## Farmers Union Says

## Agriculture Deserves One Percent Of The Federal Budget

Farmers Union officials say federal budget limitations are giving Congress few options as it considers the 1990 farm bill and they say agriculture deserves better.
National Farmers Union Executive Committee riembers neeting in Washington this week sent a letter to Members of Congress statiog that the federal budget should reflect agriculture's tremendous contribution to the national economy, and that one be earmarked for farm be earmarked fort programs."
support programs.
NFU defends the statement noting that under Bush Administration proposals, the Congressional Budget Office projects farm support spending to total .63 percent of the federa budget in fiscal year 1991. But, they point out that despite that modest share, Administration proposals call for 6.4 ing cuts planned for FY ' 91 to come from firm support programs. "On top of that
agriculture represents almost 19 percent of the GNP," said Texas Farmers Union President Joe Rankin. "An industry that important to the economy deserves one percent of the budget. Rankin blames the budget problems surrounding the farm bill on the way the 1985
Food Security Act was Food Security Act was programs that stabilize programs that stabilize demand needs stimulate markets. But, every time the markets. started to rise under the ' 85 bill, administrators used their authority to rive used their authority to rive to marke up the difference with costly deficiency wayments." payments.
Recently released CBO estimates predict a 21 percent decline in net farm
income if the ' 85 farm bill was continued over the next 5 years resulting in the loss years resulting in the loss

SSI is a Federal program that makes payments to persons with limited income and with limited income and blind or disabled
lind or disabled.
A biind person whose vision is less than 20/200 with glasses, or who has tunnel vision of 20 degrees or less should consider SSI. But, you cannot have much income nor own much property. But, you cas own your own home. There is no minimum or maxirnum age for people who are blind or have a disability.
You should apply for SSI if you cannot work because of a physical or mental condition that is expected to last at least 12 months or result in death. A child under 18 is eligible if he or she has an impairment comparable to ore which would prevent an a duit from working.

People can get SSI even if hey have other income. Many people get Social Security benefits and SSI. The amount of a person's SSI payment depends on how much other income he or she has. Income includes Social Security benefits, salary or self-employment income, pensions or annuities, or any money received, as well as housing and food paid by another person.
In 1990, a person can have countable income of up to $\$ 406$ a month and still get some SSI payment. An eligible couple can have income of up to $\$ 599$ a month still get some SSI payment. Social Security payment. Social Security doesn't count all income, to get SSI even if you have more income, especially if more income, especially if you live in a State that adds money to the SSI checks or if most of your income is from In
In addition to income have resours, a person cannot $\$ 2000$. Thave resources of more than $\$ 3000$. The limit for couple is $\$ 3000$. Resources include savings and checking accounts, bonds, stocks, life insurance, real and personal property.

## Grant Awarded To Cancer Center Research

Allen Edmundson, Ph.D., director of the x-ray crystallography lab of Harrington lography lab of Harrington Research Institute got good Research Instit in form of funds to womplete this grant funds to complete this gran year in the new lab plus funding for next year, and additional funding for the five years following that.

Edmundson's grants, called M.E.R.I.T. awards, are given by the National Institutes of Health and only the top one percent of scientists in the U.S. receive this funding. M.E.R.I.T. (Method to Extend Research in Time) status gives Edmundson uninterrupted financial support and frees him from time-consuming paper work involved in traditional grant renewa applications so he can devote his efforts to research. M.E.R.I.T. status is not applied for but rather awarded to researchers in recognition of their consistent commitment to excellence demonstrated in previous research.
Edmundson says he received the first M.E.R.I. award given in 1986 from the National Cancer Institute of the National Institutes of Health to the intermountain west region during his years the University of Utah. He was also one of the first awardees when the NIH program Edmundson's award marks the fdirst time Harringto Cancer Center has received an NIH grant.

This writig said, in part, ECHO-TECH, Envitonmental Waste Manage ment Co., Amarillo, has formed a company for the purposes of hazardous waste storage, management consulting and brokerage of hazardous waste materials and it plans to build such a facility in Carson County, 21 miles east of Amarillo.
On Thursday, May 3, approximately 20 Carson County landowners met at Conway to voice their concern over the situation with County Judge Jay Roselius and Boyd Deaver, assistant manager of the Teras Water Commission Teffice in Amarillo. Those office in Amarilio. to know landowners wa facility and more about the faciity the about their rights in the procedures.
In its letter to landowners, Eco-Tech said, "The project is a facility for the storage and shipment of hazardous
waste materials out of Texas and the Panhandle area. The first phase ... is for the construction of one warehouse storage facility and an office." The warehouse will store the waste for up to a maximum of 90 days, and then ship it to one of the two incinerator points for incinerat
disposal.
The plot is 600 feet by 600 feet with a 7 -foot high security fence around the securite site. A security guard will be on duty 24 hours a will be on ding to Foo-Tech. day, accordin the group that Deaver toid the group that the facility will act as a brokeraging firm. He explained that it may presently cost $\$ 500$ to $\$ 700$ per drum for individuals to have their hazardous materials hauled off, but the price could be reduced to $\$ 100$ to $\$ 200$ under this type of facility. The idea is to provide a collection point so that incinerator companies in Louisiana and Houston would be able to pick up a truckload rather than individual drums, thereby lowering the cost to the generator of the waste.

The plan talks about one facility initially and expanding to four warehouses, each
with an elaborate fire monitoring system (hydrants, air monitors and leak monitors below the building.) No one knows yet where the company plans to get its water in this area that has a very limited underground water supply.
Landowners were also informed that the hazardous waste materials (bio-medical waste from hospitals and medical facilities, chemical waste products from chemical plants, and asbestos materials from schools and other public facilities) would other public facilities) would be stored in polyvinyl, double-lines $55-g a i l o n$ drums. Once the drums are
sealed, they are spill-proof sealed, they are spi
and puncture-proof.

Deaver said it probably Deaver said it probably would be the only facility of its kind between Dallas and Denver. The company hopes to get Pantex, Celanese, Diamond Shamrock, Phillips and other such big companies as customers to cre large enough market.

Feedlots within the area served by Southwestern Public Service Company (SPS) during 1989 fed the highest number of cattle on record, according to SPS's annual Fed Cattle Survey
Feedlots in the SPS service area fed $5,468,350$ head of cattle, a 2.5 pecent increase over the 1988 total of $5,335,603$. The previous record was set in 1987 with $5,406,975$ cattle fed.
The survey also showed that the one-time total capacity of area feedlots in 1989 was $2,785,475$ head, up from the one-time total capacity in 1988 of $2,758,662$ head.

The 1989 study shows how important cattle feeding is to the area's economy," said Dave Krupnick, SPS manager of agricultural and "Although prices for feeder Although prices for feeder cattie remain up, 1989 was ", area."
SPS annually prepares a Fed Cattle Survey covering feediots in its service area. $\mathbf{5 2 , 0 0 0}$-square-mile area comprising the Teras and Oklahoma panhandles, the Teras Sonth Plains, eastern Terd southeastern New Merico, and south New Mexico, and Additio
Additionally, the survey fund that $4,694,852$ cattle were slaughtered last year at 13 beef-packing plants in the SPS service area, Krupnick said. The facilities have an annual slaughter capacity of 4,818,320 head.

Each year feedlots and packing plants are very cooperative in supplying information for this survey, and we really appreciate that," Krupnick said. "We continue to receive requests from across the United State for this survey, and it helps highlight this area's agriculture and food-processing industries.'
The report also shows that the total number of feedlots in the area has grown to 117, and the one-time capacity of these lots is still on the increase.
