Fatalities Increase On Texas Farms

Farming as an occupation is getting more hazardous each year. Although the Texas farm population is declining, farm accidents are on

Increased mechanization is a big factor. Machines allow the farmer to do much more work than prevlously, but they also increase his work load. And as fatigue sets in, the accident potential rises.

The number of Texas farmers decreased some 45 per cent in the last 15 years. But accidents have jumped an alarming 66 per The leading cause of accidents on farms is machinery, followed

by drowning, then firearms, falls, blows, burns, electricity and poison. cent of the more than 9,000 fatal the last three year period. This makes farming more dangerous than work in mines, quarries and industrial factories combned.

February through July is the most hazardous part of the farming year. Machinery accidents are crease throughout the summer and fall, then decline steadily from January through May.

John C. White recently joined the National Safety Council in urging greater safety factors to be built into farm machinery.

CROP SEEKING BEEF FOR HOPE

The Texas CROP Livestock Advisory Committee met this week in Austin to launch a "BEEF FOR HOPE" project as an effort to assist hungry people abroad, thru the churches, with canned beef from the United States.

As an advisory group of the Texas CROP-CWS board the committee gives guidance to the livestock appeals of the state program. The committee consists of church ranch land CROP leaders of the central Texas area.

Hugh O. Schulze of Mason, dedicated CROP worker since the program's origin in 1947, led the meeting in the absence of the committee's chairman, Dolph Briscoe, Jr., of Uvalde,

Three million pounds of canned meat have been requested by the overseas programs of the churches through Church World Service for 1965, reported Texas CROP-CWS Director Norman A. Sundwall of Austin. The requests have come, the director said, from the areas Texas Agriculture Commissioner of the world where two-thirds of Rep. Walter Rogers. the world's population suffer from hunger and malnutrition. The meat is needed for disaster relief in areas like East Pakistan where seven million people lost their homes through their most devasting cyclone in history; and for self-help programs in other areas where CROP food is provided as wages for those workers in local development projects.

CROP is a community resources program for Church World Service and has been authorized to handle designations for other overseas church relief agencies such as the services with the assistance of Catholic Relief Services and Lutheran World Relief.

By way of the "BEEF FOR HOPE" project ranchers of Texas will be asked to contribute a beef, concert in sacred music, sung by or its equivalent, to help CROP meet the needs for meat through Church World Service. In addition to receiving tax deductible receipts for their contributions, the ranchers will be given "BEEF FOR HOPE" stickers for their truck windows.

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



earlier document: "We hold these truths to be selfevident; That all men are created equal; that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable rights; that among these are life, liberty, and the pursuit of


"That to secure these rights, governments are instituted among men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed;

Some five years later, the first 10 amendments to our Constitution were adopted at one time, specifically detailing various basic civil rights stemming from the underying theory of the Declaration of
