Allen Patman and Kevin McDowell placed first and second in the regional science contest at Levelland April 13. The top three in each

contest travels to state competition. Patman is the 18-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Ed Patman. He has recently been named valedictorian of the 1984 graduating class and also placed fourth in readywriting competition at the regional contest. McDowell is the 18-

year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Bob McDowell and Mollie McDowell. He ranks sixth in his graduating class, and placed 10th in agriculture competition at Levelland.

Also competing in Levelland were seniors Don Bode, Darin Corley, and Bryan Smitherman.

McLean qualified five tracksters to regional competition in Levelland during the district track meet Tuesday.

Heading the list is senior Scott Stubbs, who qualified in three events. Stubbs won first place in the long jump, with a mark of 19'7"; anchored the 400 meter sprint relay, which placed second

Senator Bill Sarpalius opened our meeting Friday afternoon, serving as guest speaker at our first luncheon. He was informative, and stayed around and answered questions thrown to him by various members of the press. He will soon begin battling H. Ross Peirot's school suggestion. We need to keep an eye on this and be prepared to write our representatives when the time comes.

We attended a workshop entitled, "How to be a Small Town Publisher and Not Become a Workaholic" conducted by Dr. Clayton Hoffman of High Plains Baptist Hospital; an advertising workshop by Bonita Advertising; a Writer's Workshop conducted by Rosemary Rumbley; and a roundtable discussion on "How to be a good ol' boy and still protect the public's right to know", led by Plainview editor, Danny Andrews.

Political IQ testing is a factor we have neglected too much in choosing public officials to represent us in government.

The "IQ" in this case stands for "Integrity" quotient...not intelligence. We ought to be able to expect intelligence from public officials, all right, but maybe integrity is even more important.

Too often we seem to get too little of either. And if "intelligence" is too much to expect, "integrity" certainly isn't...at any level of government.

It isn't unreasonable, it seems to us, to demand that a man who is to be the Attorney General of the United States should not only be knowledgeable about both legal and ethical standards required by his office but should have the personal integrity to maintain those standards.

Or at another and lower level of government, it isn't unreasonable to demand that the Sheriff of Hemphill County should not only be knowledgeable about both the legal and ethical standards required by his office but should have the personal integrity to maintain those standards...beyond question.

Persons who are appointed or elected to enforce

the laws and are sworn to uphold them should conduct personal as well as public business so as to avoid repeated questioning about the property, if not the legality, of their actions.

Edwin Meese, the nominee for Attorney General who is under intense investigation for apparent improprieties (and possible illegalities) is not the first United States Attorney General within recent

memory to score low on the Integrity Quotient... (remember Mr. Nixon's John Mitchell?)...but he shouldn't be placed in that high office to become a continuing embarrassment to his President and the People.

And by the same token, our own Sheriff C.H. Wright, who is seeking re-election in spite of repeated improprieties in his personal business affairs, shouldn't be returned to that high office to be a continuing embarrassment to the people who elected him.

We need to raise the IQ (Integrity Quotient) which we demand of people we elect to our public offices, and we'd better begin by setting higher standards at the local levels of government if we expect to maintain them at national levels.

Motion by Loyd Bybee, second by Suggs for Mayor to talk with McMorries and Associates to get an estimate on cost of seal coating more

streets and draw plat for utility lines to develop land along I-40. Motion carried.

Motion by Loyd Bybee, second by Fabian, all voting in favor of motion to pay current bills.

There being no further business to be brought before the meeting it was

upon motion by Bentley, second by Loyd Bybee adjourned at 9:15 p.m.

The city council met in a called session April 5, 7 p.m. in the city hall with members of the Industrial Development Corporation.

Attending the meeting were mayor Terry; councilmen Loyd Bybee, Wayne Bybee, June Suggs, and Harold Fabian, M.D.; and Industrial Development Corporation members, Clarence Pierce, Pat Durham, Jim Barker, Ida Hess, Johnny Haynes, Loyd Kurtz, Gerald Tate, Roger McCracken, and Jim McDonald.

The invocation was given by Mayor Terry. The council was presented with a petition to organize the industrial corporation board.

Motion by Loyd Bybee, second by Wayne

Bybee to accept petition. The Industrial board appointed officers. Roger McCracken will serve as president of the board, Jim McDonald as vice-president, Ida Hess as secretary, and Johnny Haynes as treasurer.

The industrial board then presented the articles and by-laws for the corporation. Loyd Bybee motioned to accept, June Suggs seconded, and motion carried.

