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

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Don Anglin Coordinates Air Waves

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February 5, 1989

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The following article was published in December edition of AirCheck Nation Wide Communications Inc.

WBJW, Orlando Chief Engineer Don Anglin is the Broadcast Society Engineers [SBE] frequency coordinator for central Florida.

Don helped set up the

Orlando SBE chapter about 15 years ago. He helped develop the concept of frequency coordination well before it was adopted on a national level.

typical situation requiring his expertise might be a televised race at Daytona, with its portable cameras, blimp cameras, car

and all using cameras, different microwave frequencies.

The last week of September, however, was definitely not typical.

As the media converged at Cape Canaveral to cover the launch of the space shuttle Discovery, it was Don's responsibility to sort out and allocate the nearly 250 frequencies the media needed, to make sure they didn't interfere with over 300 frequencies assigned to NASA, the Kennedy Space Center and other agencies in the area.

But Don's interest in the Discovery launch went beyond all that.

Before he BJ105, Don spent a lot of time at Cape Canaveral, starting with the initial construction phase in 1956. He saw it all: the Atlas launches, the first manned flight, the lunar mapping missions, the unmanned lunar landing, Neil Armstrong's 'giant leap for mankind."

He was the countdown voice for the John Glenn orbital mission. At one point, he was in charge of all Eastern Test Range radars and computers at the Cape and at tracking stations worldwide.

So how do you get from there to a radio station?

"I saw the handwriting on the wall," says Don. Funding cutbacks in the early '70s slowed the momentum of the space program, and suddenly NASA found itself having to tighten its belt.

In 1973 Don signed on as Vice President/Engineering with the Rounsaville radio chain, former owner of

Council Discusses Options On Land Fill, Maintaining Officer.

Mayor George M. Green with the need for a officer, released on January 31, the minutes of the City Council meeting and are as follows:

The City Council of McLean, met in special session Thursday, January 26, 1989 in the Lovett Memorial Library meeting room. The meeting was called to order by Mayor Green at 7:33 p.m.

Members present were Wayne Bybee, Dale Glass, Martha Jo Bailey, W.C. Simpson, Harold Smith and George Green.

Others present were Stella Lee, Bob Glenn, Michael Colley, Dwight Brandt, Rick Harris, Jamie Johnson and numerous citizens.

The Refuse Department

was a main item on the agenda. Dwight Brandt, engineer, explained the new rules of operating a landfill. They also made suggestions as how to close the landfill and covering and seeding the area by October 1, 1989. Bybee suggested continuing the pick-up service by the city and hauling to Pampa or Shamrock. A motion by Bybee, seconded by Glass to continue a pick-up service for clean-up week until the landfill closes. The vote was unanimous. New laws governing City Landfills make it almost impossible financially for small cities and towns to operate a local landfill. An example is a landfill must be covered daily with four inches to five option the Council looked into was to contract the removal of refuse. This would eliminate jobs in McLean and very probably be more expensive.

A motion made by Glass and seconded by Bailey to close, cover and seed the landfill .. . to specifications by July 31, 1989 was passed.

The Police Department was discussed in length. The floor was opened for discussion by the public concerning the local Police officer. Subjects discussed were the peoples vote at the time of the questionnaires sent out in 1987. The questions dealt

enforcement of city ordinances and animal control. clean up properties and traffic problems.

expressed concern to the way the animal control was conducted. Citizens were also concerned with the fact that passengers were riding in the Police Officer's unit. There was concern as to who is liable in case of an accident. Some questioned the decision to a have a police officer. Many brought up the fact that the citizens of McLean filled out questionaries concerning this fact in 1987 and decided that an officer was not needed. Other law enforcement agencies authority were discussed, including the Sheriff's department, Local DPS, etc.

Mr. Hess explained the need for a new sewer service. Mr. Johnson, Engineer for Mr. Hess, appeared before the council to explain, pressure sewer units as opposed to gravity flow systems.

A motion by Bailey and seconded by Glass, was made to go into executive session at 9:20 p.m. Discussed were the police officers duties, liability, jurisdiction, dress code, insurance and need for an officer. Also discussed was a sewer system, suggested by Hess or system.

A motion was made by Bailey and seconded by Smith to return to regular session at 9:50 p.m.

Glass made a motion and was seconded by Bybee to continue with the police officer and support his actions. Three councilmen voted in favor and two were against.

A motion by Glass and seconded by Bailey to require Mr. Hess to furnish the City with a feasibility study and cost analysis for both types of sewer systems before any further work or decisions can be made.



Cattle Should be one of the bright spots in agriculture in 1989, according to some economists who see prices moving up early in the year, then sharply higher the second half.

A federal judge has dismissed a 12-year-old antitrust case against meatpackers IBP, Inc, and Excel Corp. and the Yellow Sheet publisher, ruling there was no "credible evidence" to support plaintiffs' allegations. A rehearing has been requested.

Regulators have closed the Richmond Production Credit Assn., a \$20 million institution in Sugar Land, that offered short-term crop production loans. El Campo PCA will temporarily provide services to the Richmond PCA territory.

Some cropped wetlands and scoureroded croplands are eligible for the Conservation Reserve Program if they were cropped in 2 of the 5 years from 1981-85 and erosion was caused by outof-bank water flows, savs USDA. The 8th CRP sign-up. period is February 6-24.

USCS Chief Wilson Scaling is reminding farmers that the 1985 Farm Bill requires those who farm highly erodible land to develop a conservation plan and have it approved by Dec. 31, 1989, in order to remain eligible for USDA farm program benefits.

National grasslands graz-ing fees in 9 states including Texas and Oklahoma will be \$2.29 per head per month, as of March 1. National forest fees in 15 states including Oklahoma will be \$1.86. That's a hike over 1988 of \$.46 for grasslands and \$.32 for forests.

Former U.S. Rep Beau Boulter, R-Texas, is a leading candidate for chief of the Immigration and Naturalization Service, according to the Dallas Times Herald.

Mild Weather and dry soil conditions in wheatgrowing areas of the Plains

states have forced cattle into feedlots lighter and earlier than normal, which may increase cattle on feed during the second quarter, says KRF News.

The Mexican government will purchase about 200,000 more U.S. dairy cows over the next 3 years in addition to the 30,000 it usually imports annually from the U.S. and Canada. The cows will be sold to producers on credit and repaid through milk sales.

National Meat Month begins February 1, and is expected to boost beef sales, which have been slowed by wholesale prices,

according to analysts. U.S. cattle producers aren't the only ones concerned about industry concentration. Now comes word that Australia is worried "concetration of about power" should market Japanese investors integrate from the farm to the marketplace.

It's Law

It is illegal now for advertisers or solicitors to use the name "Social Security' to mislead the public.

Also banned is the use of copies of Social Security cards or emblems to give a false impression that the government is endorsing a particular product, service or organization, said Larry Mayo, Social Security branch manager in Pampa.

Restricting use of Social Security's name was one of the provisions of the "Medicare Catastrophic Coverage Act of 1988" signed into law last July.

The law covers books, advertisements, circulars, pamphlets, radio television broadcasts, and other communications. Civil money fines can be imposed for violations, May said.

The new law will help protect the public from unscrupulous persons who try to prey upon fears or ignorance. The best place to get correct information is directly from the Social Security office, he said.

Name changes, earning history reports and other services are always free from the Social Security Many Administration. services can be handled with just a phone call, Mayo added.
