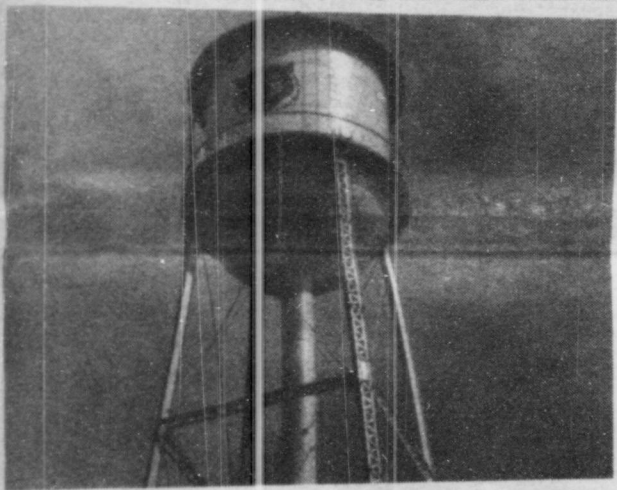
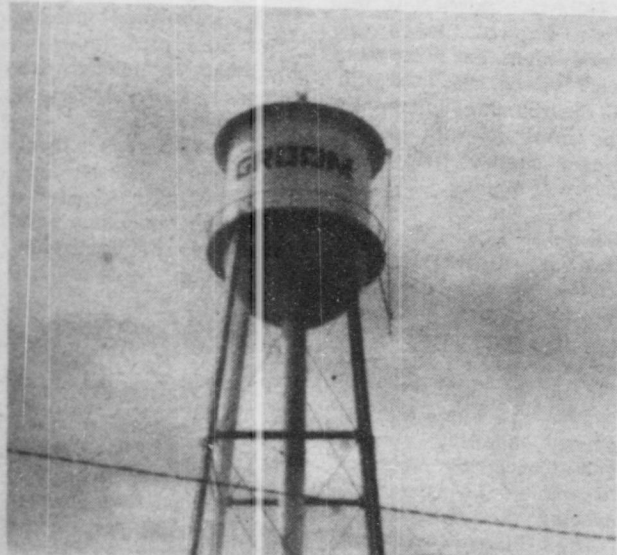

Impact Of Polish Settler On The Area Topic Of Final Lecture

The influence of "The Polish" settlers on the area will be discussed by Mrs. Carolyn Rapstine of White Deer in the final lecture of the series, "Impacting a Region," at 3:00 p.m., Sunday, April 29 at the Square House Museum in Panhandle.

Extensive research on Polish immigration from Prussia in the 1850's and

their subsequent settlement in Carson County in the early 1900's was conducted by Mrs. Rapstine and Mrs. Proxie Warminski of White Deer. This research, including several trips to Poland, led to the writing and production of a Polish pageant for the Texas Sesquicentennial. Mrs. Rapstine edited the book, "Roots of Faith-

Friday there will be no classes at Groom ISD.

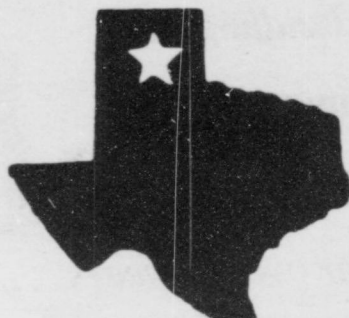

Breast Cancer Detection Unit Coming To McLean May 4th

The Mobile Breast Cancer Detection Unit of Odessa, Texas, which services McLean, Texas today received the certification of the American College of Radiology Mammography Accreditation Program.

Mammography is an x-ray examination of the breast, which the American Cancer Society and other medical experts see as the best means for the early detection of breast cancer.

The program is voluntary and is designed to insure that women receive optimum quality mammographic examinations. The process is done through a peer review evaluation of the facility's staff qualifications, equipment, quality control and quality assurance programs, image quality, and breast dose. The accreditation must be renewed every three years.

