Delbert Trew Reports On Status Of Museum

In response to many inquiries about the status of the proposed Barbed Wire Museum in McLean, Delber Trew, local agent for the museum, states that the museum is a reality. We are working with the city of McLean on a lease, and double checking the insurance coverage necessary. No problems have been encountered and details are being worked out. We have been incorporated by the Secretary of State, but are working or requirements by the IRS to

achieve tax exempt status.

A Board of Directors from across the United States has been selected and a slate of executive officers will be presented to the membership on July 20 at Moriarity, N.M. at the next wire show. Pledges have been called for and are being deposited in the Bank of Commerce in McLean.

A basic floor plan has been tentatively adopted and will be adjusted as exhibits are finalized. Planned at the present is a 6000 sq. ft. area for barbed wire and related items, including almost every known patented wire related item, patent information, salesman samples, wire cut medicine bottles and cans, all related tools, history of all organizations, art work of all mediums related to barberl wire. Also included will be the Barbed Wire Hall of Fame and the Barbarian Award recipients display.

A 1200 sq. ft. area will feature the Old Route 60 Association of Texas exhibit. It will show a map of Old Route 66 from Chicago to L.A. with many actual pictures and historical items from the past. Memorabilia from Old 66 around McLean is being restored now for display also.

A large lobby and store will be in the entrance area. It will be handicap accessible with restrooms and sitting area included. TV Video areas are planned with one in the Lobby, telling the story of Barbed Wire and one in the Old 66 exhibit room telling about Old 66. Store sales will include almost every type of souvenir for barbed wire and Old 66 known. Local crafts and art will be offered for sale also.

Trew states that the north 3000 sq. ft. adjacent to the lobby and restrooms will feature the Western Heritage Community room. This area is to be used for Collector's shows, wire shows, Old 66 conventions, art shows and local community events. Facilities for catered meals will be included.

The Wire Museum and the Old Route 66 areas are pretty well provided for financially, but help is needed for the Community room. Labor is already donated, but to have tables and chairs for a show or banquet, we need some donations from the local area. Anyone wishing to help financially on the Community room, please contact me at 779-3164. Any donations raised locally will be used only in the Community room and will be recognized by a plaque displayed in the room.

Renovation on the Old Sears factory is expected to start approximately August 1, with a completion date in late fall. Grand Opening will depend on exhibit delivery and construction progress.

A lengthy and often frustrating quest by the First United Methodist Church of McLean for a sister church in the Soviet Union has come to a successful conclusion. A relationship has been formed with a United Methodist church in the Soviet Baltic republic of Etonia. The church is in the capital city of Tallin and is pastored by the Rev. Olav Parnamet.

The Rev. Mark Wilson, pastor of McLean UMC, began searching for a sister church over a year ago. His objective is to find two such churches: one Methodist and one Russian Orthodox.

Upon learning that the Tallin church and an Orthodox church in Kiev were possibilities for a sister church relationship, Rev. Wilson mailed letters to the pastors of both congregations. He did so without having any idea if the letters would reach their destinations or if he would ever receive a response.

After a long wait, Rev. Wilson attempted to call the pastors. However, he discovered that phoning the Soviet Union was no bargain either. "It seemed the circuits to Russia were the busiest in the world," said one McLean resident.

Persistence paid off and Rev. Wilson finally got through on March 26 of this year. Rev. Parnamet's daughter, Ulla, answered the phone. In halting English, she informed Rev.

Wilson that her father was in the United States! Rev. Wilson wasn't sure why Rev. Parnamet was here or where he was but he was delighted at the progress.

That same day, Rev. Wilson also reached the Very Reverend Boris Udobenbro in Kiev. Rev. Udovenbro was interested in a sister church relationship and requested a letter be sent to him explaining more about the relationship.

A call was placed to InfoServ, requesting information on Rev. Parnamet. A day later he was located. He was in the United States as a World Missioner and his host church was Pleasantview United Methodist Church in Abingdon, Virginia.

Everything at this point happily went according to plan and when Rev. Parnamet was reached, he readily agreed to the sister church proposal.

