Tom Christian Appointed Interim Director Of Museum

Area rancher Tom T. Christian has been appointed interim director of the Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum. His appointment was announced Oct. 14 by Carl D. Hare, president of the Panhandle-Plains Historical Society.

Christian's duties will officially begin Nov. 1. He will retain the position of interim director until a new permanent director is selected.

The new museum director brings to the position a varied background in business, education and government. A native of Claude, he comes from a ranching family whose roots go back nearly a century in Panhandle history.

He is a graduate of West State University where he played football. After graduation, he taught and

coached in Canadian and at Boys' Ranch.

Christian was elected a State Representative for the 75th Legislative District in 1968 and served from 1969-1972.

He served as president of the Historical Society with four generations of his family claiming membership in the society.

Other regional posts held by Christian include 11 years on the Claude School Board, as well as past presidencies of the Panhandle Livestock Association, Panhandle Rural Health Initiative and the Armstrong County Medical Society.

He is a member of the Board of the Texas Panhandle Heritage Association and serves as a Regent of West Texas State University.

Area Fields Wet, Harvest Halted As Rain Continues

Rains Tuesday brought the maize harvest to a swift halt. Most area farmers had barely begun to cut in the soggy fields when rains hit Tuesday.

"Not much of this year's crop had yet been harvested," said Wheeler Evans Manager Nadine Thornton. "Rains earlier in the month did not hurt the crop as it was still in the ripening stages. The greatest threat should the rains continue for any time would be rotting of the stalks causing the grain to fall on the ground. Also weight of the grain may be reduced."

Tony Treadwell of RGM Ag and Grain said the crop has not yet been damaged but should a freeze come while the fields are wet, "turn the cows in." This year's crop, in that case, would be a total loss.

Local farmers are hoping for dry weather so that harvest can be completed. The recent wet conditions have not only slowed harvest but some have been unable to plant wheat as yet.

McLean Tigers Scare Booker, But Falls Short

The McLean Tigers got off to a roaring start Friday night in their game against the Booker Kiowas.

The first quarter belonged to the Tigers. After getting the opening kickoff, the Kiowas lost the ball when Pat Gomez recovered a fumbled pass reception. Six plays later, McLean was on the Booker 1 yard line and Jim Anderson jumped into the endzone for a touchdown. A two point conversion attempt was not successful and the Tigers led 6-0.

Booker got the ball back but quickly lost it again on a fumble recovery by Greg Littlefield. After five plays, Clint Herndon scored on a 12 yard run. Huey Green scored a two point conversion and McLean was up 14-0.

Booker was able to score once in the first quarter and twice in the second. With two unsuccessful point

after attempts, the Kiowas led 19-14 at the end of the first half.

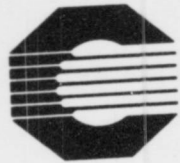



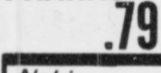

Irrigation Gas Users Continue Efforts

The local gas users association has continued to work with other gas user associations in the area and with the local suppliers of irrigation fuel in an endeavor to maintain irrigation fuel prices in line with the industry-wide decline in oil and gas prices.

According to Paul Fields, one of the user group organizers, since March of 1985, the prices charged for irrigation fuel have declined approximately \$1.30 per MCF.

"Unfortunately, the most effective price reduction came at the conclusion of the irrigation season," said Fields. "However, the gas suppliers will continue to pass on their savings to the irrigation user, and there is a possibility that prices for

the next irrigation season will be more profitable for the user."

Effective February 17, 1986, the lowest stated rate over 1,000 MCF was \$3.53 per MCF, the rates in effect for the past irrigation season. Note that the sliding scale predicated that the first two MCF's used will be at the \$8 minimum, then 8 more at the next rate, declining in cost with increased usage. "For instance, when the scale reads 'next 500 MCF', the user has actually used 1,000 MCF at that point and the rate charged will average approximately 4.5 cents above that stated rate.

"Similarly, when the rate scale reads 'over 1,000 MCF', the user at that time is actually being charged for his second 1,000 MCF's consumption, and would actually be paying about 3 cents over that rate."

Users of residential heating fuel are encouraged to consult with the gas users group in their efforts to monitor costs.

"The local suppliers have been very cooperative in working with us," says Fields, "and we hope to continue working with them in the coming year. These latest decreases will benefit all users, both residential and farm."

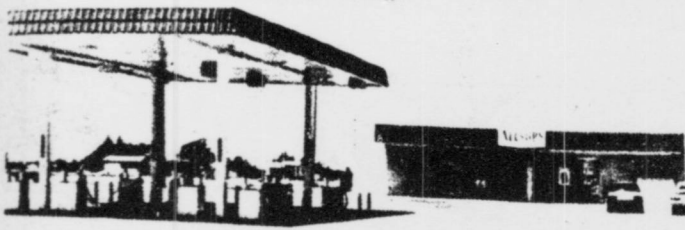
