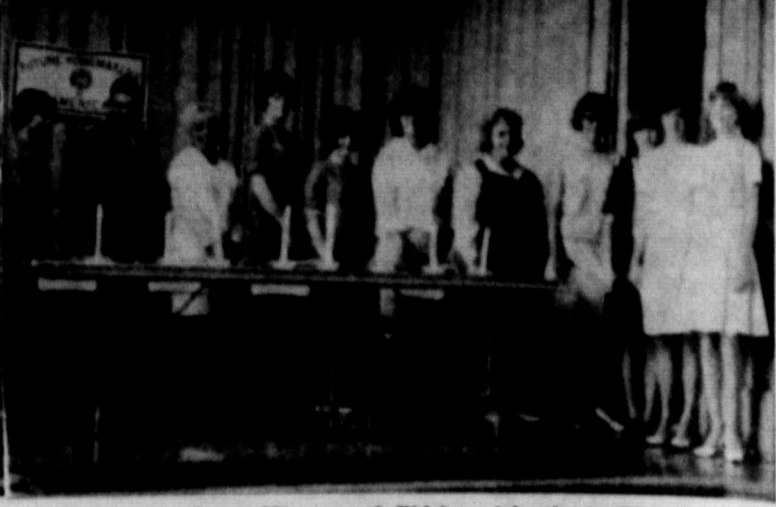

### McClellan Watershed Plans Now in Development Stage

The McClellan Creek Watershed plan is being developed at the present time.

I was with Joe Camp, engineer with the watershed planning party this week. They have been staking the center lines and spillway sections on the proposed site locations.

The plan is being developed and they are not sure how many structures will be installed. They have tentatively planned 13 structures on the watershed. The number will depend on the cost of the structures and the amount of water which will need to be controlled to safely protect the McClellan Creek Watershed.

Several of the site locations have stakes showing where the water lines and two feet above water lines will be on the adjoining property when the spillway of the structure is running at the expected peak flow in a 100 year frequency. We will be getting land rights, maps which will show the amount of water and size of structure and all persons affected by the structure.

I will review these with the individuals affected and then we can make definite plans as to each structure when we receive these maps.

### QUESTIONS & A

Q—I served in the regular Army from 1930 to 1935. Am I entitled to all this stuff under the new GI Bill?

A—No. The new GI Bill provides GI loans, education and other benefits for veterans who served after the close of the Korean conflict to the present time. That is, after Jan. 31, 1955.

Q—I am in college working for a degree in law. I heard we do not have to send VA certificates of attendance for our monthly checks. Is that true? Also, when can we expect the checks?

A—In order to avoid possible hardship cases, the Veterans Administration arranged to send out the first month allowance checks ONLY to veteran students when the colleges sent VA a certificate of enrollment. That applies only to the first check. All others will be sent to veterans attending college only after he sends in a certificate of attendance. Checks are mailed the 20th of the month following the month of completed attendance.

