Letter To The Editor

On Saturday, October 30, the voters of Groom Independent School District are being asked to participate in a tax rollback election. Under normal circumstances, this situation occurs with a significant increase in the proposed tax rate. However, with the new finance law, abolishment of CED's, and an unusual method of computing effective and rollback tax rates, Groom ISD finds itself in a rollback situation, even though the proposed 1993 tax rate is exactly the same \$1.25/\$100 value as the total combined CED and local rate for the three previous years.

In 1992 each dollar our taxpayers paid to the CED netted our district about \$.91. In computing the 1993 rollback tax rate, the state formula considered only the \$.91 instead of the one dollar paid by our taxpayers. The result is an artificially low rollback tax rate, and an automatic, mandated rollback election.

Knowing the commitment and dedication the taxpayers

Tigers Win, 54-42 2 Games To Go

Groom played one of their toughest games Friday night against Lefors. A pass interception early in the first quarter gave Lefors a running start with a 0-8 score. The Pirates confidence began to wane when turnovers found Seth Ritter scoring from the three yard line. Tom Lambert scored on the P.A.T. to move ahead 14 - 8.

The good defensive job by both teams kept the second quarter scoreless until 36 seconds from halftime when Ty Lambert slipped by the line to score from the one yard line. Tom Lambert again made the point after. The Tigers headed to the locker room with a comfortable lead at halftime of 22 - 8.

The third quarter found both teams fired up and getting their second wind. Lefors scored a touchdown on their first possession, closing the distance between the scores, 22 - 14.

Bo Burgin scored next from the five yard line.

Tom Lambert again made the P.A.T.

Lefors came back with a score, playing catch up, to pull the score gap back down to an eight point difference.

Bo Burgin pulled in another touchdown on an 11 yard run and Tom Lambert connected on the P.A.T.

Lefors scored another TD early in the fourth. Groom's defense held the Pirates line inside the 20.

Bart Britten pulled off an eight yard dash with Collin Downs kicking the extra points to pull ahead 46 -18.

Narrowing the margin, Lefors again scored with 3:26 left to play.

The Pirates passed again for a touchdown.

Groom's last score came from an 18 yard run by Bo Burgin. Collin Downs scored again on the P.A.T.

Lefors finished the game with one last score making the final 54 - 42.

Groom plays McLean at home on Friday night for Homecoming.



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

The Carson County Jail is
currently holding ten
inmates. Over the past
week seven persons were
booked into jail. Two
persons were charged with
Theft of Service, one for
Disorderly Conduct, one for
Felony DWI, one for Sexual
Assault of a Child, one for
Physical Assault of a Child
and one for Out-Of-County
Warrants.

The Sheriff's Department, Texas Highway Patrol and Panhandle Fire and EMS responded to an explosion and fire north of Panhandle on Wednesday. One person was seriously injured after the crane he was operating was consumed by flames at natural gas pipeline excavation. Bodensteiner of Amarillo was taken to Lubbock by Medivac helicopter for treatment of burns covering 35-40% of his body. This is just one of many recent incidents where we have made use of the Mediva: helicopter which is based in Amarillo.

The Sheriff's Department is working with the Texas Cattleman's Association Ranger to investigate some cattle that were missing from a Carson County ranch. The cattle were located, but discovered to be re-branded. The owner's original brand made it possible for us to positively identify the cattle.

Our department is

currently investigating the theft of a welder, weed eater and a bundle of fence posts from a barn west of Panhandle. The welder is a "Miller" model 250 amp welder/generator and has a broken pointer dial. The welder is mounted on a Volkswagen frame with broken tie rods and should be somewhat difficult to move. There is a bluecolored ammunition box mounted on the welder. Also taken was one Ryobi brand weedeater and 100 3/8 rebar fence posts in a bundle. If you know the whereabouts of these items or if you have information which might lead to their location, please contact Sheriff Loren Brand at 537-3511.

With Halloween approaching, drivers are asked to be extra cautious and to be on the lookout for young ghosts and goblins who have only "treats" on their minds. Children should be dressed in lightcolored or reflective clothing and should be equipped with flashlights if they are out after dark. Trick Or Treat

This Saturday will find lots of ghosts, goblins and spooks haunting the streets of Groom.

In all the excitement of Halloween, some children forget safety rules that can prevent mishaps from marring their fun.

Encourage children to obey all the traffic rules, such as crossing the street at only the corners, and looking both ways. Instruct tricksters to travel with a group and always walk on sidewalks when they can. Ask them to please respect flower beds and shrubbery of those treaters who are good enough to participate in the fun.

Allow children to start early enough to finish before dark. Just to be on the safe side make sure they have a flashlight and some type of reflectors on their costume.

Remind the children not to eat anything until an adult has inspected it.

Make sure that costumes allow for easy movement, does not drag the ground and can be seen. Also make sure that the ghouls and goblins can see out of their masks well.

