

Plan To Donate Blood May 2

Coffee Memorial Blood Center representatives will be in Groom next Monday evening to conduct a blood drive. The Blood Center needs to collect 400 pints of blood each week from volunteer donors to meet the needs of sick and injured in area hospitals.

The community responsibility concept of donating blood was designed to assure a safer blood supply and to eliminate the non-replacement fee, a charge to transfusion recipients who did not replace the blood used. This non-replacement fee was in addition to the regular processing fee. Under the Community Responsibility system the volunteer blood donors do not have any financial interest to donate blood, but do so

freely to support their community.

In 1985 Coffee Memorial Blood Center adopted the Community Responsibility system and discontinued charging the non-replacement fee.

Community response in the Panhandle is among the best in the country and is responsible for the success of the community blood program. We are very proud of our volunteer blood donors.

The blood drive in Groom will be conducted at the Community Center from 4:00 to 7:00 p.m.



Public Notice EPA Lead Notification

The United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) sets drinking water standards and has determined that lead is a health. concern at certain levels of exposure. There is currently a standard of 0.050 parts per million (ppm). Based on new health information, EPA is likely to lower this standard significantly.

Part of the purpose of this notice is to inform you of the potential adverse health effects of lead. This is being done even though your water may not be in violation of the current standard.

EPA and others are concerned about lead in drinking water. Too much lead in the human body can cause serious damage to the brain, kidneys, nervous system, and red blood cells. The greatest risk, even with short-term exposure, is to young children and pregnant women.

Lead levels in your drinking water are likely to be highest:

1. if your home or water system has lead pipes, or 2. if your home has copper pipes with lead solder, and

-if the home is less than five years old, or

-if you have soft or acidic water, or -if water sits in the pipes

for several hours. Ways to avoid potential lead exposure are to "flush" faucets before use and to use cold water for drinking and cooking. You may wish to have your home tap water tested for lead content by a competent laboratory. You may also wish to check to see if lead pipes, solder, or flux were used in your home plumbing.

The water system for the City of McLean is tested every year for lead and it is well below the EPA standards. Any time lead piping is found, it is replaced with lead free piping.


