Patrol Investigates 12 Accidents in February in County

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 12 accidents on rural highways in Gray County during the month of February, according to Sgt. J. W. Wilson, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in nine persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$4,090. The rural accident summary

for this county during the first two months of 1967 shows a total of 23 accidents resulting in no persons killed, 20 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$12,425.

Only one month remains for approximately 2,000,000 vehicles registered in Texas to secure the 1967 safety inspection sticker. The period set by law for securing the 1967 sticker ends at midnight, April 15, 1967, and there can be no extension of that deadline. The sergeant stated, "Any motorist whose ve hicle bearing Texas license plates that does not display the 1967 inspection sticker after April 15 is subject to arrest by any sheriff, deputy sheriff, city policeman or any officer of the Department of Public Safety and upon conviction will be subject to a fine not to exceed \$200.

McLean area residents interested in putting their skills to use in developing nations around the world are invited to take the Peace Corps Placement test at 1:30 p.m. on Saturday, March 18, at Room 322, Post Office,

The Peace Corps uses the placement test to determine how an applicant can best be utilized overseas. The test measures general aptitude and the ability to learn a language, not education or achievement. (If test scores indicate a limited language-learning ability, for example, the Peace Corps tries to place the applicant in an English-speaking country.) The placement test requires no preparation and is non-competitivean applicant can neither pass

The application form, not the placement test, is the most important factor in the selection of volunteers. Persons interested in serving in the Peace Corps must fill out an application, if they have not already done so, and present it to the tester before taking the test. Applications may be obtained from local post offices or from the Peace Corps, Washington, D. C.

The placement test takes about an hour and a half.

Administration?

A-Generally, all veterans and widows on pension rolls and parents who are receiving dependency and indemnity compensations as of October, 1966. Questionnaires will also be mailed this year to parents in receipt of death compensation.

Q-When I move next month, how should I tell the VA so tat I will get my pension check at the new address? Should I notify the U. S. Treasury in Chicago?

A-No. Do not advise Treasury Department. Notify the VA regional office where your records are located and they will advise the Treasury Department. Give your claim number along with your old and new address. Also, sure to tell your post office of the change.

Q-Will children in receipt of death pension be required to submit questionnaires,

A-Children will not be sent ques tionnaires. However, any child that has an annual income exclusive of earned income in excess of \$1,800 should report source, amount, and date of income promptly.

Q-Are veterans whose only service was after Jan. 31, 1955, eligible for admission to a Veterans Administration hospital?

A-Yes, on the same basis as

veterans with war-time service. Q-A person who has no veteran status, but is in the service now, is he able to take training under the new G. I. bill?

A-Yes. Any person on active duty in the armed forces of the United Safes who has served on active duty for at least two years and continues on active duty is eligible to appy for educational benefts under the new G. I. bill. O-Under the new G. I. bill, can

training on-the-iob be approved? A-No. Apprentice, or other onthe-iob. or institutional on-farm training, may not be approved. Q-I am the wife of a totally disabled veteran. Can I go to school under the new G. I. Bill?

A-No provisions are made for a wife's education. You should check your Veterans Administration for all benefits available for dependents of those in your husband's condition.

Q-I changed jobs last year and now find myself driving about 30 miles a day to get back and forth to work. Can I deduct 10c a mile for this driving?

A-No. Commuting to and from work is a personal expense and is not deductible. Q-Are child support payments