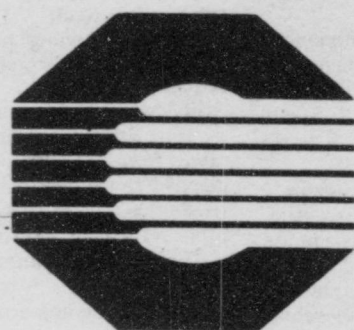
Services Held For Bertha Walker

The agenda for the meeting includes election of two directors, business centering on the financial standing of the Cooperative and drawing of members' names for attendance prizes.

This year members will elect directors from Districts one and four to serve a three-year term. District one is composed of all Wheeler County east of U.S. Highway 83. District four is composed of all of Collingsworth County south of the Salt Fork River, including

Childress County.

In early April, each member will receive by mail a notice of the meeting along with the Co-Op's annual report. Everyone is encouraged to look over the report before the meeting since the financial statements in the report will be reviewed during the business session. Directors, management and employees of GEC will be at the meeting to answer any questions that members may have concerning the Cooperative.

The annual membership meeting dates back to the very beginning of Greenbelt Electric Cooperative. The founding directors, back in 1938, felt the members should have a specific opportunity each year to learn more about their organization and to participate in a forum in which they

could receive answers to any questions concerning the Cooperative. The directors felt the annual meeting was so important to the success of the Cooperative that the bylaws of the Cooperative were written to provide for such a meeting.

Greenbelt Electric Cooperative was established as a non-profit organization with its goal to bring electricity to the rural communities which were lighted by kerosene lamps and heated by wood and places where water was pumped by hand.

Before the Cooperative was established, the existing power companies refused to serve the rural areas because they felt the expense involved in building electric lines would outweigh the return they would receive in electricity sales.

Greenbelt Electric was created when concerned rural people of the area realized that if they were ever to have electric service they would have to provide it themselves.

Today, as when it was founded, Greenbelt observes basic cooperative principles in its operation:

Each member, no matter the amount of electricity purchased, is entitled to one vote.

Nonprofit operation with affordable electric service to members is the primary objective of the Cooperative.

All members are encouraged to mark their calendars today to be at this year's annual meeting April 27. Without members' involvement and concern, Greenbelt Electric cannot continue serving as it has since 1938.

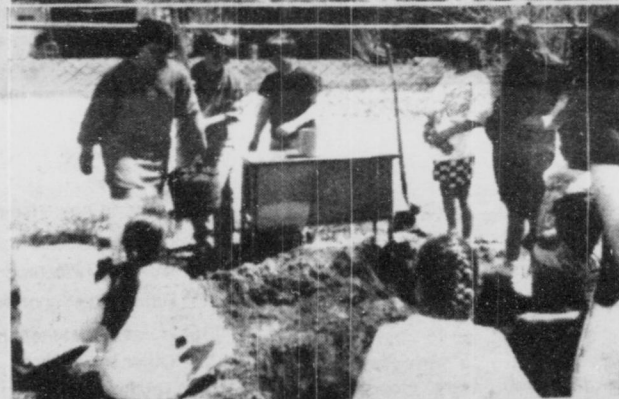

COMMERCIAL DRIVER'S LICENSE LAW MEETING SET FOR THURSDAY

In 1989, the Texas Legislature established the Commercial Driver's License Law to comply with the federal Commercial Motor Vehicle Safety Act of 1986.

These laws were passed to reduce traffic accidents involving commercial motor vehicles, said Department of Public Safety Trooper Gary Davenport.

"All drivers who operate a commercial motor vehicle will be required to have a commercial driver's license by April 1, 1992," he said, "however, there are some exemptions such as a vehicle that is controlled or operated by a farmer, a fire truck or emergency medical services vehicle, a military vehicle or a recreational vehicle driven for personal use."

Because of this new law, the Department of Public Safety is holding a meeting at 9:30 a.m. Thursday at the Borger School Administration building in the old cafeteria at 9th Street and Weatherly.

Sgt. Doug Triplett, of the Dept. of Public Safety from Lubbock will be conducting the "for your information" meeting. Triplett is the coordinator for testing.

"This meeting," Davenport said, "is a general information meeting that will answer questions about how the testing will be done. We are asking that anyone who plans to attend bring all the questions they can come up with to ask so that there will be no doubt in their minds about how this new law will affect them."