Essentially the two congregations, for a period of perhaps one year, will endeavor, primarily through correspondence, become acquainted with one another. This will bring an appreciation of one another's church, culture, country, etc. It is hoped that this will bring the congregations closer together and be conducive to a peaceful and mutually beneficial relationship between the United States and the Soviet Union.

The letter sent to Rev. Udovenbro proposed an association of similar nature and with similar aims. (Rev. Wilson has learned that mail service to and from the Ukraine should be about three weeks in transit. He is hopeful that a second sister church relationship will be established in two months.)

It is understood that the congregations in Tallin and Kiev are considerably larger than that in McLean, but Rev. Wilson has indicated that if those churches can tolerate a little sister, his church won't mind having some big ones.

Delbert Trew Reports On Status Of Museum

In response to many inquiries about the status of the proposed Barbed Wire Museum in McLean, Delber Trew, local agent for the museum, states that the museum is a reality. We are working with the city of McLean on a lease, and checking the insurance coverage necessary. No problems have been encountered and details are being worked out. We have been incorporated by the Secretary of State, but are working on requirements by the IRS to achieve tax exempt status.

A Board of Directors from across the United States has been selected and a slate of executive officers will be presented to the membership on July 20 at Moriarity, N.M. at the next wire show. Pledges have been called for and are being deposited in the Bank of Commerce in McLean.

A basic floor plan has been tentatively adopted and will be adjusted as exhibits are finalized. Planned at the present is a 6000 sq. ft. area for barbed wire and related items, including almost every known patented wire related item, patent information, salesman samples, wire cut medicine bottles and cans, all related tools, history of all organizations, art work of all mediums related to barbed wire. 

McLean United Methodist Church Gets Soviet Sister Church From Estonia

A lengthy and often frustrating quest by the First United Methodist Church of McLean for a sister church in the Soviet Union has come to a successful conclusion. A relationship has been formed with a United Methodist church in the Soviet Baltic republic of Etonia. The church is in the capital city of Tallin and is pastored by the Rev. Olav Parnamet.

The Rev. Mark Wilson, pastor of McLean UMC, began searching for a sister church over a year ago. His objective is to find two such churches: one Methodist and one Russian Orthodox.

Upon learning that the Tallin church and an Orthodox church in Kiev were possibilities for a sister church relationship, Rev. Wilson mailed letters to the pastors of both congregations. He did so without having any idea if the letters would reach their destinations or if he would ever receive a response.

After a long wait, Rev. Wilson attempted to call the pastors. However, he discovered that phoning the Soviet Union was no bargain either. "It seemed the circuits to Russia were the busiest in the world," said one McLean resident.

Persistence paid off and Rev. Wilson finally got through on March 26 of this year. Rev. Parnamet's daughter, Ulla, answered the phone. In halting English, she informed Rev.

Wilson that her father was in the United States! Rev. Wilson wasn't sure why Rev. Parnamet was here or where he was but he was delighted at the progress.

That same day, Rev. Wilson also reached the Very Reverend Boris Udobenbro in Kiev. Rev. Udovenbro was interested in a sister church relationship and requested a letter be sent to him explaining more about the relationship.

A call was placed to InfoServ, requesting information on Rev. Parnamet. A day later he was located. He was in the United States as a World Missioner and his host church was Pleasantview United Methodist Church in Abingdon, Virginia.

Everything at this point happily went according to plan and when Rev. Parnamet was reached, he readily agreed to the sister church proposal.

Essentially the two congregations, for a period of perhaps one year, will endeavor, primarily through correspondence, become acquainted with one another. This will bring an appreciation of one another's church, culture, country, etc. It is hoped that this will bring the congregations closer together and be conducive to a peaceful and mutually beneficial relationship between the United States and the Soviet Union.

The letter sent to Rev. Udovenbro proposed an association of similar nature and with similar aims. (Rev. Wilson has learned that mail service to and from the Ukraine should be about three weeks in transit. He is hopeful that a second sister church relationship will be established in two months.)

It is understood that the congregations in Tallin and Kiev are considerably larger than that in McLean, but Rev. Wilson has indicated that if those churches can tolerate a little sister, his church won't mind having some big ones.
