## COMMERCIAL DRIVER' LICENSE LAW MEETING

 SET FOR THURSDAYIn 1989, the Texas Legislature established the Commercial Driver's License Law to comply with the federal Commercial Motor Vehicle Safety Act of 1986.

These laws were passed to reduce traffic accidents involving commercial motor vehicles, said Departmen of Public Safety Trooper Gary Davenport.
commercial motor vehicle will be required to have a commercial driver's license by April 1, 1992," he said, "however, there are some exemptions such as a vehicle that is controlled or operated by a farmer, a fire truck or emergency medical services vehicle, a military vehicle or a recreational vehicle driven for personal use.
Because of this new law, the Department of Public Safety is holding a meeting at $9: 30 \mathrm{a} . \mathrm{m}$. Thursday at the Borger School Administration building in the old cafeteria at 9 th Street and Weatherly.
Sgt. Doug Triplett, of the Dept. of Public Safety from Lubbock will be conducting the "for your information' meeting. Triplett is the coordinator for testing.
"This meeting," Davenport said, "is a general information meeting that will answer questions about how the testing will be done. We are asking that anyone who plans to attend bring all the questions they can come up with to ask so tha their minds about how this new law will affect them."
