Christian Mothers will have confetti eggs.


Sorority will have their delicious homemade ice cream.

Youthful Experiences Saves Delbert Trew Thousands Of Dollars

Every time I see someone take a dip of snuff or buy a can, I instantly remember Grandma Trew. carried this little round, shiny, can of snuff in her gingham apron pocket. There was also this little root of some kind that had a chewed look to it. She would open the little can, dip in the frazzled root, and then put the snuff in her bottom lip. Somehow this was fascinating to a seven year old Delbert.

Each morning and evening as she and Grandpa went to milk, she would hang the apron and its fascinating cargo behind the kitchen door. One time, I opened the can, dipped with the root, and started to my bottom lip. I don't know what happened then, but I blew snuff out of every body opening I had for an hour. To this day, I haven't dipped snuff.

The water in some of the windmills on the ranch in New Mexico tasted bad, so chewing Beech Nut tobacco was used to fill in the gaps

between drinks of water. Once, while riding a young horse, and loping along, calm and relaxed, I got ready to spit. A covey of Blueheads exploded beneath my young horse. I estimate I swallowed approximately a large coffee cup of the liquid, along with a Johnny Day sized chaw. To this day, I've never bought another pack of tobacco.

My father was a chain smoker, and from birth I've lived under a blue cloud of second hand smoke. Again, I've never bought a package of cigarettes.

The final part of the mystery involved here concerns Ruth. We have been married nearly twenty five years and I've never set foot in a Barber Shop since our wedding day.

So, I've spent nothing on snuff, I've spent almost nothing on chewing tobacco, and nothing on cigarettes. Not a dime was spent on haircuts since 1970. The savings of this practice could amount to many thousands of dollars.



Lone Star Card To Simplify Texas Food Stamp

State Comptroller John Sharp activated the Lone Star card in the Panhandle area on July 31, 1995. He announced that the new electronic benefits delivery system will abolish paper food stamp coupons - and much of the fraud associated with them - in Carson County and 89 other counties beginning Tuesday, August 1.

"This security card is going to virtually take public benefits off the black market, saving taxpayers of dollars and returning the food stamp program to its original feeding hungry families," Sharp said, as he officially brought the innovative new system on-

electronic system has been undergoing final testing. Since July 24, emergency food stamp clients have received Lone Star cards instead of the old paper food stamp coupons," Sharp

"And starting Tuesday, August 1 the Lone Star card will expand across several other regions of the state, including the cities of Lufkin-Nacogdoches, Beaumont-Port Arthur-Orange, Victoria, San Antonio, Amarillo, Lubbock and El Paso," Sharp said. "From that moment on, it will revolutionize the way these areas of Texas deliver public assistance benefits."

Recipients will also be able to use their cards to access Aid to Families with "For the past week, the Dependent Children (AFDC) benefits at nearly grocery stores 4,000 displaying the red, white and blue decals that read "Lone Star Card Accepted Here." The AFDC program is a cash benefit for qualifying

The Lone Star card is the cornerstone of Sharp's wideranging welfare reforms, which were approved during the recent session of the Texas Legislature and signed into law by the Sharp first governor. proposed the card in his 1991 Breaking the Mold report and has overseen its development.

Tuesday, Beginning August 1, 300,000 families in 90 counties will use the Lone Star card instead of paper food stamp coupons to access their food stamp

"In Houston, where the Lone Star card has been operating since February 1, grocery retailers reported an immediate increase in food sales," Sharp said. "From one month to the next, food sales rose by \$4.5 million because the benefits may be spent on food - and food alone."

The Lone Star card is also expected to dramatically reduce food stamp fraud throughout the 90 counties included in the third phase of the program's expansion.

"Just six weeks into the system in Houston, \$1 million was taken off the black market in one 'bust' alone," Sharp said. "These were taxpayer-funded benefits that previously had disappeared into the black

hole of the black market.

"The Lone Star card returns public assistance to its intended purpose, while cutting out the middlemen who printed, distributed, stored and otherwise made millions of dollars off the old paper coupon system," Sharp said.

Nationwide, taxpayers spend \$45.5 million to print food stamps, \$4.5 million to distribute them and \$23 million for the final processing and destruction of the coupons.

The Lone Star card automatically subtracts the purchase of food items from a recipient's account. No cash ever changes hands on food purchases, while those who also receive AFDC

payments may purchase non-food items and receive small amounts of cash in separate transactions.

The Lone Star card is the largest electronic benefits transfer program in the country. The expansion into the 90 counties across four regions of the state will almost double the number of households served from 400,000 to 700,000 statewide. The system will continue to expand region by region until it covers the entire state by early 1996.

The Texas Department of Human Services administers the Lone Star card, while Transactive Corporation, an Austin-based technology company, operates the hightech computer system.


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
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

LICENSE SUSPENSION: WHAT YOU CAN **EXPECT**

URING the past legislative session, the Texas Legislature approved a measure that gave my office the authority to suspend the professional, driver's and recrea licenses of parents who are delinquent in their child support payments. On September 1, 1995 the new law, one of the most comprehensive in the nation, goes into effect.

What it means

Non-custodial parents who hold state-regulated licenses, owe

30th Anniversary Finds Medicare Program Revised

As we mark the 30th of Medicare this Saturday, the program that has been a life-saver for millions of Americans is itself in ailing health. However, Congress will take action this year to ensure that Americans can rely on this vital health program far into the future.

On July 29, 1995, President Lyndon B. Johnson signed a bill to protect the medical needs of America's senior citizens. Since that time, millions of seniors and disabled Americans have relied on Medicare to pay for their hospital and physician costs. Many Americans who could not obtain health care coverage were able to receive quality medical services.

Unfortunately, like many government programs, Medicare has not kept pace with changing times. For all the good it does, Medicare is nonetheless a 1960s-style government program operating in the dynamic health-care environment of the 1990s. Private health care systems have made dramatic progress this decade in containing costs without negatively affecting patient care. As a result, private health care costs rose by only four percent in 1994.

That's not the case with Medicare, which has no incentive to control costs and make efficient use of taxpayer dollars. The sad truth is that Medicare costs have been rising at a rate of

11 percent a year. That is 7 percent faster than the increase in the number of Americans Medicare serves.

Just as in 1965 when President Johnson acted boldly to give senior citizens health care coverage, Congress today also must act to keep Medicare financially sound for current and future generations. We have no choice, since the Medicare Board of Trustees issued a report which found the Medicare Part A Trust Fund will be bankrupt in just seven years.

If the Trust Fund is allowed to go bankrupt, by law no payments may be made for hospital or home health services. This would

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have a devastating impact anniversary of the creation on the 32 million seniors and 4 million disabled people who rely Medicare to pay for their health care benefits.

Congress is not seeking to change Medicare to pay for tax cuts for the wealthy or to balance the budget. Even if the government had a balanced budget and the tax cuts passed by the House and Senate were not enacted, the Medicare Trust Fund would still be bankrupt. No one disputes this claim. President Clinton has said it, the Clinton Medicare Trustees have proven it, and the Congress will do something about it.

The good news is that curing Medicare does not cutting spending. mean Under the budget proposal the House adopted earlier this year, Medicare spending will rise by 40 percent between 1996 and 2002. That means the amount we spend per Medicare beneficiary will increase form \$4,800 to \$6,400. We Medicare preserving the current system for those who want to use it, and by giving seniors the right to choose the type of health plan and coverage they want.

After 30 years, Medicare is as vital as ever to elderly and disabled Americans. It just isn't working as well as it should be. Congress will take steps this year to ensure that Americans can observe Medicare's 40th anniversary with a celebration rather than a funeral.



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
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