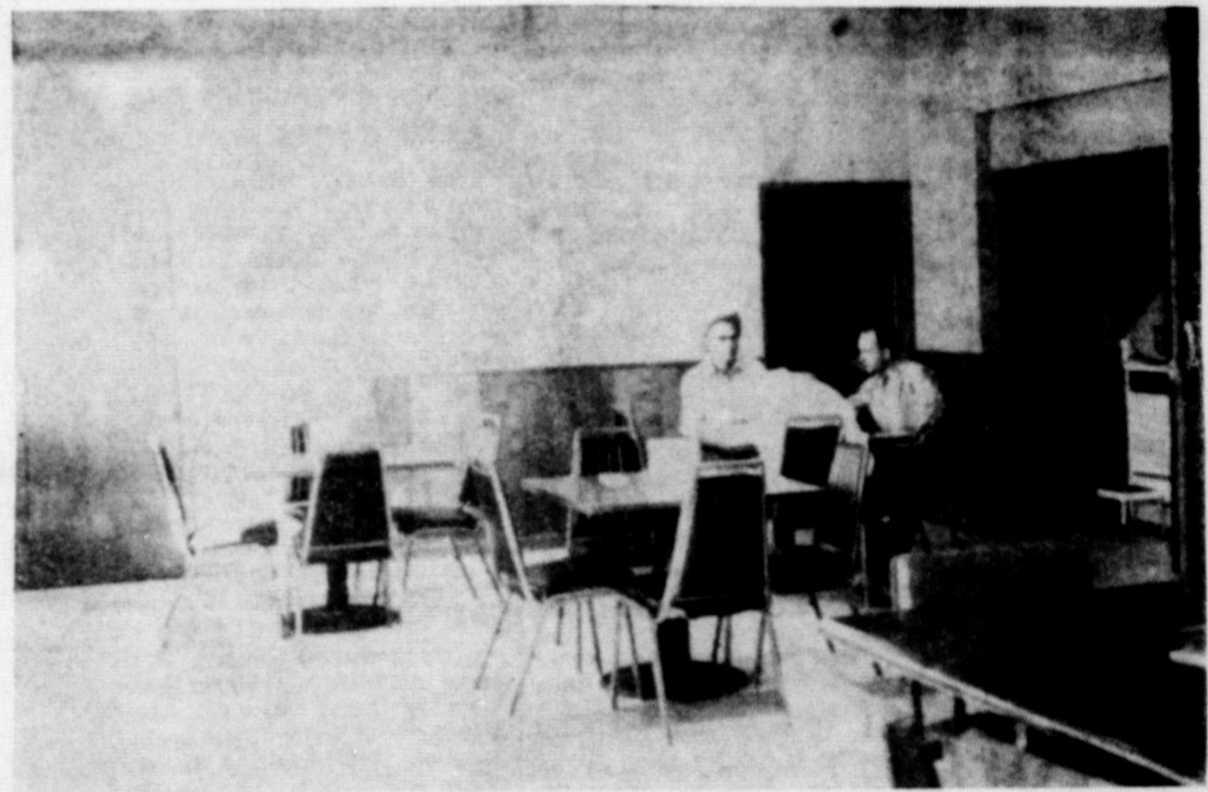

Texas veterans who have received GI loans for the purchase of homes were reminded today that they remain personally liable on their note and mortgage when they sell their homes if the new buyer merely continues the payments on the GI loan.

Jack Coker, manager of the Veterans Administration regional office, advised veterans that liability continues until the loan is paid in full or until veterans are personally released by the VA on the obligation.

"The VA has guaranteed and approved many home loans in the area under our jurisdiction," Coker said. "We have experienced cases where veterans have sold their properties and were led to believe they had no further responsibility for the mortgage debt."

He warned veterans who may be behind in their payments due on GI loans to be very careful before agreeing to offers by strangers to make up their back payments if the veteran will sign contracts.

Coker said that if such a proposition is made, veterans should ask the holder of their mortgages or the Loan Guaranty Division of the VA regional office for advice on the validity of the offer.

He stressed that the veteran remains personally liable for the payment of his GI loan if it is not paid by someone else. Even though the buyer takes over the mortgage and agrees to make the payments, until the VA provides a written release from liability, the veteran is held responsible.