The lease of the disposal land was discussed. Loyd Bybee motioned, June Suggs second for council to contact F. Jake Hess, who presently leases the land to inform him of the council's decision to run a bid for the lease of land.

The council will run a lease for approximately 57 acres. The meeting was adjourned at 8:55 p.m.

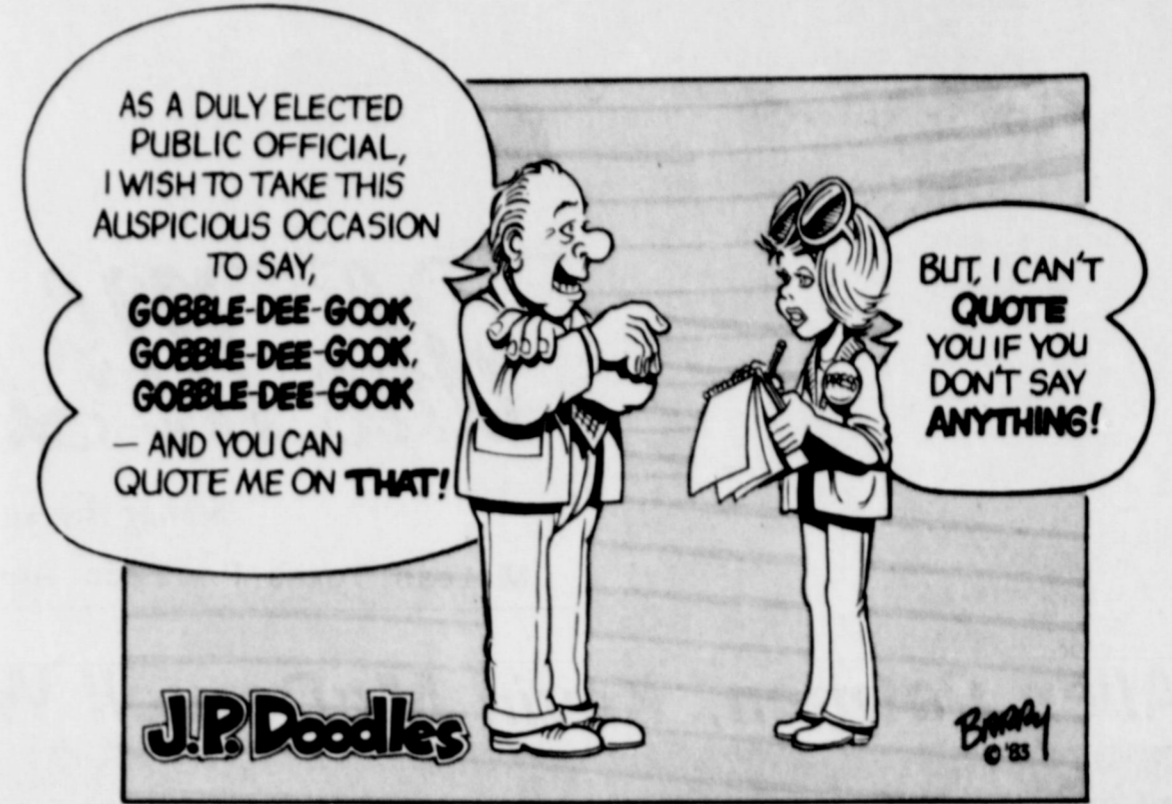

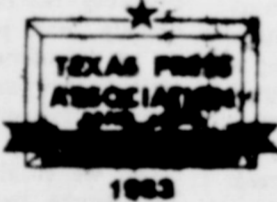

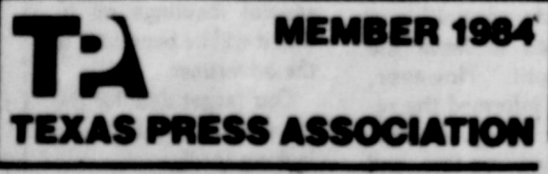


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# McLean Lions Club Sponsors "Journey For Sight" To Raise Funds

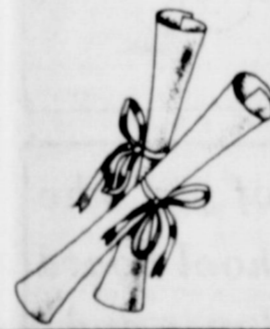

## County Extension Offices Slate McLean Tour May 1

A tour centered around the McLean vicinity will be held May 1. This tour will feature range, grass, brush and weed control.

