The appearance and perform ance of a durable press garment are affected if the interfacing or interlining is not completely compatible with the fabric.

Therefore, points out Jimmie Lou Wainscott, Gray County home demonstration agent, an interfacing must perform the same as the outer fabric in shrinkage, color retention and sewability.

Interlinings must have the correct stiffness and tensile strength with the right weight to provide a particular styling result and to add life and sta bility to the garment.

There is no such thing as 'partial compatibility" between outer fabric and interlining or interfacing fabrics. This is due to several factors:

1. If shrinkage and sewability are not compatible, wrinkles, paneling or puckering will re-

2. If tensile strength is not compatible, there will be variances in wear;

3. If color or whiteness are not compatible, discoloration

Without true compatibility between fabric and interlining, true durable press garments cannot be achieved.


