## FmHA To Hire Temporary Staff

The Farmers Home Administration will hire additional temporary employees to help process farm loan applications in Texas FmHA State Director J. Lynn Futch said today.

"We will begin hiring the extra staff immediately," Futch said. "The new employees will be temporary. They will serve for four months to help with the seasonal loan peak and to process loans for hundreds of farmers who have requested a review of their debt situation to see if they qualify for the new debt restructuring program."

Under the new program, farmers who are having trouble meeting their FmHA payments, may have their loans rescheduled or have up to 25 percent of their loans, up to \$200,000, set aside for five years with no interest. Farm loans held by commercial banks and other lenders that are classified as "problem loans," can be reduced by ten percent in exchange for an FmHA guarantee.

Army Pvt. Billy R. Corley, son of Jeanne A. Ridgeway of McLean, has completed a wheeled-vehicle mechanic course at the U.S. Army Training Center, Fort Leonard Wood, Mo.

During the course, students learned to perform organizational maintenance and assist in the repair of automotive vehicles and associated equipment.

They became familiarized with the functioning of automotive wheeled-vehicle components, fundamentals of fuel and electrical combustion engines, and the use of test equipment. He is a 1984 graduate of White Deer High School.

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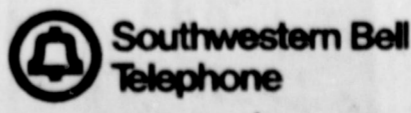

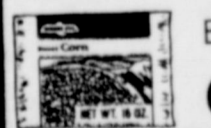

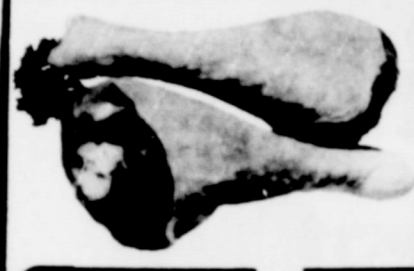
