

## Support Needed For HB 343

An Editorial Did you know that some real estate in Texas has been taken from owners by unscrupulous lenders because of an antiquated iaw that requires notice of a deed of trust sale be placed in three "public places":

The "public places" can be a utility pole, a tree in the park the courthouse bulletin This is all the notice board. that is required by our present state laws, and the chances are that the only "bidder" for the distress property will be the mortgagee. He and the sheriff will be the only ones likely to know of it.

Steps are being taken right now in our state legislature to correct this sad situation. A law has been proposed by State Representatives Jack Hawkins and Bill Ragg, House Bill 343, that will require effective public notices be presented to the public and that such notices will appear in a local newspaper of general circulation. Now before readers jump to

the conclusion we're interested in this law to acquire additional revenue for this newspaper, we assure you that there isn't enough of this type of business to make any great deal of difference to us financially. Besides as we're not the county seat newspaper, such notices would most likely go to the Pampa daily newspaper anyway

House Bill 343 has merit from several standpoints. It would provide adequate notice to the owner, giving him three weeks remember many joyful hours on to round up the necessary funds to take up delinquent payments. It would also increase the sale price of the property because proper notice would attract more buyers, thus increasing competition for the property and the bids would be more in keeping with the property's true value. The old practice of putting such

notices on the bulletin board and on a utility pole or sapling wasn't too bad back in the horse and buggy days when the courthouse was the center of things.

When house furnishings are well designed, well constructed March 16 in the home of Mrs. and well finished, they are pleasant to live with through the years, say home furnishing specialists at Texas A & M University.

> To have such furnishings, a family must begin with a plan which fits their house and their way of life.

> Since good design and workmanship are found at all price levels, the family should shop around. It pays to compare merchandise and check prices at various stores.

Learn to read labels and understand facts about materials and construction. Look for the manufacturer's name on the label. A reputable manufacturer "stands behind" his furniture should anything go wrong.

Study woods and other materials used in making furniture. A single piece of furniture may be made of several different woods chosen for very good

Learn to recognize good construction features. Look behind, inside and under to see how the piece is made and what materials are used. Examine drawers, doors and all visible joints, then test rigidly.

A good firtish is a definite in dication of quality. The back and underside of high quality furniture are sanded smooth. sealed and finished to reduce and shrinking. Inspect the finish in a good light.

A chair, table or any other piece must perform the job for which it was designed. If you're buying a desk or table, sit down and see if it is a comfortable height. A similar test will help determine the comfort and usability of other



CHILDREN IN CAMP It's a good idea to give written consent for necessary medical care if your child leaves home for a visit or a camping trip, or if you plan to be away for any length of time.

For example, a summer camp nurse may bring a boy into a hospital with an acute case of appendicitis. But the doctor may well hesitate to go ahead and operate without the parents' consent.

Is the doctor arbitrary, and is such permission just a legal technicality? No, he is well within his rights, though he may give first aid-but only for emergency treatment where a child's health or life may be at stake. He is likely to put off follow-up care until he can reach the child's parents. A relative or baby sitter generally cannot grant consent ofr a child's treatment.

Even an adult must request treatment and grant consent to medical care on his own before a doctor can give it to him. Children can

By going to your doctor you show your willingness and consent to accept his treatment. Your consent is assumed when you ask for a house call by the doctor, or if as a result of an accident you come to a hospital for emergency treatment. If you are unconscious, the doctor may well give you emergency care, yet later he should get your consent to further treatment. Almost everyone goes for sweets. And there a problem arises. The natural sweet taste artificial sweeteners now availof foods comes from their sugar content. Sweetness is insufficient in some, and overshadowed in others by the acids, as in some citrus fruits. And so the taste is supplemented by the addition of the sugar we know best, sucrose, derived mainly from the sugar cane and the sugar beet. And this has, in addition to its delightful taste, "dose ol' debbil calories!

Besides, it has been indicated by dentists as a contributing cause of dental decay. And the cruelest blow of all, nutritionists hold it in contempt as a source of "empty calories." Only the food faddists love sugar, and then only in its unrefined form.

## Sugar Useful

In defense of sugar, it is only fair to say that used in reasonable moderation, it contributes "emptiness" of mineral and vitamin contributions, likewise is counterbalanced by the rest of the diet. As to dental decay—the proper use of the toothbrush relatively few calories to a prop-

Saccharin, a white powder which has roughly 500 times the sweetening power of sugar;








For a quick and hearty meal try cooking pork sausage links or patties with a tomato or Creole sauce. You can add an extra touch by serving with toast points.

For variety, fill centers of baked apples with peppermint candies, chopped dates, raisins, nuts or orange marmalade.

Potatoes, prepared either creamed or fried on top of the range, are excellent with broiled dinners because this permits the homemaker to use surface units for cooking vegetables as well as potatoes.