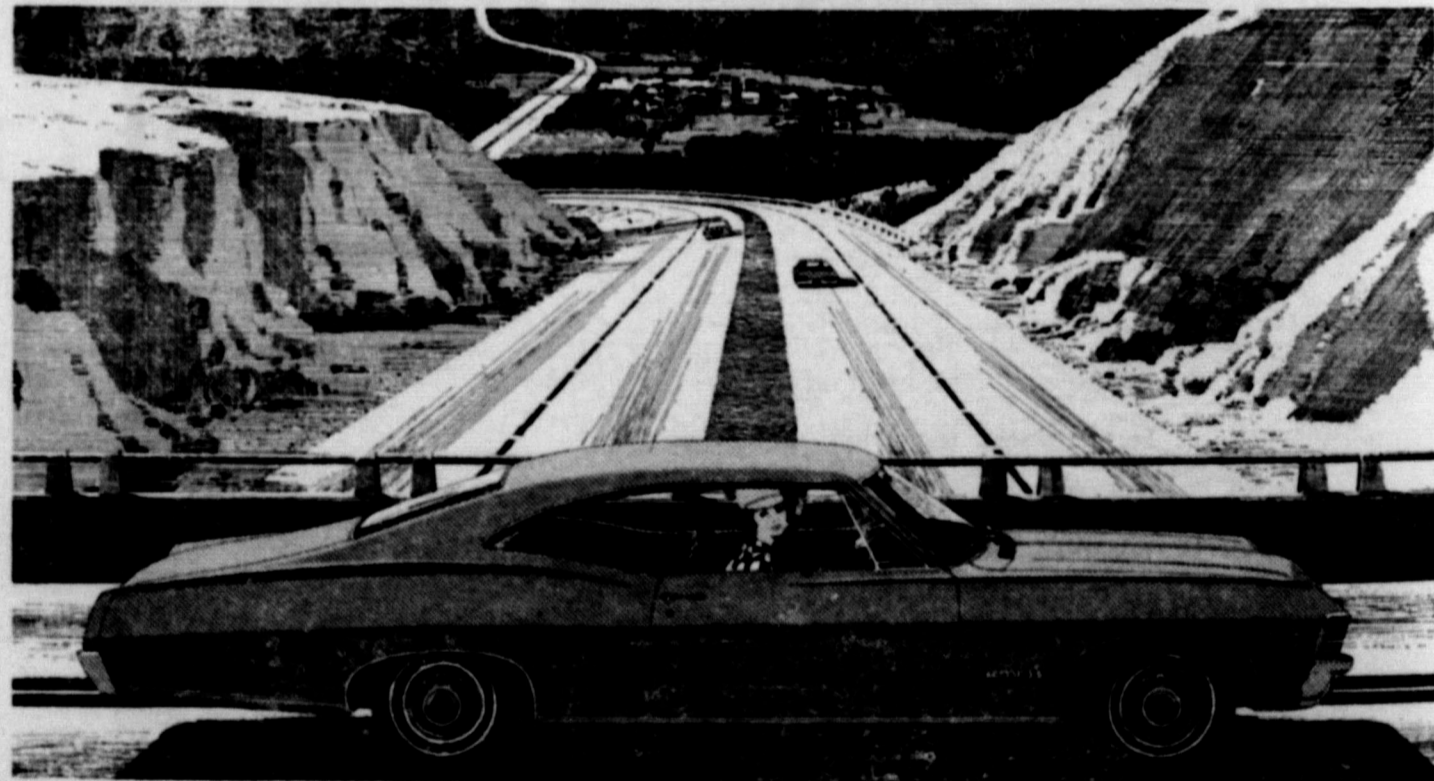

(Serves 4)

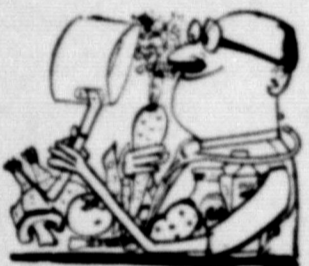
4 chicken breasts (about 1 lb.)

1 large ripe tomato

1 package seasoned coating mix for chicken

4 strips bacon

Remove skin and bones from chicken breasts. Cut tomato in 4 slices. Coat with seasoned coating mix as directed on package, reserving any remaining mix. Arrange chicken in single layer in ungreased shallow baking pan. Bake at 400 degrees for 30 minutes. Coat tomato slices with remaining seasoned coating mix; place in baking pan with chicken and bacon strips. Bake 10 minutes longer at 400 degrees, or until chicken is tender. To serve, top each tomato slice with a chicken breast; then top each with a strip of crisp bacon.

### WINTER SPORTS

What have winter sports to do with the doctor in the kitchen? Well, it's like this.

The more inactive you are in the season when the temptation is to hole up and keep warm, the more likely you are to get fat if you keep on eating as you did while you were water-skiing, swimming, hiking, playing golf or tennis or working in the garden.

Winter exercise is just like eating less, and it can be a lot more fun.

Maybe you're tired of hearing that the calories you take in must remain in balance with the energy you put out if you wish to maintain that desirable weight which keeps your clothes fitting and your silhouette attractive, instead of looking like the fat woman who was described as having double chins—all the way down.

