## Protest Hearings <br> Begin June 25

Property owners in the Carson County Appraisal District will have an opportunity later this month to protest proposed appraisals of their property for local taxes. The district's appraisal review board (ARB) will begin hearing taxpayer protests on June 25, 1990 from 9:00 a.m. to 11:30 a.m.
After the ARB concludes
its hearings and approves final property appraisals, local governments will use these appraisals to assess property taxes for 1990 .
The ARB is a group of citizens who live in the appraisal district and who appraisal district and who district's directors. Their responsibilities are outlined by the Texas Constitution, which requires that property be appraised equally and be appraised equally and exemptions and productivity appraisal be properly granted.
Property owners may appear before the ARB to protest any of these specific actions of the appraisal office:
oftice: appraised or agricultural value of the property; tural value of the property, axpayer's property compared to other property in the district; on the appraisal records; *denial of a partial exempion, such as a homestead exemption;
*denial of agricultural use, open-space, or timber use, open-space, or ti
productivity appraisal; agricultural or timber land has had a change-of-use and is subject to a rollback tax; *identification of the taxing unit or units in which the property is located;
*determination that the taxpayer is the owner of the property;
*any other action of the appraisal office that adversely affects the property owner.
Dianne Lavake, chief appraiser for the district, outlined the steps by which property owner files protest" with the ARB. This must be filed by May 31 or within 30 days after the tax payer is mailed a notice of appraised value by the chief appraiser, whichever is appra
later.
How

However, if the ARB sends a property owner a notice of any other kind of change in the appraisal records, or if the chief appraiser issues a prior-year omitted property notice, the property owner has only 10 days from the mailing date to file a protest.
Official forms for a notice of protest are available at the appraisal district office. "A letter from the taxpayer is also acceptable," Lavake said, "as long as it identifies the property owner and the property that is the subject property that is the subject of the protest and indicates
dissatisfaction with some decision or action of the appraisal office."
Each protesting property owner may offer evidence or argument, either in person

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or by filing an affidavit with the ARB. Property owners should be aware that the ARB has no authority over tax rates or taxing-unit spending and will not hear protests on these matters. The ARB will schedule hearings as property owners file protests and will inform them of the time, date, and place of their individual hearings at least 15 days before the scheduled date. Lavake said that protest hearings will be held for one day and that the ARB expects to approve the final appraisal roll on approximately July 20. State law requires the ARB to review and approve the appraisal records by July 20, or when not more than 5 percent of the total property value in protest.

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## Flag Day Is June 14

'On this day our nation ommemorates two events which are so much a part of ur tradition and so much urct of our success. They ere ovents which press are events which precede, f give meaning to, many our other holidays. Today abs the United States ay of the 213th States Army and the 213 bir " of the American flag, said Lt . Col. Charies S. Beeson, Army recruiting commander for the state of Oklahoma, the Texas Panhandle and west Kansas.
How appropriate it is that these two birthdays be celebrated on the same day. For throughout our long and proud history, the Army and the flag have constantly een together. Soldiers have ong protected the flag from anger and destruction. The flag has long inspired soldiers to accomplish feats hat might have seeme mpossible. History gives ample testimony to tha relationship.
When the fight for reedorn began at Lexington, Mass., on April 19, 1775 America was simply a group of disorganized colonies. There was no Army, no national flag, no recognized eader.
"What we did have was just a group of farmers, merchants, craftsmen and ther banded loosely ogether in iocal militias Hardly a force that would instill fear in the British Army. Hardly a threat to the King's rule, the greatest Army in the world at that time.
"Yet this group of unorganized colonials would kindle a fire. At first just a little smoke, then a few flames! Soon a blaze of epic proportions would sweep the colonies and it would not be extinguished until freedom was achieved in America.
"However, the fire would never have grown if an Army had not been created. Unity was needed--the unity of an organized fighting force led by a strong leader. Thus, on June 14, 1775, the Second Continental Congress adopted the militia of New England as its 'Continental Army' and appointed a committee to draft Rules and Regulations for the Government of the Army, " continued Beeson.
On that same day, the Congress resolved to add citizens of other colonies to the Army. The resolution read in part:
"Resolved that six companies of expert riflemen be immediately raised in Pennsylvania, two in Maryland, and two in Virginia;...That each company, as soon as completed, shall march and join the Army near Boston, to be there employed as light infantry, under the command of the Chief officer in that Army.
The very next day, that chief officer of the Army was named. Congress äppointed a Virginian by the name of George Washing. ton. The newly created force had the leader it so desperately needed. The rest, as they say, is history.
'It's the history of famous battles from Yorktown and

Gettysburg, to Guadacanal and Normandy. It's the history of strong and exceptional Army leaders such as Andrew Jackson, Ulysses S Grant, John J. Pershing and Douglas MacArthur. It's the history of sacrifice and struggle by millions of Americans who ve worn the Army uniform in every decade of our existence.
"And as those millions of Americans trained to be soldiers, as they endlessly drilled and marched on parade fields, they could always look up for inspira tion when things got tough They could look up to the nearest flagpole and se waving in the wind a vivid reminder of their countrythe Stars and Stripes," said Beeson.
The Army was already two years old, and had been through a number of battles, when the American flag was born. The Continental Congress authorized the Stars and Stripes as our national flag on June 14, 1777. Thereafter, it quickly became a proud and visible symbol of our struggle for freedom.
When George Washing ton first saw the flag being flown above his Army he was struck by its beauty and symbolism. He is reported to have said: "We take the stars from heaven, the red from our mother country, separating it by white stripes, thus showing that we have separated from her, and the white stripes should go down to posterity representing liberty.
From then on, much as siblings do, the Army and flag grew up together. As the nation expanded its borders westward, the Army was the forefront. So, too, was the flag. When a threat against America arose, the Army marched to the battlefield. So, too, did the flag. And when the country assumed a role as world power and defender of
democracy, the Army was there and so was the flag.

Pursuant to the settlement, while not admitting liabiilty, Southwestern Beil, the other local exchange telephone companies in Texas, and AT\&T Communications of the Southwest, Inc. have agreed to pay refunds to those WATS/800 customers who paid overtime charges attributable to the rounding practices for intrastate WATS/800 services at any time between September, 1976, and February, 1987. The refunds will ba based upon either the actual or estimated amount of overtime charges attributable to such rounding practices. An exact refund will be determined for customers able to produce copies of their WATS/800 service bills. For customers who do not have copies of their WATS/800 service bills to establish actual overtime charges paid, an average refund of $\$ 4.53$ to $\$ 5.95$ per WATS/800 service line per month will be applied. All clains will be subject to verification. The refunds will a so include interest at the rate of $7.80 \%$ per annum