High Plains Part of 10 State USDA Study

The Texas Agricultural Statistics Service (TASS) will begin surveying farmers and ranchers on the High Plains of Texas in late October about their chemical use and conservation practices in randomly selected fields. Approximately 1,050 fields have been selected in 37 counties in Texas as part of a 10-state USDA study in 1993. A total of 4,150 farmers and ranchers will be interviewed in Arizona, Arkansas, California, Kentucky, Louisiana. Mississippi, Missouri, New Mexico, Tennessee and Texas. Ten other states Tennessee participated in the 1991 and 1992 studies.

The USDA's Economic Research Service will use the data obtained to determine relationships among farming activities. Resource characteristics such as soil type, terrain, climate, and ground water quality will be studied.

USDA is committed to offering American farmers, ranchers and foresters responsible alternatives for solving water resource Information problems. obtained from this survey is strictly confidential and is necessary to understand the conditions under which chemicals do and do not threaten the Nation's water or the health of farmers and ranchers who use the chemicals. Previously, agricultural chemical use information was not readily available and of limited statistical reliability. Consequently, neither USDA nor other farm and ranch organizations were able to respond to issues associated with the environmental impact of agricultural chemicals.

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





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Stickers Placement To Change

If the sticker is peeled off

The Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) is issuing a new vehicle registration sticker - for placement inside windshields instead of outside on license plates. The program begins

The sticker is larger and of a different design. Its main purpose is to deter theft - bringing up another important feature.

the windshield, the word "VOID" appears on it, making it a useless scrap of paper. It's not even worth stealing. In 1992, 586,885 replacement license plates and stickers were issued. TxDOT estimates that 60 percent of replacement stickers issued were due to At \$5.30 per theft. replacement, replacing the stickers cost the public \$1.8 million and a lot of time and aggravation.

"When the word gets out that these stickers are useless when peeled off the glass, incidence of stolen stickers will drop quickly, as will the cost of replacing stolen stickers," said Jerry Dike director of TxDOT's Division of Motor Vehicle Title and Registration. "But the savings don't stop there. If all stolen stickers were used on vehicles that would otherwise be legally registered, state and county revenue losses could exceed Recouping \$17 million. these losses could mean savings passed on for use on other projects."

The 72nd Texas Legislature passed a law in 1991 mandating the sticker change to lower vehicle registration theft. Drivers whose vehicles have no windshield will continue

using the license plate stickers.




McLean Records 102-69 Win Against Follett

The Tigers kicked off to Follett and held their first drive, taking over and manufacturing a touchdown drive midway through the first quarter on a Brandon

West one yard run. Seth Brown kicked the extra points to put McLean on top 8-0. Follett's Mark Howard broke through on the next Panther possession to score on a 39 yard run

but the kick missed. Never mind the 8-6 score, Toby Northcutt ran a 47 yard run the home team bleachers and scored 6 With Seth's kick McLean had a 16-6 lead until the kick off to Mark Howard who broke it for a Panther TD. The scoring stopped for 30 seconds as Follett missed the P.A.T. and it took Northcutt one play to speed past the bleachers again for a 39 yard TD run followed by the perfect foot of Seth Brown, McLean led 24-12 with 1:51 left in the first quarter. Follett went to the air and again, Mark Howard scored on a one yard run with four seconds left, they sed the P.A.T. kick and Seth Brown's three 2point kicks made the edge 24-18.

It took 2 ½ minutes of play until Brandon West went off right tackle for a 15 yard score.

This time the extra point play was fumbled but so was Northcutt's onside kick and Brad Dickey recovered resulting in a 25 yard southeastern touchdown run by Toby. Seth's kick was blocked but with 5:41 remaining in the McLean led 36-18.

Follett's 172 pound junior running back ran his fourth touchdown, a 28 yarder, but again the Tigers spoiled the P.A.T. to stay on top 36-24.

A 50 yard Northcutt to Jeremy Crutcher pass set of a four yard Brandon West score and another kick by Brown with 1:26 remaining putting McLean up by 20; 44-24.

Howard opened up the second half scoring with his fifth touchdown run and once again McLean broke up the extra point but had their lead sliced back to 44-30. 16 seconds later, Northcutt answered with a 45 yard touchdown sprint and held for another Brown two pointer for a 52-30 third quarter lead.



The City of McLean has been notified by the Texas Department of Health that the water being supplied by our system exceeds the

following maximum constituent level for Nitrate specified by the Department "Drinking Water Act," Public Law 93-523 (U.S.). The limit is set at 10 milligrams of Nitrate (as nitrogen) per liter of water. The amount of Nitrate (as nitrogen) in the water to be 11.73 milligrams per liter.

Adults and children over the age of 6 months need not be concerned about drinking water from the tap. An excess of Nitrate intake by an infant under the age of 6 months may reduce its available oxygen supply and possibly produce "blue baby" symptoms.