### Fun Outdoors

The growth of winter sports in the United States is one of the more encouraging signs of the times. It proves that there is fun to be had outdoors as well as in, without necessarily spending the winter on a tropical beach. Skating is available almost anywhere, and there is skiing within easy distance of many localities. For those tied too closely to their work, these sports are possible only on the weekend. But there are other alternatives.

For the city dweller, there are municipal and other pools for swimming, and moderately priced facilities for handball and other regular gymnasium activities.

## AMA Advises 'Can't Cure Cold'

This is the season of the year when the American Medical Association reminds once again that you can't cure a cold.

And if anyone tries to sell you on the latest version of a so-called "cold cure" you can save your money.

Many of the classic diseases of history have succumbed in the 20th century to new medical skills and modern drugs. But the cold virus still successfully resists the best efforts of the world's combined medical research talent.

As the years go by more and more is being learned about colds and their causes. A number of viruses produce the symptoms that most of us call a cold, possibly as many as a hundred. The true cold is an infection with one or more viruses. Bacteria are believed to be purely secondary infectors.

Current research seems to indicate that colds are harder to spread than has been thought. Fresh colds appear to be more contagious than older ones. Children's colds probably are more contagious than those of adults. There still is much discussion among experts as to the relationship of becoming chilled or exposure to dampness to "catching" a cold.

What can you do for a cold?

No specific treatment, so far available, is effective against the cold virus. Any treatment is directed toward relief of the discomfort of runny nose, watering eyes, sore throat, slight fever and the other symptoms of the cold. Penicillin does not stop the virus, but may be prescribed by your physician for secondary bacterial infections. Bed rest, or at least inactivity, is helpful. Your physician may suggest mild medication to help relieve the discomfort.

Cold vaccines have yet to be proved of much value. There is no evidence that any particular foods, vitamin supplements, special clothing or exposure to sunlight or fresh air have any effect on colds. If a cold persists or seems unusually severe, see your doctor. Colds are great imitators and the early symptoms can mimic those of other more serious infections. Recurring colds may not be colds at all, but may be allergic attacks that require medical attention.

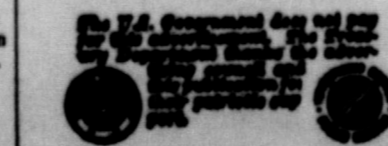
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## National 4-H Club Congress



This scene will be repeated in November in the International Amphitheatre at the Chicago Stock Yards. Shown here are young citizens from every state who attended the 1965 National 4-H Club Congress. The 1966 program in the huge area will again pay tribute to the 2 1/4 million 4-H youth throughout the nation.

**SIXTEEN HUNDRED** of the nation's finest youth will open the 45th National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago on Sunday, November 27. They will represent the 50 states and Puerto Rico. A group of Canadian 4-H'ers will be special guests. About 700 adults associated with 4-H Club work also are expected to attend.

The Congress will open with an impressive program based on the 1966 theme: Pursuit of Excellence.

The keynote speaker will be a woman who has pioneered a long list of "firsts" for women, and who will add yet another "first" to her impressive record. She will be the first woman ever to keynote the opening assembly of the National 4-H Club Congress, now in its 45th year.

She is Mary G. Roebing, chairman of the board of Trenton Trust Company, Trenton, N.J. She is first board chairman of a major commercial bank and the first woman governor of the American Stock Exchange.

Mrs. Roebing is one of the nation's outstanding women in finance, public service, social and educational activities. A widow, she has a married son and daughter and five grandchildren, so she seems to be well qualified as a parent to speak to a teen-age audience.

Before the 4-H'ers leave home, they are oriented as to what they will encounter on the trip to Chicago, which for many will be the first time away from home. They will travel by bus, train or plane. They will be briefed on staying in a large hotel, social events, educational tours, sightseeing and shopping on their own.

The delegates' main session will feature talks and panel discussions on the pursuit of excellence. Every boy and girl who attends the Congress is sponsored by a business concern or private enterprise. The sponsor also is host to the young people during the week-long event.
