City Council Issues "Special Use Permit" To Jackson For Bed & Breakfast

A "Special Use Permit" was issued to June Jackson after the Groom City Council heard comments from several concerned citizens in their meeting last Tuesday night. June Jackson owns the former Alderman Don Case casting Culver House located at 507 E. 5th Street, and has plans to turn the private residence into a "Bed and Breakfast" establishment.

Residents Phillis Jackson, Ashley Jackson, Glenn D and Sybil Harrell, Fern Anderwald, Nellie and Burl Painter, Mary Rose, Janelle Sustaire and Diane Bruso attended the meeting.

Janelle Sustaire, representing the Zoning commission read minutes from their July meeting. The commission recommended that the property in question be rezoned commercial. However, upon information


obtained from the city attorney, it was found that spot zoning is illegal. He recommended that a special use permit be issued. The council agreed to the permit in a split decision with the dissenting vote.



Carson County Sheriff's Report

We currently have thirteen prisoners incarcerated in the Carson County Jail. Charges range from Possession of Heroin to Public Intoxication.

Deputy Jeff Oldham assisted White Deer City Marshal Tam Terry on an assault call in White Deer. One male was arrested for assault while the female was arrested for public Our intoxication. department is also assisting Marshal Terry in the investigation of a harassment/stalking case and in the investigation of false reports of fires and other emergency matters.

Sgt. Ray "Columbo" Davis used his finely honed investigative skills to collect numerous items of stolen property from a subject who was traveling through Carson County. The subject was a female who had left her spouse after a domestic violence episode. The female, in retaliation, had taken a number of sealed boxes from a camping trailer in their backyard and when she was stopped, it was found that the boxes contained stereo

equipment, telephones and several cases of paper shredders. The property was found to have been stolen from a railroad car in Amarillo three days before. The theft is now being investigated by the Santa Fe Railroad Police Department and the Federal Bureau of Investigation. Sgt. Davis provided an important link in locating suspects in the case.

Chief Deputy Lovell Kennard investigated an accident involving a drunk

driver along U.S. 207 north of Panhandle. The suspect had driven through several sections of fence and damaged private property. The suspect was arrested for DWI by Panhandle Police Chief Ken Rogers and Panhandle Police Officer Gary Robertson.

Our department assisted the Texas Highway Patrol at the scene of a two-vehicle accident on U.S. 60 at the intersection of FM 2373. An Amarillo woman was pronounced dead at the scene and the driver of the second vehicle was taken to Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo where he was

A pursuit which began on Interstate 40 near Shamrock ended in Carson was County Saturday night when the suspect vehicle was rendered inoperable after the tires were deflated. Sgt. Ray "Spike" Davis deployed Stinger Spike tire his deflation needles at a time which was beneficial to other motorists but was unfortunate for the stolen Ford Explorer and the three occupants. The vehicle had been pursued by the Texas Highway Patrol and one attempt had been made to "spike" the vehicle before it turned in the median and started back east on Interstate 40. The three suspects are currently incarcerated in the Carson County Jail. The Ford Explorer had been stolen from South Carolina.








Daryl Homer Takes Management Training For Circuit City
