MEET THE CITY COUNCIL CANDIDATES:

WAYNE BYBEE

Wayne Bybee is 49 years old. He has lived in McLean six years. He and his wife, Sonnie, have two children, Billy Bybee and Vonda Dennis. He graduated from Lone Oak High School in Lone Oak, Texas, and from Mountain View College, Dallas, with special degrees in General Manufacturing Engineering and Mechanical Engineering. He is the owner of B &

B Enterprises. He states as his reason for running, "I am concerned about the city and its future, after I-40 goes around. I would like to see new industry in the factory building, that would employ some of our unemployed. I would like to work to have better streets in our city. We need to keep working on getting the hospital reopened, and many other things, that would keep our city alive."

HAROLD F. FABIAN M.D.

Harold Fabian, M.D., is 59 years old. He has lived in McLean 27 years. He and his wife, Bonnie, have two sons, Roderic and Gregory. Both were educated in McLean schools.

Dr. Fabian graduated from Raymondville High School in Raymondville, Texas. He served in the U.S. Naval Reserve, Corpus Christi College, and graduated from Southwestern University, Georgetown. He is a graduate of Southwestern Medical School, Dallas Branch of the University of Texas. He served four years of preceptorship and rotating internship, and has 30 years experi-

ence as a doctor, "the best school of all."

Dr. Fabian states, "My reasons for running for city council are simply because McLean has been good to me and my family, and there are a bunch of 'salt of the earth' people here, they deserve the truth and good city government. I can make no promises, except that I will promise to do the best job that I can; to present the truth, and dispel untruths; to think things out before I act; and to always act in the interest of the people. I have no axes to grind, and I understand the pay is lousy. I humbly offer my services."

MIRO PAKAN

Miro Pakan is 77 years old. He has lived in McLean 42 years, and in the panhandle of Texas, all of his life. He and his wife, Irene, have four children. He graduated from McLean High

School. He is a self-employed truck-driver. He states, as his reasons for running for city council, "I believe I may can help in our gas system, and all around city business."

BOBBY RICHARDSON

Bobby Richardson is 21 years old, and has lived in McLean eight months. His wife's name is Denise. He graduated from New Deal High School in 1981, and is part owner in a local service station. When

asked for his reason for running, he stated, "I want to try to bring more money into the city of McLean after the highway goes around. In general, try to make the right choices with the City of McLean in mind."

JUNE SUGGS

June Suggs is 45 years old. She has lived in McLean most of her life. She has one son, Randy.

She graduated from McLean High School in 1957, and is presently employed by Wheeler

Feed Yards as office manager. She states, "I have enjoyed serving on the council this last year. I would like to continue to serve on the council to help carry out the projects we have started."

The major topic of conversation on the Whittler's Bench (now that Houston lost to Georgetown in the N.C.A.A. finals) is the coming rash of elections in which we will have the opportunity to exercise our right to vote.

Of course, we will be hearing of Mondale, Hart, Jackson and Reagan until the Democratic and Republican conventions, and then, no doubt, Reagan and some democrat will monopolize many of our waking hours until conclusion of the presidential election.

Voters in Amarillo will be voting on the collective bargaining issue with the police and fire departments. This issue has been receiving much media attention, and in my opinion will be voted down by a large margin by the basically conservative and anti-union people of our area.

I personally think the most important elections for the residents of the McLean area will be races for city commission and school board places which will be held Saturday.

I would hope that every citizen consider it a personal obligation to make it to the polls and let his or her preference be known by the ballot. After a dozen or so years on the McLean school board and 10 years as mayor of this city, I know there is much, much more to operating a school or city than most citizens realize.

Federal and state regulations and local laws and ordinances often limit what a school or municipality can legally do for the benefit of the community, and care must always be taken to keep the local operations within the bounds of law.

It is always so easy to say "If I was running this town or this school I would do this or that, but in reality it is just not that easily done. New changes being proposed in educational circles, and the limitations of income on small cities, should encourage us all to study the qualifications of the candidates carefully and select the ones we think can meet the challenges of the future in a manner which will be of benefit to our children and our community.

Former Resident Honored At Basketball Benefit

Members of Amarillo Police Department and local news media squared off in a benefit basketball game Tuesday night to raise funds for cancer-stricken Amarillo policeman Kenneth Goodman.
Goodman, a 30-year veteran officer, discovered last June that he had melanoma cancer and has been undergoing experimental treatments at M.D. Anderson Hospital in Houston.
To raise funds to help with Goodman's medical expenses, police and reporters battled at basketball in the Amarillo

College Carter Gym.
All proceeds were given to Cancer Medical Fund for Kenneth Goodman, established at Texas American Bank by Panhandle Fellowship of Christian Peace Officers.
Goodman retired May 31, 1982, after 30 years of service with the Amarillo force. He spent his first two years as a field officer but worked the remainder of his career as police dispatcher.
In 1978, Goodman talked about his job. "This is the heart of the police department. It's one of the most important jobs," the McLean native said. "I don't miss being out in

the field at all, because I feel that what I do here is important, and I'm qualified to do it."
"I've never been disappointed," Goodman said. "I've enjoyed this job."
In June, doctors determined the officer had cancer after examining a mole removed from his back. Surgeons removed Goodman's lymph nodes in October. He will undergo treatments at Houston for an indefinite period.
Goodman is the brother of Mrs. Marjorie Fish, and the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. C.O. Goodman.

TAB is one of the oldest and largest state business alliances in the nation, representing nearly 4,000 member-firms in Texas.














Harris, Magee Represent McLean