The program starts at 9 a.m. at the Jake Hess II Ranch. The tour starts at a Shin Oak control site,

located five miles South of McLean on the East side of Highway 273 at a wire gate. Charles Beers, Elanco Products Co. will discuss Shin Oak Control.

The next stop will be on the Martinez Ranch to observe Weeping Lovegrass stands with Ronald Gooch, Donley County Extension Agent, leading the discussion. Also, Tim Fitch, Martinez Ranch Manager, will discuss

their shin oak control and

Cell Grazing system.

From there, the next stop at 10:30 will be just North of the McLean Rodeo area at the old Boyd Meador place to observe Gold Aster Weed Control plots. Dr. Pete Jacoby, Associate Professor, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, Vernon, and Joe VanZandt, Gray County Extension Agent, will discuss research and demonstration work on Gold Aster weeds.

The next stop will be at the Ken Stark Farm, just East of McLean to observe the Plains variety of Old World Bluestem. Chet Dewald, Research Agronomist, USDA Southern Plains Research Station, Woodward, OK will make comments.

At 11:30 a.m., the tour

will arrive at the Gray County AG Barn in the Southeast edge of McLean. Chet Dewald will then continue discussing characteristics and management of Old World Bluestems.

At noon, a free B-B-Q will be furnished by Elanco Products Co. to those attending the tour.

At 12:45, new brush control chemicals and methods will be discussed by Dr. Tommy Welch, Extension Range Brush and Weed Control Specialist, College Station, Texas.

The program concludes with a panel discussion on the Weeping Lovegrass situation and management practices. Extension and Research personnel will be on the panel. A lot of folks are

wondering about what to do with their Lovegrass pastures because of the lack of early spring growth this year. This panel will attempt to come up with some possible answers.

This East Panhandle Range Tour is sponsored by the County Extension Offices and Program Building Committees in Donley, Collingsworth, Wheeler, and Gray Counties. This is a joint effort to bring an outstanding program to the McLean area. There is a lot of interest in each one of these topics and many questions will be answered. Producers are urged to attend this tour and become up-dated on the latest practices adapted to this area.

tour and meal need to be called in before noon April 30 to one of the County Extension Offices.

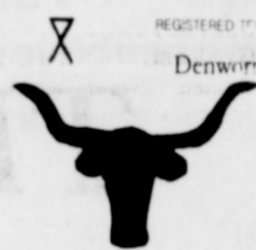

Information about your changing telephone service from Gary Stevens, Manager-Community Relations

### A look at "local measured service"

Perhaps you've heard about a new optional type of service that Southwestern Bell Telephone is proposing for its Texas customers. It's called Local Measured Service (LMS). Simply put, LMS would give you the option of paying for your direct use of the telephone network.

Southwestern Bell Telephone's LMS proposal to the Public Utility Commission (PUC) includes an option that would lower fixed monthly charges while adding a low usage charge for each completed outgoing call. Those calls would be billed on the basis of distance, duration of the call and the time of day.

Another option would be a "LIFELINE" service at a \$5 monthly fee. This service would be targeted to the elderly on poverty-level income. The rate would include a usage allowance of 25 completed outgoing local calls. Additional completed outgoing local calls would be billed at the rate of 8 cents each. Customers would not be charged for incoming calls under either plan.

### It's your option

LMS is for residence customers, as well as single-line, one-party business customers. And of course you could keep the current "flat-rate" monthly service if you'd prefer.

These new local service pricing plans would be available within 60 days of Commission approval in 89 offices which currently serve over 2,500,000 customer lines. The company plans to equip the remaining offices within two years after approval.

I think you'll agree there are several benefits to measured service. It would give you options for choosing the plan that gives you more control over your phone bill. You'd also have the option of paying for the service you used, rather than subsidizing those who use their phones a great deal more than you do.

While LMS as a standard service offering would be new to Southwestern Bell Telephone's Texas customers, it isn't new in Texas. Customers of three other companies in the Lone Star State — General Telephone, Continental Telephone and Cent-Tel — are taking advantage of LMS. And like us, other companies — United Tel, Palo Pinto Tel and Mustang Tel — have requests pending with the PUC.

### Customer interest

We're proposing the service because we've known there has been a need for optional pricing in Texas. Last summer we conducted a survey to determine customer interest in LMS.

We found that interest was strong, particularly among those customers making fewer local calls or shorter-duration calls. The results also showed that customers want wider choices in how they pay for service by having the ability to match their cost to their calling needs.

At this time, PUC hearings on LMS are set to begin Sept. 24 in Austin. You can look for more information about LMS in the special insert in your telephone bill.
